- January 27-28: Rescue Group overnight with MCA. This will probably be an Arctic Survival School - building snow caves, etc.
- In February: Tentatively, though no date has been set, a Ski Tour over Johnson Pass to Moose Pass a distance of 20 miles.
- February 10, 11, 12: Mail Trail snowshoe trip. This will be a repeat of the most successful Ski Bowl to Indian trip of 2 years ago. Gene Horning, leading. BR 8-9395.

SNOWSHOE TRAINING CLASS

On January 7, 1962 Joe Pichler conducted a training session for beginners on snowshoes. There was only one trouble -- only one "student" showed up. He was a guest of Rod Wilson, a newcomer to town Dr. Tom Kiester. He took to the shoes very readily and together with Joe, Rod, Jim Messick, and John Dillman, all of whom had been on the clumsy things before, we all plodded off into the woods near the foot of Clark's Road off Rabbit Creek Road about 2 miles south of the east end of O'Malley Road. We followed an old trail to the right of Clark's Road, then as we gained altitude we returned to the road and soon reached Clark's house standing 2300 ft above fog-bound Anchorage. The Aleutian Range and Alaska Range could be seen in fine detail sparkling in the sun. After coffee with the Clark's (who are always pleasant to Mountaineering Club members, but who say they tire of predatory and destructive visitors) we made our way up on to the ridge behind the Clark's. We decided not to try to climb Flattop since we did not have a rope (there-by having already broken a club rule which requires a rope on any outing more pretentious than a picnic) or ice axes which would be useful on the steep few feet near the top of Flattop. Led by John Dillman, we then came off the ridge to the South heading for the road which leads up into Rabbit Creek Valley. Joe Pichler took a shot with his gun at some Ptarmigan without success. Soon we reached the road which led back to the cars. We were gone about 6 hours and covered 4 or 5 miles in all.

PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS

I was gratified that so many showed up for the December 28 meeting in spite of the 30 to 40 below zero temperatures prevailing in the area that night.

One change of policy was voted: The Club will reimburse members for costs of film, developing and producing any black and white prints which are used in publicity write-ups of any MCA climb or trip. This is to encourage members to take more black and white photos, which can generally be reproduced much better than color slides.

According to the Constitution, January 1 is the deadline for payment of dues by established members. We have extended this deadline to the January 23 meeting. The list of members as of January 23 with their addresses and phone numbers will be published in February.

This is the final notice that beginning in February SCREE will be mailed only to members who are paid-up (plus prospective members, and non-members receiving complimentary copies, such as other Mountaineering Clubs on a reciprocal basis).

There has apparently been a misunderstanding as to when the MCA year begins and ends. For instance, some who paid for the first time in June or July were under the impression that this paid them up for all of 1962. However, the new MCA year begins in October according to the Constitution (which many members may not have seen). The Constitution and By-laws state:

1. "Dues shall be due and payable prior to the Annual Meeting,
2. "An Annual meeting shall be called during the month of October . ."

I believe this is a rather awkward arrangement. I suggest that we consider changing the Constitution so that the MCA year will more closely conform to a calendar year. As a temporary alleviation, we have decided that all those who paid dues in August or September shall be considered paid-up for the year beginning October 1961.

Journals of the Appalachian Mountain Club, Sierra Club, Alaska Alpine Club, American Alpine Club, Colorado Mountain Club, and the Explorers Club of Pittsburgh are received by MCA. Heretofore they have not been readily accessible to individual members. Beginning with the January meeting these journals will be brought by the Secretary to each general meeting for perusal by anyone interested.

Also available at each meeting will be the Club's official set of all issues of Scree. I feel that prospective members could become familiar with the Club's activities rather quickly by thumbing through these back issues of SCREE.
