P R O C E E D I N G S

(On Record at 2:45 p.m.)

MR. PENNOYER: Are we on the air? Who is on line?

MR. WOLFE: Roll call.

MR. PENNOYER: Good idea. We are reconvening of the Trustee Council meeting that we recessed here last week. Those that are here in Juneau are Jim Ayers and John Sandor, I'm Steve Pennoyer, and there's Jim Wolfe, and the supporting staff. Could we have a roll call of who is at the other locations?

MS. WILLIAMS: Steve, in Anchorage there is Deborah Williams and Craig Tillery and staff.

MR. PENNOYER: (Inaudible -- simultaneous talking) out there somewhere?

MR. SAKURA: In Washington, Dan Sakura.

MR. ROSIER: Steve, I'm here, as is Jerome.

MR. PENNOYER: Okay. Perhaps we should proceed then and let Mr. Ayers lead us through the document we've just received.

MR. AYERS: Mr. Chairman, just before we recessed our previous meeting, we had -- I was directed to put together a letter with the various parties, including the state representative Mark Broderson, as well as the Attorney General's Office, and the Forest Service as the lead agency. We completed that letter and sent the letter forthwith, which you all have copies of or were copied, basically outlining our basic protective measures proposal. That letter was sent to Eyak -- Eyak and Sherstone Corporation, owner of the timber rights. They acted over the weekend, and I received

1 several phone calls from them over the weekend regarding the
2 letter, and they felt like it was imperative that they respond
3 immediately. They are putting together and have worked out with
4 their board the details of a proposal which they are sending back
5 to us. However, in order to deal with the immediate concern of
6 Orca Narrows, linking Orca Narrows to that protection of habitat --
7 those habitat areas that we described -- they have contacted us and
8 asked that we respond -- certainly to this time if they -- if an
9 oral presentation of simply a statement that they are interested in
10 resolving the issue of this year's scheduled harvest, and their
11 attorney assured me some two hours ago that he would have a very
12 brief letter by 2:30. I have not received that letter, but they
13 are not able to get the detailed proposal to us yet, but they
14 wanted to immediately get up a positive response and also offer to
15 us the opportunity to acquire the scheduled harvest for this summer
16 in those areas that we are concerned about and link that to their
17 more detailed proposal by getting up -- I don't want to use the
18 word "option" until we see their detailed proposal -- but giving up
19 a moratorium, so to speak, on those areas, the core lands, the
20 specific biological areas of importance, and Orca Narrows -- they'd
21 give us a moratorium as well. That proposal, however, from them
22 says that they have been informed by Rainier that, based on market
23 conditions, that the timber is worth some two hundred dollars per
24 board feet. We have informed them that that would have to be
25 subject to an appraisal and that we are interested in working with
26 them, but it all has to be subject to an appraisal. Therefore, you

1 have the best of our thinking to this point, which is the
2 resolution that's in front of you. The time critical element of
3 this is that their board has also agreed to simply recess. They
4 are going to reconvene late this afternoon, subject to our
5 discussion. I got the feeling that the Trustee Council, as a
6 group, wanted to continue to be included in this particular aspect
7 of the negotiations at this point in a very detailed way, and so,
8 they are asking that we respond to their -- their concern at this
9 point about the summer's scheduled harvest. That is what is before
10 you, but then also be clear that this is considered to be a lynch
11 pin to those areas which we outline in our areas, core areas,
12 special biological areas, Orca Narrows.

13 MR. ROSIER: Mr. Chairman? (Pause) Mr. Chairman?

14 MR. PENNOYER: Yes.

15 MR. ROSIER: I hope that Jim was not talking about two
16 hundred -- some two hundred dollars per board foot, and that that
17 was closer to a thousand board feet.

18 MR. AYERS: Yes, I stand corrected. I had the K in
19 front of the B-F but . . .

20 MR. PENNOYER: He does that rather frequently on millions
21 and thousands so --

22 (Laughter)

23 MR. ROSIER: Okay. I thought the price of timber had
24 really gone through the roof.

25 (Laughter)

26 MR. AYERS: Two hundred dollars per thousand is what

1 they believe they have good information on. We did work with them
2 both Saturday and Sunday. They agreed to send representatives of
3 their organization, including Rainier's representative, to Juneau.
4 They met with the Forest Service this morning and discussed the
5 appraisal process, including the information that they have
6 available regarding the value of this timber. What obviously I
7 think is at issue for Eyak is they would like -- they have
8 indicated positively -- we should have a letter stating that, but
9 they have definitely indicated through their board of directors to
10 us that they met. They also met with their shareholders and had a
11 lengthy discussion about this issue, and the board has directed
12 them to proceed. The issue at hand is that they would -- they want
13 to make it clear they do not -- they do not want the appearance of
14 inappropriate or even threatened behavior, but they are simply
15 trying to move forward with their corporation, and they have
16 waited, as they stated, some eighteen months to move forward. They
17 regret the timeliness of this, but would like to get an answer if
18 we are interested in doing something this summer with regard to
19 both their proposed scheduled harvest and then, as I say, the lynch
20 pin to their larger, detailed proposal, which they hope to have to
21 us, you know, as soon as possible, and their board did vote to
22 authorize them to move forward with a more detailed proposal that's
23 responsive to our letter. The resolution, Mr. Chairman, that's
24 before you in draft is a variety of conversation, and maybe the
25 thing to do is to take a -- ten minutes or so, and let people have
26 a chance to take a look at that. It is my understanding now that

1 we have been contacted by the Eyak attorney, and that letter is
2 being faxed from him now.

3 MR. PENNOYER: So the letter will arrive before we have
4 to make a decision on this then?

5 MR. AYERS: Yes, sir.

6 MR. ROSIER: Jim? Mr. Chairman?

7 MR. PENNOYER: Yes, go ahead, Carl.

8 MR. ROSIER: We have not received the resolution.

9 MR. AYERS: Is there -- Molly, are you on line there
10 in Anchorage?

11 MS. MCCAMMON: I am. We'll check and make sure it gets
12 to the appropriate person.

13 MR. AYERS: I'll take care of it right now, Carl. Can
14 you give me your fax number?

15 MR. ROSIER: Three-three-two.

16 (Aside comments)

17 MR. AYERS: We have received the letter just now from
18 Eyak, and -- here it is.

19 (Aside comments)

20 MR. PENNOYER: Can I ask legal counsel for some advice
21 here. I'm not sure how deep we're going to go into negotiating,
22 discussions, on the record before we go into an executive session.
23 I'm not clear when that should happen or if it should happen.

24 MR. WOLFE: I'll have to ask Maria that.

25 MS. LISOWSKI: It seems to me that this document is still
26 in draft, so it's still a privileged document, and if you're going

1 to be discussing this document in terms of what the offer is from
2 Eyak (indiscernible -- extraneous noise) go into executive session.

3 MR. AYERS: Mr. Chairman, we were -- we were hoping
4 that we would have the copies of the letter when we -- get the
5 copies of the letter and I would recommend that we move into
6 executive session.

7 MR. PENNOYER: Well, why don't we do that, and then while
8 you're getting the copies out we can make any hook-ups or any other
9 changes we need to make in the hook-up. Who is going to do that
10 for us? Do I hear a motion -- do I need a motion to go to
11 executive session?

12 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Yes.

13 MR. PENNOYER: I have a motion

14 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: You have the motion, I have the
15 second.

16 MR. PENNOYER: Okay. It's been moved and seconded. Any
17 objection to going to executive session to discuss the negotiation
18 aspects of this agreement? Hearing none, then, Jim, will you
19 arrange that?

20 MR. AYERS: Yes.

21 MR. PENNOYER: And then we will do that and then come
22 back on the public record later this afternoon. So, we'll see you.
23 Do you want to disconnect now and then reconnect, or how do you
24 wish to do it?

25 MR. AYERS: Yes. Are the LIO's on line?

26 MS. MCCAMMON: Jim, this is Molly. They are.

1 (Inaudible-- simultaneous talking) There are Cordova, Valdez and
2 Kodiak LIO's. We'll have to disconnect and then reconnect the
3 Trustees.

4 MR. AYERS: Was that you, Molly?

5 MS. MCCAMMON: Yes, it is.

6 MR. PENNOYER: Molly, you'll have to speak up. We can't
7 hear you.

8 MS. MCCAMMON: You'll have to disconnect and then we will
9 reconnect you.

10 MR. AYERS: Right. As discussed, we're going to hang
11 up now, and if you'll reconnect all of the Trustees at their
12 appropriate numbers.

13 MS. MCCAMMON: That's correct.

14 MR. AYERS: Thank you.

17 MR. PENNOYER: Carl are you there?

18 MR. ROSIER: (Inaudible)

19 MR. PENNOYER: Carl is that you?

20 MR. ROSIER: Yes. Okay.

21 MR. PENNOYER: Your voice is fading at this hour. Okay,
22 well, can we get back and reconvene our meeting now as -- why we
23 recessed for an executive session to discuss Eyak habitat
24 protection offer, and I believe that Executive Director Ayers will
25 lead into a status report of where we are in this matter. Mr.
26 Ayers.

1 MR. AYERS: Mr. Chairman, on April 28, subsequent to
2 our meeting and direction of the Trustee Council, I sent to the
3 president of Eyak Corporation-Sherstone Corporation, outlining the
4 interest of protective measures that the Trustee Council proposed
5 for lands owned by Eyak Corporation or in control of their
6 Sherstone Corporation. Those included the core lands, the area's
7 special biological areas, and you included in your restoration --
8 specifically Orca Narrows. In the body of that letter, we
9 requested a detailed proposal from their board of directors that
10 would accommodate our interests in the protection, as well as
11 recognizing that they had interests in development of their lands
12 in the future. We also proposed in that letter an interim measure
13 that they proposed to us that some measure for acquiring protection
14 for corporate lands on which timber harvesting was scheduled prior
15 to April 1995. Through a meeting of their board of directors over
16 the weekend, the Eyak Corporation, Sherstone Corporation board of
17 directors have sent to us a letter in direct response to our
18 proposal. Certainly, they have not had time to prepare a detailed
19 proposal for the acquisition of the larger areas of interest that
20 I outlined, but they did respond to our request for a proposal for
21 an interim measure, inasmuch as we're interested in acquiring
22 protection for the corporation lands on which timber harvesting is
23 scheduled prior to April 1st, and their letter received this
24 afternoon, dated May 2nd, 1994, and signed by John Johnson,
25 chairman of the Eyak board of directors, and Luke Borer, president
26 of Sherstone Corporation, they have outlined to us a proposal for

1 that interim measure, and essentially that letter proposes that we
2 acquire at fair market value, although they also identify more than
3 two hundred dollars per thousand board feet, some approximate ten
4 million board feet that is scheduled for harvest. The legal
5 description is in the body of that letter. They also proposed a
6 moratorium on the other areas that we have identified as important,
7 at least until -- they've proposed March 1, 1995. They mention a
8 couple of other items that are of consequence to that, including
9 that we provide indemnification, which I've been advised is not
10 possible, but -- we're not within legal jurisdiction, nor do we
11 have the authority to provide full indemnification of Eyak and
12 Sherstone for damages and costs with regard to the transaction.
13 Therefore, Mr. Chairman, I seek guidance and a resolution to
14 specifically respond to their letter and hope that we can do so
15 today.

16 MR. PENNOYER: Thank you, Mr. Ayers. Could I entertain
17 a motion then from the Trustee Council as to how to proceed, which
18 we could amend as appropriate -- yes, Mr. Wolfe.

19 MR. WOLFE: Mr. Chairman, while the Forest Service has
20 some concerns about some of the specifics of the proposal prepared
21 -- or submitted -- by Eyak, we would like to make a motion that we
22 prepare a resolution to address the interim protection of the
23 subparcels, Orca Narrows, as described in that offer from the
24 imminent threat of timber harvest and that we do this as quickly as
25 possible, maybe even yet today.

26 MR. PENNOYER: Do I hear a second for discussion?

1 MR. ROSIER: Second.

2 MR. PENNOYER: Okay, could I have then discussion or
3 potential amendments, things of interest to the Trustee Council.

4 MR. SANDOR: Call for the question.

5 MR. PENNOYER: I think before calling the question, there
6 are a couple of items that might be of some concern in terms of
7 preparation of the resolution. Maybe we should clarify to
8 Executive Director Ayers before he prepares it. I know that our
9 letter, for example, could clarify the fact that our interests were
10 rather broad in this area, as has occurred in past discussions, but
11 we did solicit an interim proposal to address the short-term
12 concerns of immediate timber harvest in Orca Narrows. I believe
13 that was the nature of the response that we received from Eyak
14 Corporation. Nevertheless, I think, as Eyak points out in the
15 final paragraph of their letter, there is an interest in a broader
16 concern. For example, the (indiscernible) covers only a small part
17 of the items in our letter -- item three, areas contributing to
18 restoration of Orca Narrows. The area's importance, both
19 recreation and tourism, and in fact this interim measure covers
20 even a small part of that total area of concern. So, I guess I
21 would ask in this resolution that the Executive Director addresses
22 a more comprehensive concern expressed both by the Trustee Council
23 and by Eyak Corporation, and they would then in a relatively short
24 period of time, as part of this apparent agreement, we express the
25 need to receive a more detailed proposal addressing other concerns
26 in their April 28th letter. So, if someone wants to move that --

1 MR. SANDOR: I'll move.
2 MS. WILLIAMS: Second.
3 MR. ROSIER: Second.
4 MR. PENNOYER: Is there any further discussion of that
5 aspect? (No audible response) I know that there's some concern
6 about the court request for funding. Does anybody want to further
7 elaborate on that?
8 MR. WOLFE: Mr. Chairman? I would propose to include
9 in the resolution the -- that we will go to the court for up to two
10 million dollars of the monies and have them available to
11 demonstrate our good faith in moving forward with this resolution.
12 MR. PENNOYER: That would be upon acceptance of Eyak --
13 by Eyak -- of this offer then?
14 MR. WOLFE: I would presume that would be the case.
15 MR. PENNOYER: Is there a second to that?
16 MR. ROSIER: I'll second it.
17 MR. PENNOYER: Does anyone want to further discuss that
18 aspect of it? (No response) Okay. Is there any discussion about
19 the content of the moratorium and funding offer, or was that
20 covered adequately in the discussion we've had so far? (Pause)
21 Yes, Mr. Sandor?
22 MR. SANDOR: Mr. Chairman, I just wanted to reiterate
23 our understanding and my understanding of the resolution and the
24 point that what we're really after is the protection of those lands
25 identified in the April 28th letter, which specifically with regard
26 to Orca Narrows, the twenty-six hundred acres of lands that are --

1 that are in that viewshed. So, I see this as an interim step of
2 what we will ultimately achieve -- achieve is what appears to be
3 apparent in Eyak-Sherstone's letter, last paragraph, of the mutual
4 commitment to achieve total protection of all the areas that are
5 identified in the April 28th letter, and I believe that the
6 resolution can be drawn with that in mind.

7 MR. PENNOYER: Thank you, Commissioner. Mr. Ayers?

8 MR. AYERS: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Perhaps in follow-up
9 to Commissioner Sandor's comments that the -- it's my -- I guess it
10 was recommended that we respond specifically to the letter from
11 Eyak with regard to a moratorium, perhaps we would propose that the
12 offer to purchase a moratorium on commercial timber harvest and
13 road development that is scheduled prior to March 1, 1995, on the
14 seller's land that were described in the Trustee Council's letter
15 of April 28th, and that that moratorium be for some four hundred
16 thousand dollars. However, that if the fair market value of that
17 timber, four thousand board feet, exceeds one hundred and sixty
18 dollars, that the price of the moratorium will be reduced by one
19 hundred dollars for each penny the fair market value of the timber
20 is above the one hundred and sixty dollars per thousand board feet,
21 and therein providing them a moratorium -- some compensation for
22 their moratorium -- unless they actually do accomplish a fairly
23 high value for their timber, i.e., a hundred and sixty dollars or
24 more, and then it's reduced accordingly?

25 MS. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I so move.

26 MR. PENNOYER: Deborah -- the second.

1 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: I'll second it.

2 MR. SANDOR: Mr. Chairman.

3 MR. PENNOYER: Yes, Mr. Sandor.

4 MR. SANDOR: Just for the benefit of our understanding,
5 this essentially then would achieve the value described in the
6 Eyak-Sherstone proposal, is that not true?

7 MR. PENNOYER: Mr. Wolfe?

8 MR. WOLFE: I was just going to elaborate on what Mr.
9 Sandor has said there, and I guess what we're trying to achieve is
10 that if we got to this point, we would accomplish about a two
11 hundred dollar per thousand value for the -- I don't want to get
12 into that.

13 MR. PENNOYER: Okay. Is there further discussion on any
14 of these items? Does anybody have additional comments to make on
15 the resolution or things that the Executive Director needs to take
16 into account?

17 MS. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, with respect to the last
18 point though, I would like to mention two things. One is that we
19 believe as a matter of law that we can only pay fair market value
20 for the timber, but we also believe that the moratorium does have
21 value, and we think that the proposal that was just set forth
22 accommodates both facts.

23 MR. PENNOYER: Thank you. What was the second point,
24 Deborah?

25 MS. WILLIAMS: Well -- there -- those were the two points
26 together. One, that we can . . .

1 MR. PENNOYER: Okay.

2 MS. WILLIAMS: . . . only pay fair market value, and two,
3 that the moratorium does have value.

4 MR. PENNOYER: Are there other items that we need to
5 bring to the Executive Director's attention in drafting this
6 resolution? (No response) Is there further business now, and
7 since this business item has not been finalized, do we simply want
8 to recess this meeting until we are in receipt of the final offer
9 or something? Is there a need to possibly continue this?
10 (Aside comments) Well, we might do that too. Okay. Anything
11 further that we need to do on the motion.

12 MS. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I do believe it's important
13 in our resolution to note that when it comes to the appraisal, we
14 believe that the appraisers should certainly review or consider the
15 Rainier market and cost information, but that that cannot be,
16 unless the appraiser so determines -- we cannot prejudge whether
17 that is the only information upon which the appraiser will rely.

18 MR. PENNOYER: I thank you. I think that's understood.
19 Is there anything further? Okay, is there any objection to this
20 motion? (No response) Hearing none, it is passed, and the
21 Executive Director will proceed forthwith with the resolution for
22 transmittal to Eyak. Mr. Ayers.

23 MR. AYERS: Yes, Mr. Chairman, it is my understanding
24 that we are responding to the Eyak board, that I am able to convey
25 to them that there has been action taken, obviously, to draft this
26 resolution, and the Trustee Council will reconvene at some hour

1 tomorrow to actually approve the resolution?

2 MR. PENNOYER: I would assume that would be -- is
3 everybody available tomorrow sometime to approve the resolution in
4 its final form.

5 MR. SANDOR: Either I or Mark.

6 MR. PENNOYER: Okay, somebody or the alternates will be
7 available a time tomorrow to review and finally accept that.

8 MR. AYERS: Is that acceptable in Anchorage there?

9 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes.

10 MR. AYERS: I will do so and have a draft of the
11 resolution to you prior to calling the meeting tomorrow.

12 MR. PENNOYER: Carl, are you going to be here tomorrow
13 too?

14 MR. ROSIER: Yes, I'll be in tomorrow.

15 MR. PENNOYER: Okay, fine. I guess the last item I have
16 is where we proceed from here. We're going to meet tomorrow and,
17 I guess, we'll make our decision at that point as to whether to
18 continue the meeting if we're done with that or not. I assume
19 we'll probably have to just recess and reconvene for this one item
20 since we're not going to approve the final answer until we
21 (indecipherable) the resolution.

22 MR. AYERS: Do you want to set the time for noon
23 tomorrow, Mr. Chairman?

24 MR. PENNOYER: Er, it's fine by me, if it's fine with
25 everybody else.

26 MR. ROSIER: Sounds good to me -- noon?

1 MR. PENNOYER: Commissioner Sandor?
2 MR. SANDOR: Either before or after.
3 MR. PENNOYER: After noon -- how about one o'clock?
4 MS. WILLIAMS: One o'clock would be preferable for me.
5 MR. PENNOYER: Okay, one o'clock then that we'll
6 reconvene and take a look at the resolution.
7 MR. SANDOR: Make it 1:10.
8 MR. PENNOYER: Make it 1:10 for Commissioner Sandor.
9 He's got a longer lunch. (Laughter) Anything else then this
10 evening?
11 MR. ROSIER: That doesn't work.
12 MR. PENNOYER: Anchorage?
13 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Carl can't be here at 1:10.
14 MR. PENNOYER: Oh, you can't be here at one-ten? I
15 thought you meant adjourning didn't work. What time can you make
16 it?
17 MR. ROSIER: Well . . .
18 MR. PENNOYER: How about before noon then -- eleven
19 o'clock.
20 MR. ROSIER: Yeah, eleven o'clock would be fine.
21 MR. PENNOYER: Commissioner -- (indecipherable) this
22 resolution -- 10:30 or eleven?
23 (Aside comments)
24 MS. WILLIAMS: Eleven o'clock is preferable for me.
25 MR. PENNOYER: Okay, then, is eleven o'clock all right
26 then? Eleven o'clock tomorrow morning then.

1 MR. ROSIER: All right.
2 MR. PENNOYER: Thank you.
3 MR. ROSIER: Thank you.
4 MR. PENNOYER: We'll see you tomorrow morning then. This
5 meeting is recessed.

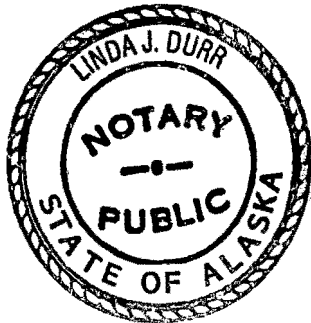
