Apparently a number of buildings of this mining camp and railroad station are still standing. A roadhouse (SOL-125) was shown here on the 1908 "Map of Seward Peninsula" by Arthur Gibson. The name derives from Iron Creek, which was the center of a major gold mining region in the early 1900s.
