CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: This is the continuation from the meeting in -- what was the last date of the last meeting?

MS. McCAMMON: October 22nd.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: October 22nd. So it's a continuation meeting to discuss potential purchase of parcels of land on Kodiak Island and the Uyak Bay area. I'd like to do a roll call for the Trustee Council. I understand Bill Hines is sitting in for Steve Pennoyer. Marilyn Heiman is on the line; Alex Swiderski for Craig Tillery.

MS. McCAMMON: Craig is on the line.

MR. TILLERY: Craig Tillery is on the line.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: Oh, Craig's on, okay.

Didn't hear Craig. Frank Rue is on the line and is there anybody from DEC?

MR. EASTON: Dan Easton for Michele Brown.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: Okay, thank you. So all present and, Molly, you want to bring up the topic we're going to discuss today and is there a time line?

MS. McCAMMON: Yeah, Mr. Chairman, these are 17 parcels, Larsen Bay tax parcels that were on the agenda for the October 22nd meeting. At that time there were a number of questions about some of the parcels. Since that time Fish and

Wildlife Service went back and prepared 17 individual benefits reports for these acquisitions. They also redid the map and clarified some of the land holdings that surround these potential purchases and provided additional information about the resource value of them.

Again, these are 17 parcels, they total in acreage 163.64 acres, the total purchase price of all of them combined is \$254,000. These parcels have already been purchased by the Conservation Fund, basically to protect their resource value. What is happening in this area, and if you look at the map, you can see that there are a number of small inholdings throughout -- on both sides of Uyak Bay. And the refuge has been attempting to purchase as many of these inholdings as possible.

There was a question on a couple of things, one of them was the potential status of the surrounding lands owned by Koniag and whether those were, in fact, on the table as part of the phase two acquisition. We did have a recent discussion with Koniag on these lands and they understand that it is the desire of the Interior Department and the Refuge go put these into the package and to clean up a lot of the land ownership. There's just kind of a mish-mash of some of this land ownership and to clean that up as part of phase two. So they do understand it's on the table, we had some preliminary discussions about it during our last negotiating session.

The other question that came up in review of this was

whether these acquisitions were supported by local people in Larsen Bay and by Koniag Corporation. And I did speak with Jay Bellinger, the Refuge Manager, just prior to this meeting, just about five minutes ago, and we just kind of went over the history of this once again. These acquisitions by the Refuge are strongly supported by local people. What has happened is that most of them end up getting sold because they're either forfeited because they aren't able to make taxes to the Kodiak Borough or they end up getting sold, mostly to people in Anchorage or outside the area. And these are all very key areas, they have key access points, they're at the mouths of creeks, they're highly desirable for their location for access points for subsistence hunting in this area. So having them as part of the Refuge, according to the Refuge Manager, is strongly supported by local people.

If you look through the individual benefits reports there is greater detail about each individual parcel, whether there is a salmon stream that goes through it, bald eagle nest, things of that nature. These are all acquisitions that would compliment the large parcel acquisitions.

So we do have -- it's my understanding we have Steve Shuck also in the office with Marilyn, if there are any additional questions.

MS. HEIMAN: Yeah, Steve Shuck is here if you do have any questions about any of the parcels or the

background.

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MS. McCAMMON: But I'd be happy to answer any questions and I'm sure Steve would.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: Any questions?

MR. HINES: What's the total price? I'm sorry, I didn't add this up, I apologize.

MS. McCAMMON: \$254,000.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: Molly, how much -- Steve or Marilyn, how much is remaining of the million dollar tax parcel money left?

MR. SHUCK: We have not closed any of the parcels, we have the Trustee Council action to authorize purchase of seven from Kodiak Island Borough, but we are reappraising those and we will be coming back to the Council if the appraisal prices change at all. The Council has also approved funding of four private parcels, none of those have closed yet, we are waiting -- in fact, one of them, I think, we just got the check in the office for. I take that back. We have requested funding for one of those, and I believe that money will be requested to be withdrawn from the court with the State money that was requested as well. So right now all of the million remains, if everything goes through, I didn't bring those figures with me, but if everything goes through that's been approved so far, we'd be looking at, oh, four to \$500,000 still remaining after these acquisitions take place.

MS. McCAMMON: And, Mr. Chairman, I was going to say, I don't have the status report in front of me here, but I was going to say it's approximately half of it remains uncommitted. And, if you'll recall, this is one of the issues when we had our discussion in October on the future of small parcels, this is one of the issues that was discussed at that time and it was requested of Fish and Wildlife Service to come back in January with a status report on kind what has been accomplished to date, what remains thus far and whether there still is a need for that additional half a million.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: One other question. Is the appraised value of the purchase price that the Conservation Fund acquired the property for; is that how that was established?

MR. SHUCK: No, the appraisal was conducted actually twice by MacSwain and Associates, the first time it was done we had values and the appraisal went stale before anything could be consummated, the reappraisal showed exactly the same values of land. The Conservation Fund did not have an appraisal when they acquired the properties and after talking with their representatives, they were close, they were a little high on some and a little low on some, but they did approve our appraised values.

MR. RUE: Yeah, Dave, this is Frank, I have a quick question.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS: Sure, go ahead, Frank.

MR. RUE: Molly said in January we'd be getting an update in general, does that mean we'll look at sort of the status in general of ongoing negotiations and what the feasibility is for other small parcel purchases?

MS. McCAMMON: In this area, yes.

MR. RUE: Yeah, okay.

MS. McCAMMON: Yes.

MR. HINES: Was it the desire that those small parcels, like in the blue, is that what the Trustee Council will eventually try to acquire or what is the significance of that, considering that you're buying the 1097, 1096 and you have a like a blue parcel, is that eventually going to try to be negotiated?

MS. McCAMMON: That's correct, those are parcels that are currently -- that is the desire of Fish and Wildlife Service to acquire. And when the Service first came to the Trustee Council on these they had some prioritized selections, and one of the things we've asked them to go back and look at is where are we in terms of protecting the top priority parcels and are we now looking at Tier II and Tier III parcels or exactly where are we.

MR. HINES: Thank you.

MR. RUE: Molly, this Frank again, could you remind me what's going on with the KIB? I assume that Kodiak

Island Borough.

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MS. McCAMMON: Those are the Kodiak Island
Borough parcels and those are ones that Steve mentioned that
the Council has already approved the acquisition of those
parcels, however, there was questions about deed restrictions
and things and it's my understanding that the appraisals have
now expired and they are being reappraised. And so I would
anticipate if the value has gone up, then it would be up to the
Council to decide whether they wanted to contribute any
additional money to it.

MR. RUE: Does the Kodiak Island Borough have any philanthropic leaning since fish and wildlife are critical to their existence?

MS. HEIMAN: No. They want Refuge revenue sharing, remember, not less.

MR. RUE: Yeah. I only say that half tongue in cheek.

MS. HEIMAN: Yes.

MS. McCAMMON: Well, the Borough was very supportive of.....

MR. RUE: Us giving them money.

MS. HEIMAN: Yes.

MS. McCAMMON: Yes.

MR. RUE: Huh. I wonder if we couldn't figure out of making it cheaper when the Borough is involved.
