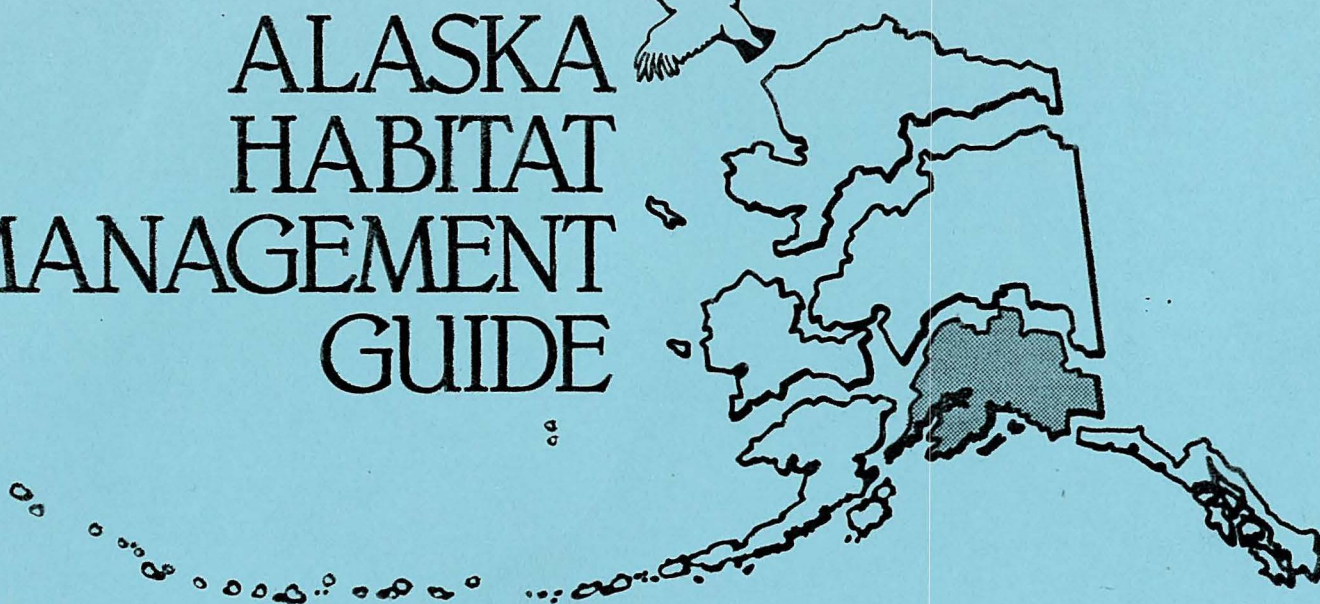

Acreage: Undetermined

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of moose, Dall sheep, brown bear, mountain goat; and fishing

Acreage: 150-ft easement

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of Dall sheep, mountain goat, black and brown bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, hare, waterfowl, sandhill crane, and snipes; trapping of lynx, mink, marten, wolf, wolverine, coyote, beaver, land otter, fox, and muskrat; and fishing

Acreage: 50-ft easement

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of Dall sheep, black and brown bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, and hares; trapping of fox and coyotes; and fishing

Mode of access: Via foot, horse, ATV, or snowmobile

Place name: Goat Trail

Acreage: 50-ft easement

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of Dall sheep, mountain goat, brown bear, spruce grouse, and hare; and trapping of fox and coyote

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of moose, Dall sheep, mountain goat, black and brown bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, hare, and waterfowl; trapping of coyote, mink, beaver, wolf, wolverine, lynx, land otter, fox, muskrat, and marten

Mode of access: Via foot, horse, ATV, and snowmachine

Place name: McCarthy Creek Trail

A short spur trail branches off near Mile 10 and extends west to the crest of Bonanza Ridge. Two short spur trails head off eastward.

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of moose, Dall sheep, mountain goat, black and brown bear, spruce grouse, ptarmigan, hare, and waterfowl; trapping of coyote, mink, beaver, wolf, wolverine, lynx, land otter, fox, muskrat, and marten; and fishing

Purpose or management/research objectives: To provide access for hunting of Dall sheep, mountain goat, brown bear, and ptarmigan

Mode of access: Via foot, horse, ATV, and snowmachine

Mode of access: Via foot, horse, ATV, snowmachine, skis

Mile 14 of the Fish Creek Trail.

Lower Fish Lake is 2 mi east on the trail; Upper Fish Lake is 3 mi east on the trail.
