Colonies of pigeon guillemots occur near the property, where they feed in near shore marine waters that also host marbled murrelets, wintering sea ducks and loons. 






View of Tract 21-01, T. 32 S., R. 28 W., Sec. 21 looking northerly at mouth of stream with pink salmon present. Building site also available.


