STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Walla Walla site is nationally significant because of its association with the Iditarod National Historic Trail. The roadhouse was identified by Goodwin in his 1910 survey as a major roadhouse stop on the Kaltag to Nome route located over the divide from the McKinley Creek drainage, on the eastern side of the peninsula. Presently, the McKinley Creek trail, beginning at Walla Walla, is used as a snow machine trail versus the Portage Creek trail farther to the south. The Portage Creek Trail known for its gentler grade changes, was used by the mail runner. Walla Walla has been designated as significant on a regional basis also due to its intact condition as a typical log roadhouse site.
