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The United States Board of Geographic Names has named one of the highest poaks in the Romanzof Range in northeastern Alaska, near the Arctic Ocean, after Dr. Richard C. Hubley, a meteorologist who died on McCall Glacier in 1957. Mount Hubley is 8,819 foot.

The Anchorage Daily Times reported on April 15th that four mountaineers are preparing to climb Mt. McKinley. They will be flown with their gear to the 7,000 ft. Kahiltna Glacier on April 26th and hope to begin their climb the next day. The group will be lead by George Cloutier, a Fairbanks physician and includes Henry Marshall, Dr. Theodore Anderson and wildlife agent Gary Kinwood of Thee River, California.

"The Potomac Appalachian Trail Club of Washington, D.C., has recently published the minth edition of their bulletin, Hiking, Camping, and Mountaineering Equipment. In 50 pages, the bulletin lists domestic and many foreign sources of almost every conceivable item of outdoor equipment (except ski equipment). A four page introduction by Art Lembeck, Chairman of the PATC Equipment Committee and one of the leading exports on mountaineering equipment, discusses everything from what to export from a sleeping bag to how to seal a polyethylene food bag and what is the best type of salt tablet. If you're interested in axes (ice, Hudson Bay, or regular), bags (sleeping, food or duffel), crampons, karabiners or compasses, or any one of over 180 other items, the Equipment bulletin tells you where to buy it, how much it costs, how much it weighs, and what the advantages and disadvantages of different types may be.
