A disaster of great proportion is scheduled to happen this coming spring--the logging of the Paul's Lake and Laura Lake drainage on Afognak Island. This portion of Afognak is one of the most productive and critical habitats on the island. It is a main producer of red, silver, and pink salmon, for sport and commercial fishermen. The north end of Afognak is the most prolific producer of wildlife and fish, (both fresh and saltwater) of the whole Northern islands.

I have lived on Afognak at different times, and on all coasts of the island and can personally attest to the uniqueness of the north side of Afognak.

The "jewel" of the island is the Red Lake/Red Peak area in the northwest corner. This small piece stretches from Blue Fox Bay to Waterfall Bay. This area is also different from all other portions of the island. There is abundant salmon habitat as well as the largest herd of elk and the largest concentration of the sea otter habitat.

This area supports the northern and westernmost single species stand or monoculture of old growth forest. As you know, old growth forests are being logged at an exponential rate. This makes this piece of land uniquely qualified to receive your most special attention. To date, the Council has exercised its protection of this unique part of Alaska well, but there is one tract left which requires immediate protection--the north section of Afognak.

Kodiak Seiners Association urges you to not let this opportunity pass.

The City of Homer is pleased to participate in supporting the nominations of the following properties on the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough for consideration of funding under the Small Parcel Habitat Protection Program. The Trust for Public Land (TPL) currently has options to purchase these properties, which total more than ~~100~~ acres. TPL is still in negotiations with the property owners of several other high priority properties, and hopes to submit additional nomination forms in the coming weeks.

The City of Homer has a long history of being interested in acquiring private property on the Homer Spit to put into a protected status, and leave undisturbed for future generations. Some of the efforts undertaken by the City, and some of the unique characteristics of the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough are described below.

- The 1990 Homer Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map designated everything north of the Fishin' Hole Lagoon and Beluga Slough as public/governmental.
- In 1990 the City traded a publicly owned lot on the Small Boat Harbor side of the Homer Spit for a lot on the west side of the Spit to protect the undisturbed view and allow public access to the beach.
- The City is concurrently, along with this application, preparing a proposal to the EVOS Trustees for a project at Mariner Park which would reintroduce flushing of the park area, to protect and enhance habitat resources.
- The natural resources of the Homer Spit is enjoyed by over 100,000 visitors each year.
- The Annual Shorebird Festival, which takes place almost entirely on the Homer Spit, is visited by over 2,000 birding enthusiasts.
- In 1996 the Legislature approved the creation of the Beluga Slough Critical Habitat Area surrounding the Homer Airport. The Critical Habitat Area was overwhelmingly endorsed by referendum by the citizens.



- The City of Homer approved in 1996 a conservation easement with the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust for twenty-six acres on the Homer Spit.
- The Spit is host to a traditional silver salmon subsistence fisheries and supports sport claming.
- The City recently created a new Conservation Zoning District, on which the permitted uses are fish and wildlife habitat protection and enhancement and marine-life and wildlife sanctuary or preserve.

In closing, the City of Homer is very excited about this proposal to the EVOS Trustees, and are confident that acquiring these parcels for habitat protection and recreational uses meets the mandate set forth from the Exxon Valdez settlement. The City would consider taking over stewardship of these parcels if the EVOS Trustees find that would be the most effective method of protecting the valuable resources found on the parcels.

On behalf of Defenders of Wildlife, a national conservation organization with over 200,000 members and supporters, I am writing to urge your support in protecting important shorebird habitat in the area of Homer, Alaska. I urge your positive action on using funds available from the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill (EVOS) Trust to support the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust's protection of key habitat.

I understand that the EVOS Trustee Council is seriously considering applying funds to acquire, through the small parcel program, key tracts of shorebird habitat at the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough. For several reasons, we endorse using available funds for these acquisitions. First, intertidal resources, including this particular area, were damaged by the oil spill in 1989, and restoration of intertidal resources is a stated priority of the Trust. Therefore, protection of these key tracts through acquisition is a particularly appropriate use of those funds.

Second, these tidelands attract tourists and recreationists who enjoy the opportunity to view the huge numbers of shorebirds that rely on this habitat. This tourism, which has minimal impact on the birds, provides economic benefits to the area. Because another priority for the Trust is promotion of tourism that decreased because of the spill, this is a second powerful reason to acquire the parcels by using these funds.

Finally, this area is essential habitat for migrating birds, especially shorebirds. This site is a Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network site (hosting over 100,000 shorebirds each spring), a designated State Critical Habitat, and the location for the popular Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival.

Protecting these parcels will bring permanent protection to essential habitat for shorebirds and fulfill the designated priorities of the EVOS Trust. We hope that you will encourage a positive Council vote on May 29.

Dear Governor Knowles:

I have been following the efforts to protect the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough with very great interest and I write to urge you to exert your influence to see that some of the financial resources available to the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council through its small parcel program are put toward this project.

The oil spill did significant damage to the intertidal resources of this area, impacting the intertidal habitat and the plants and animals which depend upon that habitat. The tidelands along the Homer Spit and in Beluga Slough are not only critically important to the ecology of the area, but are privately owned and still obtainable and undeveloped.

If the "bottom-line" must always be the generation of dollars for local economies, I would only point out the obvious: if the resource is protected, then birdwatchers from all over the world, clam diggers and other local recreationists will continue to pour money into the local economy indefinitely. The relatively few people to be employed by commercial development cannot compare with the value of the natural habitat already bringing growing numbers of visitors and dollars to area businesses.

Birds are a "renewable resource", for so long as their habitats remain intact. Bird-watching is the fastest growing recreation in the country. Birdwatchers tend to be upper-income people who will travel anywhere in the world to find concentrations of the birds they seek to admire. Homer is more accessible than many other parts of your beautiful big state. To throw away the opportunity to protect this resource is so short-sighted. The Oil Spill Trustee Council needs to hear this from Alaskans.

The Nuttall Ornithological Club is the oldest organization of its kind in North America. More than a century ago its members were the founders of the American Ornithologists' Union, the AOU. This latter is the largest and most prestigious organization of professional ornithologists in North America. I am only one of hundreds of Nuttall and AOU members who have visited the Kenai Peninsula and specifically the Homer Spit to see the concentrations of migrating shorebirds for which the area is famous, but I know I speak for them all.

Dear Governor Knowles,

In a few weeks over 100,000 shorebirds will begin using parts of Kachemak Bay, by Homer, for a stopover migration site. This location was recognized as a site of "international importance" as part of the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network at last year's Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival.

I also understand that in a few weeks the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council will be in a position to consider once again some tracts for acquisition through the "small parcel program" and that these tracts might include sections of the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough.

While the Trustees have committed about \$380 million to land acquisition and have made some significant purchases, some people take the view that the remaining funds are best spent to protect the integrity of remote areas that are still wilderness. This is certainly not the case for the Homer Spit, since much of the spit has been developed. However, developed or not, the area is still of tremendous importance to migratory birds and to the people who enjoy watching them.

Let's face it, *this is the place the birds themselves have chosen as an important stopover site.*

The preservation of these intertidal lands constitutes an appropriate candidate for acquisition, since intertidal resources were badly damaged by the oil spill. Moreover, these tidelands provide a series of high-quality recreation opportunities -- including wildlife viewing, bird-watching, and beach walking. This sort of recreation -- an economic resource -- was a service that was injured by the spill.

So far, I understand that there has been little chance to acquire tidelands that are important to fish and wildlife resources. The Homer Spit does have privately owned tidelands, and they are fast being developed (e.g., filled for log transfer sites). The City of Homer owns some of the tidelands on the spit, and they are committing their remaining holdings to conservation. Thus, the Homer Spit represents a real opportunity to contribute to conservation initiative supported by local government. Indeed, this may be the only EVOC acquisition that would actually bring tidelands into public ownership.

While the costs of these lands may seem somewhat high (approximately \$2 million for about 110 acres), the value for conservation is great. I hope you can bring the powers of your office to resolve this in favor of spending appropriate moneys from the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill fund for this purpose.

On behalf of Defenders of Wildlife, I am writing to urge your support in protecting very important shorebird habitat in the area of Homer, Alaska. We urge your positive action on using funds available from the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trust to support the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust's protection of key habitat. Defenders of Wildlife, a national conservation organization with nearly 200,000 members and supporters, is active in bird conservation programs around the nation.

We understand that the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council is seriously considering applying funds to acquire, through the 'small parcel program', key tracts of shorebird habitat at the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough. For several reasons, we endorse using available funds for these acquisitions. First, these particular intertidal areas were badly damaged by the oil spill in 1989, therefore, protection of these key tracts through acquisition is a particularly appropriate use of those funds.

Second, these tidelands attract tourists and recreationists who enjoy the opportunity to view the huge numbers of shorebirds that rely on this habitat. This tourism, which has minimal impact on the birds, provides economic benefits to the area. Income from tourism decreased in the area as a result of the oil spill, making this assistance to that sector of the region's economy particularly justified.

Finally, the importance of this area for the shorebirds themselves must not be overlooked. This area is a Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network site (hosting over 100,000 shorebirds each spring), a designated State Critical Habitat, and the location for the Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival.

Defenders of Wildlife would certainly appreciate positive action on this issue. The time to act is now.

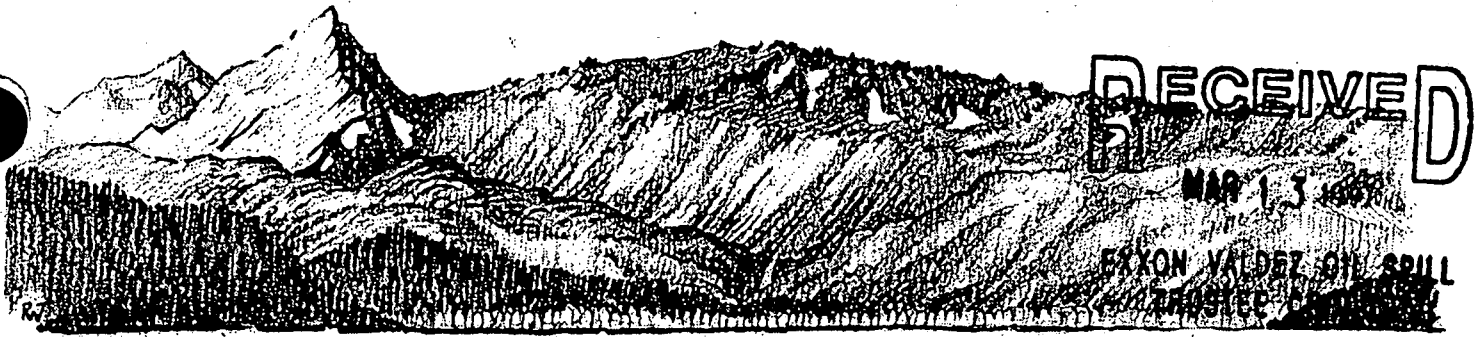

It has recently come to my attention that a wonderful opportunity currently exists for you to support an important conservation initiative that is presently pending in the Homer area of south-coastal Alaska. I am specifically referring to Homer Spit and the efforts that the Trust for Public Land (TPL) and the City of Homer and Kachemak Heritage Land Trust are making to acquire public land areas in Beluga Slough and along Homer Spit.

From a personal perspective, both as a bird tour leader and ornithologist who has brought Massachusetts Audubon Society natural history tour groups to Alaska for the past five years, as well as from the point of view of a member of the Board of Directors of the American Birding Association, there seems to exist a wonderful opportunity to preserve in perpetuity some areas of outstanding importance to both recreational use and to migratory birds, especially shorebirds.

Both my father and his eldest brother traveled to Alaska in the last decade of the 1800s, attracted by your beautiful wilderness and the diversity and abundance of wildlife. My father was unable to stay but my uncle remained in the Ketchikan area until he was an old man.

I, too, have visited Alaska, timing my travels to coincide with the concentrations and migrations of wildlife, particularly birds. One of my favorite memories is of time spent on the Kenai Peninsula, searching for shorebirds on the Homer Spit and taking boats from there to find seabirds we never see here on the East coast. The area is well-known to increasing numbers of ardent birdwatchers who travel world-wide seeking bird concentrations such as are found in Homer.

Need I point out that birds have become BIG BUSINESS? Birders generate billions of dollars of economic activity wherever birds are found in predictable numbers. And they are a renewable resource as long as their needed habitats are preserved. Increased bird populations ensure a variety of recreational opportunities and economic benefits to nearby communities, as long as the birds continue to come at traditional times.

I understand that the Trust for Public Land, the City of Homer and the Lachemak Heritage Land Trust are working to obtain some key pieces of private land from willing sellers in the Beluga Slough and along the Spit. Funds obtained through the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council have been used already for several valuable land acquisitions in other places, but the opportunity to protect the Beluga Slough and the Homer Spit has arisen only recently and must be acted upon quickly.

Intertidal resources suffered badly as a result of the oil spill. This opportunity to preserve tidelands along the spit and slough must not be allowed to slip away for this habitat and the flora and fauna it supports will, if preserved, support high-quality recreation indefinitely for as long as local communities can provide accommodations for the thousands of Alaskan residents and visitors who will seek such beauty. Renewable resources provide for much more stable economies than do the traditional boom-and-bust cycles that accompany resource extraction.

On behalf of all who love Alaska, both residents and non-residents, please do what you can to encourage and accomplish this opportunity to restore intertidal resources through habitat acquisition and thus make something of permanent benefit result from the tragedy of the infamous Exxon Valdez oil spill.

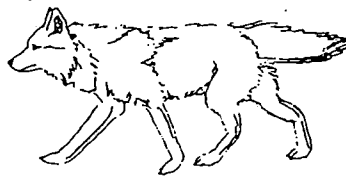



Kachemak Heritage Land Trust (KHLT) wishes to express its strong support for the acquisition of land submitted in three packages of proposals from the Trust for Public Land. These packages include lands which are both highly valuable as habitat for species injured by the oil spill, and as popular recreation areas. I would like to take this opportunity to briefly explain the unusual and precedent-setting nature of this project, since it might bear merit where further important decisions will be made.

Over the past few years, KHLT has created a comprehensive conservation strategy based on intensive mapping of natural, recreational and cultural values and the threats impacting them. The maps revealed that the highest priority in the southern Kenai Peninsula was the intertidal lands of the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough. KHLT has not had the resources to protect these lands simply by purchase, and when an opportunity arose to involve the national Trust for Public Land (TPL) in the preservation of these important places, we gladly took advantage of it. TPL is currently assisting in a collaborative effort with the City of Homer and Kachemak Heritage Land Trust to achieve cooperative protection of resources very dear to both residents' and visitors' hearts and to this community's long-term economic well-being.

Because of strong and consistent interest over the years from the local community in preserving the Homer Spit, the City of Homer has made a serious commitment to conservation by working with KHLT to finalize a very restrictive and perpetual conservation easement on 26 acres of shorebird habitat. In the process of working through the details of this project, KHLT encouraged the City in adopting a new conservation zone classification which we hope will grow to include most of the remaining municipal lands on the Spit.

We appreciate the Trustee Council's consideration of this important habitat and recreation preservation project. Thank you for this wonderful opportunity to help make such a positive impact on the future of this spectacular place.


During the public discussions last week when you folks made us all very happy by agreeing to purchase our wonderful "Overlook Park" acreage, you asked Pam Brodie if we had any ideas on what moneys might be used to purchase the parcels out on the Homer Spit and in our Slough area. One suggestion has occurred to me this past week in answer to this question. It was indicated during that same public discussion that the property which lies just to the East of the Overlook Park parcel was still in the negotiating stages. This surprised me a bit as the owner had turned down an extremely generous offer from EVOS some months back. This man had to be legally restrained by the City of Homer because he put in a very poor roadway on this property without obtaining any of the necessary permits. While there are a few small portions of this parcel which would compliment the Overlook Park property (Most notably the mouth of the creek draining the Park), much of the rest is perhaps more suitable to careful and legal development as homesites.

I would suggest that the excessively large sums needed to obtain this property might better be used to acquire the Spit and Slough properties.

In notifying him (I believe the owner's name is Bullock or Bullard) next time, you might suggest to him that if he is willing, the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust is ready to work with him at any time to put easements of his choosing on any of the steep and otherwise inaccessible portions of this property. He might then realize some income tax advantages. One of KHLT's Goals is to acquire any lands which are contiguous to lands already preserved, such as the Overlook Park Property.

As you probably know, the City of Homer is already working on an easement on 26 acres of Spit Property which lies next to the large parcels that EVOS and TPL are working on at present. Setting these parcels aside for Public Recreation is extremely important and this may be the last opportunity to do so.

Also, please prioritize the Overlook Park property. I understand that a new appraisal is being reviewed and this is a good chance for the acquisition and preservation of this wonderful place for the use of both Alaskans and visitors.

The Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival is a unique partnership among local businesses, non-profit groups and government agencies. Since 1993 the festival has centered around the staging of hundreds of thousands of migrating shorebirds in Kachemak Bay and specifically in the intertidal areas of the Homer Spit. By educating the public about these specialized habitats and encouraging them to observe the gatherings of shorebirds here, the festival has not only increased public awareness of the phenomenon, but has also helped businesses in the area increase revenues at a time of year when tourism has traditionally been slow. The success of the festival depends on maintaining suitable open space and habitat for the returning shorebirds.

Much of the remaining natural habitat on the Homer Spit has been drastically altered or reduced in the past few years as industrial uses there accelerate. Areas where people used to hike, ride horseback, beachcomb and watch shorebirds have been dredged and filled and no-trespassing signs have sprouted. Much of the remaining intertidal areas and low lying vegetated habitats are privately owned and could potentially be filled or altered to the point of destroying the habitat values forever. Many of the private landowners have indicated a willingness to sell their property at fair market value.

We encourage the Trustees Council to consider the purchase of intertidal lands identified by the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust on the Homer Spit and Beluga Slough in order to protect and enhance the intertidal resources that were harmed by the oil spill. In addition to helping to restore injured species, the acquisition of these properties would open up lands currently closed to public use and provide new recreational opportunities for birdwatchers and other public uses.

As an avid outdoorsman, birdwatcher, and professional biologist, I am urging you to use your influence to stop the degradation of wildlife habitat by industrial activities on the Homer spit. Each time I visit Homer, I am appalled at the takeover of the spit by logging interest and consequent habitat destruction. Wetlands important to migrating and nesting shorebirds are being lost at an alarming rate.

Placing property into ownership by the state may be the only way to provide the type of responsible stewardship required for these lands. The area was injured by the Exxon Valdez oil spill and that being the case, properties there are candidate for acquisition with Exxon Valdez Oil Spill (EVOS) funds. Few opportunities exist to protect these lands and the wildlife and human activities associated with them other than purchasing them. This letter urges your support for the acquisition of several small parcels of wetlands on the Homer Spit and in Beluga Slough in Homer that have been nominated by the Trust for Public Lands with full support of the City of Homer and the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust.

As a resident of Homer since 1984 (and Alaska since 1963) and as a biologist, I recognize the great importance that these lands have for both the future of wildlife and the future of recreational tourism in Homer. The parcels are all in intertidal areas now in private hands, heavily used by migratory birds, and sometimes used for local recreation. Intertidal beaches, mud flats, and rocky shores were hardest hit by the 1989 oil spill and these parcels represent some of the few opportunities for the Council to protect sensitive intertidal habitats.

The parcels proposed are adjacent to other lands now being set aside for wildlife and recreational use. The City of Homer and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service are both active in planning and initiating educational and recreational programs for the use of their lands; the proposed parcels would increase this opportunity and serve to protect larger contiguous blocks of intertidal habitat, which is critical if migratory birds, including some of the injured resources, make continued use of these lands. Nearby development has seriously threatened the intertidal areas along the Homer Spit. A large block of Spit land was recently dredged and filled for a barge basin and log transfer site. This area was prime upland shorebird habitat until it was destroyed. Action to protect the remaining lands along the Spit must be swift to prevent the loss of intertidal habitat there.

You are aware that the parcels under consideration are within an area recognized for their importance for wildlife as they are within the Kachemak Bay Critical Habitat Management Area and Kachemak Bay International Site of the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network. The annual Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival depends on the migration of some 30 species of shorebirds that utilize the intertidal areas in these parcels each spring. If these and adjacent lands are lost to development, the great educational opportunity created by the Festival will also be lost. The future of our wildlife - and the future of recreational opportunities for our citizens - depends on the protection of habitat in areas such as Homer.

Once again, I urge you to acquire these parcels for the protection and enhancement of injured wildlife and recreational resources.

The December 1991 payment includes interest accrued on the escrow account. The actual disbursements without interest was \$24.5 million to the United States, \$29 million to the State of Alaska and \$36.5 million to the Joint Trust Fund. The total interest earned on the escrow account was \$831,233 which was disbursed proportionately. This included \$226,280 to the United States, \$267,842 to the State of Alaska and \$337,111 to the Joint Trust Fund.

The September 1994 reimbursement to the United States included an over-payment of \$80,700 to NOAA. This over-payment is a direct result of final costs for damage assessment activities being lower than what was previously estimated. The funds were returned to the Joint Account by reducing the amount transferred to the United States in Court Request number 15.

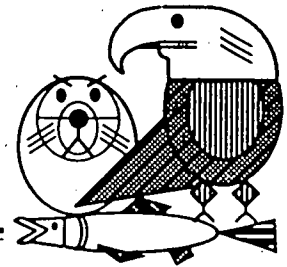

Thank you for your April 15 letter regarding the U.S. Forest Service's Russian River Angler Trail Project. You may not be aware that the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council is only providing a portion of the funds the Forest Service anticipates using for this project. Our authority is only over that portion of the project using Trustee money. Other portions of the project are being funded by the Forest Service using other sources of funds. If you have questions regarding those aspects of the project, you should direct them to Mr. Duane Harp, the Forest Service District Ranger in Seward. He can be reached at (907) 224-3374.

The Trustee Council proposed to fund three phases of the Russian River Angler Trail construction. Phase I which is scheduled to be completed this summer, includes the installation of 265 feet of elevated, light penetrating boardwalk, access stairs and a bank fishing platform. This is intended to assist in natural restoration of the trampled banks and promote bank stabilization. Phase I has been reviewed by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the Alaska Department of Natural Resources as part of the Trustee Council-funded Kenai River Habitat Restoration and Recreation Enhancement Project. It's my understanding that the final design has not yet been completed.

Phases II and III of the project will be constructed in 1998. Project features to be funded by the Trustee Council include additional boardwalking, trail rerouting and fencing.



Comments on the Russian River Angler Trail Project

These comments are presented in two parts, a brief summary and a detailed explanation.

We object to the U.S. Forest Service Russian River Angler Trail Project and think its installation would cause irreversible deterioration to the whole Russian River ecosystem. The proposal is for 3935 feet of boardwalk, upgraded "tread" (changing the natural trail to a uniform, four-foot wide hardened road), an electric tramway from Grayling Parking to the river, a toilet on the river floodplain, and other obtrusive features.

The justification for the project is overstated (see the accompanying detail of concerns).

The following is a brief summary of dangers:

- a. The obtrusive nature and size of this installation would destroy the wilderness quality of the river. It violates the Forest Services's own scenic objectives for the river.
- b. The boardwalk would block game trails, drive animals away, and likely cause injuries to and drowning of moose calves.
- c. Limited entry points and concentration of fishermen would jeopardize salmon and trout spawning.
- d. Construction of a hardened road/"trail" from Red Salmon campground to the boardwalk/"trail" on the river would provide entry and an easy trail for snow machines and all-terrain vehicles.
- e. Increased ease of access and travel would cause a tremendous increase in the fishing population and would funnel large numbers of fishermen upstream to undisturbed areas.
- f. The installation would cost \$50,000 a year to maintain. This money is not funded or promised. The current state of funding at federal, state, and local levels is very tight and will probably get tighter, leading to the possibility of a huge, unmaintained eyesore.
- g. The proposed toilet would have been underwater and a source of bacterial contamination had it been there during the 1995 flood.
- h. USFS says on page 1 of the Environmental Assessment that one of the reasons for the damage they perceive was the building of the road and river bluff parking in 1969. They propose to correct it with more of the same. More of the same remedy leads to more of the same result.

RUSSIAN RIVER ANGLER TRAIL PROJECT

The Russian River Angler Trail Project, initiated by the Seward District of the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and approved by the District Ranger on 5 September 1996, proposes major construction for more than a mile along the Russian River. It includes:

- an electric tram from the top of the bluff to the river
- a toilet on the river which will need emptying daily
- more than 3900 feet of five-foot-wide, railed boardwalk along the river
- widened, hardened "trails" along the river
- fencing of the river bank except at a limited number of river entry points

Taking these features one at a time:

a. Electric Tram: The inclusion of the electric tram is justified by the Americans With Disabilities Act, and will be used to haul toilet waste up the bluff and construction project materials down the bluff. However, the Americans With Disabilities Act specifically does not require a "Cadillac" solution (as the courts expressed it) for access for disabled. Disabled people have access currently via the ferry approximately half a mile downriver, and the project proposes another handicapped accessible trail about half a mile above the proposed tram, so handicapped access is well provided for without the tram.

b. Toilet on River: The toilet is justified by concern for levels of coliform bacteria in the river, but the USFS themselves state (USFS Environmental Assessment and 30 October 1996 letter) that the fecal coliform levels are admittedly low, and "are well within acceptable values for State Water Quality Standards for secondary water recreation and should not be considered a health risk." The toilet is intended to serve people who fish near the Kenai/Russian confluence, but the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service already have pit toilets in the confluence area, and there are also toilets at the top of the bluff along the river. USFS says that they have found human waste in the woods in the area where they plan to install the toilet, but in light of the lack of coliform bacteria problems, some human waste is greatly preferable to construction of a river-flood-plain toilet and a tram to serve it. Toilets on the river flood plain would have been under water in the 1995 fall flood.

c. Railed boardwalk: The precise construction type for the boardwalk is something of a moving target, but the latest information we've elicited from USFS is that it will be five feet wide, will have a 32-inch railing on the river side, and will probably be floored with some sort of transparent grid material. The boardwalk will block several game trails along the river, may funnel moose and bears along the boardwalks in competition with humans, and will be very difficult for moose and moose calves to cross. We have been told that first-year moose calf mortality is 30 percent in normal conditions. Considerable danger exists that moose calves,

especially, may break necks or legs in attempting a boardwalk crossing. They may become sufficiently exhausted in trying to get across the boardwalks that when they give up and try to recross the river, they may be too tired to make it, especially early in the season when the river is higher and rougher. Furthermore, grids are used all over the west to pen cattle. Animals may not even attempt boardwalk crossings. They may simply leave the area.

d. Hardened "trails". These trails were first described to us by USFS as being surfaced with gravel, somewhat like the new trail to the Russian River Falls area. The new Falls "trail" is a six- or eight-foot wide road capable of accommodating motorized vehicles, which were used to haul construction material in its building. USFS now says they are not sure what surfacing material they will use for the riverside trails, but it seems clear that they will be using motorized vehicles in building them, which will mean they will be wide enough to accommodate all-terrain vehicles and snow machines. The handicapped trail they propose from the Red Salmon Campground down to the river trail will provide access from the top of the bluff for such vehicles. This trail/boardwalk combination is particularly worrying. Wherever motorized access exists, people will use it. Making the Russian valley accessible to snow machines and ATVs inevitably will lead to their use on the river, with attendant noise and pollution, and will be a further factor in driving away the wildlife. Roads, and "trails" that can serve as roads, are one of the most damaging additions to a wilderness area.

e. Fences and limited entry points: No one has studied the effects of funneling a large number of people into the river. Will human traffic on spawning gravels destroy the salmon and rainbow eggs? Or harm the fry and smolt? Certainly funneling fishermen and wildlife alike through a limited number of entry points into the river (or a limited number of escape routes from the river for fishermen when a bear appears on the far bank) will increase human/wildlife encounters, with immediate risk to the humans, and the inevitable longer term destruction of the moose and bears. The number of bears killed in defense of life and property is already growing alarmingly, and this can only worsen it.

Besides these specific concerns about individual features of the project, there are significant general concerns about the project and its justification. They include:

a. Impact on a wilderness area: The Forest Services' own Scenic Condition Objective for the Russian River area is "...Retention', meaning that changes in the characteristic landscape should not be noticed by the average visitor." (See April 1996 USFS Environmental Assessment, p. 43) The huge metal and wood stairways down the bluff which a few years ago replaced the log and dirt paths already violate this objective. The addition of a tram, toilet, boardwalks, trails, and fences will add to, and extend, intrusive construction along a large portion of the river's length.

b. Increase in human traffic: The kind of thoroughfares the USFS intends along the river will inevitably funnel more human traffic onto the river, because of increased ease of traversing the river. It will also likely spread the kind of congestion evident near the mouth on up the stream, intensifying and spreading the damage human traffic brings.

c. The "more of the same" syndrome. The Forest Service recognizes on page one of their environmental assessment that their building a road into and campgrounds along the Russian Bluff (along with the building of the Sterling Highway) has greatly increased human traffic to the Russian. (Our observation, from having frequented the Russian since 1962, is that the bluff road, parking lots, and campgrounds have had a much heavier impact than the existence of the Sterling Highway.) They propose to fix the problems they perceive traffic has caused by doing more construction and making access even easier. More of the same remedy usually leads to more of the same result, and is not an advisable way to solve a problem.

d. Overstatement/overkill danger. The environmental assessment overstates problems and proposes overkill solutions. The coliform bacteria "problem/toilet solution" is one. The erosion danger to the Russian banks from fishermen is another. Natural occurrences, like the 1995 fall flood, cause more change and erosion (a natural process) than decades of fishermen. Furthermore, unlike the Kenai, which has soft banks for most of its length, the Russian has bouldered banks and a boulder/gravel bottom for most of its length. The Forest Service itself says on page 36 of the environmental assessment that "The river bank is made up primarily of large rocks and boulders dropped by the receding glaciers. This material, combined with extensive vegetation root systems along the banks, and the current moderate flow levels on the Russian River make for a remarkably stable natural bank." Although in some areas Forest-Service-installed gabions have increased current flow and created problems, soft banks are a significant problem only on the lower part of the river, and fisherman damage only exists at very popular fishing spots. Yet the boardwalks and "hardened trails" will extend 6300 feet up the river. The tram and toilet are not related to the issue of human-caused erosion at all, so it is unclear why they should even be included in an erosion-reduction project.

e. Impetus for Project: This appears to be a project initiated wholly within the Forest Service, with no outside impetus. Insofar as we have been able to determine, no one has requested the project, and the District Ranger, Duane Harp, described present reactions by U.S. Fish and Wildlife that could only be characterized as lukewarm indifference. In fact, in appealing a previous project along the river, the appellant quoted a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service letter of 22 May 1990 as saying "The problem of stream bank erosion is over stated and misleading to the public." The letter also said "Sanitary facilities should not be attempted if a service road is necessary," and "Localized foot wear should be treated by manipulating vegetation and controlling access rather than by constructing facilities."

f. Environmental Impact Statement: In light of the impact this project is likely to have on the character of the river, the amount of human traffic, fish spawning, game trails, and the long-term animal population, it appears that an environmental impact statement should have been done. Furthermore, the environmental assessment which was done is based more on supposition ("may have", "could") than on hard data, and inadequately supports the decision to proceed.

g. Speed of Process: The environmental assessment is dated April 1966, and the decision was made around the beginning of September. The comment period was closed before many people, including us, even knew of the proposal.

h. Progressive increase in boardwalk length: The environmental assessment on which the public had an opportunity to comment proposed 2560 feet of boardwalk, which included 525 feet of existing boardwalk. The decision notice announced that 3035 feet of *new* boardwalk would be built, an increase of 1000 feet. Current maps and documentation show that 3935 feet of boardwalk are now included in the project, an increase of more than 50 % from the alternative the public believed would be implemented. The Forest Service Project Manager states that part of the increase was driven by a request from Alaska Fish and Game that the proposed Forest Service trail be moved so that it would be 25 feet from the river bank. USFS elected to build more boardwalk rather than to move the trail as Fish and Game requested. The public had no opportunity to comment on the increase.

i. Maintenance: The project will cost \$50,000 to maintain. With the current funding crunch at federal, state, and local levels, it is extremely unlikely that the Forest Service will be able to obtain that money, which will result in a huge deteriorating eyesore along the Russian.

j. Cost: The project is expensive. The environmental assessment priced the original alternative 12 at \$848,177 (the most expensive alternative was \$866,081 and the least expensive was \$1000). Addition of another 1400 feet of boardwalk has increased the cost to \$996,000, making the adopted alternative the most expensive of the twelve proposed. The result, where not actually harmful, will not justify such an expense. Furthermore, CIRI, a private corporation, has filed a claim to the Russian River area. Undertaking a large tax-payer-funded project for land which may soon be turned over to a private corporation is unwise. Furthermore, it is unclear whether CIRI would want to commit to, or be able to fund, the annual operating cost mentioned above.

USFS has told us the first increment of financing for the project (\$85,000 in 1997) has been obtained from the Exxon Valdez Trustee Council, and will be used to install boardwalk, fencing and access points on the lower Russian. We would like, at a minimum, to see any further funding cut off and the project reopened to comment. Ideally, we would like to see the tramway, toilet, and widened, hardened trails deleted, the boardwalk substantially shortened, and erosion-control work limited to those areas where it is clearly needed. All repair should be done in such a way as to minimize river and ecosystem damage.

If the project proceeds as planned, the appearance of the Russian and the nature of the experience people have on the Russian will be very different in the future. A Fish and Game employee told us that their surveys indicate that 80% of the people who frequent the Russian want to share the river with bears. While we have no data, we surmise that a similar number would like to continue to see moose along the river. If this project is allowed to proceed, that will cease to be possible.

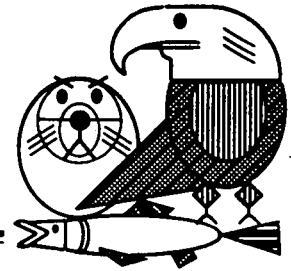

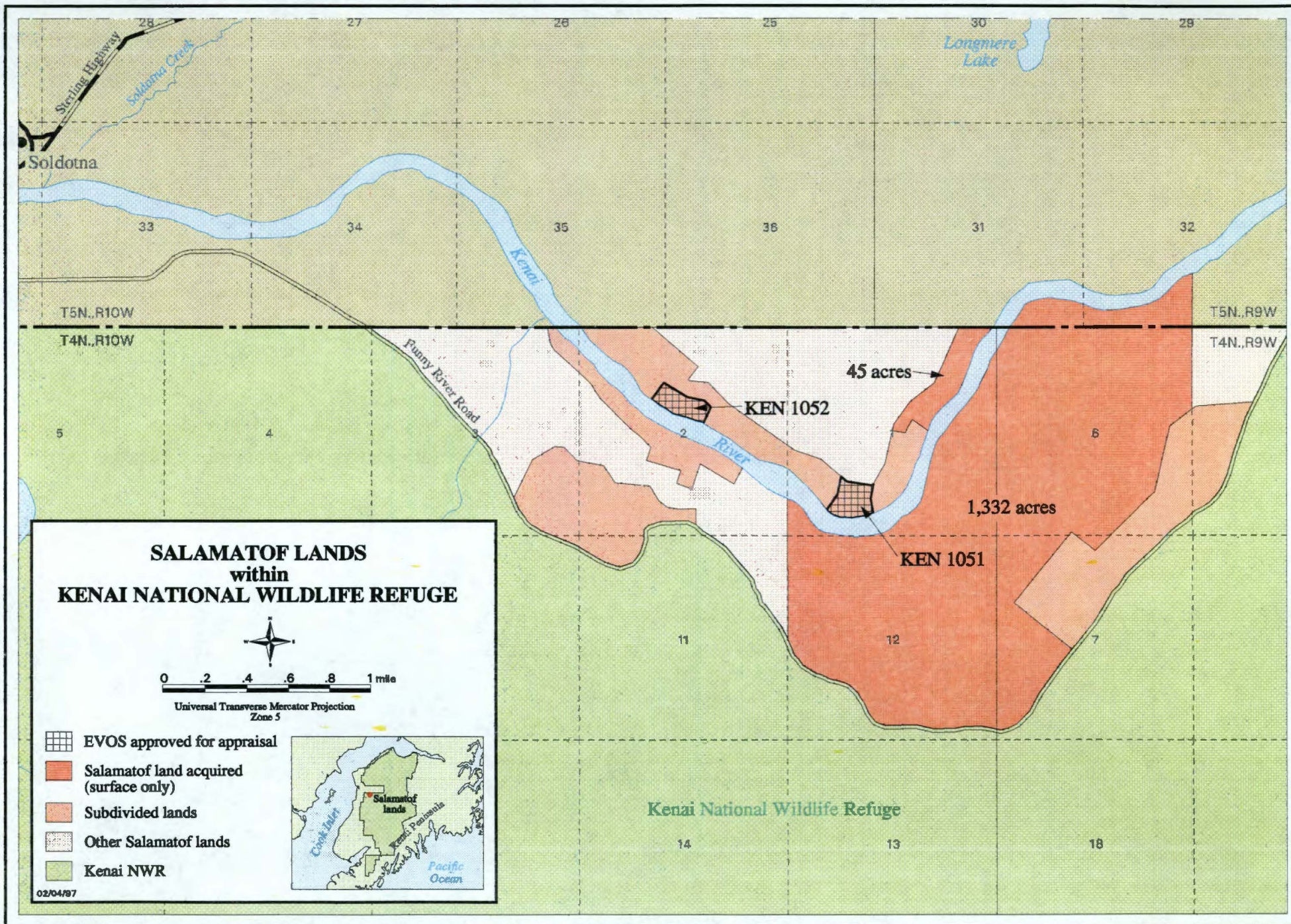
These two parcels are located within the Moose Range Meadows subdivision on the north bank of the Kenai River at approximately River Mile 26. The parcels consist of five subdivision lots and are directly across the river from the 1377 acre Salamatof parcel acquired last year. KEN 1051 is one of the largest undeveloped riverfront tracts in a subdivision that extends for nearly three river miles.

Pink salmon spawning and Dolly Varden spawning and rearing occur adjacent to the parcels. Sockeye salmon may also spawn and rear here although site-specific use has not been documented. Bald eagles roost in trees along the river and nest nearby.

Acquisition of these parcels will lead to the direct restoration of fishing opportunities on this popular stretch of the Kenai River. The number of bank anglers pursuing second run sockeye salmon has increased dramatically over the last 10 years. The construction of subdivision roads and more efficient fishing techniques contributed to this increase in use. The Service manages a 25 foot public access easement along both sides of the river. Serious river bank habitat damage and sloughing has occurred along this easement. The habitat damage prompted the Service to close the public easement during the 1995 and 1996 seasons.

The Kenai Refuge has received special funding for riverbank restoration and protection. If these parcels are acquired they will be developed as public fishing sites. Light-penetrating metal gratewalk would be installed along the bank and at wet spots on the access trail. The structures would be removed each fishing season. Adequate public parking and sanitation facilities would also be provided on site.

The acquisition of these parcels would protect sensitive banks of the Kenai River while providing for continued fishing opportunities. Concentrated public access sites would also alleviate trespass on adjacent private lands and other social conflicts. Without such facilities the annual public easement closure is likely to continue.


Dear Trustees,

Here are the petitions I have passively (left in a coffee house, food store) gathered for you to encourage you to purchase Long Island (one of the harbor islands of Kodiak, Alaska) for preservation under your responsibility to compensate for damages that occurred to our coastline as a result of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill of 1989.

I ran into the people from the Rain Forest Coalition here at ComFish in Kodiak yesterday, and I was struck by the difference in our approaches to this whole land acquisition matter. They are a big organization of various large groups involved in "green" ideologies, and those of us in favor of the purchase of Long Island are truly a "grass roots" collection of Kodiak residents who see Long Island as a local treasure to the Kodiak community for various recreational, archeological, historical, wildlife, and tourist uses. I know that the large parcel purchases are important for habitat. I am a commercial fisherman as well as a charter tour operator, and I know how very important those lands on northern Afognak are for fish and wildlife habitat. But let me remind you that most people will never see any real tangible benefit to those acquisitions...as important as they are...because it is cost prohibitive for them to afford a trip up there by boat or plane to visit these beautiful places. Long Island on the other hand is visited constantly by local residents for various recreational, archeological, historical, wildlife, and tourist uses and therefore gives the greatest political/popular value for the buck. The purchase of Long Island means that many people unable to ever visit northern Afognak or isolated Prince William Sound will regularly get to enjoy the wilderness value of Long Island. This as well as its high inherent value.

The archeological, historical, wildlife, recreational, and tourist resources related to Long Island make it a very worthy protection target. Please accept this as our strong united voice for inclusion of Long Island into purchases you make to preserve wild and valuable lands (damaged by the Exxon Valdez Spill) for the future of Alaska.

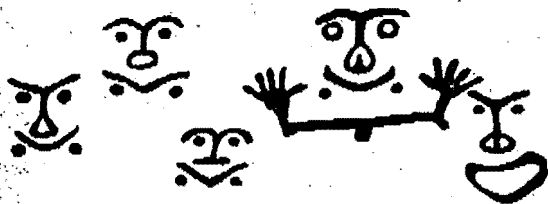

Christine passed on your email message requesting a copy of my letter to Sue Jeffery regarding the prehistory of Long Island. Here's the information I shared with her. Let me know if you would like more details!

The AHRS- Alaska Heritage Resources Survey- which is a state maintained compendium of archaeological site information, lists six sites for Long Island. Three are from the historic period- (1) a Russian era brick kiln, (2) Ft. Tidball (WWII area), and (3) Benny Benson's grave! The other three are prehistoric sites with midden deposits characteristic of the past 2500 years of Alutiiq History - from the Kachemak and Koniag cultural traditions. These are big deep deposits - up to 200 in long - that appear to represent permanent villages. At least two of these sites were badly damaged by earth moving activities during WWII, but archaeologist Donald Clark dug some test pits in the 1960s and found a variety of objects which suggest that people were deep sea fishing and hunting sea mammals from these villages. To me, they appear to be bases of cold season activity. This fits with the types of resource that are available from Long Island.

As for the earliest date of occupation, we can probably assume that Long Island was habitable much earlier than 2500 years ago. There has never been a systematic archaeological survey of the harbor islands, but older materials (ca. 6500 years ago) do occur in the general vicinity. For example, I recently found a slate lance at the Blisky site on Near Island that appears to be from the earliest period of Kodiak prehistory - known as the Ocean Bay tradition.

I hope this information is helpful. Good luck with the EVOS Trustee Council.

Long Island— Group urges trustees to buy

Leisnoi wants to sell Long Is-
land to the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill
Trustee Council and at least 300
people in Kodiak applaud the idea.

David Kubiak launched a peti-
tion-signing campaign recently to
encourage the council to purchase
the island. So far, he has col-
lected more than 300 signatures
in two weeks at Harborside Co-
ffee, Cactus Flats, Sutliff's and
Withrow's clinic (the Kodiak Is-
land Medical Associates.)

"I recently took a group of
friends to Long Island. We con-
templated that Long Island be-
longs to Leisnoi and what a
shame it would be to see the is-
land logged or developed,"
Kubiak says.

"The island is a high priority
public recreation area, a favorite
spot for people in Kodiak to get
away, because most of the time
the weather allows people to
scoot over to the island. You
have to go around Spruce Cape
and Cape Chiniak to get to other
off-road areas."

Leisnoi asked the EVOS Coun-
cil in November to consider pur-
chasing Long Island, saying it is
an area that has many of the dam-
aged resources and services be-
ing sought for restoration.

Kodiak resident Hank Eaton,
who served on the Alaska Fed-
eration of Natives from 1970-75,
opposes the sale, however.

"They're supposed to be the
protectors of the land for the chil-
dren and their children's chil-
dren," said Eaton, a member of
the Ouzinkie Native Corp.

"We worked hard during the
land claims settlement to get land
for us and for future generations,
not for somebody to sit at a desk

and put a price on it. Now they're
undoing everything."

Indeed, Long Island is a trea-
sure, home to a variety of land
and marine animals, some of them
on the threatened species list and
others considered at risk due to
the oil spill. The four-mile long
island is covered with a forest of
Sitka Spruce which provides habi-
tat for deer, beaver, fox, rabbits,
land otter, squirrel, weasel, a few
cattle, numerous song bird spe-
cies, bald eagles, northern gos-
hawks and marbled murrelets.

Rainbow trout, land-locked sil-
ver salmon and Dolly Varden
swim in its lakes. A dense popu-
lation of harbor seals dwell in its
coastal waters and 50 to 75 resi-
dent Steller sea lions inhabit the
rocky outcroppings on its north-
eastern shore.

The Department of Natural Re-
sources says islets in Cook Bay,
an all-weather harbor on the
northwestern shore of Long Is-
land, provide seabird rookeries
for more than 2,000 birds includ-
ing the only Kodiak breeding site
for the rhinoceros auklet.

But Long Island is much more
than a wildlife sanctuary. When
the DNR report describes the ter-
rain, the island sounds more like
a scene from a fairytale:

"The pastoral setting of Long
Island is rich in scenic beauty. The
grassy slopes, black rock cliffs,
brilliant wildlife flowers and quiet
secluded lakes...is contrasted by
the open exposure of Long Island
to the pounding surf."

Ironically, the park-like island
has also served as a commercial
hub and a military site throughout
its history. The island supported
several Native village sites before
contact with the Russians in the
1700s. During the 1800s the Rus-

sian American Company ran a
brick-making operation at a site on
Long Island, which is on the Na-
tional Register of Historic Places.

A century later, the U.S. Army
used Long Island as a coastal de-
fense site called Fort Tidball dur-
ing WWII.

"It was similar to Fort
Abercrombie and the defense site
at Chiniak, all three of which
served as outposts for Fort
Greeley at the Buskin River," said
Claire Holland, district ranger for
Alaska State Parks Kodiak.

"It had gun emplacements with
two six-inch guns and a radar re-
ceiving station, the radar tower
which is still intact. Troops lived
in quonset huts located around a
main mess hall with shower and
laundry facilities. The quonset
huts and bunks are still there.
Long Island is the most well-pre-
served WWII site in Kodiak and
possibly the most intact coastal
defense site in Alaska."

The Army Corp of Engineers
will clean up Long Island and
other WWII sites in Kodiak this
summer, Holland says.

Using established evaluation
criteria, the EVOS Trustee Coun-
cil currently ranks Long Island
"moderate" and is considering it
for acquisition. Kubiak, who has
been enjoying Long Island since
1966, hopes people who also
consider Long Island a treasure,

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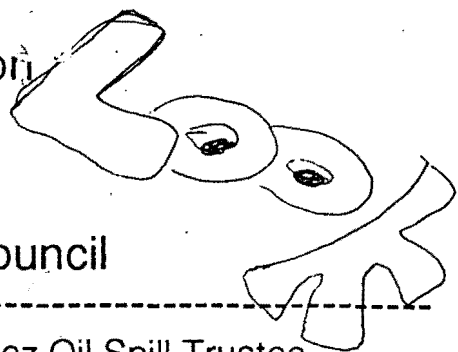



A few weeks ago we sent the Council a copy of our 6 April 1997 paper titled "Comments on the Russian River Angler Trail Project." We included a brief summary, but since it was a long paper, some of you may not have had a chance to read it through, and we may not have given some of the points adequate emphasis.

In rereading the paper, we think we may not have given proper emphasis to the road/trail USFS plans to build from the Red Salmon Campground down to the river. This road/trail would connect with the trail/boardwalk running along the river and would allow all-terrain vehicles to go a considerable distance up river, and would allow snow machines to go both up and down river. Making the Russian accessible to these vehicles inevitably would lead to their use on the river and that would be a further factor in erosion, in habitat damage, and in driving away wildlife

In general, this proposal is being presented under the guise of habitat protection and erosion control, but the bulk of its features have nothing to do with either. They include a mechanical tram, four-foot-wide gravel roads, excessive length of boardwalk, etc. If these features were removed and the project reduced to actual habitat protection and erosion control, USFS might be able to pay for it from their own funds and would not need Exxon Valdez Oil Spill money, which then would be available for other uses.

We'd like to reiterate our request that any funding be limited to habitat protection and essential erosion control repairs.

I have traveled around this area for 18 years total. The logging is the least of the problems Chiniak has - starting in the WWII era up until the 1970's Chiniak became the toxic waste dump of the world. There are unknown amounts of waste oil, fuel, solvents and who knows what else, buried on the property these "Friends of Chiniak" want to see become a park. Sound judgement here. There is way more to Chiniak than meets the eye.



The Cape Chiniak parcel is currently being evaluated from the perspective of how acquiring these lands could benefit the recovery and restoration of resources and services injured by the oil spill. Thanks for spending time with me on the phone today about the Trustees' and USFS' efforts to acquire additional property on the Duck Flats.

Somehow I neglected to mention the RCAC has just completed an Ecological Risk Assessment of the Port Valdez marine environment. The study, based on existing data and a "conceptual model" (in this case, a qualitative -- as opposed to quantitative -- computer model), finds that the area of the Port most at risk is the Duck Flats.

The model says the Duck Flats are more at risk than the area around the Alyeska terminal, and that some inputs and impacts (e.g., contaminated runoff, and construction and development) pose more risk to the environment than the effluent from Alyeska's Ballast Water Treatment Facility. These two findings have become controversial for those who believe that the BWTP discharge must be the most serious environmental risk here.


I have enclosed the report's Executive Summary, and marked the paragraph that refers to the Duck Flats. If you want a copy of the full report, please call.

The Risk Assessment's finding that the Duck Flats are most at risk is based both on the potential hazards to which they are exposed and on the richness and vulnerability of their habitat and biota.

I believe the Ecological Risk Assessment's emphasis on the importance of the Duck Flats further validates the Trustee Council and USFS efforts to acquire the remaining private land on the flats.

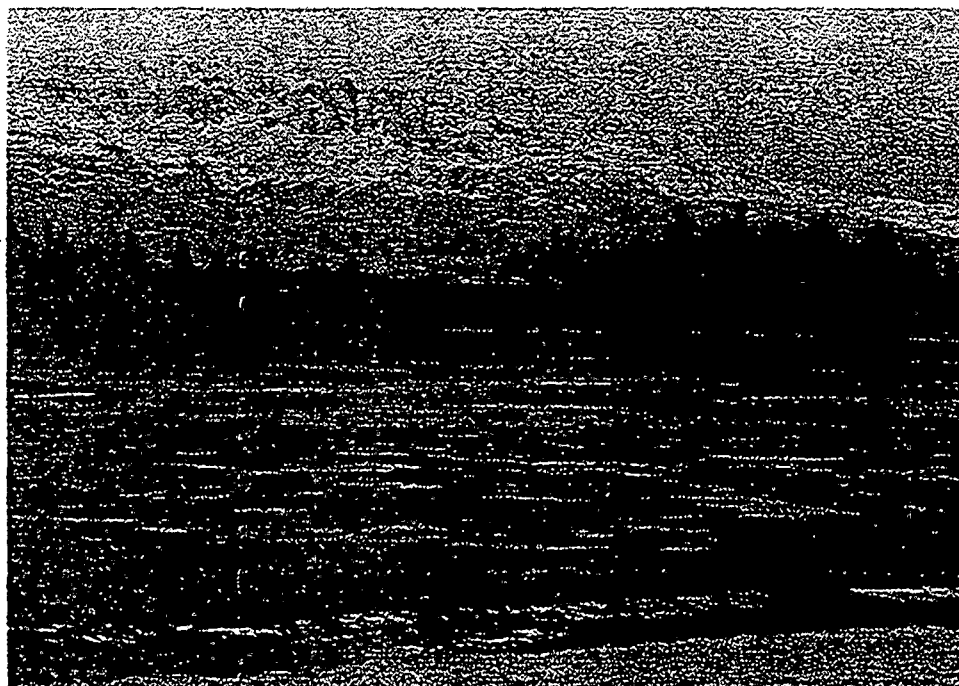
I hope those efforts are successful, and would like to express my appreciation to everyone involved.

Executive Summary

We have conducted an ecological risk assessment of the marine environment of Port Valdez, Alaska. Concerns about the environmental consequences of present and proposed activities in Port Valdez and about potential conflicts and incompatibilities among those activities have grown with development of the Port. These concerns led to an awareness that environmental management of Port Valdez is a complex task which can best be approached in a unified way. The Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council (RCAC) and the Alyeska Pipeline Service Company (APSC) have sponsored this regional ecological risk assessment to provide a factual basis for comparing the various environmental risks which must be managed in the Port.

This risk assessment was not performed in response to any specific regulatory action or policy decision. Rather it was intended to improve environmental management of Port Valdez by analyzing and ranking the various kinds of ecological risks from human activity in the Port. The resulting assessment was broad in scope and required the extension of the risk analysis paradigm to allow comparative risk assessment on a regional basis. The assessment relied on input from stakeholders through public meetings in Valdez, comments on preliminary drafts of this report, meetings with the principal stakeholders (RCAC, APSC, and state and federal regulatory agencies), and individual conversations with stakeholders, environmental scientists, and other knowledgeable individuals.

Following an introduction and description of methods, this report contains a detailed description of the Port Valdez marine environment (Sec. 3) based on data and technical information available in 1996. Section 4 describes the chosen assessment endpoints, those environmental features to which the assessment estimates risk. The report presents a conceptual model and its results in Sec. 5 and 6. The conceptual model depicts the set of relationships and procedures by which relative risk has been ranked in Port Valdez. In Sec. 7 we present information about widely accepted measures of environmental risk for some chemicals in the Port. This information serves to associate some of the relative risks ranked by the conceptual model with "acceptable" levels of environmental risk. Sections 8 and 9 present possible scenarios for potential risks to Port Valdez. The final section of the body of the report discusses the types and degree of uncertainty thought to be associated with this risk assessment. The report also includes a set of appendices which give detailed data, methods, and other background material.

In assessing ecological risk to this area, we developed a conceptual model that can help with prioritization of future studies, interpretation, or decision making in the Port environment.

This model involves the division of the Port into sub-areas that contain specific ecological and anthropogenic structures and activities. The sub-areas used in this assessment can be thought of as units which are compared and analyzed to form a Port-wide perspective of ecological risk. Within each sub-area the sources of stressors are analyzed to estimate the extent to which they result in exposure of receptors within habitats which may lead to effects relevant to the chosen assessment endpoints. To evaluate these risks we developed a numerical analysis of the conceptual model: the relative risk model. This analysis leads to a ranking of individual risks which are then summed to estimate relative risks within each sub-area, from each source, and to each habitat.

Our application of the model indicates that the highest relative environmental risk is found in the sub-area containing the Duck Flats and Old Valdez. Other shoreline areas in the eastern Port including both the City of Valdez and the Alyeska Marine Terminal are at moderate relative risk while the relatively undeveloped western shoreline and deep water environments are at low relative risk. Using the model to rank risk from various sources present in the Port indicated that contaminated runoff, accidental spills, construction and development, and shoreline activity present high relative risk. Vessel traffic and treated discharges pose moderate relative risk; and seafood processing and fish wastes, and salmon released from the hatchery present low relative risk to Port Valdez.

In order to confirm our ranking of chemical risks by more conventional analyses, chemical concentrations were compared to reference values generally considered to be low risk. This comparison could only be made in areas with sufficient chemical data. In sediments collected from 1992 to 1995 near the Valdez Marine Terminal, polyaromatic hydrocarbon (PAH) concentrations exceeded these values in 4 of 819 measurements. For samples collected in 1995 at the Small Boat Harbor, PAH concentrations exceeded the reference values on 11 of 36 measurements. Benzo[a]pyrene concentrations in mussels collected from 1992 to 1995 at Shoup Bay, Gold Creek, Sawmill Creek, and the Alyeska marine terminal were all below the reference value. A model used to estimate the risk of PAHs to marine invertebrates indicated low risk, with the boat harbor having the highest estimate. Biomonitoring tests using sediment organisms also have failed to detect effects due to chemical contamination. These studies confirm our predictions based on the ranking techniques.

Some possible risks to Port Valdez could not be adequately treated using the conceptual model. These risks include rare but potentially catastrophic events such as large oil spills and introduction of non-native species. Risks in Port Valdez about which data are totally absent, such as the risk posed by organo-tins from anti-fouling paints, cannot be addressed until data become available. Such risks are discussed in general terms emphasizing the key information needed for adequate risk assessment.

Substantial uncertainty is associated with this ecological risk assessment. The sources of this uncertainty include missing information, ambiguities in the available information, errors in the conceptual model, and errors in the estimate of relative risk. Uncertainty is lower at well studied locations like Alyeska's Valdez Marine Terminal and higher at less studied areas.

This risk assessment should serve as a working document such that any further data collected can be applied according to the conceptual model and ranked by the relative risk model. To encourage use of this model for the evaluation of comparative risks in the future, we have enclosed a diskette with this report that contains the model in Microsoft Excel® format.

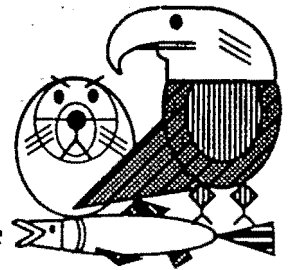

Thank you for your April 15 letter regarding the U.S. Forest Service's Russian River Angler Trail Project. You may not be aware that the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council is only providing a portion of the funds the Forest Service anticipates using for this project. Our authority is only over that portion of the project using Trustee money. Other portions of the project are being funded by the Forest Service using other sources of funds. If you have questions regarding those aspects of the project, you should direct them to Mr. Duane Harp, the Forest Service District Ranger in Seward. He can be reached at (907) 224-3374.

The Trustee Council proposed to fund three phases of the Russian River Angler Trail construction. Phase I which is scheduled to be completed this summer, includes the installation of 265 feet of elevated, light penetrating boardwalk, access stairs and a bank fishing platform. This is intended to assist in natural restoration of the trampled banks and promote bank stabilization. Phase I has been reviewed by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the Alaska Department of Natural Resources as part of the Trustee Council-funded Kenai River Habitat Restoration and Recreation Enhancement Project. Comments on the Russian River Angler Trail Project

These comments are presented in two parts, a brief summary and a detailed explanation.

We object to the U.S. Forest Service Russian River Angler Trail Project and think its installation would cause irreversible deterioration to the whole Russian River ecosystem. The proposal is for 3935 feet of boardwalk, upgraded "tread" (changing the natural trail to a uniform, four-foot wide hardened road), an electric tramway from Grayling Parking to the river, a toilet on the river floodplain, and other obtrusive features.

The justification for the project is overstated (see the accompanying detail of concerns).

The following is a brief summary of dangers:

- a. The obtrusive nature and size of this installation would destroy the wilderness quality of the river. It violates the Forest Services's own scenic objectives for the river.
- b. The boardwalk would block game trails, drive animals away, and likely cause injuries to and drowning of moose calves.
- c. Limited entry points and concentration of fishermen would jeopardize salmon and trout spawning.
- d. Construction of a hardened road/"trail" from Red Salmon campground to the boardwalk/"trail" on the river would provide entry and an easy trail for snow machines and all-terrain vehicles.
- e. Increased ease of access and travel would cause a tremendous increase in the fishing population and would funnel large numbers of fishermen upstream to undisturbed areas.
- f. The installation would cost \$50,000 a year to maintain. This money is not funded or promised. The current state of funding at federal, state, and local levels is very tight and will probably get tighter, leading to the possibility of a huge, unmaintained eyesore.
- g. The proposed toilet would have been underwater and a source of bacterial contamination had it been there during the 1995 flood.
- h. USFS says on page 1 of the Environmental Assessment that one of the reasons for the damage they perceive was the building of the road and river bluff parking in 1969. They propose to correct it with more of the same. More of the same remedy leads to more of the same result.

RUSSIAN RIVER ANGLER TRAIL PROJECT**

The Russian River Angler Trail Project, initiated by the Seward District of the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and approved by the District Ranger on 5 September 1996, proposes major construction for more than a mile along the Russian River. It includes:

- an electric tram from the top of the bluff to the river
- a toilet on the river which will need emptying daily
- more than 3900 feet of five-foot-wide, railed boardwalk along the river
- widened, hardened "trails" along the river
- fencing of the river bank except at a limited number of river entry points

Taking these features one at a time:

a. Electric Tram: The inclusion of the electric tram is justified by the Americans With Disabilities Act, and will be used to haul toilet waste up the bluff and construction project materials down the bluff. However, the Americans With Disabilities Act specifically does not require a "Cadillac" solution (as the courts expressed it) for access for disabled. Disabled people have access currently via the ferry approximately half a mile downriver, and the project proposes another handicapped accessible trail about half a mile above the proposed tram, so handicapped access is well provided for without the tram.

b. Toilet on River: The toilet is justified by concern for levels of coliform bacteria in the river, but the USFS themselves state (USFS Environmental Assessment and 30 October 1996 letter) that the fecal coliform levels are admittedly low, and "are well within acceptable values for State Water Quality Standards for secondary water recreation and should not be considered a health risk." The toilet is intended to serve people who fish near the Kenai/Russian confluence, but the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service already have pit toilets in the confluence area, and there are also toilets at the top of the bluff along the river. USFS says that they have found human waste in the woods in the area where they plan to install the toilet, but in light of the lack of coliform bacteria problems, some human waste is greatly preferable to construction of a river-flood-plain toilet and a tram to serve it. Toilets on the river flood plain would have been under water in the 1995 fall flood.

c. Railed boardwalk: The precise construction type for the boardwalk is something of a moving target, but the latest information we've elicited from USFS is that it will be five feet wide, will have a 32-inch railing on the river side, and will probably be floored with some sort of transparent grid material. The boardwalk will block several game trails along the river, may funnel moose and bears along the boardwalks in competition with humans, and will be very difficult for moose and moose calves to cross. We have been told that first-year moose calf mortality is 30 percent in normal conditions. Considerable danger exists that moose calves,

especially, may break necks or legs in attempting a boardwalk crossing. They may become sufficiently exhausted in trying to get across the boardwalks that when they give up and try to recross the river, they may be too tired to make it, especially early in the season when the river is higher and rougher. Furthermore, grids are used all over the west to pen cattle. Animals may not even attempt boardwalk crossings. They may simply leave the area.

d. Hardened "trails". These trails were first described to us by USFS as being surfaced with gravel, somewhat like the new trail to the Russian River Falls area. The new Falls "trail" is a six- or eight-foot wide road capable of accommodating motorized vehicles, which were used to haul construction material in its building. USFS now says they are not sure what surfacing material they will use for the riverside trails, but it seems clear that they will be using motorized vehicles in building them, which will mean they will be wide enough to accommodate all-terrain vehicles and snow machines. The handicapped trail they propose from the Red Salmon Campground down to the river trail will provide access from the top of the bluff for such vehicles. This trail/boardwalk combination is particularly worrying. Wherever motorized access exists, people will use it. Making the Russian valley accessible to snow machines and ATVs inevitably will lead to their use on the river, with attendant noise and pollution, and will be a further factor in driving away the wildlife. Roads, and "trails" that can serve as roads, are one of the most damaging additions to a wilderness area.

e. Fences and limited entry points: No one has studied the effects of funneling a large number of people into the river. Will human traffic on spawning gravels destroy the salmon and rainbow eggs? Or harm the fry and smolt? Certainly funneling fishermen and wildlife alike through a limited number of entry points into the river (or a limited number of escape routes from the river for fishermen when a bear appears on the far bank) will increase human/wildlife encounters, with immediate risk to the humans, and the inevitable longer term destruction of the moose and bears. The number of bears killed in defense of life and property is already growing alarmingly, and this can only worsen it.

Besides these specific concerns about individual features of the project, there are significant general concerns about the project and its justification. They include:

a. Impact on a wilderness area: The Forest Services' own Scenic Condition Objective for the Russian River area is "...Retention', meaning that changes in the characteristic landscape should not be noticed by the average visitor." (See April 1996 USFS Environmental Assessment, p. 43) The huge metal and wood stairways down the bluff which a few years ago replaced the log and dirt paths already violate this objective. The addition of a tram, toilet, boardwalks, trails, and fences will add to, and extend, intrusive construction along a large portion of the river's length.

b. Increase in human traffic: The kind of thoroughfares the USFS intends along the river will inevitably funnel more human traffic onto the river, because of increased ease of traversing the river. It will also likely spread the kind of congestion evident near the mouth on up the stream, intensifying and spreading the damage human traffic brings.

c. The "more of the same" syndrome. The Forest Service recognizes on page one of their environmental assessment that their building a road into and campgrounds along the Russian Bluff (along with the building of the Sterling Highway) has greatly increased human traffic to the Russian. (Our observation, from having frequented the Russian since 1962, is that the bluff road, parking lots, and campgrounds have had a much heavier impact than the existence of the Sterling Highway.) They propose to fix the problems they perceive traffic has caused by doing more construction and making access even easier. More of the same remedy usually leads to more of the same result, and is not an advisable way to solve a problem.

d. Overstatement/overkill danger: The environmental assessment overstates problems and proposes overkill solutions. The coliform bacteria "problem/toilet solution" is one. The erosion danger to the Russian banks from fishermen is another. Natural occurrences, like the 1995 fall flood, cause more change and erosion (a natural process) than decades of fishermen. Furthermore, unlike the Kenai, which has soft banks for most of its length, the Russian has bouldered banks and a boulder/gravel bottom for most of its length. The Forest Service itself says on page 36 of the environmental assessment that "The river bank is made up primarily of large rocks and boulders dropped by the receding glaciers. This material, combined with extensive vegetation root systems along the banks, and the current moderate flow levels on the Russian River make for a remarkably stable natural bank." Although in some areas Forest-Service-installed gabions have increased current flow and created problems, soft banks are a significant problem only on the lower part of the river, and fisherman damage only exists at very popular fishing spots. Yet the boardwalks and "hardened trails" will extend 6300 feet up the river. The tram and toilet are not related to the issue of human-caused erosion at all, so it is unclear why they should even be included in an erosion-reduction project.

e. Impetus for Project: This appears to be a project initiated wholly within the Forest Service, with no outside impetus. Insofar as we have been able to determine, no one has requested the project, and the District Ranger, Duane Harp, described present reactions by U.S. Fish and Wildlife that could only be characterized as lukewarm indifference. In fact, in appealing a previous project along the river, the appellant quoted a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service letter of 22 May 1990 as saying "The problem of stream bank erosion is over stated and misleading to the public." The letter also said "Sanitary facilities should not be attempted if a service road is necessary," and "Localized foot wear should be treated by manipulating vegetation and controlling access rather than by constructing facilities."

f. Environmental Impact Statement: In light of the impact this project is likely to have on the character of the river, the amount of human traffic, fish spawning, game trails, and the long-term animal population, it appears that an environmental impact statement should have been done. Furthermore, the environmental assessment which was done is based more on supposition ("may have", "could") than on hard data, and inadequately supports the decision to proceed.

g. Speed of Process: The environmental assessment is dated April 1966, and the decision was made around the beginning of September. The comment period was closed before many people, including us, even knew of the proposal.

h. Progressive increase in boardwalk length: The environmental assessment on which the public had an opportunity to comment proposed 2560 feet of boardwalk, which included 525 feet of existing boardwalk. The decision notice announced that 3035 feet of *new* boardwalk would be built, an increase of 1000 feet. Current maps and documentation show that 3935 feet of boardwalk are now included in the project, an increase of more than 50 % from the alternative the public believed would be implemented. The Forest Service Project Manager states that part of the increase was driven by a request from Alaska Fish and Game that the proposed Forest Service trail be moved so that it would be 25 feet from the river bank. USFS elected to build more boardwalk rather than to move the trail as Fish and Game requested. The public had no opportunity to comment on the increase.

i. Maintenance: The project will cost \$50,000 to maintain. With the current funding crunch at federal, state, and local levels, it is extremely unlikely that the Forest Service will be able to obtain that money, which will result in a huge deteriorating eyesore along the Russian.

j. Cost: The project is expensive. The environmental assessment priced the original alternative 12 at \$848,177 (the most expensive alternative was \$866,081 and the least expensive was \$1000). Addition of another 1400 feet of boardwalk has increased the cost to \$996,000, making the adopted alternative the most expensive of the twelve proposed. The result, where not actually harmful, will not justify such an expense. Furthermore, CIRC, a private corporation, has filed a claim to the Russian River area. Undertaking a large tax-payer-funded project for land which may soon be turned over to a private corporation is unwise. Furthermore, it is unclear whether CIRC would want to commit to, or be able to fund, the annual operating cost mentioned above.

USFS has told us the first increment of financing for the project (\$85,000 in 1997) has been obtained from the Exxon Valdez Trustee Council, and will be used to install boardwalk, fencing and access points on the lower Russian. We would like, at a minimum, to see any further funding cut off and the project reopened to comment. Ideally, we would like to see the tramway, toilet, and widened, hardened trails deleted, the boardwalk substantially shortened, and erosion-control work limited to those areas where it is clearly needed. All repair should be done in such a way as to minimize river and ecosystem damage.

If the project proceeds as planned, the appearance of the Russian and the nature of the experience people have on the Russian will be very different in the future. A Fish and Game employee told us that their surveys indicate that 80% of the people who frequent the Russian want to share the river with bears. While we have no data, we surmise that a similar number would like to continue to see moose along the river. If this project is allowed to proceed, that will cease to be possible.

Joe Bridgeman called as a concerned interested member of the public to check on the status of the Valdez Duck Flats small parcel acquisition process. Eric Myers (after consulting with Dave Gibbons/USFS) informed Mr. Bridgeman that the USFS was still working on the acquisition and was hoping to be able to make an offer to the University of Alaska in the near future.

Dear Molly,

I am writing this letter as a Cordova resident who is concerned about the pace, price, and potential outcome of the pending EVOS Trustee Council negotiations with Eyak Corporation over lands in eastern Prince William Sound. I think it is important to state the obvious: that perspectives differ and while the Trustee Council is negotiating on behalf of habitat protection and restoration, Eyak Corporation is weighing benefits and consequences that will surely accrue, whether now or in the future, from loss of its land base.

Eyak Corporation has asked my support for successful conclusion of the ongoing negotiations between the Trustee Council and the corporation over the comprehensive habitat protection package involving its lands in eastern Prince William Sound.

For the past two years I have been involved with a citizen initiative to diversify the local and regional economy of the Copper River watershed while protecting the cultural heritage and the environment. I must make it clear that this letter is my own, however my past work has influenced my present philosophy of land management and ownership. I find that what is missing in many of Alaska's citizens is a land ethic, a sense of caring and stewardship, a balance of economic and environmental concerns, instead of raw environmental exploitation. I can only conclude at this point that this missing ethic in part stems from the dominant land ownership by the federal government. Therefore, I support retention of land by private owners, particularly for Alaska's Native people whose culture is so intimately tied to the land.

I reviewed the discussion draft map and observed that the bulk of the negotiation (55,000 acres) is for fee simple title, while the remainder is for conservation easements (6,400 acres) and timber conservation easements (17,500 acres).

I strongly encourage the Trustee Council to get creative and purchase for less than fee title, especially in areas of cultural importance to the Eyak people. It is my understanding that the area around Power Creek, Eyak Lake, and Eyak River is of particular cultural sensitivity. It is an area meriting special attention, because the City of Cordova has also annexed the bulk of these lands. I believe it is in the best interests of everyone, present and future, if these lands were to be included as super restrictive conservation easements, rather than as fee title.

There is an opportunity, through these negotiations, to create a sustainable future for this region by integrating comprehensive conservation for critical fish and wildlife habitat, and protections for subsistence and recreational resources, with development opportunities for Eyak Corporation and long-term benefits for its shareholders. I believe this opportunity would be best seized through more conservation easements and less fee title purchases.

Nonetheless, I encourage the Trustee Council to complete its negotiations with Eyak Corporation over these land parcels. Whatever the result, the future of the region will be determined by your decisions. *Carpe diem!* Seize the day.

Dear Molly:

As you know, the grounding of the Exxon Valdez had a devastating effect on the City of Cordova and its residents. Fishing -- commercial, sport and subsistence -- long the mainstay of the City's economy, and the defining aspect of living in Cordova, has yet to fully recover from the spill. Because of the enormous dislocations resulting from the oil spill, even if the fisheries were to fully recover, it is certain that Cordova will be a community permanently affected by the grounding of the Exxon Valdez. The resources on which the community has been so dependent have also not recovered.

Of all the boaters who fished Prince William Sound, approximately 65% have lived in or berthed their boats in Cordova. The biggest fish processing plants in Cordova, also the biggest employers, the largest taxpayers and the largest utility customers, were forced to close during the spill. Most went bankrupt and remain idle to this day.

The oil spill, and that portion of the clean-up effort staged from Cordova, placed an almost unbearable strain on the financial and human resources of this fishing community. The community continues to struggle toward recovery. The stress created in the lives of the people and their families was enormous. At times in the past, the acuteness of this suffering was communicated to the Council in the outrage that was sometimes expressed by certain members of the community. Other than the village of Chenega, Cordova was unquestionably the community most severely impacted from the economic and social devastation wrought by the spill.

The community would like to pick up the pieces of their lives and put them back together. To accomplish this in a way that will provide a lasting benefit to the community, the region as well as the spill zone, however, will necessitate some outside assistance, a portion of which could hopefully come from the Settlement Trust and related resources. In helping to represent the City, I would like to let you know that the City will submit to the Council within the next 90 days a request for its support of a comprehensive, community-based project linked to and aimed at furthering restoration goals of the Council while contributing to the recovery of the City, its residents and the resources on which the people are dependent. This project will include a significant contribution from the community itself, and is of paramount importance to the future of Cordova.

Although it is our understanding that this project request does not need to be submitted by April 15, 1997, to be considered for possible support during the coming fiscal year, the City Commission has requested that I inform the Trustee Council at this time that work is underway currently on the development of the project.

We look forward to working with you, other Council representatives, and the Council itself in the days ahead on this project which holds such promise to further restoration under the Consent Decree of the Court, while assisting the recovery of this community in the oil spill zone which was so profoundly and adversely affected by the spill.

Notice

You are hereby put on notice that the Thlinadi and the Kuyedi (the Kuiu Kwaan), and certain other Indigenous Nations of Alaska have chosen to exercise their Suzerain Sovereign Trust Responsibilities to protect the Traditional Indigenous Peoples of the Region of Chenega in their just and legitimate rights under Traditional Tribal Law. This Protest and Request for Stay of Land Sale is filed to stop and reverse all action regarding the above named sale of lands, waters and resources which are owned by the Indigenous Chenega Peoples, the Original Indigenous Holders of Allodial Title. The interests and welfare of the Chenega descendants unto the next seven generations and beyond must be protected.
Cause of Protest

The Indigenous Nations Allodial Title predates the Declaration of Independence of the United States from Great Britain, and predates the establishment of any encampments in the Region of Alaska by any European nations or Russia.
The title referred to by the Kuyedi and the Thlinadi is not "aboriginal title," as referred to as being extinguished by AMCSA. To be precise, the title held by the lineal descendants of the Indigenous Peoples of Alaska is "Allodial Title" or Absolute Title," to the soil, the same kind of title generally assumed by the European descendants to be held by the United States.
The basis of these statements lies in the fact that the Indigenous Peoples of Alaska have had dominion and possession of their lands and waters from time immemorial. The assumption that the United States has any valid title in Alaska, and had the legal right to cut a deal with certain members of Alaskas Indigenous People, utilizing AMCSA is erroneous. The Kuyedi Tribal Council and other Indigenous Nations issued a challenge for the United States and/or the state of Alaska to produce a valid title to Alaska lands, waters and resources. None has been produced because none exists.
No persons, corporate entities, nor any state can sell or broker what it does not own or have clear undisputed title to. This includes the United States of America, Imperial Russia and the various AMCSA corporations who are not Traditional Tribal Governments.
Legal investigations into federal archives in Washington DC, concerning the rights of the Kuyedi and other Southeast Alaska Tribes, led to the discovery of what has become known as The Smoking Gun. Documents found prove that the United States never perfected absolute title. Allodial Title to Kuiu Island and the Thlinadi Traditional lands and waters is still held by the Traditional Tribal Peoples of that region. This discovery has direct applications for all the Indigenous Peoples, Tribes and Nations of the Region of Alaska.
The Chenega Corporation does not have the jurisdiction to make binding legal decisions regarding the Traditional lands, waters and resources of the Traditional Indigenous Peoples of the Chenega region. The Chenega Corporation is attempting to intrude into areas of Sovereign Jurisdiction of Indigenous Nations - areas that are clearly beyond its limited powers as a corporation which owes its existence to the United States. The Chenega Corporation cannot legally broker nor sell any Indigenous lands, waters or resources.

An International Tribunal of Original Nations convened in Seattle, Washington on January 8-10, 1997; which Tribunal thoroughly examined the question of Who Owns Alaska? The published decision is that the US does not have title to Alaska. In addition to these findings, there is a body of proclamations, documents and statutes designed to govern non-Native and federal agency conduct with regards to Indigenous Peoples, Tribes and Nations.

US Guarantees to Indigenous Peoples

Statutes Applicable to the taking or selling of Indigenous Lands

The following statutes were designed to govern non-Native and federal agency conduct with regards to Indigenous Peoples, Tribes, and Nations:

1. Northwest Ordinance of 1787, Enacted Aug. 7th, 1789 (1 Stat. 50), Article 3: (I quote)... "The utmost good faith shall always be observed towards the Indians, their lands and property shall never be taken without their consent: and, in their property, Rights and Liberty, they shall never be invaded or disturbed...."
2. Address to Indian Leaders by George Washington, first US President (shortly following the passage of the NW Ordinance) outlining the obligation of the United States to protect Tribes from alienation of Tribal lands. President Washington speaking for and about the USA: "....will never consent to your being defrauded, but will protect you in all your just rights... But your great object seems to be, the security of your remaining lands: And I have, therefore upon this point, meant to be sufficiently strong and clear, that, in future, you cannot be defrauded of your lands: That you possess the right to sell, and the right of refusing to sell, your lands: That, therefore the sale of your lands, in the future will depend entirely upon yourselves. But that, when you may find it for your interest to sell any part of your lands, the United States must be present, by their agent, and will be your security that you shall not be defrauded in the bargain you may make..."
3. The US Constitution, A. Commerce Clause Sec. 8--Powers of Congress, Item 3.
4. Senate Congressional Resolution 76, Sept. 16th, 1987, 100th Congress
5. Genocide Act Codified under Public Law 100-606, Nov. 4th, 1988
6. The Indian Trade and Intercourse Act R.S. 2116 was from ACT June 30th, 1834 (25 US C.ss177.) 177. Purchase or grants of lands from Indians. "No purchase, grant, lease, or other conveyance of lands, or of any title or claim thereto, from any Indian nation or tribe of Indians, shall be of validity in law or equity, unless the same be made by treaty or convention entered into pursuant to the Constitution.

Genocide and Human Rights Violations

The governments of the United States and the state of Alaska have inflicted serious injury upon Indigenous Peoples of Alaska and North America, and continue to do so. Federal and Alaska state officials have embarked upon a course of action designed to eliminate Traditional Indigenous subsistence uses. Alaska state officials have stated in the press and media that they intend to pursue this course with vigor. Referenced injuries include but are not limited to:

Continuous erosion and destruction of Indigenous Peoples land, water and resource base;

Denial and obstruction of the Indigenous time-honored way of making a living in the "Traditional and Customary Way;" therefore forcing the Indigenous Peoples to seek employment in alien trades, in different geographical areas and environments;

Denial of access to Indigenous Traditional and Customary Foods and medicines;

Denial and hindrance of access to Indigenous Sacred Sites and Sacred Environmental Sanctuaries; Defacement and physical alteration of said sites; Forced assimilation through dispersal of Indigenous Peoples and the removal of their children from their traditional lands, waters, and resources; therefore compelling the Indigenous Peoples and Nations to forsake their Cultural Heritages and Native Languages and forcing them to adopt an alien language and culture and religion;

Indigenous Peoples are arrested, jailed and prosecuted for harvesting traditional foods;

Imposition of conditions of life that will result in the destruction of the Indigenous Peoples of Alaska in whole or in part;

Elimination of Tribes and Peoples through the US federal recognition process.

In attempts at solving the Indian problem, the US Government ignored traditional Indigenous Governments and Tribal Courts and engineered "federally recognized Indian entities" that are overseen by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The "federally recognized Indian entities" (or the US version of a "recognized tribe") are social engineering at its worst, puppet organizations created to do the bidding of the US government.

The creation of "federally recognized entities," wrote off Indigenous nations as extinct, and lumped other nations together who historically had been separate. This is constructive fraud as well as an ancient ploy of "divide and conquer." (Ref: The constructive fraud was exposed via federal Judge Zillys 1996 decision in the Samish Nation Case. Judge Zilly issued a scathing indictment of the bureaucrat who falsified records and stood in the way of the Samish efforts to gain recognition.)

By utilizing their "federally recognized Indian entities," the US claims to the world community that the US has abandoned it's genocidal actions of the past and is now dealing honorably with the present day Indigenous Peoples and Nations. The puppet organizations that receive funding and do the bidding of the BIA are caught by their programs and in most cases have nothing to do with Traditional Tribal Governments.

Traditional Tribal Governments, like the KUIU THLING-GIT NATION, who truly represent their Peoples, would require a face to face meeting on a "Nation to Nation" basis to discuss and settle differences. We know our lineage, we know our history. We know who we are and where we come from. We don't need non-Natives to socially engineer us.

Proper Course of Action

1. Pay the \$34 million to the Indigenous Peoples of Chenega for the oil spill which destroyed much of their water resources and adversely affected their lands and lives.

2. Leave the 60,000 acres under their control so that their People can live like they always have. The funds should be paid to them as partial compensation and restitution for environmental degradation due to the Exxon Valdez oil spill. (It appears that the US is attempting to pay the Chenega Corporation with restoration monies that should have gone to the Traditional Peoples of Chenega in the first place without the sale of their lands, which are their heritage and birthright. What will the seventh generation of Peoples Indigenous to the region have left when their lands and the monies are both gone?)

The Peoples Indigenous to lands in question should have been allowed to explore all available options and opportunities for their lands, in an unbiased and unprejudiced manner. They should have been informed that under the SARA Amendments to the Clean Water Act, the Indigenous Peoples are in line to receive restoration monies. They do not have to sell their lands, waters and resources to receive a just compensation.

The \$34 million dollars is not adequate compensation for the losses suffered. It most assuredly is not just compensation for the lands, waters and resources in question. Indigenous land should never be sold. However, to establish fair market value, several independent appraisers of land, water, and resources would have to be employed to establish a true certified value of the lands and properties in question. After all the pertinent data has been gathered and established the Indigenous Chenega Peoples would set a base price. A call would then be made for sealed bids from interested parties, which would include representatives from the International Community. The Indigenous Peoples of Chenega would then be in a position to receive many times the paltry \$34,000,000.00 that is being proffered by the US.

Special Notice

Because of the extensive damages to the eco-systems and natural habitat in the Region of Alaska, the Traditional Indigenous Leaders are laying plans to form an "Investigative Committee" under the terms as outlined in: CERCLA COMPREHENSIVE ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE COMPENSATION AND LIABILITY ACT OF 1980 43 CFR Part 11 vol 51--148, Natural Resource Damage Assessments: Final Rule, SARA AMENDMENTS Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act, October 17, 1988, vol. 53 No. 34, Commonly known as: THE CLEAN WATER ACT WITH THE SARA AMENDMENTS. The committee will look specifically at the damages caused by the Exxon Valdez oil spill, set a damage amount, which then will qualify for "Rebuttable Presumption."

Conclusion

1. A title search shows that the US never perfected title to Kuiu Island and Thlinadi Lands and Waters in Southeast Alaska and most likely the rest of the region of Alaska.

2. Title remains vested in the Traditional Indigenous Peoples of the Region of Alaska.

3. ANCSA which purported to extinguish aboriginal claims was not a settlement with the Traditional Tribes. It was a deal cut to get at the oil resources of Alaska. The title the Indigenous Peoples have is allodial title, title in fee simple absolute.

Jerry Mander put it well in his book, In the Absence of the Sacred. But just like the Allotment Act, the Indian Reorganization Act, and the Indian Claims Commission Act, ANCSA was a fraud in concept and in execution. It was created by a congress that was essentially acting as a surrogate for US oil, mineral, and fishing companies. In terms of effective, efficient robbery and scale of deception, ANCSA makes the Allotment Act look like a dime-store burglary.

4. The past 500 years have been fraught with intrusions by European immigrants which resulted in continual diminishment of the Indigenous land and water base. The result has been, in far too many cases, the suffering and annihilation of Indigenous Peoples -- many having been completely destroyed and removed from the land of the living... The taking of Traditional Indigenous Lands and Waters, by whatever means, equates annihilation and genocide. Stolen land is stolen land and cannot be sold. Flawed title never improves with the passage of time.

5. The so-called purchase of nearly 60,000 acres of land from the Native Peoples of Chenega in the region of Alaska by the US Government is but another example of the process of genocide being perpetrated on the Indigenous Peoples of Alaska. It is a taking which exemplifies the slick and underhanded dealings of the US

5 and its agencies with the Indigenous Peoples and Nations. Without an adequate land and water base the Indigenous Peoples and Tribes cannot survive and be able to practice and utilize their Traditional Spiritual, Cultural and Tribal Heritage.

We urge the Traditional Tribal Peoples of the Chenega Region to call this land transaction for what it is: a land scam. This attempted robbing denies a Traditional Peoples their right to continue as a People, and exercise their Traditional and Cultural Heritage. WITHOUT A SUFFICIENT AND PROPER LAND, WATER AND RESOURCE BASE NO INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OR TRADITIONAL TRIBES CAN SURVIVE.

As a champion and staunch friend of the environment, we are surprised by the participation of Bruce Babbitt, of the Department of Interior in this land deal. The cost required of the Indigenous Peoples is unreasonable and much too high. It cannot be denied that statutes are in place to govern non-Native actions. The law abiding decent Peoples of the World Community are tired of double standards. They are well aware of how we Traditional Indigenous Peoples and Nations have been and are being treated by the USA Federal and state agencies. Let us clear the decks and start anew with a higher standard of conduct.

Dear Commissioners:

On March 17, the board of the Alaska Fly Fishers, and members of the boards of the Alaska Sportfishing Association and Trout Unlimited, met with Mr. Mike Thompson, of the Alaska Department of Fish & Game, Habitat Division, Mr. Ed Fogel of the Alaska Department of Natural Resources, Division of Lands, and Ms. Laura Bottger of the Alaska Department of Law, Natural Resources Section, to discuss issues arising from the private ownership of most of the lands along the South Fork of the Anchor River, Ninilchik River and Deep Creek on the southern Kenai Peninsula.

Except for the fishing on the lowest reaches of those streams -- which is primarily for salmon and occurs substantially within three small state recreation areas at the mouths of each river -- the fisheries for steelhead, dolly varden, rainbow trout, and some of the salmon fishing, are upstream of those state recreation areas. There, private ownership creates a variety of concerns -- for conservation of fish and wildlife, for public access and for the quality of the fisheries.

We are now asking you to designate staff to participate in further discussions to see if an inter-agency process and program can be devised to address those concerns.

To give an idea of what transpired at the March 17th meeting, the participants discussed the land ownership patterns, navigability law, and options for addressing the above concerns.

Although the land patterns differ along the streams, generally there is almost no public land upstream of the three small recreation areas. Upstream of those areas, the land is generally in small, contiguous, private tracts. In most instances, the owners built on the bluffs and own the bottom lands. The number of tracts is not overwhelming. But some subdividing is occurring, including some bottom land development. And some assertions of trespass apparently have occurred. Most deeds probably rest upon pre-statehood federal patents. On the South Fork Anchor River, small private parcels comprise nearly all land from the vicinity of the confluence of the North and South Forks at about MP 157 on the Sterling Highway upstream to about MP 164. Upstream of there is the Anchor River/Fritz Creek CHA. Ninilchik and Deep Creek are

bounded similarly by small private parcels where those streams parallel Oil Well Road. Upstream, the land is substantially owned by Native village and regional corporations. The local tax assessment maps of the Anchor indicate some surveys go to the middle of the river. That may indicate patents which utilized the pre-Gulkana navigability test, and the deeds may be partially voidable if the Gulkana test were applied. Similar issues may exist on the ANCSA patents if they, too, rest upon pre-Gulkana navigability determinations, but we did not look into that matter.

However, we are not writing to encourage litigation or any adversarial approach.

We encourage quiet, low-key, friendly approaches other than litigation. Although litigation to apply the Gulkana test and thereby to amend many deeds could be worthwhile in some context, such litigation likely would have disadvantages at this point. It would aggravate owners of the deeds and would likely precipitate posting of land, thereby restricting access which currently exists with the generous or tacit consent of nearly every long-term owner. Litigation would be expensive and would be of limited utility. The nature of these fisheries is that the participants utilize trails and engage in a mobile, "hike, walk and wade" fishery, rather than a stationary fishery. The activities are not confined to submerged lands between the ordinary high water marks. Furthermore, such litigation would address neither the habitat issues that arise out of concerns for the riparian corridors or the issues that arise out of a need to maintain the character and quality of these fisheries.

We hope that your agency will participate in further discussions to address other options. We came up with four.

First, we suggest that ADF&G and DNR develop a program to allow and encourage donors of conservation and access easements or fee simple to obtain tax benefits through reductions in appraised values, through the deductibility of charitable contributions from income taxes, through the estate tax system, and through similar devices. We assume DOL might help in designing such a program. *boundary issue*

Second, we suggest that the agencies consider whether Exxon Valdez monies under the Trustee Council could address some of the habitat and access issues. We encourage agency staff to consider these lands in terms of restoration/replacement for injuries to resources and active and passive uses. For reasons we can discuss, we suspect these lands merit a high priority, if a goal were to achieve conservation corridors to benefit a variety of resources and active and passive uses. We could support funding by the Council of ADF&G-supported proposals to assess cumulative impacts of timber harvest, timber roads and subdivisions on resources and use values in the Ninilchik and Deep Creek drainages, if such studies can underpin agency actions on timber or decisions by the Council to seek restoration/replacement corridors in the drainages.

Third, we suggest that DNR use the Kenai Area Plan planning process to identify a pool of "trading stock", composed of state land or timber rights where habitat and public use values are low, and that such trading stock be offerable to owners of riparian and adjacent corridor land in exchange for conservation and access.


Fourth, we suggest that the Administration prepare legislation to add a surcharge to sport fish licenses to fund acquisition of access and conservation on riparian and corridor lands and that such a fund be a separate account within the Fish and Game Fund.


That summarizes our discussions of March 17.







Thankyou for your April 1 letter to me regarding my request, for over four years, that the Trustee Council commission a truly independent, credible, and comprehensive assessment of EVOS science. Your announcement that the enormous government EVOS science program has already been independently, comprehensively, and credibly reviewed is great news. I, and many others, were unaware of this. I have been waiting for the answers to many questions concerning the program, and I am elated that your independent, comprehensive, and credible review can now provide them.

In light of your assertion that "no other research program in the country has this much independent scrutiny" and that you have "independent reviewers who are familiar with the entire program", I would appreciate receiving their and your detailed answers to the following questions:

1. Precisely how have your research results been used to aid the recovery of the injured ecosystem? Please provide me with your review's itemized list of exactly what restorative management decisions have been made based on your research, by which agency, and at what date. Please attach copies of each and every such decision.
2. What is the total amount of public funds that have been expended to date on government EVOS research? Please provide me with your review's itemized accounting of all such expenditures, including all equipment that has been purchased using EVOS funds, what its ultimate disposition has been, and how the present use of that equipment is benefiting the recovery of the injured ecosystem.
3. Precisely what amount of public funds were taken out of the settlement as reimbursements to the State and Federal governments for damage assessment and restoration planning, response and cleanup costs, and litigation costs? Please provide me with an itemized accounting of all such expenditures, and your review's assessment of the efficacy and legitimacy of these expenditures in fulfillment of the U.S. District Court ordered Consent Decree.
4. To what extent have settlement funds within your control gone to fund activities that were either ongoing or were contemplated to be funded before the spill occurred? That is, exactly how much money did you spend on efforts that would reasonably be considered to be normal agency responsibilities? Please provide me with your review's detailed accounting of this issue.
5. What is your review's conclusion regarding the allocation of funds between various components of injured ecosystem research? Please provide me with your complete assesment of the issue of balance and inclusion in your research program - i.e., what significant questions were not addressed, what insignificant ones were?

What has your comprehensive, independent review concluded concerning issues such as agency bias, conflict of interest, duplication of effort, openness and competitiveness of the RFP process, and general fairness in the conduct of your research program since March, 1989? Please provide me with the detailed results of your assessment regarding this issue.
7. Precisely how much money have you provided out of the settlement in overhead to your own agencies? Please provide me with an accurate accounting of all overhead allocations you have made in the purported interest of restoration.
7. Considering the level of funding allocated and the overhead rates charged, were the results of each individual project you sponsored commensurate with the funding provided? Please provide me with your review's detailed assessment of this issue.
8. Precisely how has the Department of Justice, the Alaska Department of Law, and Exxon influenced your science program? Was it in the public interest to keep early NRDA results confidential? Had the NRDA case gone to trial, would your scientific results have been provable and defensible? Please provide me with your detailed assessment of this issue.
9. Did your government science program provide sufficient scope and rigor to support the 30,000 or so privant plaintiffs, as you had agreed in your out-of-court settlement with them? Please provide me with your review's assessment of this inportant legal issue.
10. Precisely what mechanism have you established to monitor the compliance of any future expenditure of settlement funds with the U.S. District Court ordered Consent Decree by which you are operating? What accounting proceedure have you established by which the public and the court may determine that all such expenditures - i.e., at the Alaska Sea Life Center, from the Restoration Reserve, etc. - are in accordance with the court's order?
11. Given the results of your ongoing, comprehensive, credible, and independent review, what have we as a society learned from this disaster and how should we as a society respond better next time? Precisely how has your enormous expenditure of public funds helped to advance the present human condition? Please provide me with your detailed review of this, the ultimate question.

I am elated and excited that you will be able to immediately provide me with all of the above information, as a result of your existing review process.




Dear Trustees:

At the January 14, 1997 meeting of the Valdez Trails Association, the membership voted unanimously to support the acquisition of the Blondeau property at the mouth of Mineral Creek by the Exxon Valdez Trustees Council.

Besides providing important winter and summer habitat for waterfowl, shorebirds, river otters, sea otters, and harbor seals, the area would provide local residents and tourists with undeveloped beach access to Port Valdez. In the past, Mr. Blondeau at times has granted permission to kayakers and other local recreationists to use his property. They testified at the meeting to its value as a picnic area, wildlife watching area, and kayak launching and haul-out area.

Homer gets top of its wish list

State lawmakers reached agreement Sunday on a \$2.4 billion budget for fiscal year 1998, including \$100 million in capital projects that will spend more than \$8.5 million for the lower Kenai Peninsula.

Claiming victory in their efforts to shave spending by at least \$60 million — they actually cut \$63 million — the Republican-led majorities in the House and Senate left Juneau two days early, finishing business late Sunday night. The state's 120-day session was scheduled to end Tuesday.

The \$8.5 million set aside in the capital projects on the Lower Peninsula includes more than \$7 million for projects specific to

Homer, according to information from Sen. John Torgerson.

Those projects include \$775,000 to design, build and improve the Homer ferry terminal, and \$279,000 for the acquisition of Overlook Park, which is contingent on an agreement between the state and Kachemak Bay Conservation Society for monitoring and cleaning the park.

The legislature approved Homer's No. 1 capital request — \$500,000 for a new water storage tank on Skyline Drive — and \$281,732 for Homer Senior Citizens Inc.

The state capital budget will spring loose some \$500 million in federal funds, particularly for transportation. Road projects include \$3.32 million for rehabilitation of the first 3.7 miles of East End Road, \$335,100 for boardwalks along Mud Bay and \$1.56 million for a pedestrian pathway along Homer Spit Road.

The Homer Deep Water Dock will get upgraded fenders with \$102,487, the city gets \$46,978 in supplemental appropriations, and the Kachemak Bay Branch of Kenai Peninsula College will receive \$200,000 for refurbishing the Homer Intermediate School building as a temporary campus and furthering the effort to build a new campus in downtown Homer.

"I'm thrilled to death," said City

Manager Patti Whalin. "Our delegation worked very hard. I'm very pleased."

Whalin said the capital budget contains more than she thought possible back at the beginning of the session. She said it helped having lobbyist Norm Gorsuch in Juneau to watch various bills and to keep an eye on what is in and what is not in the budget, and to stay atop events minute by minute.

Other projects in District 7 include \$350,000 in Exxon Valdez oil spill money for Nanwalek for restorations of resources or services; \$300,000 to build a second story on the fire-damaged portion of Ninilchik Elementary/High School; \$100,000 for expansion of Anchor Point's water system; \$309,900 in Alaska Department of Transportation funds for work on the Sterling Highway entrance to Skyview High School; and \$25,000 for Seldovia for city office repairs. Kachemak City will get \$55,472 for a baseball field.

Also likely to benefit the Lower Peninsula is \$482,768 to the Kenai Peninsula Borough for road improvements.

District 8, which includes the Central Peninsula and Seward also did well, getting a total of \$13.2 million.

Altogether, Senate District D, which includes House Districts 7 and 8, received \$23.45 million in the capital budget.

"I'm pleased with the progress we made this year on some very important pro-

jects for the Peninsula," District D Senator John Torgerson said Monday. The budget "includes projects which reflect many of my priorities, focusing on roads, water and sewer projects and basic infrastructure improvements. It also includes deferred maintenance projects and completion of trails projects in Seward and Homer."

Money for Overlook Park had been deleted from a supplemental budget in April because at the time it appeared the state was about to close state parks on the Anchor River and Stariski Creek. The Anchor Point-area parks, however, were not closed.

Torgerson entered language into the capital budget requiring Overlook Park be maintained without expense to the state — thus the funding's contingency on an agreement with the conservation society.

Torgerson also said he was pleased that the East End Road project is in the budget, as well as money for the pathway and boardwalk on the Spit.

House Speaker Gail Phillips rated the first session of the 20th Legislature as "excellent," noting the majority caucus had "fulfilled its commitment to Alaskans" by addressing long-range planning and cutting spending.

She also said the \$63 million this year may not be huge but it moved the Legislature closer to closing the fiscal gap.

Natives, Interior conclude land deal

WASHINGTON — Robert Kvasnikoff, whom Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt simply called Bobby, was in many people's thoughts Monday as leaders of Native-owned English Bay Corp. signed papers transferring more than 32,000 acres of their land to the federal government.

Most of the land, for which the Native village corporation will receive nearly \$15.4 million from Exxon Valdez oil-spill settlement proceeds, will be made part of the Kenai Fjords National Park. About 2,280 acres will be added to the

Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge.

Kvasnikoff, who died of AIDS in January at the age of 45, was the longtime chairman of the village corporation's board and an early and persistent advocate of the sale.

"Bobby was a very special person," corporation president Donald Emmal said at the signing ceremony in an Interior Department conference room. "Without his wisdom, his determination and his love for his people, this could not have taken place."

The land purchase is part of a continuing effort by the state and federal governments to buy sensi-

tive lands in the vicinity of the 11-million-gallon disaster to help the area recover by ending the threat of development. More than 500,000 acres have been bought or protected through conservation easements.

English Bay Corp. is the village corporation for Nanwalek, located on the southern tip of the Kenai Peninsula. English Bay was the village's former name.

The land in Monday's sale was part of the English Bay Corp.'s entitlement under the 1971 Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act. Most of it is along the shoreline of Nuka Bay, Two Arm Bay and Harris Bay — described as extraordinary

wildlife habitat that now will be permanently protected as if it were wilderness.

"This agreement is a monument to Bobby," Babbitt said. "I've instructed the National Park Service that his name be out there on the landscape as a monument to him."

Molly McCammon, executive director of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council charged with spending \$900 million in proceeds from Exxon Corp.'s settlement of criminal and civil actions arising from the spill, said the Park Service wants to have a scenic waterfall renamed after the Native leader.

Under the deal, English Bay

Corp. will use about \$500,000 of the proceeds to fund archaeological and cultural protection work on lands transferred to the park. The remainder of the money will be placed in a trust fund and invested to earn dividends for the Native corporation's 70 shareholders.

Emmal said the corporation still retains ownership of about 45,000 acres outside the park and refuge. The land-sale agreement preserves the Natives' rights to subsistence hunting in the park.

After the ceremony, Emmal described Kvasnikoff as "a visionary."

"He was instrumental in wanting to see this happen," he said.

In addition to his work for the village corporation, Kvasnikoff was the lead guitarist and vocalist for a rock 'n' roll group called the English Bay Band. Two of his brothers, Wally and John, also played in the group and John succeeded Bobby as village corporation chairman.

During a reception after the signing ceremony, one of English Bay's lobbyists, Tim Mahoney, passed out copies of the band's only album — "Some Nights It Works."

Dissident Akhiok shareholders want \$100,000 payout

ANCHORAGE (AP) — A Kodiak-based Native village corporation with a \$46 million windfall has turned to the courts to stop dissident shareholders demanding a \$100,000-a-person payout.

Akhiok Kaguyak Inc. and three of its board members say that agreeing to the payment would put the once-impooverished corporation at financial risk. Akhiok realized the windfall in 1995, when it sold about half of its lands to the federal government.

Dissidents want a dispersal of more than \$15 million, said their lawyer, Richard Jameson. The company says shareholder demands amount to an illegal fight to wrest control of the

company's board.

Akhiok's trouble is the latest in a series of fights within Alaska Native corporations waged by shareholders frustrated over what they say are meager returns from their companies.

In recent years, shareholders have pressured the timber-rich villages of Southeast Alaska to hand out tens of thousands of dollars to each shareholder. Shareholder revolts prompted Juneau's Goldbelt Inc. to distribute nearly half of its net worth.

Akhiok's dispute will be highlighted Friday when dissidents at the annual shareholder meeting hope to seat three board members favorable to

their views.

The company meanwhile has turned to a state court, which on Wednesday is scheduled to decide if votes collected by the dissidents may be used.

Alaska Natives were enrolled as corporation shareholders under federal law in 1971 that settled Native land claims to virtually all of Alaska.

Akhiok and Kaguyak were separate village corporations that merged in 1979. The corporation now has 157 shareholders, company documents show.

Like many village corporations, Akhiok Kaguyak struggled financially for most of its early life.

Most of the company land ac-

quired under the federal law fell within the Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge and was effectively blocked from development. Two years ago the federal government bought some company land, using part of the \$1 billion in legal settlements paid by Exxon after the 1989 Exxon Valdez oil spill.

Akhiok Kaguyak received \$46 million for the land, pumping \$37 million into a "permanent fund" investment to produce payments for shareholders in years to come, court documents say.

The company's other investments include Anchorage real estate, New Mexico apartments and a timber venture, a corporation financial report shows.

The company also handed out about \$30,000 to each shareholder and this year expects to issue dividends worth about \$6,000 to each shareholder, Akhiok lawyer James Wilkens said.

But Clida Leger, a shareholder critical of past dividends, said she collected votes to support the opposition board candidates because she believes "the shareholders aren't getting that much."

She said a new slate also would change some company operations.

Kenai Native's land deal gets Babbitt's signature

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The landmark agreement, the culmination of 20 years of negotiations, also separates nearly 20,000 acres of KNA lands from the Kenai Refuge — effectively lifting environmental restrictions that have prevented logging and other development activities.

"This agreement will both protect fish and wildlife habitat on the Kenai River and provide Alaska Natives with significant new opportunities for economic development," Babbitt said upon signing the agreement.

Although the deal was approved as part of the 1996 Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management Act, the celebration was postponed until Tuesday, when Babbitt officially enacted the agreement.

"The legislation will allow KNA greater flexibility to use our lands," said KNA President Diana Zirul. "We now have the necessary funding to promote the economic development of KNA's resources, while still respecting and preserving our heritage."

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While the new agreement allows the KNA to develop 20,000 acres of former Kenai refuge lands, the Interior Department will simultaneously transfer 37,000 acres northwest of Fairbanks into the

Kanuti National Wildlife Refuge — a compromise hailed by the Sierra Club and other environmental groups in Alaska.

Sen. Frank Murkowski, who is largely responsible for passing the land exchange bill, originally opposed the extension of Kanuti lands, but reversed his position under threat of a presidential veto.

Although Murkowski, R-Alaska, pointed to the final act as a victory, he made one final stab at environmentalists and administration officials who he said delayed the agreement.

"I have worked with the Kenai Natives Association leadership in their pursuit of justice since I arrived in the Senate in 1981," he said. "Foot dragging by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and opposition by the environmental

community has frustrated us at every turn.

"Finally this chapter has come to a just conclusion for the Kenai Natives Association."

Besides ideological dilemmas, budgetary issues also further postponed the land swap. As the White House aimed for a balanced federal budget, funding for the project became increasingly scarce.

It wasn't until the Interior Department eyed the Exxon Valdez settlement funds — which contributed 91 percent of the \$4.4 million for the land swap — that the project became viable.

The Kenai Natives Association also will receive five acres in old town Kenai. But KNA representatives contacted Tuesday were uncertain about planned development projects.

Those projects include \$775,000 to design, build and improve the Homer ferry terminal, and \$279,000 for the acquisition of Overlook Park, which is contingent on an agreement between the state and Kachemak Bay Conservation Society for monitoring and cleaning the park.

The legislature approved Homer's No. 1 capital request — \$500,000 for a new water storage tank on Skyline Drive — and \$281,732 for Homer Senior Citizens Inc.

The state capital budget will spring loose some \$500 million in federal funds, particularly for transportation. Road projects include \$3.32 million for rehabilitation of the first 3.7 miles of East End Road, \$335,100 for boardwalks along Mud Bay and \$1.56 million for a pedestrian pathway along Homer Spit Road.

The Homer Deep Water Dock will get upgraded fenders with \$102,487, the city gets \$46,978 in supplemental appropriations, and the Kachemak Bay Branch of Kenai Peninsula College will receive \$200,000 for refurbishing the Homer Intermediate School building as a temporary campus and furthering the effort to build a new campus in downtown Homer.

"I'm thrilled to death," said City

Manager Patti Whalin. "Our delegation worked very hard. I'm very pleased."

Whalin said the capital budget contains more than she thought possible back at the beginning of the session. She said it helped having lobbyist Norm Gorsuch in Juneau to watch various bills and to keep an eye on what is in and what is not in the budget, and to stay atop events minute by minute.

Other projects in District 7 include \$350,000 in Exxon Valdez oil spill money for Nanwalek for restorations of resources or services; \$300,000 to build a second story on the fire-damaged portion of Ninilchik Elementary/High School; \$100,000 for expansion of Anchor Point's water system; \$309,900 in Alaska Department of Transportation funds for work on the Sterling Highway entrance to Skyview High School; and \$25,000 for Seldovia for city office repairs. Kachemak City will get \$55,472 for a baseball field.

Also likely to benefit the Lower Peninsula is \$482,768 to the Kenai Peninsula Borough for road improvements.

District 8, which includes the Central Peninsula and Seward also did well, getting a total of \$13.2 million.

Altogether, Senate District D, which includes House Districts 7 and 8, received \$23.45 million in the capital budget.

"I'm pleased with the progress we made this year on some very important pro-

jects for the Peninsula," District D Senator John Torgerson said Monday. The budget "includes projects which reflect many of my priorities, focusing on roads, water and sewer projects and basic infrastructure improvements. It also includes deferred maintenance projects and completion of trails projects in Seward and Homer."

Money for Overlook Park had been deleted from a supplemental budget in April because at the time it appeared the state was about to close state parks on the Anchor River and Stariski Creek. The Anchor Point-area parks, however, were not closed.

Torgerson entered language into the capital budget requiring Overlook Park be maintained without expense to the state — thus the funding's contingency on an agreement with the conservation society.

Torgerson also said he was pleased that the East End Road project is in the budget, as well as money for the pathway and boardwalk on the Spit.

House Speaker Gail Phillips rated the first session of the 20th Legislature as "excellent," noting the majority caucus had "fulfilled its commitment to Alaskans" by addressing long-range planning and cutting spending.

She also said the \$63 million cut this year may not be huge but it moved the Legislature closer to closing the fiscal gap.

Natives, Interior conclude land deal

WASHINGTON — Robert Kvasnikoff, whom Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt simply called Bobby, was in many people's thoughts Monday as leaders of Native-owned English Bay Corp. signed papers transferring more than 32,000 acres of their land to the federal government.

Most of the land, for which the Native village corporation will receive nearly \$15.4 million from Exxon Valdez oil-spill settlement proceeds, will be made part of the Kenai Fjords National Park. About 2,280 acres will be added to the

Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge.

Kvasnikoff, who died of AIDS in January at the age of 45, was the longtime chairman of the village corporation's board and an early and persistent advocate of the sale.

"Bobby was a very special person," corporation president Donald Emmal said at the signing ceremony in an Interior Department conference room. "Without his wisdom, his determination and his love for his people, this could not have taken place."

The land purchase is part of a continuing effort by the state and federal governments to buy sensi-

tive lands in the vicinity of the 11-million-gallon disaster to help the area recover by ending the threat of development. More than 500,000 acres have been bought or protected through conservation easements.

English Bay Corp. is the village corporation for Nanwalek, located on the southern tip of the Kenai Peninsula. English Bay was the village's former name.

The land in Monday's sale was part of the English Bay Corp.'s entitlement under the 1971 Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act. Most of it is along the shoreline of Nuka Bay, Two Arm Bay and Harris Bay — described as extraordinary

wildlife habitat that now will be permanently protected as if it were wilderness.

"This agreement is a monument to Bobby," Babbitt said. "I've instructed the National Park Service that his name be out there on the landscape as a monument to him."

Molly McCammon, executive director of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council charged with spending \$900 million in proceeds from Exxon Corp.'s settlement of criminal and civil actions arising from the spill, said the Park Service wants to have a scenic waterfall renamed after the Native leader.

Under the deal, English Bay

Corp. will use about \$500,000 of the proceeds to fund archaeological and cultural protection work on lands transferred to the park. The remainder of the money will be placed in a trust fund and invested to earn dividends for the Native corporation's 70 shareholders.

Emmal said the corporation still retains ownership of about 45,000 acres outside the park and refuge. The land-sale agreement preserves the Natives' rights to subsistence hunting in the park.

After the ceremony, Emmal described Kvasnikoff as "a visionary."

"He was instrumental in wanting to see this happen," he said.

In addition to his work for the village corporation, Kvasnikoff was the lead guitarist and vocalist for a rock 'n' roll group called the English Bay Band. Two of his brothers, Wally and John, also played in the group and John succeeded Bobby as village corporation chairman.

During a reception after the signing ceremony, one of English Bay's lobbyists, Tim Mahoney, passed out copies of the band's only album — "Some Nights It Works."

Dissident Akhiok shareholders want \$100,000 payout

ANCHORAGE (AP) — A Kodiak-based Native village corporation with a \$46 million windfall has turned to the courts to stop dissident shareholders demanding a \$100,000-a-person payout.

Akhiok Kaguyak Inc. and three of its board members say that agreeing to the payment would put the once-impooverished corporation at financial risk. Akhiok realized the windfall in 1995, when it sold about half of its lands to the federal government.

Dissidents want a dispersal of more than \$15 million, said their lawyer, Richard Jameson. The company says shareholder demands amount to an illegal fight to wrest control of the

company's board.

Akhiok's trouble is the latest in a series of fights within Alaska Native corporations waged by shareholders frustrated over what they say are meager returns from their companies.

In recent years, shareholders have pressured the timber-rich villages of Southeast Alaska to hand out tens of thousands of dollars to each shareholder. Shareholder revolts prompted Juneau's Goldbelt Inc. to distribute nearly half of its net worth.

Akhiok's dispute will be highlighted Friday when dissidents at the annual shareholder meeting hope to seat three board members favorable to

their views.

The company meanwhile has turned to a state court, which on Wednesday is scheduled to decide if votes collected by the dissidents may be used.

Alaska Natives were enrolled as corporation shareholders under federal law in 1971 that settled Native land claims to virtually all of Alaska.

Akhiok and Kaguyak were separate village corporations that merged in 1979. The corporation now has 157 shareholders, company documents show.

Like many village corporations, Akhiok Kaguyak struggled financially for most of its early life.

Most of the company land ac-

quired under the federal law fell within the Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge and was effectively blocked from development. Two years ago the federal government bought some company land, using part of the \$1 billion in legal settlements paid by Exxon after the 1989 Exxon Valdez oil spill.

Akhiok Kaguyak received \$46 million for the land, pumping \$37 million into a "permanent fund" investment to produce payments for shareholders in years to come, court documents say.

The company's other investments include Anchorage real estate, New Mexico apartments and a timber venture, a corporation financial report shows.

The company also handed out about \$30,000 to each shareholder and this year expects to issue dividends worth about \$6,000 to each shareholder, Akhiok lawyer James Wilkens said.

But Clida Leger, a shareholder critical of past dividends, said she collected votes to support the opposition board candidates because she believes "the shareholders aren't getting that much."

She said a new slate also would change some company operations.

A Tanker Hauling Memories Is Shunned

Alaska Residents Oppose Exxon's Effort to Bring Back the Valdez

ANCHORAGE, March 12 — Pete Kompkoff and the other villagers of Chenega know perfectly well that when the Exxon Valdez hemorrhaged oil onto their shores, it was the crew that was at fault, and not the ship.

But they are not about to sit back silently in the coming weeks as the Exxon Corporation seeks permission in Federal District Court here for the tanker, renamed the Mediterranean, to return to Prince William Sound, where she unleashed one of the worst environmental disasters.

"It's just like a slap in the face, even though the machine didn't do the damage," said Mr. Kompkoff, administrator of the 28-house village tucked onto an island that is one small puzzle piece in the white-and-blue jigsaw of the sparsely populated sound. "It's the people behind the wheel."

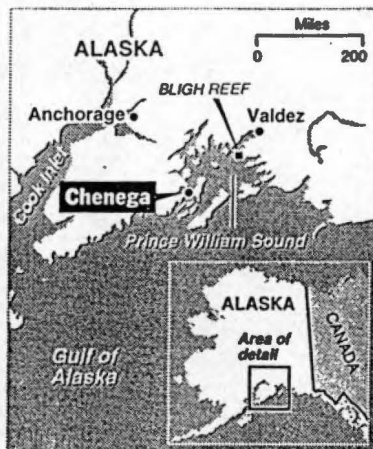
The suit, which will begin its court process here on March 24, "is an insult, just the idea of having the Exxon Valdez back on Prince William Sound," Mr. Kompkoff said.

That reaction reflects the deep damage, environmental and emotional, that remains nearly eight years after the tanker ran aground on Bligh Reef and leaked nearly 11 million gallons of crude oil.

The physical damage is easiest to measure. Though the bald eagles are back to their former numbers, experts say, researchers have found that the rest of the ecosystem is still hurting. From mussels to salmon to sea otters, the wildlife is either recovering or, like the populations of harbor seals, harlequin ducks and Pacific herring, still devastated.

Most of the oil is gone, said Molly McCammon, executive director of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council. "But there are beaches where, on a hot sunny day, you can still smell the oil, or you can scuff your foot in the sand and still get to fresh oil," Ms. McCammon said. "And what's there now is going to take a long time to go."

The council guides the spending of

\$900 million that Exxon, the nation's largest oil company, was required to pay in a 1991 civil settlement to finance restoration of the environment damaged by the spill.

Along with studying and trying to help the flora and fauna, the council has also begun trying to protect some of the damaged area in perpetuity by helping to buy swatches of land and manage them for the good of the wildlife. Last month, the council joined with the Federal Government to buy its first major parcel on the sound, 60,000 acres in the hardest-hit area.

But if villagers like those in Chenega remain furious about the spill, it is in part because the biggest part of the financial penalties imposed on Exxon, a \$5 billion award by a state jury in 1994 for damage to the thousands of fishermen, landowners and other residents, is being appealed by the oil company. Lawyers expect the suit to be tied up in court so long that fishermen and scientists wonder aloud whether they will see it resolved in their lifetimes.

With that money held up, the fishermen of the spill area remain largely uncompensated for their still diminished catches. And Mr. Kompkoff and others contend that although

scientists believe that there is no health threat from the remaining oil, gathering mussels and other food from the shore now is like shopping at a dirty grocery store where the food might be contaminated.

The trustee council plans to spend nearly \$2 million this year to clean eight beaches in the Chenega area, partly to restore villagers' confidence and partly, Mr. Kompkoff said, because they need the work. It has been years since the cash bonanzas that they received from helping with the cleanup, which cost Exxon hundreds of millions of dollars.

In November, Exxon settled its insurance claims for the spill, receiving a total of \$780 million against costs that it says totaled \$2.5 billion.

With such lingering problems and Exxon's biggest bill left unpaid, one reader of The Anchorage Daily News suggested recently that the Mediterranean be allowed to return to Prince William Sound, if the company pays the \$5 billion.

Exxon's view, needless to say, is different. The Exxon shipping subsidiary that is bringing the suit here, Seariver Maritime, Financial Holdings, is challenging the provision in the Oil Pollution Act of 1990 that is keeping the vessel out of the sound, saying the law acted retroactively.

Among other actions, the law, passed when horror about the spill was high, barred any vessel that had spilled more than one million gallons of oil after March 22, 1989 — the Valdez spill started on March 23 — from sailing in Prince William Sound again. Seariver, in Houston, protests that the provision was meant as punishment for Exxon and constitutes an unconstitutional taking of its property without providing redress.

"This is a pretty significant constitutional issue," a spokesman for Seariver, Arthur Stephen, said, "as to can you come along at some point and retroactively prohibit a vessel from operating where she was designed for, where she was certified by all the Government agencies for operating? And frankly, do you do it against a piece of equipment?"

Environmental and emotional damage remain in Prince William Sound.

The ship had no mechanical problems that led to the leak; the disaster was attributed mainly to poor judgment by the crew, which tried to rock the vessel free. In 1990, Capt. Joseph J. Hazelwood was acquitted of operating the ship while drunk; much of the blame was laid on the exhaustion of another ship's officer.

The vessel formerly known as the Valdez and her sister ship, the Long Beach, were constructed specifically for carrying oil from Alaska to the ports of California, Mr. Stephen said.

Because the Valdez has been barred from Prince William Sound

she cannot reach Port Valdez, the loading station for all the oil piped from the North Slope. The tanker has had to operate in Europe and the Middle East, Mr. Stephen said, where she has faced far more competition and brought in far less profit than she would have in the American Pacific.

The targets of the suit are the Transportation Department, the Attorney General and the Justice Department. Transferred last month from a court in Washington, the suit is scheduled to begin here with status reports from both sides. Several groups of villagers like those in Chenega have filed friend-of-the-court briefs or letters of complaint against the suit.

Ripples from the spill are also being felt farther afield. In Washington State, environmentalists are fighting a move by the legislature to merge the Office of Marine Safety into the State Ecology Department.

The office was created after the Valdez spill to prevent a similar problem from occurring in Puget Sound.

An environmental group, People for Puget Sound, plans a rally on March 24, the anniversary of the spill, beneath the slogan, "Remember the Exxon Valdez!" a spokesman for the group, Mike Sato, said.

Shipping and oil companies have been fighting the 5-cents-a-barrel state import tax on oil that finances the tough spill-prevention program. But environmentalists warn of the continuing danger of falling asleep at the switch, as Alaska did.

"One of the hardest things to maintain is vigilance on spill prevention," said Fred Felleman of Ocean Advocates, another group that opposes the merger of the Marine Safety Office into the Ecology Department. "Because when it's working you don't see anything happening. So in the competition for budgets it's the first thing to go."
