TRIP REPORTS

Ice is Nice in Eagle River Valley by Steve Davis



large number of local climbers have begun the year right by improving their ice climbing skills out at Echo Bend in Eagle River Valley on January 10, 1998. The weekend began with an ice climber's orientation provided by

Steve Davis. Fifty-five people attended his slide show hosted by the Eagle River Nature Center. His slides, music and narration provided an overview of ice climbing areas from Homer to Valdez and a few areas in between.

On Saturday, Steve led a group of 33 climbers to Echo Bend. With the assistance of several experienced climbers, a series of 8 top-rope routes were established ranging in grade from WI2-4. Temperatures were mild for this time of year and with all the routes, no one got cold. People were able to rotate through the climbs, testing a variety of tools, all the while receiving pointers from the more experienced climbers. The ice conditions were perfect; some pitches were wet and plastic, while others were brittle and chandiliered. By mid-afternoon, everyone was pretty tired but happy with the day. People who had chosen to bring their skis were the envy of those on snowshoes or on foot as the 3.5 mile hike out seemed to take a little longer than usual.

All reports following the trip have been positive. People learned that waterfall ice is more fragile than glacier ice and thus requires more finesse and better technique to climb. The importance of good footwork was stressed and climbers learned to "stem" The success of the trip would not have been possible with out the help of several club members who offered their assistance. I wish to particular thank, Ralph and Thor Tingey, Pete Panerese, Willy Hersman, Mark Miraglia, Richard Baranow, and Wendy Sanem.

Snow and Weather Information

The Alaska River Forecast Center (AKRFC) is sending daily snow and weather information to their home page at http://
www.alaska.net/~akrfc on the internet. The data can be found by clicking the "data" button on the home page. The data are made available to help the recreational user to do a preliminary assessment of the snow conditions and avalanche potential before leaving for the site. On-site evaluations will still be necessary for a safe trip. The daily data includes snow depth, snow water equivalent, accumulated precipitation since October 1, maximum and minimum temperatures, maximum and minimum wind speeds, and maximum wind speed direction. Some hourly data are also planned. Some sites do not collect all of these data types.

The data are provisional data - that is, the data has not been checked for accuracy prior to it being sent to the home page database. Thus, the user should evaluate the data for reasonableness before using it to make decisions. The user should also be aware that the locations of most of the sites are located in the valley bottoms for the collection of precipitation data, so the wind data, and even the precipitation data, may not be representative of the snow and winds at higher elevations and in the avalanche starting zone. As you know, precipitation and winds can be extremely variable in mountainous terrain. The AKRFC plans to add upper level wind information to their home page to assist in the preliminary evaluation of ridge-top snow loading.

Data is provided for sites throughout Alaska, with a heavier concentration of sites in Southcentral Alaska. Sites in Southcentral Alaska include Independence Mine in Hatcher Pass, Turnagain Pass, Summit Creek, Grandview, Cooper Lake, Indian Pass, Sheep Mountain Airport, Talkeetna, Portage Visitor Center, and others. As was mentioned above, the data collected at one of the gauge sites may not be representative of your location of interest, but you may be able to evaluate a pattern to forecast the difference. For example, there is an indication that the precipitation at Turnagain Pass, which is measured on Center Ridge, is less than what typically falls on nearby Tincan Mountain.
