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PROCEEDINGS

(On record - 12:03 p.m.)

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CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, this is a continued -this is Craig Tillery, this is a continuation of our previous
meeting. At the meeting we have Frank Rue representing the
Department of Fish and Game; Ginny Fay representing the
Department of Environmental Conservation; Steve Pennoyer with
NOAA; Jim Wolfe with the Forest Service; and Deborah Williams
with the Department of Interior; and myself with the Department
of Law.

We don't have any minutes, we don't even actually, at this point, have a written agenda. It is my understanding that the agenda for this meeting is primarily an executive session. to discuss habitat acquisition issues. Is there any other item that needs to be brought up today besides that?

MS. McCAMMON: That's it, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Given that, I would entertain a motion to go into executive session.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, we do have Greg Petrich on and I don't know if we -- if he would like to say a few words but I think, if he does, we could entertain that now.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: We could. My understanding was he wasn't really -- that we're not going to be taking any action today or -- and that my understanding was that he wasn't going to be speaking, but, Greg, did you want to say something

for a couple of minutes. I know you..... MR. SWIDERSKI: We also have a limited amount 2 of time. 3 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: I note that there is a 4 letter from Greg to Molly McCammon, which I hope everyone has a 5 copy of. 6 MS. D. WILLIAMS: I do not. 7 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Can we fax..... 8 MR. MYERS: I believe we did try to fax it to 9 you within the last half an hour. I'm not sure what fax number 10 we had for you. Do you have a number that we should try to fax 11 it to, Deborah? 12 MS. McCAMMON: Can you just summarize it for 13 14 us, Eric? 15 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Some could just..... 16 MR. SWIDERSKI: It's a short letter, you could read it. 17 18 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Yeah, right. 19 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Greg, can you just -- do 20 you have any comments that you'd like to make orally in addition to your letter? 21 MR. PETRICH: No. Well, I think that the 22 primary one is that there's this real heightened level of 23 concern on the environmental side that the components of this 24 25 negotiation can get complex and we're working up against a time deadline with this appraisal expiration, in a lot of people's minds, so that's really of concern. You know, we're trying to think of ways and proposals to accommodate, you know, land owners and retain our best areas but we realize it's a pretty difficult situation. And, you know, we just want to see the best effort that you can put forth here in a short period of time to try and get something palatable to the land owners, you know.

And you, of course, have some, I'm sure, executive session ideas that, you know, may be information that we don't have and so may I just say from our standpoint that it's a very critical acquisition to us and as much flexibility as we can show, you know, is appreciated to make it work.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you, Greg. Are there any questions from Council members or comments?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. I -- excuse me, wait a second.

(Whispered conversation)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: We have just received word that Tim Mahoney and Howard Valley would like to be added in. How do we do that?

MS. YOCKEY: I'm going to call (indiscernible - away from microphone)....

MR. ROTH: Maybe you can call the 1-800 number

and have somebody authorize it.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yeah, we're going to try to do that. Is it the desire of the Council to perhaps -- the two choices, as I see it, would be go into executive session and have them on at the end or to, I guess, stand down for about five minutes while we try to add them on and see if they wish to make any comments. What's the sense of the Council?

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Even though I am time pressed, I would like to hear them before we go into executive session.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, then let us try to add them on. Just while we're doing that, what is people's time pressures today?

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I am supposed to check out of my condo at noon, so that's, you know, 53 minutes.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Is there anybody else that's under an immediate time constraint?

MR. RUE: This is Frank Rue, I got Rob Bosworth with me, I have to catch an airplane, so I'll be leaving here at the latest at 12:45.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay.

MR. RUE: Rob can be here for a little longer.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, great.

MR. RUE: Be listening in.

MR. SWIDERSKI: Should we read this letter

while we're stopped?

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yeah, I guess for purposes of those people who do not have a copy of Greg's letter, I will just summarize it for you.

Greg thanks the -- it's a letter to Ms. McCammon, he thanks the staff for working with him and taking time to meet and explain the developments. He notes that the Alaska Rain Forest Campaign is a coalition with longstanding interests in protecting high value forests and fish and wildlife habitats. And that safeguarding key northern lands on Afognak Island is AJV-1 and AJV-3 have been and are continuing to be the highest priorities for the campaign. And in their view any habitat proposal should seek to retain the largest possible amount of uncut forests in those two key areas.

He goes on to note that proposal have been made to expand the acreage of the overall buyout, they do not wish to dismiss ideas which could lead to a successful conclusion.

ATT OPERATOR: ATT operator adding Howard Valley, go ahead, please.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay.

MR. VALLEY: Thanks. Somehow I got cut off.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. And we're still

trying to add in Tim Mahoney, I take it?

MR. SWIDERSKI: Yeah, I believe so.

(Phone ring)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Is that?

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Tim?

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Is Tim Mahoney on?

(No audible response)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. And just, I think, in conclusion in Greg's letter he notes that at least one recent proposal, in their view, lacks sufficient information, AJV-4 to evaluate it from a public interest perspective. He ask that the Council.....

ATT OPERATOR: This is the ATT operator again adding Tim Mahoney on line. Go ahead.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. And he concludes by asking that the Council make available adequate staff and resources to work on the negotiations.

Tim Mahoney and Howard Valley have joined us. This is the meeting of the Exxon Valdez Trustee Council, the only item on the agenda is an executive session on habitat acquisition. Greg Petrich just made a brief, two or three minute, comment with respect to the AJV proposed acquisition and we would like to know if either of you would like to make a comment on that or other habitat acquisition matters?

MR. MAHONEY: If either Howard or Tim?

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: That's correct.

MR. MAHONEY: Well, this is Tim. AJV has a series of proposals before the Trustees. We believe we have

dealt with the Trustees fairly and patiently and without posturing. I think there is some belief on the part of AJV that while we think we understand the limitation and priorities that the Trustees operate under, there have been times when the AJV partners think that, perhaps, the Trustees do not understand that AJV differs from perhaps some of the other sellers in having their own crews, data, their own appraisal analysis that they've been working with throughout this decade and when AJV analyzes any kind of a proposal they do so comparing it to their own numbers. And the numbers are -- depending on the unit, they are about five to 15 percent higher than the appraised numbers that the Trustees are using.

This has led us to think that if the Trustees cannot adjust their timber numbers that the way to make an agreement work is to put land in the -- in combination with timbered land, non-commercial timbered land, in an agreeable package where both sides could agree on a bottom line number, each side might look at the component parts of that differently, but we believe that there is a possibility for a solution there.

I think, from AJV's standpoint, we don't think we're getting through very well because of the responses from the Trustees have tended to be very timber heavy, very unmixed, between land and timber. And because the Trustees are unwilling to go above the value numbers that came up in the Cascade appraisal, that leaves AJV short and AJV can't agree to

any of those proposals. The last proposal that came from the Trustees would have been for AJV, it would have essentially been meeting its timber needs and throwing in the land for free. And AJV, in that instance, could not agree to sell. But we have put forward more proposals because we think that there must be a way to do this.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you, Tim.

Mr. Valley, did you have any comment that you would like to make?

MR. VALLEY: No, not at this time, thank you.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Are there Council

members that have questions or comments with regard to

Mr. Mahoney's comments?

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I do, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, Ms. Williams.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: This is for either. In looking at your latest proposal and particularly at Alterative II where the possibility would be to increase about a quarter of the timber from Unit 3(A), have you had the opportunity to discuss that with ADF&G or anyone else to determine what quarter that would be and how it would be configured; has there been any discussions along that line?

MR. MAHONEY: No discussions. This is Tim

Mahoney. When we configured that in trying to put together a

proposal. We looked at the priority listing of subunits that

Mike Wiedmer and the other biologists had worked out last fall. They ranked their subunits in order of importance and we worked our way up from least important up, taking away the -- I think there was something like nine subunits that we had been looking at previously. So to take about a quarter of the timber away we took out the lower most five subunits and left in the larger four primary subunits which are all contiguous.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Okay. All right. And then with respect to the trade out for timber of equal value in Seal Bay State Park; can you just describe that a little more?

MR. MAHONEY: Well, we've -- as we've said, we need a -- from our standpoint we need a mix of land and timber and without that mix our differences in timber value are too great to make an agreement possible. So the negotiators for the Trustees had indicated that they did not want to include any lands in the Paramanof Peninsula, Unit 4, and they only wanted to look at the other units. That led us to say that that was possible but only if we shrank the amount of timber in the deal.

We've always said that we would be open for a timber for timber trade, so when we put this on the table, we took the approximately \$5,000,000 worth of timber out of 3(A) and said we would hold it for a couple of years during which time we would enter into, if you chose, a separate negotiation on the potential trade outs. I think some of that timber, maybe a

quarter of it, could be found just along the road corridor that would have to be built to connect up to the logging operation that's tentatively agreed to in Unit 3(A). The rest would have to be located within the Seal Bay Park and because this land was once part of the Afognak Joint Venture, AJV has crews maps and has knowledge of the timber values there, so we know what is possible, but we've not engaged in any serious discussions as to whether it's -- there's a likely timber swap there or not.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, that's all the questions I have.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Are there other

Council members that have any questions or comments?

MS. McCAMMON: Mr. Chairman, this is Molly

McCammon.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Ms. McCammon.

MS. McCAMMON: Tim, could you explain AJV's perspective and clarify for the Council that this ratio between the timbered lands and the non-timbered lands is not just an economic issue of trying to make up the difference in the timber values, but it's also from the perspective of AJV that they're not willing to sell just high valued timbered lands. Can you reflect that?

MR. MAHONEY: Okay. Yes, that would be good, thanks for asking. When AJV began this process, what now, four

or five years ago with the Trustees, timber prices were higher, the -- but even so AJV believed that it was not in its interest, economically or as far as the partner corporations felt was in their interests, to sell only the trees and be left with a number of non-timbered acres which had less development potential. Instead, AJV embraced the idea of selling something that was approximately proportional in terms of land -- of non-commercial timbered land and commercial timbered land, and tried to leave its remaining lands in place. AJV, unlike some of the other sellers, is not planning to go out of the timber business, it would remain in the timber business but in perhaps a smaller capacity than before or for fewer years out into the future. So they did not want to high grade. I think overall commercial timber makes up about a quarter of all of the AJV The proportion that is in all of the proposals that AJV puts forward to the Trustees is higher than that but the Trustees proposals to AJV have been overwhelmingly timbered lands.

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So even when prices were very high and timber would make a great return, AJV was not interested in an unbalanced approach. With timber prices low, AJV would not sell its most valuable assets in kind of an overwhelming manner. We sort of look at it the way you might look at a stock that is currently devalued. The idea is to sell high and buy low. When the stock is devalued you would not sell the preponderance of your

1	assets at that ratio at that rate. So the two ideas, the
2	idea that AJV has always had that there needs to be a balance
3	of timber and non-timber and the thought that's very recent
4	that perhaps the non-timbered lands could help balance out our
5	differences in value kind of came together, but only this
6	winter.
7	CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Ms. McCammon, does

24	MR. RUE: Second.
25	CHAIRMAN TILLERY: All in favor say aye.

IN UNISON: Aye. 1 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Opposed. 2 (No opposing responses) 3 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, this meeting will 4 adjourn and go into executive session. Logistically, how is 5 that going to happen. 6 MS. YOCKEY: I'm going to have to call the 7 operator. 8 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, so does everybody hang 9 up? Is that the way we do this? 10 MS. YOCKEY: Yes. 11 12 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, everybody should hang 13 In terms of how long the executive session is going to take, I know we had set aside until about another hour. 14 15 Deborah is going to have to leave. Deborah, do you have a -is Barry on? 16 17 MR. ROTH: Yes. MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I'll ask if --18 19 I'll have my husband ask if we can have a late check-out. 20 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, all right. MS. McCAMMON: Mr. Chairman, could we just have 21 the two (sic) public member maybe just hang up and -- do we all 22 have to.... 23 24 MS. D. WILLIAMS: That would be a lot easier. 25 MS. McCAMMON: It would be quicker. I trust

MR. MAHONEY: No, we don't have -- we will participate as you wish.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay.

MR. VALLEY: I guess to know that the meeting was over might be beneficial for us here.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, what we'll do is, I

think, is we'll go into executive session, if we're going to do anything when we come out, other than simply adjourn and report on the fact that we held an executive session, we will call these numbers and try to bring you back in, otherwise we'll simply call you and let you know that the meeting is over.

MR. PETRICH: Okay.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: If that's okay for everybody. Okay, so if you three could hang up.

MR. PETRICH: Fine and -- this is Greg and I just really appreciate the vacationers touching base here, that's above the call of duty, so thank you.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Aloha, Greg.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you.
