Jan 31-Feb 2 MANITOBA MOUNTAIN


The MCA has reserved the cabin near Summit Lakes for Friday and Saturday nights. It sleeps 12 or so. Each person contributes \$5.00 to the Nordic Ski Club. There is excellent telemark skiing on the nearby mountain, as well as flat skiing available.

Those driving south from Anchorage should park at a turnoff on the left, approximately 8 miles south of the Hope cutoff, at milepost 249, just past a sign for Fresno Creek. (If you reach Summit Lakes, turn around). A trail goes north from the turnoff, running adjacent to the guard rail and then down into the woods for 1/2 mile. Reach a foot bridge over Summit Creek, and the cabin just beyond on a knoll.

There is a wood stove and bunks. Space will go to those who show up first, so a tent may be a good idea. Call leader. Class A. Leader: Neil O'Donnell 274-5069

TRIP REPORTS

Flattop

A blizzard made it difficult to reach the summit of Flattop during the annual solstice overnight event.

Rumor was that some early arrivals managed to make it up before the storm hit. (They were sighted, like Mallory and Irvine, somewhere below the summit.) Maxine Stoddard and I made it as far as the saddle past blueberry hill before wind, darkness and the flu convinced us to make camp in the trees. Chris Tomsen and Roy Smith, frustrated by intense wind and frost nip, turned around after 500 meters. Chris retreated to a collapsing snow cave two hundred meters from the parking lot, but later reached the saddle below the summit with the Sorensens.

Mark Miraglia started after dark and made it half-way before turning around. Others failed to show when they learned of the storm. During the middle of the night, when the storm had let up and the full moon was high in the sky, a pair of photographers from the Times also made a failed effort for the summit.

AMERICAN LUNG ASSOCIATION SKI TRIPS

A ski trip from Hilltop to Kincaid will take place on Saturday, February 1 to benefit the American Lung Association. This will offer skiers a 37-kilometer course with warm rest stops, a barbecue at the finish and transportation from Kincaid back to Hilltop.

Hilltop Ski Area will provide a pancake breakfast during registration, local restaurants have donated hot soup, which will be served in warm tents at three rest stops along the way. Princess Tours will provide the transportation. Everyone who participates in the trek raises \$100.00 in pledges to support the Lung Association's programs.

Other backcountry ski trips include: Nancy Lake, February 29-March 2; Foggy Pass, March 7-14; Ruth Glacier, March 12-15; Resurrection Trail, March 14-18. The Lung Association offers a training course in winter camping, backcountry skiing and first aid for all participants.
