MINUTES FOR THE MARCH MEETING

The meeting was held March 18th at the Pioneer Schoolhouse, and called to order by President Mark Findlay at 7:45 pm. The reading of the minutes for February was waived.

I. COMMITTEE REPORTS

- A. Library Committee Check out the new and improved library at Alaska Mountaineering and Hiking, 2633 Spenard Road. All you need to check out a book is a current MCA card.
- B. Hiking Committee Jim Pommert announced that the new hiking schedule for the spring, summer and fall would be

printed in the next Scree. If you are interested in leading a trip contact Jim.

- C. John Nevin will no longer be able to notify the newspapers about time and place of our meetings. If any one is willing to take over this job, please notify Mark Findlay. Thanks John, for all of your efforts.
- informed the club about the big proposed D. Tim Neal development (huge resort-1500 rooms) up the south fork of the Eagle River. Tim also informed us of a local helicopter company that is petitioning the Chugach State Park Advisory Board to allow them to land in the Park. informed us of the US Biathlon and Nordic Ski Association's plans to build a training camp up on the Eagle glacier approximately three miles from the MCA Eagle The facility will consist of permanent buildings hut. that can facilitate 24 skiers. The Chuqach National Forest will be taking comment on this matter at some future date. Tim recommends that the Club think on the matter and make a comment on the proposal at a later date. Tim supplied the Club with a fact sheet on the ski camp proposal.
- E. The board met on 3/11/87 after the printing of the Scree. The following topics were discussed:
 - 1. Hiking committee
 - a) Leaders needed for MCA trips.
 - b) Discussed a need for waiver being signed before a person could participate on a club trip. Decided a once in a lifetime (lifetime of a MCA membership) signing would be better than a waiver signed prior to every trip.
 - c) Discussed classifying trips in regards to difficulty.
 - d) Discussed a need for leadership qualifications, guidelines, and liabilities.
 - 2. The board decided on an answering machine for the MCA Hotline that would maintain itself rather than require periodic manual maintenance.
 - 3. The board discussed the insurance issue once again.
 - 4. The board discussed the status of the Clubs non profit and tax exempt filings.
 - 5. The board discussed gross negligence and the need for a leadership workshop.
 - 6. The MCA directory was discussed.

- 7. The cabin by Manitobou mountain that was offered for MCA use was discussed.
- 8. The board voted to extend the lease on the Mint Hut for another year.

II. OLD BUSINESS

- A. The MCA Hotline was installed. The number is 337-6679. See MCA Hotline instructions.
- B. The Wilderness Challenge Course that was discussed last month has been dismantled and put into storage.

III. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Tim Neal proposed to send a letter to the Parks and National Resources in opposition to allowing helicopter landings in the Chugach State Park. The motion passed unanimously.
- B. Mark Findlay informed the Club that during the April meeting we will be voting on some bylaw changes. See proposed By-Law changes.

NEW POLICIES FOR MCA TRIPS

The Board of Directors of the MCA and the Hiking Comittee have established some new guidelines and rules for all future MCA-sanctioned trips. These guidelines and rules are only very basic. It is impossible to be very specific about many details since each trip is unique, but it has become clear that in the past the club has had only vague guidelines for its trip leaders and participants. This is an attempt to change that, and there will probably be several refinements in rules over the next few seasons. Some of this may all seem very silly, but it should be remembered that past MCA trips have experienced injuries and even deaths.

V. LEADER QUALAFFICATIONS:

- A. Must be a member of the MCA.
- B. Must have approval of the Hiking Committee (A simple majority.)
- C. Must have participated in trips of the same or higher classification showing competence in the opinion of the leaders of those hikes, or equivalent experience acceptable to the Hiking Committee.

VI. LEADER GUIDELINES:

- A. Follow the general rules for MCA Sanctioned Trips.
- B. Must have a sign-up sheet with all participants' names on it and turn it in to the Hiking Committee at the end of the trip.
- C. Must select a meeting time and place disclose this information only to those persons on the sign-up sheet, unless call-ins are acceptable to the leader.
- D. Must verify that each participant has signed a valid waiver and that it is on file.
- E. Can require special equipment and refuse participation to any person that is ill-equipped.
- F. Has the authority to split the group (fast and slow), but must select a co-leader to help.
- G. Must report any injuries to the MCA President.
- H. Must report any personnel problems to the Hiking Committee.

TRIP CLASSIFICATIONS

The classifications below do not consider individual trip hazards such as river crossings, scree slopes, snow fields, bears, etc. Trip leaders are required to inform the trip participants of any such hazards either verbally, on the sign-up sheet, or in the trip description. Leader approval is required for all trips.

NON-TECHNICAL: Following are a few standards used to classify trips. The classification is made in terms of hiking distance and altitude gain. Many trips are not on established trails.

- CLASS A: Easy hikes with a maximum distance of 8 miles for day trips or 4 miles per day for overnight trips. Altitude gain up to 1200 feet.
- CLASS B: Trips involving a maximum distance of up to 12 miles for a day hike or 6 miles per day for an overnight trip. Altitude gain of 1200 to 2500 feet.
- CLASS C: Trips up to 15 miles for a day hike or 8 miles per day for an overnight trip. Altitude gain up to 3500 feet. Scree, steep grass, or other rough terrain problems may be encountered.
- CLASS D: Hikes and climbs with an altitude gain of over 3500 feet or a distance of greater than 15 miles for a day hike or greater than 8 miles per day for an overnight trip. Peaks in this classification may require minimal climbing skills.
- CLASS E: Hazardous climbing conditions may be encountered. A Basic Mountaineering Course may be required.

TECHNICAL: Technical trips are open to all <u>qualified</u> climbers. However, the registration on any particular trip must be restricted to a safe and manageable number of climbers. Registration is made directly with the leader who determines the qualifications needed for the trip.

TRIP PARTICIPANTS have the obligation to acquaint themselves with the nature of the trip and to verify that it is within their capability and experience. Anyone wishing to participate in any trip above CLASS A must have completed one or more trips of the next lower classification, or the equivalent.

GENERAL RULES FOR MCA SANCTIONED TRIPS (amended from March 1984 Scree)

1. Proper equipment is required as follows:

Day Hikes

Map, compass, whistle
Raingear that works
Warm clothing (not cotton)
Hiking boots
Sunscreen & dark glasses
Mosquito repellent
Water
Food
Fire starter
First aid kit with moleskin
Pocket knife

Additional for overnight or Special Situations

Down or synthetic equivalent
sleeping bag
Tent (or prearranged sharing)
Sleeping pad
Stove (if need to cook or melt snow)
fires usually prohibited
Adequate food for extra day
Dry clothes, socks, headgear, gloves
Stream crossing footwear

(This is a minimum list, it does not include equipment for climbs or winter.)

- 2. No dogs are permitted on MCA trips (among the reasons are bear problems.)
- 3. The leader's suggestions are to be followed. Do not go off alone, return or rush ahead without his (her) permission, and don't ford a stream before the leader assesses the situation. Remember, this is a club trip and the leader must know where all participants are.

 Anyone separating from the group without the leader's approval is no longer considered a participant in the MCA Sanctioned trip.
- 4. Non-sponsored, informal, mid-week hikes meet at UAA Sports Complex, west entrance, unless otherwise instructed.
- 5. You must be signed up on a trip roster (club meetings) or through contact with the leader, and have signed the club waiver to be on a club trip.
- 6. When carpools are arranged, please plan to pay the driver your share without his (her) asking you. Generally \$5 short trips, \$10 or more for longer.
- 7. If at the last minute you find you can't go, please let the leader know, both for transportation planning and so someone else can go. If you are the leader, help find a replacement.
- 8. Total number of people on club trips: Minimum: 4 (for safety reasons)

Maximum: Leader option, depends upon the trail and campsite conditions, but generally limited to 12 in trailess areas or State & National Parks

9. Firearms are not encouraged, and please let the leader know if you want to carry one - it will be leader's option.

ALASKA SEA KAYAKING SYMPOSIUM '87

Sea kayaking instruction, plenty of kayaks, and a weekend of fun will be offered again this year at the second ALASKA SEA KAYAKING SYMPOSIUM, in Seward, AK, June 12, 13, 14, 1987.

Water skills and safety will be a primary emphasis of the symposium. On-water activities will focus on demonstrations and instruction in paddling techniques, personal and group rescue, reading the water, hypothermia and emergencies.

Kayaks and equipment will be available for Symposium participants to see and tryout. You need not have a kayak to participate at ASKS'87!

For experienced paddlers, trip leaders, and sea kayaking guides there will be the ALASKA OPEN OCEAN PADDLING WORKSHOP, also at Seward, June 9, 10, & 11, 1987. British Canoe Union coaches and authors John Ramwell and Derek Hutchinson will be featured instructors for this special on-water workshop. Other instructors will include John Bauman, who recently circumnavigated Iceland, Doug Fesler, and Robin Ziperman. Topics will include surf landings and launchings, kayak surfing, coastal and open water navigation, group dynamics and leadership, emergency kayak repair, emergency situation management, and discussion of off-season training techniques. Instruction will take place in the classroom, swimming pool, and at sea.

The deadline for registration for both events is May 15th with registration being limited to 350 participants for ASKS'87 and 40 participants for the Open Ocean workshop. Registration forms are available at kayaking retail shops, in the April issue of BLUE WATER PADDLER, or by contacting:

MCA TRIP HOTLINE

The phone is up and working just great. By following the instructions closely you should have no problem leaving or hearing trips.

The phone number is 337-6679. You must have a push button phone to hear the trip messages, but can leave a trip from any type of phone.

To hear the recorded trips: dial 337-6679. The message you will hear is called the outgoing message and it explains how to play the tape with the trip messages. While the outgoing message is still playing PUSH O, you will hear one to eight beeps tell you how many messages have been left. Immediately after the last beep PUSH 66 and another beep will be heard. There is a delay while the tape rewinds. After all the messages have played, three beeps will sound. Hang up. To hear the trips again during the playback push 3. The tape will rewind and replay 15 seconds of tape, to rewind further push 3 again.

To leave a trip just wait for the beep at the end of the message. It is a good idea to have the trip written out before you call. Leave your name, phone number, day of the trip, and a short description. Do not leave a meeting place.
