Since Greg moved to California there have not been many articles in this section that might be informative to some or give others a moment to reminisce. The following article is one that probably best fits in the History Corner.

nber Glacier, Talkeetna Mountains

north of the Bomber Glacier.' Folks also began trekking into and out of the Mir Glacier hut by way of the Reed Lakes, which would take them over the Bomber Glacier.

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The Bomber Glacier was so named because of the four engine wrecked airplane that now rests on the glacier. Many folks visited the relic, poked around the wreakage, crawled into the fuselage, took a few pictures, and wondered what ever happened.

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The purpose of this article is to answer some of the questions. The plane laying on the glacier, about one mile northeast of upper Reed Lake, is a B-29 Superfortress. The B-29 was designed in 1937, first flown in Seattle in 1942, and out of production in 1946. The B-29 Superfortress is best remembered as the aircraft that dropped two atomic bombs on Japan in 1945.

This particular plane was set up strictly for radar use, and was on a routine radar calibrating flight when it crashed. The plane had taken off from Elmendorf AFB about 7 a.m. About 6 p.m. it flew over Talkeetna, on the way back to Elmendorf. A routine radio report was given with no unusual problems reported. The plane was not heard from again. The date was November 15, 1957. A crew of ten were on board; four survived the crash and were found the following day. The impact of hitting the glacier tore the cockpit section completely off. The cockpit slid 500 feet further up the glacier. None of the cockpit secton is visible today.

Weather was marginal at the time of the crash with the ceiling between 1,500 and 2,00 feet in the area. There was speculation that the plane was off course due to a snow storm between Talkeetna and Elmendorf. Possibly the crew was trying to fly around the storm. The plane was scheduled to land at Elmendorf about 7 p.m. but had enough fuel for another 5 hours of flying.

Today the faded red and sliver plane sits on the glacier as a quiet memorial to the past and the six men that died in the crash twenty-six years ago.
