STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

Elim is nationally significant because of its association with the Iditarod National Historic Trail. Elim was not located during the period of the Iditarod gold rush. An early missionary by the name of Father Osnis was the original founder of the permanent settlement at Elim. Father Osnis was from Golovin Mission on the Cape Darvey Peninsula. He moved the Golovin Mission to Elim in 1920. A roadhouse, Pleasant's Roadhouse which burnt in later years, was located at Elim. Elim is a significant regional site because of its historic association with Golovin Mission.
