TRIP REPORTS

Yudikench Peak

he rain pounding my window and the water spewing from the gutter kept me awake much of the night, so after hitting the snooze on my alarm clock five or six times, I tumbled out of bed at 6:30 Saturday morning, already an hour late. I hurriedly dressed, packed, ate, and sped to the Eklutna Lake trailhead amid pouring rain. I wondered if I was doing the right thing by heading out in a downpour. I also thought the rest of my party might have had the sense to spend the rainy day inside. Upon turning onto the Eklutna Lake Road, however, the rain stopped.

I had arranged to meet with Tom Choate and an unnamed friend of his at the Bold Ridge Overlook Trail approximately 5 miles from the Eklutna Lake parking lot at about 9:15. I was going to hike in because I don't own a mountain bike. Tom and his friend would get an hour extra sleep and would enjoy

the speedy approach to the start of the climb.

I set out along the Eklutna Lakeside Trail on foot, enjoying patches of blue sky. At 9:40 I arrived at the Bold Ridge Overlook Trail just past Bold Creek, but did not see any sign of other people that day. I waited until shortly after 10, then proceeded alone up the trail to climb Yudikench Peak (elev. 5732, T15N, R3E, Sec. 4). I had seen the name Yudikench Peak assigned to this peak at the local USGS office. I had also seen the same peak named Bleak Peak on maps at the Vin Hoeman Library at Alaska Mountaineering and Hiking. I have called the feature Yudikench Peak in deference to the governmental authority. Tom had told me a month earlier that "Yudikench" meant "golden eagle's nest" in the D'naina dialect. It seemed a fitting name because I saw a golden eagle soaring overhead throughout the day.

As the Bold Ridge Overlook Trail emerged from the alders, I left the now snowy trail to head northeast, crossing Bold Creek and circling around a ridge on a very wet willow-studded bench above Sdaylent Creek (I had also obtained the name Sdaylent from USGS, although I am ignorant as to its meaning, if any). I crossed the stream and headed north up a southeast-facing slope. After attaining the ridge, I followed it over Point 5420, where I noticed a cairn, to Yudikench Peak at the head of the Yuditna Creek drainage (again, the name came from USGS. Apparently it means "golden eagle creek." Chugach State Park has erected a sign on the Eklutna Lakeside Trail naming the stream Yuditnu Creek, probably a misspelling of Yuditna.) The hiking was relatively easy for most of the way. A sheep trail followed most of the ridge, but at times was covered with snow. I found a cairn on the summit, but no register. A storm was heading down the Hunter Creek drainage, so I returned on the same route, finding an old, wet tent without poles in a green and white 5-gallon bucket. I made a mistake crossing Sdaylent Creek below its confluence with a side stream in Section 17. The water was much higher and faster downstream of the confluence.

As I headed down the wet willow-studded bench, I began to see fresh tracks heading out. I followed them until I could see Tom Choate and another man ahead of me. I crossed Bold Creek below them, beat some alders for a short distance, and arrived at the Bold Ridge Overlook Trail at about the same time as Tom. With him was James Larabee. Apparently they had a late start and I had missed them by about 5 or 10 minutes. They had headed up Point 5430 and enjoyed a nice glissade down. We had a pleasant walk down to the Eklutna Lakeside trail together. Once at the Eklutna Lakeside Trail, though, I found the real benefit of having a mountain bike. Tom



and James zipped by me as I plodded down the trail. It took me 50 minutes longer to hike out than it took for them to ride. Nonetheless, they waited for me so we could gorge on ice cream and pizza. Once down on the Glenn Highway, the rain resumed. What had been a rainy day in the Anchorage Bowl had been pretty decent (albeit windy) at Eklutna Lake.

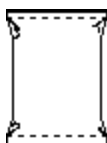
