SUBJECT: Public comment on GEM Science Plan

We request your comments on the Science Plan for the Gulf of Alaska Ecosystem Monitoring and Research Program (GEM), available for downloading at

http://www.oilspill.state.ak.us/gem/documents.html. The review of the Science Plan is an annual invitation for comments from everyone to improve the Science Plan. After the Science Plan is edited in response to comments, the Invitation for Proposals is prepared based on the needs and priorities identified in the Science Plan. Normally the review period for the Science Plan is from August to November; however events beyond our control limit the review period this year to the month of December – first week of January, with comments closing at the end of the day of January 5, 2004.

Reviewers should take care to limit comments to changes that may be required as a result of updates to the best available scientific information. Comments should be based on new scientific findings, or scientific findings that were overlooked in the GEM Program Document or the National Research Council review of GEM (available on the EVOSTC website). For example, comments are welcome on topics such as advances in current understandings of fate and effects of oil in biological systems, new findings on biological or climatic mechanisms of control of marine bird, mammal or fish populations, and information considered relevant to status of species and other resources injured by the oil spill.

On the other hand, comments of a policy nature, such as ideas for modifying the Trustee Council's mission statement, or ideas for projects outside the established geographic or topical scopes of GEM are not appropriate for the purposes of modifying the Science Plan. The Science Plan is based on the best scientific information available in January 2003. The scientific information selected was limited by its relevance to the mission statement supplied by the Trustee Council. Hence changing the mission statement would require assembling a different suite of information for a different Science Plan, which is not conducive to a long-term monitoring program.

This is to confirm that Gulf of Alaska Ecosystem Monitoring and Research Program (GEM), Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, is a committed partner institution in the coastal Alaska LTER (Schoch and Eckert). GEM is a long term monitoring program funded by an endowment created by the Trustee Council in 1999. As stated by the National Research Council in the publication A Century of Ecosystem Science: Planning Long-Term Research in the Gulf of Alaska (National Academy Press) GEM offers, "... an unprecedented opportunity to increase our understanding of the functioning of large marine ecosystems ..." (p. 3).

Our commitment is based on the certainty that partnerships are essential to the success of GEM. As the NRC also pointed out, GEM cannot attain its mission without substantial leveraging of its own resources through partnerships. We see the Schoch and Eckert LTER proposal as an excellent opportunity to form a framework within which those connections and interactions with other long-term research entities can be forged. Indeed the past assistance of the coastal Alaska LTER co-authors in networking GEM with other groups, such as the Partnership for Interdisciplinary Studies in Coastal Oceanography (PISCO), has already been invaluable to the development of our current program.

Our commitment is also based on the belief that the time is ripe for the LTER concept to be extended to the marine environment. GEM is among a growing number of long-term research programs nationwide to recognize that marine ecosystems do not stop at the shoreline. GEM research seeks to understand how the biogeochemical cycle joins the

marine and terrestrial environments of Alaska to make them inseparable components of the same ecosystem. By seeking to understand the nature of the connection between the Gulf of Alaska and Prince William Sound, the LTER participants would produce information essential to GEM objectives.

The conceptual foundation of GEM makes clear that variations in productivities of terrestrial ecosystems cannot be understood in the absence of information on variation in transfer rates of carbon and nitrogen from gulf to sound, and from sound to watershed. The understandings of the connection between gulf and sound that would become available via the LTER, is of enormous potential benefit to our objective of understanding variations in the productivities of coastal watersheds in Alaska. As a consequence, our commitment to the coastal Alaska LTER is expected to be strong and of long duration.

Attached is the information you requested and a status report for the small parcel acquisition grant that was issued to The Nature Conservancy and the Conservation Fund.

Of the \$1,000,000 originally established for the small parcels program, there is approximately \$294,350 left unexpended.

We need to reimburse the grantees \$217,756.59 for purchases authorized by the previous Council but not as yet reimbursed by EVOS plus an additional \$18,650 in direct acquisition costs that the grantees spent in order to convey acquired properties to the State of Alaska. The attached spreadsheet will give you the details of these purchases.

After the first of the year, I would like to schedule a teleconferenced Trustee Council meeting to discuss the small parcels program. We need a formal resolution from the Council to approve the reimbursement of funds expended by the grantees on behalf of EVOS. We also need to discuss disposition of the remaining \$294,350 in the program and whether or not you wish to re-enter a new contract with the grantees to purchase more small parcels or whether you wish to put this money back into the investment account or elsewhere.

The purpose of this letter is to provide an accurate accounting under the small parcel acquisition grant provided by the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council to The Conservation Fund (TCF) and The Nature Conservancy (TNC) (the Grantees) through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The attached spreadsheet provides details on specific properties and related expenses and an overall summary.

To summarize, of the original \$1 million grant:

- ♦ \$82,500 has been spent on salary and administrative support by USFWS and the Grantees, including \$25,000 each to TNC and TCF. (Administrative support to other agencies has not been included in this figure.)
- ♦ \$386,733.34 has been reimbursed to the Grantees for land acquisition including land costs and other direct acquisition costs (e.g., appraisals, title insurance,...).
- \$217,756.59 has been expended by the Grantees but not yet reimbursed by EVOS.
- ◆ Approximately \$18,650 in direct acquisition costs will have to be expended by the Grantees or the State of Alaska to convey acquired properties to the State of Alaska.
- Approximately \$294,350 remains to acquire additional properties.

We would be happy to provide alternatives for expending the remaining funds or fully develop cost estimates for proceeding with specific acquisitions. Hopefully, this accounting gives us all an accurate picture of the funds expended to date, outstanding obligations, and remaining funds. We look forward to working closely with you and the Trustee Council on the next steps.

Exxon Corporation</u>, et al., No. A91-082 CIV, U.S. District Court for the District of Alaska, for necessary natural resource damage assessment and restoration activities for fiscal years 2004, 2005 and 2006 as described in Attachment A. Re: Final details on the FY 2004 Work Plan requiring your action

Dear Trustees:

Upon review of the transcripts of the Trustee Council meeting of November 10<sup>th</sup>, two additional actions remain pertaining to the FY 2004 Work Plan.

- 1. Funding of two continuing projects, now deferred, that cannot be finished without additional funds;
- 2. Funding of an alternative to the modeling proposals rejected on November 10<sup>th</sup>.

The Trustee Council agreed to re-consider funding deferred projects during FY 2004; however, given the current work load and the lateness in the fiscal year, I am recommending that you consider funding only two deferred projects in FY 2004 (Stabeno and Willette). The projects are continuing projects (funded in FY 2003) where we need additional investment to get full benefits from money already spent. If acceptable to the Trustee Council, authors of the other deferred projects would be notified not to expect funding in FY 2004. This would allow them to pursue other funding sources, or to consider re-submitting under the FY 2005 Invitation. At present, authors of all deferred proposals are waiting to hear from the Trustee Council.

The Trustee Council agreed to the concept of developing a modeling program; however, it asked for a less costly alternative to the proposals rejected on November 10<sup>th</sup>. Our Science Director, Dr. Mundy, has recommended that the budget of project 040630, Science Management, be increased by \$70,000 to support four workshops and preparation of a modeling report in FY 2004, which would allow us to do the work inhouse. The workshops and report would address questions raised by the Trustee Council during the November 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, including availability of models from state and federal agencies, feasibility of engaging modeling personnel from state or federal agencies on a *pro bono* basis, and methods for making stakeholder input, traditional ecological knowledge, and other forms of community involvement integral components of the modeling process. The cost estimate is based on travel for 48 people, as the total attendance for the work shops at our offices in Anchorage and report preparation by staff.

Alaska Department of Law

I recommend that the Trustee Council could take care of these two items in a brief conference call at a time to be determined, if there is general agreement on the course of action recommended. I will e-mail you in several days to get your input.

If more discussion is required, I am hoping that all Trustee Council members will be present for the opening of the Alaskan Marine Science Symposium at the Hotel Captain Cook at 1:00 PM January 12, which would allow us to meet in the morning.
