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CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yeah, this is Craig Tillery with the Department of Law. This is the continuation of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council meeting. It's April 2nd of 1998. I believe that we have on the line Bill Hines from NOAA.

MR. HINES: Here.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Deborah Williams from the Department of Interior.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Here.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Jim Wolfe from the United States Forest Service.

MR. WOLFE: Yes.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: All Ewing from the Department of Environmental Conservation.

MR. EWING: Yes.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Frank Rue from the

19 Department of Fish and Game.

MR. RUE: Here.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, then this is Craig
Tillery from the Department of Law. Does everybody have an

23 agenda?

MR. RUE: No.

MR. EWING: No

MR. WOLFE: No.

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MS. McCAMMON: That was resounding.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Where did that get? Okay will just read the agenda to you. The other thing is, did everybody get a -- was there a package sent also?

MS. McCAMMON: With a copy of the resolution and the maps and all, yes.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yeah, was that -- did everybody get a copy of a draft resolution along with some maps and so forth?

MR. EWING: No.

MR. RUE: We got the maps but the res -- how did you send it?

MS. McCAMMON: It was faxed to you, Frank, for copying there and, Deborah, it was faxed to your office, they were supposed to deliver it to you.

MR. RUE: Let me check.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I have Barry's copy of the draft resolution, but that's -- oh, oh, oh, look, here it is. Great, all right, I got it.

MS. McCAMMON: Good.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I don't see maps though.

MS. McCAMMON: I don't think we were able to get you a map, Deborah.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Okay, very good.

MS. McCAMMON: And, Jim Wolfe, we weren't able to get you anything.

MR. WOLFE: Right.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Were are you, Jim?

MR. WOLFE: I'm in New Mexico.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Oh, great.

MR. RUE: The resolution is arriving, this is

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, what I'll do, let me just go through -- the proposed agenda is we will first have a brief explanation of the status of the AJV Habitat Protection Proposal.

(Off record comments - other people on line)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Anyway, the proposed agenda is to first go through the AJV habitat protection package, then we'll go into executive session to discuss certain aspects of that package. We'll come back into public session and take public comment, hopefully -- it says by about 2:30 but we'll see when we go into. And then perhaps have an action item on that protection package.

Is there a motion to approve that agenda?

MR. RUE: So moved.

MR. EWING: Second.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Anyone opposed?

(No opposing responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Hearing none the agenda is approved. Ms. McCammon, who will be taking us through the package?

MS. McCAMMON: Mr. Chairman, a negotiating team made up of the State of Alaska is the lead -- we're having some feed back on here, Joe, and I'm not sure if it's from your recorder.

COURT REPORTER: It's not mine.

MS. McCAMMON: Okay. That was led by the State of Alaska together with Fish and Wildlife Service representing the Federal side, have been negotiating with Afognak Joint Venture for more than three years now, most intensively since last summer. There have been detailed, and as I said, intense negotiations since we actually went an looked at a number of the parcels under consideration.

The negotiating team reached agreement with Afognak Joint Venture last Friday, we have a proposal that we would like to present to the Trustee Council for your consideration. This proposal totals approximately 41,750 acres on northern Afognak Island for a net present value price of \$70,500,000.

MR. WOLFE: How many acres was that?

MS. McCAMMON: Forty-one thousand, seven hundred and fifty acres, give or take.

MR. WOLFE: Okay. That's in fee. Everything is in fee. I see.

MS. McCAMMON: Yes, there are approximately 300 acres or so of timber rights only on Delphin and Discoverer Islands. Those lands are already held in fee with in the Maritime Refuge, but this package also includes timber rights there.

MR. WOLFE: Okay.

MS. McCAMMON: And what I'd like to do now is to have Alex Swiderski go through the package, in detail, and describe what the proposal is.

MR. SWIDERSKI: Mr. Chairman, this is Alex Swiderski. What I'm going to do is walk through the package, essentially subparcel by parcel. The first parcel AJV01a, the proposal is that -- is for an acquisition for approximately 19,071 acres which is the large majority, all but about 500 acres of AJV01a as it was originally configured by the Council back in 1994, and by the way, I think negotiations actually started 1993, so I think we're closing in on five years of working at this.

The only part of Parcel Ola that's not in the proposal is the very southeastern corner of it, constituting about 500 to 700 acres that is west of Waterfall Creek. Parcel Ola would include the three islands in Bluefox Bay, Hodd, Teck and Bear Island containing about 386 acres. In addition there is a weir site on Waterfall Creek and the package -- most of the weir site is in the portion that would be acquired in fee. The

package would also provide for an easement for use of the land on the other side, so that weir can be attached to the bank, et cetera.

Parcel AJV01b was divided as shown on the map. The acquisition would be for the western portion of the parcel, including approximately 2,800 acres. This land is adjacent to the Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge.

Parcel 03a is essentially the configuration that the biologists from Fish and Game, the Fish and Wildlife Service and the Forest Service put together last fall. There were some very minor tweaks to that, made after discussions with AJV, it provides for approximately 7,900 acres to be acquired in fee, 5,680 of those acres would be acquired at the time of closing. Approximately 2,200 acres would be acquired following completion of timber harvest on them, but not longer than 15 years.

In addition, AJV has agreed to add a 200 foot buffer along the western shores of Laura and Pauls Lake, this was an important addition from the restoration perspective that we were able to secure on essentially the last day of negotiating with them. That buffer would be -- permit in it up to two lodges and cabins and related facilities and limited road access to the cabins.

In addition, there's a provision that if a lesser buffer suffices at any point around the lodge to provide the

necessary wildlife corridor and protection of the lake that
Fish and Game and the Fish and Wildlife Service would have the
authority to reduce the size of the buffer. I think the
thought is, in effect, that if a lodge were placed on a point
it may not require more than 200 feet going back from the point
to provide adequate protection. Let see, in addition, in
Parcel 03a the weir site at the mouth of Pauls Creek would be
protected by -- actually an easement for operation of the weir
site would be granted to the State of Alaska.

Parcel AJV07 is the same parcel that was originally appraised by the Council, it's 256,000 acres and Parcel 08 contains 8,742 acres, that parcel has been slightly reconfigured to add some land to the western portion of it and another half section. That parcel does not have commercial timber on it.

In addition, the two islands, Delphin and Discoverer Islands in Perenosa Bay, the surface estates are already owned by the United States, the timber rights are owned by AJV and the timber rights would be acquired as part of this package. So in addition to acquiring something less than fee on Delphin and Discoverer, the 200 buffer easement around Laura and Pauls Lake would be less than a fee acquisition. And that's for a total of approximately 41,750 acres.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Ms. McCammon, do you

1 have anything to add to that? MS. McCAMMON: No, that's fine. 2 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Are there questions from 3 Council members? 4 MR. WOLFE: Mr. Chairman. 5 Mr. Wolfe. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: 6 MR. WOLFE: Did I hear two lodges? I don't 7 have the material so you may have to bear with me a little bit. 8 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yes. 9 10 MR. SWIDERSKI: Mr. Chairman, that's correct, up to two lodges would be permitted in the buffer zone to the 11 west of Laura and Pauls Lake. And I may have misspoken a 12 little bit there, if they build a lodge they would be required 13 14 to maintain a 200 foot buffer behind the lodge, so to speak, and in addition to the lodge. So the lodges won't impact the 15 buffer. 16 17 MR. WOLFE: Okay. Plus two cabins, did I hear? MR. SWIDERSKI: There's not a limit on the 18 number of cabins. 19 20 MR. WOLFE: Oh, plus cabins. MR. SWIDERSKI: Plus cabins. 21 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Are there other 22 questions? 23 (No audible responses) 24 25 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Mr. Swiderski, this buffer

is already inclusive of the existing 66 foot buffer? 1 MR. SWIDERSKI: That's correct, Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: So it's not a 266 foot, it's 3 just a 200? MR. SWIDERSKI: That's correct. There is a 66 5 foot buffer that already exists pursuant to Forest Practices 6 Act, the one thing this buffer would is that under the existing 7 66 foot buffer it is possible to get a waiver, so to speak, to take specific trees out of the buffer and that would, of 10 course, no longer be possible. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Are there additional 11 12 questions from anyone? (No audible responses) 13 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. I think at this point 14 I would entertain a motion to go into executive session to 15 16 discuss this portion of this package relating to financial Is there a motion? 17 aspects. MR. WOLFE: Mr. Chair. 18 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yes, Mr. Wolfe. 19 20 MR. WOLFE: I would make a motion that we go into executive session to discuss this acquisition in more 21 detail. 22 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Is -- Ms. Williams. 23 24 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Yes, I'm sorry, Mr. Chairman.

Do we have representatives from AJV who will be presenting

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testimony today? 2 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: We have representatives from AJV who are here and I do not whether they will be making a 3 public comment or not. MS. D. WILLIAMS: Okay. 5 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Right now they're shaking 6 their heads like probably not. MS. D. WILLIAMS: All right. Okay. 8 9 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: But there will be a public comment following executive session. 10 MS. D. WILLIAMS: All right. 11 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Is there a second to 12 the motion? 13 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Second. 14 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: All in favor say aye. 15 IN UNISON: 16 Aye. 17 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Opposed? (No opposing responses) 18 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, hearing that we'll 19 adjourn from public session, go into executive session. 20 I understand that -- Ms. McCammon, the logistics, please? 21 MS. McCAMMON: Everyone needs to hang up and 22 those who will be included in the executive session will be 23 called back right away, so I do want you to hang up. 24

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: And for purpose of the

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public, how long do you anticipate we'll be in there, half an hour, you think, less?

MS. McCAMMON: Less.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I think it would be less.

MS. McCAMMON: I think less.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, so we could be back on line anywhere in the next probably 20 minutes on, I'd say.

Okay, then we will hang up and move into executive session.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. We have returned from executive session. During the executive session we discussed issues relating to the proposed AJV acquisition.

At this time we're ready for public comment. And we have Anchorage, Homer, Kodiak and Juneau. Why don't we start with Homer. Ms. Brodie, did you have any comment?

MS. BRODIE: I just want to say as your designated representative on the Public Advisory Group of environmentalists in Alaska and around the country, I want to thank your staff for their enormous effort, hard work and dedication over five years, according to Alex, and to bring this very difficult negotiation to a conclusion agreeable to all parties. We are deeply grateful and delighted with this proposal and I hope and trust that the Trustees will take action today to protect this extraordinarily beautiful and

valuable area.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. Is there anyone else -- well, actually, first, are there any question from Council members for Ms. Brodie?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, is there anyone else in Homer with you, Pam?

MS. BRODIE: No.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Let's move then to Kodiak. Is there anyone in Kodiak who wishes to comment?

KODIAK LIO: No.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you. Traci, is there anyone with you in Juneau?

MS. CRAMER: There is a gentleman with me, I don't know if he's interested in commenting.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Sir, do you have a comment?

MR. PETRICH: Well, this is Greg Petrich, I'm

the Wildlife Conservation Director for the Alaska Rain Forest

Campaign and I guess my only comment is we -- the campaign

certainly appreciates the efforts that the Trustee Council

staff and the landowners have put into these negotiations.

We've seen some important points over the years where you've

had to work on difficult issues, such as dividing up timbered

areas so you can retain the best habitat values in those areas

and still be able to work some operations through the timber people. And we've been pretty impressed with the work that the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and Department of Interior staff that have been put in on that -- on those particular issues which at some point have drawn concern that very important habitat areas would be lost in this process and dropped off the table. Field staff has been able to work through some very difficult situations and bring considerably valuable property back on the table through their efforts. On behalf of the campaign I just wanted to say that we are certainly grateful for the staff work that's gone into these issues.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you. Are there questions from Council members for Mr. Petrich?

MS. D. WILLIAMS: This is Deborah Williams.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Ms. Williams.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Greg, I assume you've had a chance to review the contours of this proposal, do you support it?

MR. PETRICH: I'm familiar with it and I -- the map, I understand, wasn't made public, but I am familiar with the components of the project area and, yes, we are in support of it.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Okay, thank you.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: I want to note for the

record, the map is, in fact, public, it's up in Anchorage anyway, it's here. I think we just got these maps yesterday and were unable to get them to the....

MS. CRAMER: No, he has one now, Craig, we were just waiting for that.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Oh, okay. Any other questions for Mr. Petrich?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. And in Anchorage we have two people who have indicated that they wish to make a comment. John Schoen. Please move approach a mike, I'm not sure what you speak in to.

MR. SCHOEN: Thank you for the opportunity to be here today. My name is John Schoen, I'm the Executive Director of the Alaska State office of the National Audubon Society. And on behalf of the National Audubon Society and its 550,000 members, and specifically our Anchorage and Kodiak Chapters, I would like to congratulate the Trustee Council, your staff and Afognak Joint Venture for the successful conclusion of the recent lands purchase agreement reached between the Council and AJV on northern Afognak Island. This is a great achievement for conservation and the restoration of the Trustee Council.

The four major blocks of land on northern Afognak
Island, which includes lands along Shuyak Strait, Laura and

Pauls Lakes, East Tonki Bay and West Tonki Bay encompass valuable marine shoreline habitat as well as old growth forest lands which provide important habitat for marbled murrelets, brown bear, bald eagles, black tail deer, elk, anadromous salmon and a variety of other wildlife. The long term habitat protection resulting from this action will enhance restoration efforts and will leave a legacy for future generations to enjoy.

The Audubon Society is very pleased with what has been accomplished on northern Afognak Island and congratulates all the participants on crafting a successful agreement for which we can all be proud.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you, Mr. Schoen. Just to make sure the record is clear on this. There's no agreement quite yet, there is a proposal that negotiators have agreed to take to each of the bodies. Of course, the Council will be considering today, I guess my understanding that AJV will be having a meeting at a later date to also look at it.

Are there questions or comments from Council members for Mr. Schoen?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you very much and we appreciate your help in all this also. Grant Baker, Mr. Baker.

MR. BAKER: Thank you. My name is Grant Baker and I'm a commercial fisherman in Prince William Sound. I have a salmon setnet in Eshamy Bay which is about 50 miles south of Whittier. I bought my permit in 1988 from someone who had fished the site for about the previous 40 years or so, since the late '40s and early '50s. And he had a fish camp set up and a cabin and I set up my fish camp at the same site and I built a cabin there. And I had a contract with the Chenega Corporation to use the cabin and site since it was their land. And last summer that land was purchased by the Trustee Council and prior to the sale I had been assured by the State that there wasn't any problem of my usage of that area and also for the cabin.

I talked to Chuck Totemoff, the President of the Chenega Corporation and he said he had notified everyone -- or at least had notified the proper people that I was out there and my usage out there. And he said that he had thought that they were going to honor my usage at the fish camp. Also I talked to John Harmening, I believe he with the -- he was the Forest Service negotiator, I believe, and he said he didn't see any problem with continuing to use the fish camp and cabin as is. In fact, he said that it wouldn't make sense to tear it down or shut it down because the purpose of the Trustee Council purchases were to protect and preserve the preexisting uses, which it was, he said.

Unfortunately after the sale last summer that didn't happen. The State doesn't have a mechanism in place for issuing leases or even title those lands that were transferred. And so for the last year essentially nothing has happened as far as issuing of a lease, they don't know what to do and they're also saying that they'll probably very likely tear down the cabin, which would destroy the fish camp because that's based on that cabin for protection and for storage and for use during the fish camp season with my family.

And so what I would ask the Council -- well, also what the State is doing is they say once they get a process in place it will -- they'll send out some kind of a permitting paper to be reviewed and after the review process, which they expect to be very lengthy, but they're not sure when it will start. That if there's any opposition, you know, to what they wrote in the permit or about the reviews that I can then go through the appeal process through the administrative appeal process, like, the different levels and, I guess, eventually end up court, which I think most of you know, that process is pretty lengthy, expensive and would essentially put me out of business that way, too.

So what I would ask the Council the do right now, for these land purchases that are happening on Afognak, is that to make sure if there are preexisting uses that they're protected because it wasn't the intent of the Council to have this happen

to me, but it is happening and I wouldn't wish it on anyone else. So if there -- I would ask the Council to make sure that preexisting uses on the lands that they're going to purchase are protected. And I also ask the Council to help me in my situation to basically protect and preserve my usage of my fish camp.

And that's it. Thank you very much.

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CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. Are there questions for Mr. Baker or comments from Council members? (No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Baker. Is there anyone else either here -- is there anyone else here in Anchorage that would like to make a comment? Anyone, for example, from AJV, no?

> MR. VALLEY: No, not at this time.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Not at this time, okay. there anyone else out on the teleconference that would like to make a comment?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, the public comment session then is closed.

> MS. CRAMER: Craig.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Whoops, who's that?

MS. CRAMER: This is Traci.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Traci.

MS. CRAMER: I believe we have one more comment.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay.

MR. PETRICH: This is Greg Petrich of the Alaska Rain Forest Campaign again. And I'd like to say I was caught short because I didn't exactly have the final version in front of me of the layout on the buyout and all the components that were important to us in this process has held together. We're looking at some pretty extraordinary areas, coastal habitat for marbled murrelets. I've heard mentioned that the site along the coastline of Pauls and Laura -- the Pauls and Laura parcel, AJV03, is the singular top site in the spill zone and I've heard further comment that it could be one of the top sites in North America, so it's really satisfying to see this kind of quality come into a project area like this, an acquisition.

As I mentioned before, the biologists have done some good work on this area and has put a lot of work in holding together recreational habitat values, such as for deer and elk in wintering areas and, all and all, the way that this parcel configuration enhances the part that is already in place, this is really an impressive layout that the people have put together, so on behalf of the Alaska Rain Forest Campaign and all its member groups, we want to thank you for the work, again, that you've put in this. And we recommend that you

approve this project.

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CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you very much.

Are there any questions or comments of Mr. Petrich?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, then the public session -- public comment period will be closed. The last item on the agenda is a tentative action item which is.....

MR. ANDERSON: Would it be possible that I speak with the public?

KODIAK LIO: Somebody here in Kodiak to speak.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Oh, we went through Kodiak and no one -- is there someone in Kodiak who would like to make a comment?

KODIAK LIO: Yes, there is.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Please....

MR. ANDERSON: I would. Thank you very much for the opportunity to address this. My name Staush Anderson, I'm speaking for myself. I sure appreciate all the work that the Trustee Council has done in all the acquisitions. And this certainly is a significant addition. With the watershed management strategy that you've undertaken in acquisitions, this is a real rounding out of what you've already acquired and I think a real asset to the whole program that you had and for the 10-year program.

Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you,

Mr. Anderson. Are there comments or questions from Council

members?

(No audible responses)

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CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Thank you. Is there anyone else then in Kodiak that would like to say something?

MR. ANDERSON: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you very much.

Then, I think, now public comment is closed.

MS. McCAMMON: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Mc. McCammon.

MS. McCAMMON: I would just like to add for the record though that the office here has received hundreds of letters, postcards, phone calls in support of some kind of a protection package on northern Afognak Island. This acquisition, I think, is one of those areas that has received the largest amount of public support. And we have copies of all of these in the files, they have come in over the last five years, especially in the last year or so as things have really heated up. But I think in addition to the comments that you heard on the record today, there is a tremendous amount of public support throughout the state, in the Kodiak Region, in the spill area for this acquisition.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. That brings to the last item on the agenda which is a tentative

action item on the AJV protection package, is.....

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MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I move to approve the resolution.

MR. RUE: Second.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: There's been a motion to approve the resolution as drafted, which for the record was made by Ms. William and seconded by Mr. Rue. Is there any comments or discussion on the motion?

MR. RUE: Yeah, this is Frank in Juneau.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Mr. Rue.

MR. RUE: Yeah, I guess I would encourage us all to approve this, I think it's been a tremendously important area for many of the species injured by the spill. I think it's got the highest rating of any of the areas that we've looked at previously. I think there's been a tremendous amount of work that gone into crafting a very excellent package and I would encourage us to approve this resolution.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you, Commissioner Rue.

Are there other Council members that would like to make a

comment?

(No audible responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, I would like to note that I concur with Commissioner Rue's comments. I've been involved in this process and watching this negotiation for four or five years, it has been a struggle, but I have been

extremely impressed by the ability of the Council negotiators, the AJV negotiators and some of the members of the public that have sort of helped us to formulate the package. We have run up against road blocks where there were, as I recall at times, places that different parties didn't want to go, but people have sat down and worked out, sometimes on acre by acre basis, a reasonable compromise that would benefit all of the parties. I am convinced after reviewing this and listening to the testimony and reading those letters that Molly has mentioned that this is in the public interest, that it is a good price for the Council, that it is a fair price for the sellers and that it is a deal that we should approve.

If there is no other comment then....

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I have....

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Ms. Williams.

MS. D. WILLIAMS: I have general comments and then just a couple specific comments. Generally, I want to thank very much the negotiating team for Exxon Valdez and thank the staff members who both participated directly and indirectly on that negotiating team. I also want to thank AJV for AJV's patience and persistence and ultimately willingness to enter into what I think is one of our most important land acquisitions.

I believe, in monitoring the negotiations closely, that this was the very best price that the Trustee Council could

pay, the lowest price that the Trustee Council could pay. I, like you, Mr. Chairman, believe it is a very fair price, both for the Trustee Council and for AJV. I think that the restoration benefits from this acquisition are clear and compelling. This acquisition is unequivocally in the public interest. The restoration benefits, as I said, are unambiguous with respect to numerous injured species, particularly the marbled murrelets. And I strongly encourage Trustee Council adoption of this resolution with to minor modifications.

And the two minor modifications I would recommend are, first of all, that we specify any and all logging routes, particularly in 3a, so that there is no question about where those are going to go and to the land that is going to be cut. And secondly, that we get clarification, particularly on the cabin issue with respect to the cabins that are to go on -- near Laura and Pauls Lake on the lake front. I do not believe that the cabin issue is specified clearly enough and there may also be further clarification made of lodges, but with the clarification on the lodge and cabin and with clarification about the logging roads, this is a package that we can all be very proud of and again I want to thank everyone involved and particularly the negotiating team and AJV.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you,

Ms. Williams. I think you've just amended your own motion....

MS. D. WILLIAMS: Yes, I've amended my own

motion. 1 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: to essentially ask that 2 in the purchase agreement that logging routes into 3a for the 3 areas that will be cut be specified and that there be a clearer understanding in the purchase agreement as to the nature and 5 extent of any cabins that could be put in the buffer zone on the west side of Laura and Pauls Lake. Is that correct; does that summarize? MS. D. WILLIAMS: Yes, that's correct. 9 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, are there other 10 comments from Council members? 11 MS. D. WILLIAMS: And, Mr. Chairman, I'd take a 12 second on my amendment or ask for the concurrence of the 13 14 seconder. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Yeah, I think that's what we 15 16 do. MS. D. WILLIAMS: 17 Okay. MR. RUE: Well, I concur if that's.... 18 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you, Mr. Rue. 1.9 20 Are there other comments by Council members? Mr. Wolfe? MR. WOLFE: I'm okay. 21 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Mr. Hines? 22 23 MR. HINES: We're okay, thank you very much. And again I'd like to reiterate the comments made by Frank Rue 24 and Deborah Williams and thank the negotiators as well as AJV 25

for a process well done. 1 Thank you. 2 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: And, Mr. Ewing, any 3 comments? 4 MR. EWING: Just concur with the comments that 5 we've heard from other Council members. 6 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you then. 7 the motion is before us as amended, all Council members in 8 favor say aye. IN UNISON: 10 Aye. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Opposed? 11 (No opposing responses) 12 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: The motion carries. Thank 13 you very much. 14 MS. D. WILLIAMS: I'm applauding from 15 Washington, D.C. 16 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. The last item of 17 business would be to adjourn, I believe. And we will accept a 18 19 motion to adjourn, we will not accept one to recess. MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, often times the 20 seller likes to speak at this point, is AJV interested in 21 22 saying few words? 23 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Mr. Valley. MS. McCAMMON: He will now. 24 25 MS. D. WILLIAMS: All right.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Would you state your name for the record.

MR. VALLEY: My name is Howard Valley, I'm the

AJV Chairman. I have been involved in negotiations for the last five years with the Trustee Council negotiators, as has been mentioned by everybody here. The negotiations have really been long, I think we've all worked hard to get a package that both sides could agree on. I think the last few months here with the configuration of 3a and so forth, that though very difficult, it came out with an arrangement that both sides are satisfied with and I look forward to working out the details of this and taking it back to our board, hopefully about the 16th of April.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you, Mr. Valley.

Okay, with that, we'll entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. RUE: So moved.

MR. EWING: Second.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: It has been moved and seconded that we adjourn, all in favor say aye.

IN UNISON: Aye.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Opposed?

(No opposing responses)

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: This meeting is adjourned.
