## Overview of Habitat Management Guides Project

### Background

Alaska is an immense and bountiful frontier, and until just recently it was all but inconceivable that we would ever need to worry about its capacity to sustain the wealth of fish and wildlife resources for which it is renowned. But the impetus of progress has not abated, and the pressure to develop our lands and waters intensifies daily. Every year more lands in Alaska are being proposed for uses other than as wildlife habitat, especially around cities, towns, and villages. These proposed uses include logging, mining, hydroelectric projects, agriculture, settlement, geothermal development, and oil and gas leases, among others. As the number of proposals and plans for development continues to increase, so does the need to carefully and efficiently evaluate their possible effects upon species and habitats, and human uses of fish and wildlife, and to recommend viable managerial options to guarantee that our valuable fish and wildlife resources and habitats are adequately protected and maintained. By using appropriate planning and managerial techniques most of the potential for damage and loss of access for human use can be avoided.

One of the responsibilities of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) is to assist land managers by recommending to them the best ways and means, based upon the best available data, for protecting local fish, wildlife, and habitats against adverse effects and impacts. Because many proposals and plans for development and land uses require a rapid response from the department, there may not be enough time for staff to actually study the specific area in which the proposed development is to occur. However, the department initiated the Alaska Habitat Management Guides (AHMG) project to prepare reports of the kinds of information upon which its recommendations must be founded in order to responsibly and rapidly address land and water use proposals made by land managers. These guides are a major undertaking and will be of inestimable value to the state in its efforts to avoid or mitigate adverse impacts to Alaska's great wealth of fish and wildlife.

### Purpose

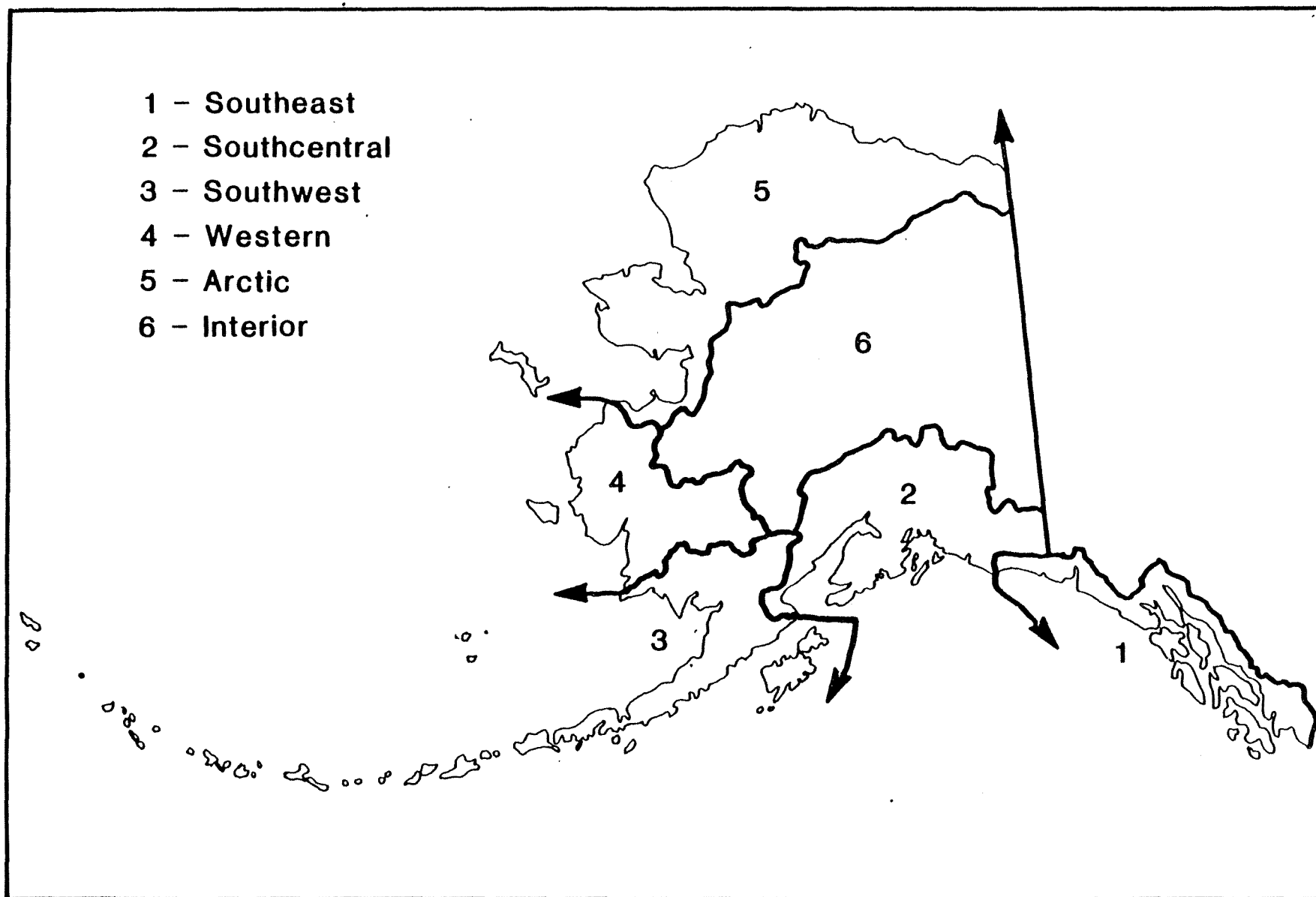
The AHMG present the best available information on selected fish and wildlife species: mapping and discussing their geographical distribution; assessing their relative abundance; describing their life functions and habitat requirements; identifying the human uses made of them, including harvest patterns of rural communities and access to fish and wildlife; and describing their role in the state's economy. This last kind of information, because of the variety of values humans place upon fish and wildlife, is not easily derived. There are, however, several methods to estimate some

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of the economic values associated with these resources, and such estimates have become particularly important in land use planning because many potentially conflicting uses must be evaluated in economic terms.

Essential to assessing what might happen to fish and wildlife if their habitats are altered is information about what effects or impacts are typically associated with particular kinds of developmental activities. The habitat management guides therefore also provide summaries of these known effects. This information, in conjunction with compiled life history information, will allow those concerned to estimate how sensitive a given species might be to a specific proposed activity - whether or not, and to what degree, the fish and wildlife are liable to be impacted. The guidance offered (a compilation of existing options for habitat management) is not site-specific. Rather, it is general information available to those who seek to avoid adverse impacts without placing undue restraints upon other land and water uses.

The completed guides coverage of fish and wildlife resources encompasses the Fish and Game Resource Management Regions established by the Joint Board of Fisheries and Game (map 1). These regions provide the most inclusive and consistent format for presenting information about fish and wildlife resources and relating it to management activities and data collection efforts within the department.

## SOUTHCENTRAL REGION: HISTORICAL ACCESS TO FISH AND WILDLIFE

### I. INTRODUCTION

#### A. Objectives

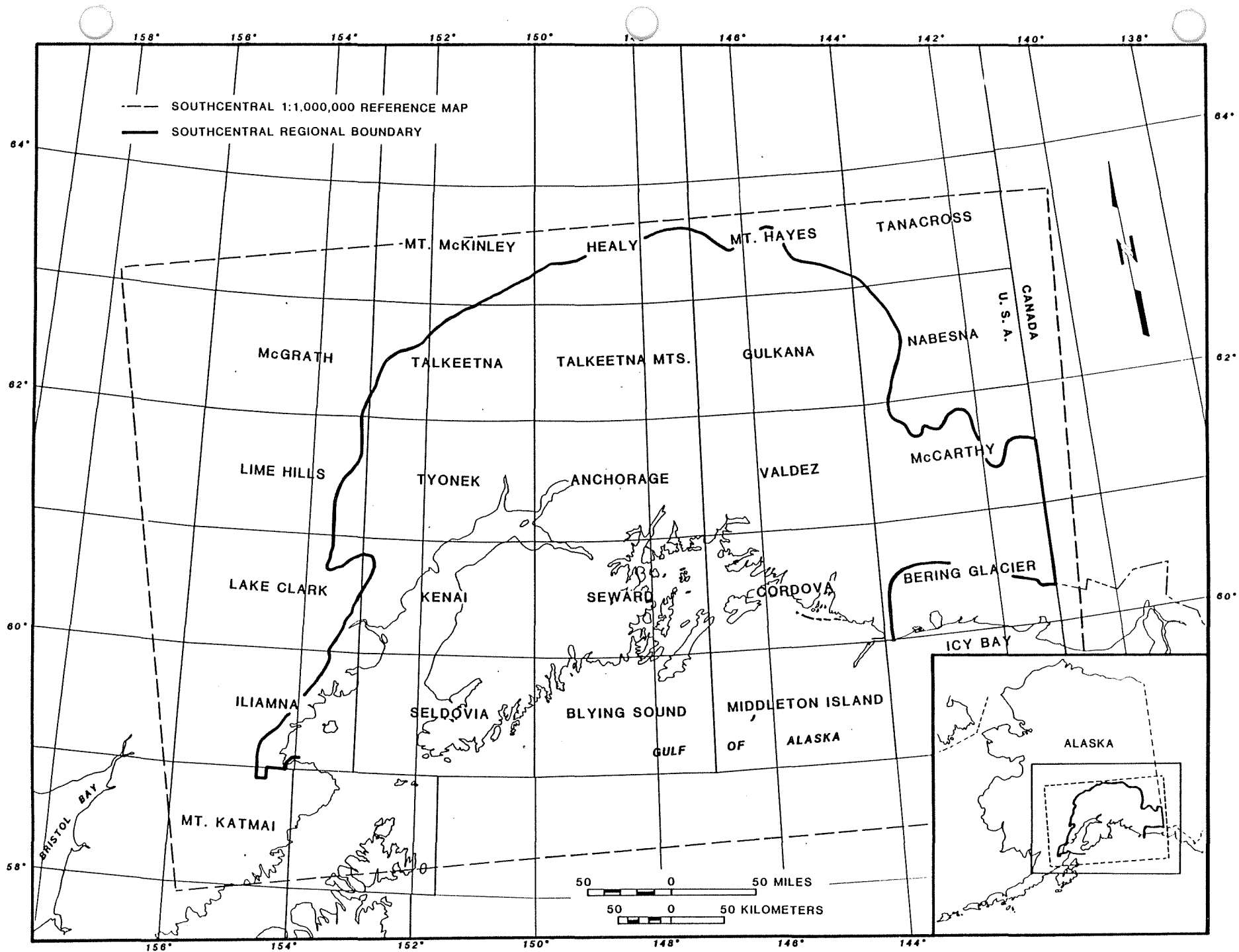
These maps and matrices have been compiled as part of the Alaska Habitat Management Guides project to identify routes and sites used by the public and/or the ADF&G to access fish and wildlife resources in Southcentral Alaska. The data contained in these products are intended for use by the Department of Fish and Game in conjunction with species distribution and harvest maps and narratives to provide a more complete picture of known current and past access patterns. It is important to note that these products document access as it has historically occurred in the region and have not been edited in terms of factors such as land ownership, legality of access, etc. It was felt that a comprehensive, realistic view of fish and wildlife use in this region depended upon maps showing, insofar as possible, actual patterns of public access to fish and wildlife. For these reasons, it should be clearly understood that the products presented here lend no authority for the public use of any of the routes or points shown. It remains the responsibility of users to obtain the appropriate authorizations for use of lands traversed by access routes.

#### B. Organization of Information

Two types of access data are presented here: 1) access sites used for hunting, fishing, trapping, or nonconsumptive use of fish and wildlife and 2) ADF&G research or management sites identified by departmental personnel during the course of this project.

The access sites are mapped on 1:250,000-scale USGS quad maps and described in short narratives, which are grouped by quad. For each quad, the access sites have been coded using sequential numbers, starting in the lower right hand corner and moving to the left. The narrative site descriptions are cross-referenced to the maps by the numerical codes. The maps and quad-based narratives are in alphabetical order based on U.S. Geological Survey quad names, as follows (see map 2):

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No documentation of historical access was collected for the following USGS quads in the Southcentral Region, which contain only small portions of the region:

Icy Bay	McGrath
Lake Clark	Mt. McKinley

Access information was collected only for the Southcentral Region portion of the USGS quads, with the exception of McCarthy and Nabesna. For these two quads, access information was also collected for portions of the Interior Region appearing on the quads.

## C. Qualifications/Limitations of Information

Several factors should be kept in mind when reviewing the information contained on the 18 maps and matrices. The access sites and routes included in this volume represent only those sites that ADF&G area management biologists in Southcentral Alaska knew were used within the last 20 years for access to fish and wildlife, either for hunting, fishing, trapping, or nonconsumptive use. In addition, permanent or semipermanent sites providing ADF&G biologists with access for their research and management operations are included. Unfortunately, it was not possible to confer with all persons or sources qualified to supply information regarding fish and wildlife access in a particular area, and therefore this information is possibly incomplete. It is recommended that users consult other sources of access information for additional information. Possible sources include ADF&G area biologists, air charter operators, hunting, fishing, and natural history guides, and local residents familiar with local use patterns. Although the following trail plans and atlases were examined in this project by the individuals locating the access sites and routes, they would be useful when interviewing additional people knowledgeable about access to fish and wildlife as references for the location of the access features: Matanuska-Susitna Borough Trails Plan (Comprehensive Development Plan - Trails, Mat-Su Borough, July 1984), the Susitna Basin Land Use/Recreation Atlas (ADNR/USDA SCS 1980), Alaska's Existing Trail System (ADOT 1974) and the Copper River Basin Area Plan Fish and Wildlife Element Atlas (ADF&G 1986).

The land status of each access site was not incorporated into these descriptions. Public access may or may not be allowed at the present time, depending upon the policies of the landowner. Land status within much of the State of Alaska is currently undergoing considerable change. Users should consult with the Alaska Department of Natural Resources (ADNR) and the U.S. Bureau of Land Management regarding the current land status of access sites identified in this volume and should also consult with the present landowner or land manager regarding allowed access. It

remains the responsibility of users to obtain the appropriate authorizations for use of lands traversed by historical access routes.

The mapped locations of the identified access sites and routes indicate only the general location and should not be used for navigational purposes. This access information is intended to be used for land management and planning, not as a travel guide to reach fish and wildlife. The general locations of the sites, trails, and water routes are based on the knowledge of ADF&G area biologists as they examined U.S. Geological Survey topographic maps. The biologists did their best to accurately portray the locations of such features as trails and the point location of airstrips and unimproved airplane landing areas. The ADF&G disclaims any responsibility for claims resulting from errors contained in the access information in this volume. The department advises users of this volume to check with local sources for more site-specific information.

Access trails designated in alpine tundra in this region are often of a very general nature. Because of the openness of alpine tundra, foot, ATV, horse, and snowmobile access is somewhat ubiquitous. Thus, a finite line drawn on a map may in reality be a general travel route rather than a specific trail. Local conditions and distribution of resources can cause variations in use patterns from year to year or within a year. People tend to travel directly towards resource concentrations (e.g., the distribution of trails is often dependent on the distribution of caribou in a particular winter). In forested areas, however, specific trails are more frequently the rule.

It is important to remember that the density of mapped trails does not indicate the density of use in an area. Access sites were mapped if they were known to be habitually used (usually annually) by either a variety of people or for a variety of uses.

Omission in the site description of species that users were seeking indicates that none of the sources mentioned it, not that the species is unused (if it is present). Even though sources used a species checklist as they mapped use areas, the species listed were recalled from memory. Species distribution maps could be used to evaluate the presence of other species in an area.

Acreage figures indicated in the site narratives represent desired easements. The legal land status of each site was not checked.

## II. METHODS

### A. Definitions

The following definitions were used to guide the source people in mapping access.

1. Boat launch - regularly or minimally maintained ramps or harbors known to be habitually used for launching boats for access to fish and wildlife. These sites are indicated on the maps as part of the "Other Access Sites" category.
2. Floatplane landing area - lake, stream, river, or coastal marine waters that are known to be habitually used for floatplane access to fish and wildlife resources. Additional areas are undoubtedly used for floatplane access to fish and wildlife.
3. Habitat enhancement site - areas that are presently being managed to increase the carrying capacity of the natural environment for a particular species. These sites are indicated on the maps as part of the "Other Access Sites" category.
4. Marine anchorage - mooring locations known to be habitually used by boaters for protection from the weather and/or for offloading skiffs, which are taken to shore for access to fish and wildlife resources. Floatplanes may also use these anchorages.
5. Public use cabin - noncommercial public use cabin maintained either by the U.S. Forest Service and located within the Chugach National Forest or by a Native corporation and known to be habitually used access to fish and wildlife.
6. Research and management site - seasonally used semipermanent or permanent sites used by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game for various research and/or management activities. These may include cabins, weirs, towers, camps, etc. These sites are indicated on the maps as part of the "Other Access Sites" category.
7. Road - improved, regularly maintained route known to be habitually used for access to lands and/or waters supporting fish and wildlife resources. A stretch of road is included only if highway vehicles are known to park along it to start using another mode of access (e.g., foot, ATV, horse, boat) to reach fish and wildlife resources. Pull-offs along roads are indicated on the maps as part of the "Other Access Sites" if they are used for access to fish and wildlife resources. (Note: Ice roads are included only if maintained and regularly used.)
8. Trail - unimproved or minimally maintained route known to be habitually used for access to lands and/or waters supporting fish and wildlife resources. These routes are repeatedly used over

alignments that remain generally unchanged. Trails receive use during open water periods and/or when the substrate is frozen.

9. Viewing area - locations known to be habitually used primarily for nonconsumptive uses (i.e., observation, photography) of fish and wildlife resources. These sites are indicated on the maps as part of the "Other Access Sites" category.
10. Water route - rivers, streams, lakes, and coastal marine waters known to be habitually used for motorboat, sailboat, canoe, raft, or kayak travel for the purpose of using fish and wildlife resources. In the site descriptions, the term "raft" is meant to represent nonmotorized rafts, canoes, and kayaks.
11. Wheel/ski airplane landing area - improved or minimally maintained airstrips or unimproved areas known to be habitually used for airplane access to fish and wildlife resources. Additional skiplane landing areas that were not mapped include frozen lakes and flat areas where vegetation is adequately covered with snow. Additional wheel plane landing areas that were not mapped include sand bars, beaches, and flat tundra areas.

## B. Procedures

1. Sources were contacted and briefed on the purposes of the project. These individuals chose the maps (USGS 1:250,000 quadrangles) to which they could contribute.
2. Sources were interviewed for information on access to fish and wildlife. The map category definitions were explained to these individuals, and they were shown the following trail atlases that applied to the geographic area with which they were familiar to aid in their location of sites and routes used for access to fish and wildlife:
  - ° Matanuska-Susitna Borough Trails Plan (Mat-Su Borough 1984)
  - ° Susitna Basin Land Use/Recreation Atlas (ADNR/USDA SCS 1980)
  - ° Alaska's Existing Trail System (ADOT 1974)
  - ° Copper River Basin Area Plan Fish and Wildlife Element Atlas (ADF&G 1986)

Sites and routes known to be used for access to fish and wildlife were recorded on USGS quad maps, and information on access mode, resources used, and any general comments were recorded on individual data sheets (one per identified site,

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route, or area). Any other access sites and routes the individual could locate from memory were also recorded.

3. Sources commented on material gathered from previous sources, which fleshed out descriptions and helped to consolidate information on trail systems.
4. Access data on individual source sheets from multiple sources were consolidated into one site description. Mapped data were numbered separately for each quadrangle and cross-referenced to the site narratives by the numerical site codes.
5. Draft maps were made available for review by sources.

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of moose and Dall sheep; and viewing of moose, Dall sheep, black bear, ptarmigan, and hare

Mode of access: Via foot

Place name: Crow Creek Road

General location: The road branches from the Alyeska Road at Mile 1.9 and extends north ca. 7 mi to near the headwaters of Crow Creek.

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of Dall sheep, moose, black bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, and hare; trapping of coyote, mink, and lynx; and viewing of Dall sheep, mountain goat, and moose

Mode of access: Via highway vehicle, 4x4 vehicle, snowmachine

Place name: Ram Valley Trail

General location: The trail begins in an unnamed drainage north of the Eagle River Visitor Center and extends east ca. 4 mi in alpine areas.

Mode of access: Via foot

Place name: Bird Creek Trail

General location: The trail begins near the end of Bird Creek Road and extends north ca. 8 mi crossing Bird Creek Pass and terminating in the headwaters of the north fork of Campbell Creek. A spur branches east from ca. Mile 5, and terminates near the headwaters of Bird Creek.

Acreage: Undetermined

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of moose, Dall sheep, black bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, and hare; trapping of coyote, mink, and lynx; fishing for Dolly Varden and pink salmon; and viewing of moose, Dall sheep, black bear, and mountain goat

Mode of access: Via foot, horse
