The 1996 Restoration Workshop is now firmly scheduled for January 16-18 at the Captain Cook Hotel in Anchorage. All project leaders and principal investigators are expected to participate.

We think that this workshop will be exciting and informative. The main purposes will be to foster interdisciplinary interchanges among projects, to update you on the status of the EVOS Restoration Program, and to obtain your comments on revised recovery objectives and strategies. We also are planning a keynote speaker and panel discussion on the topic of combining traditional/local knowledge with "western" science.

Based on comments following last year's workshop, almost the entire meeting will be held in plenary sessions. This will encourage greater exchange of information, but it also means that there will not be time for oral presentations on each project that received FY 1995 funds. As a result, we request that the project leader or principal investigator for each FY 1995 project submit a one-page abstract to the Restoration Office by December 8 (see attached guidelines). These abstracts will be duplicated, collated, and distributed in advance of the workshop and will provide everyone ready access to the full range of work supported by the Trustee Council.

In addition to an abstract for each project, we invite poster papers from anyone who wants to prepare one. These will be diplayed in a room adjacent to the main meeting room and, depending on demand, there will be a formal poster session combined with a reception on the first evening of the workshop. Guidelines for posters are enclosed.

In the next few days we will work with the Restoration Work Force to identify session leaders and projects for which oral presentations are requested. You will be mailed a detailed agenda in November.

We look forward to having your abstract by December 8 and to seeing you in January. Stay tuned for a more detailed agenda and information on conference logistics. Thank you.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR ABSTRACTS DUE DECEMBER 8**

DRAFF Abstracts are invited and expected for each project that received EVOS Trustee Council funding in FY 1995. Please submit no later than December 8, 1996 to Stan Senner, Science Coordinator, at the Restoration Office, 645 G Street, Suite 400, Anchorage, AK 99501.

Abstracts should be a maximum of one typewritten, single-spaced page, and should include:

- (1) Project number and title;
- (2) Name, mailing address, telephone number and e-mail address of the principal investigator(s);
- (3) purpose and objectives of the restoration study or project, including reference to injured resources (include scientific names for plants and animals);
- (4) study area;
- (5) brief mention of primary methods, materials, equipment (especially if not standard);
- (6) description of major results in 1995, with reference to earlier results as needed; and
- (7) any summary comments that interpret or evaluate the results, especially in view of the status of the injured resource, restoration objectives, or future program directions.

These last two items are the most important, and should account for most of the substance of the abstract.

The abstract should not include detailed descriptions of experiments, organisms, and standard methods, nor references to the literature. In most cases tables and graphs will not be appropriate, but can be included if it can be done with exceeding one page.

A sample abstract is enclosed as a model.

Scientists and the public have identified purchasing land and/or conservation easements as a key method for aiding these injured fish and wildlife populations and the users that depend upon them. This was affirmed through a rigorous Environmental Impact Statement and review process.

The Council uses fair market value appraisals that conform to government standards as part of its process to identify fair value. But appraisals provide merely an opinion of strict economic value (i.e., timber, minerals, recreational development) and do not consider restoration or biological value. To help determine those values, the Council conducted a multi-year evaluation in the spill area and identified those lands that would contribute to the recovery of injured resources and services if protected.

As allowed by state and federal laws and guidelines, the Council uses economic appraisals as a tool to decide what is a fair, reasonable price for protecting large remote parcels. Appraisers have frequent differences of professional opinion on market conditions, development costs, and speculative economic opportunities. Appraisals are estimates of value based on many assumptions and subject to professional judgements and opinions.

To date, the Gouncil has completed five major habitat protection transactions, each with enormous public support. These include a contribution (together with the Alaska Legislature) to purchase inholdings in Kachemak Bay State Park; the Seal Bay acquisition on Afognak Island which is now Afognak Island State Park; purchase of commercial timber rights along Orca Narrows near Cordova (Eyak Sub-parcel); and two purchases of land and protection easements on Kodiak Island from Old Harbor and Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc.

The Eyak Sub-parcel was purchased for the government's appraised value. The Seal Bay acquisition was negotiated by the Council subject to completion of the appraisal, and in fact the final price of \$38.7 million was at less than the government's appraised value of \$52 million. The government's appraisal for Kachemak Bay State Park was about \$20 million; the landowner's was \$34 million. After arbitration, a final deal was struck at \$22 million for all rights.

The Council has so far chosen to substantially exceed government appraised values only in the two Kodiak transactions. In both cases, after great deliberation, the Council decided that the restoration and habitat values justified a negotiated price in excess of the government appraisals' estimates of economic value.

These lands provide some of the highest value fisheries habitat in the world, worth hundreds of millions of dollars to commercial and subsistence fishermen. Until the Trustee Council protected these lands, they were potentially vulnerable to development that could have seriously harmed important fish and wildlife resources.

The Council acted on the Kodiak acquisitions in open session, in an extensively noticed public meeting, and in response to overwhelming public support. The transactions were reviewed and approved by more attorneys than anyone cares to count, including those of the U.S. Department of Justice, the Department of the Interior, and the State Attorney General's office.

The Trustee Council will continue to use economic appraisals as part of the process to determine a fair price for habitat protection. But the Council must also consider, as required by its restoration charter and as supported by overwhelming public opinion, the best interests of the biological resources injured by the spill and the humans who depend upon them. The Trustees have a strong record of prudent actions, well supported by the public.



Your paper recently published an Associated Press story regarding the appraisal process of the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council. This article contained factual errors and displayed a lack of understanding of the Trustee Council's mission.

The Council has the responsibility to restore and protect the resources and services injured by the 1989 oil spill. Scientists and the public have identified purchasing land and/or conservation easements as a key method for aiding these injured fish and wildlife populations and the users that depend upon them. This was affirmed through a rigorous Environmental Impact Statement and review process.

The Council uses fair market value appraisals that conform to government standards as part of its process to identify fair value. But appraisals provide merely an opinion of strict economic value (i.e., timber, minerals, recreational development) and do not consider restoration or biological value. To help determine those values, the Council conducted a multi-year evaluation in the spill area and identified those lands that would contribute to the recovery of injured resources and services if protected.

As allowed by state and federal laws and guidelines, the Council uses economic appraisals as a tool to decide what is a fair, reasonable price for protecting large remote parcels. Appraisers have frequent differences of professional opinion on market conditions, development costs, and speculative economic opportunities. Appraisals are estimates of value based on many assumptions and subject to professional judgements and opinions.

To date, the Council has completed five major habitat protection transactions, each with enormous public support. These include a contribution (together with the Alaska Legislature) to purchase inholdings in Kachemak Bay State Park; the Seal Bay acquisition on Afognak Island which is now Afognak Island State Park; purchase of commercial timber rights along Orca Narrows near Cordova (Eyak Sub-parcel); and two purchases of land and protection easements on Kodiak Island from Old Harbor and Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc.

The Eyak Sub-parcel was purchased for the government's appraised value. The Seal Bay acquisition was negotiated by the Council subject to completion of the appraisal, and in fact the final price of \$38.7 million was at less than the government's appraised value of \$52 million. The government's appraisal for Kachemak Bay State Park was about \$20 million; the landowner's was \$34 million. After arbitration, a final deal was struck at \$22 million for all rights.

The Council has so far chosen to substantially exceed government appraised values only in the two Kodiak transactions. In both cases, after great deliberation, the Council decided that the restoration and habitat values justified a negotiated price in excess of the government appraisals' estimates of economic value.

These lands provide some of the highest value fisheries habitat in the world, worth hundreds of millions of dollars to commercial and subsistence fishermen. Until the Trustee Council protected these lands, they were potentially vulnerable to development that could have seriously harmed important fish and wildlife resources.

The Council acted on the Kodiak acquisitions in open session, in an extensively noticed public meeting, and in response to overwhelming public support. The transactions were reviewed and approved by more attorneys than anyone cares to count, including those of the U.S. Department of Justice, the Department of the Interior, and the State Attorney General's office.

The Trustee Council will continue to use economic appraisals as part of the process to determine a fair price for habitat protection. But the Council must also consider, as required by its restoration charter and as supported by overwhelming public opinion, the best interests of the biological resources injured by the spill and the humans who depend upon them. The Trustees have a strong record of prudent actions, well supported by the public.

Overall, the focus on past due reports has been very successful and we are now seeing significant progress in catching up on the backlog.

As the PIs and liaisons are held to a more rigorous standard of accountability for report production, it is important that the review process also keep pace so that reports can be finalized as quickly as possible after they are completed by the PIs. While most of the recent attention has been given to delays in report writing, I have also heard some concerns expressed by liaisons and PIs about the time required for the report format and scientific peer reviews. While some delays are inevitable, we must make sure that the Restoration Office stays within the time guidelines provided in the report writing procedures and keeps on top of the report production.

Please know that I very much appreciate both the great quantity as well as the high quality of your work and do not wish to add a needless burden. I am asking that Sandra Schubert give this aspect of the report writing process more attention, however, and I would appreciate it if you could both work with Sandra to identify reviews, if any, that are lagging.

Each quarter we appear to be getting closer to reconciling the reports associated with the 1992 through 1995 authorizations for the Department of the Interior. However, some confusion still exists as explained below.

### 1995 Authorization

The Trustee Council authorized \$157,000 for project 95100 'Administration, Public Information and Scientific Management'. The last quarterly report distributes only \$153,500. To account for the shortage, I have increased the amount reflected for DOI-O/S by the \$3,500.

The last quarterly report reflected \$130,600 for project 95163I "Forage Fish: Program Management' in the Authorized column. However, the number reflected in the Adjusted Authorized column is \$130,400. The number in the Adjusted Authorized column appears to be an error, since a transfer of \$200 is not reflected for any other project. If the authorization was subsequently changed, please provided documentation which reflects the change.

### 1994 Authorization

The Trustee Council authorized \$3,800 for project 940FC 'Finance Committee'. The last quarterly report reflects an authorization of \$3,700. This appears to be an error. If the authorization was subsequently changed, please provided documentation which reflects the change.

The Trustee Council authorized \$58,400 for project RT 'Restoration Team Support'. The last quarterly report reflects an authorization of \$58,300. This appears to be an error. If the authorization was subsequently changed, please provided documentation

which reflects the change.

At your direction, I have included the carry forward of 1993 projects into 1994. As you can tell from the notes, it is remains unclear how the carry forward was authorized. To account for the carry forward, I have adjusted the Unobligated Balance down in the previous year and increased the authorization for the year of the carry forward.

### 1992 and 1993 Authorizations

At your direction, I have carried forward the identified 1992 projects into 1993. As you can tell from the notes, it is remains unclear how the carry forward was authorized. To account for the carry forward, I have adjusted the Unobligated Balance down in 1992 and increased the authorization in 1993 by the same amount. In doing so, it appears that the adjustments column may required a further refinement. When one compares the adjustments in 1992 to 1993 there is a net loss of \$4,945. Which just happens to have been the adjustment reflected for 1994 for the period ending September 30, 1994.

In summary, after all these revisions we still have some minor problems with our reconciliation. This includes the 1995 and 1994 authorization differences and the unexplained loss of \$4,945. Hopefully we can correct these problem on the quarterly report for the period ending September 30, 1995.

For your review, I have attached is a set of the quarterly reports for the period ending June 30, 1995.

- request oral presentations to cover a carefully-selected subset of projects (in some cases combining more than one project in a single presentation).

We need to move quickly to identify those projects for which oral presentations are desired. My suggestion is that these are identified on the basis of (a) project maturity and results, (b) contribution to the interdisciplinary picture of EVOS recovery and response, and (c) relevance to future restoration program directions.

I have enclosed a list of projects arranged under various functional headings. You have seen this before, but this version has incorporated more of your suggestions. Please write in the margins or send me a list indicating which projects (or combinations of projects) are priorities for oral presentations and which might be more appropriate for posters. In addition to the invited talks within each group, each session will begin with an overview that stresses project highlights and integration. Also remember that we will require abstracts for every project, and that these will be collated and circulated in advance of the workshop.

By my figuring, we have time for 25-30 technical presentations (over 3 days), not including the session overviews. Thus, for each functional grouping, I have suggested a target number of 20-min presentations, based largely on the number of projects in that grouping. This is for guidance only, and it is fine if you suggest more or less presentations.



To the editor:

Your recent article "The price of pricelessness" (October 22) regarding the appraisal process of the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council was incomplete, misleading and displayed a total lack of understanding of the Trustee Council's mission.

The Council is responsible for restoring and protecting the resources and services injured by the 1989 oil spill. Scientists and the public have identified protecting habitat as a key method to aid injured fish and wildlife populations and the users who depend on them.

The Council uses fair market value appraisals that conform to government standards as part of its process to identify fair value. But appraisals provide an opinion of *economic* value (i.e. timber, minerals, development), not restoration or biological value. For that reason, the Council also extensively evaluated the habitat values of lands in the spill area and identified those that could contribute to the recovery of injured resources and services if protected.

Under state and federal laws and guidelines, the Council uses economic appraisals to help decide on a fair price for protecting large remote parcels. Appraisers frequently differ on market conditions, development costs, and speculative economic opportunities. Appraisals are estimates of value based on assumptions and subject to different professional judgements and opinions.

To date the Council has completed five major habitat protection transactions, each with enormous public support. Only the two Kodiak transactions substantially exceeded government appraised values. In both cases the Council decided the restoration and habitat values justified a negotiated price exceeding government appraisers' estimates of economic value.

The Kodiak lands provide some of the highest value fisheries habitat in the world, worth hundreds of millions of dollars to commercial and subsistence fishermen. The Council decided an extra level of protection was warranted.

The Council acted on the Kodiak acquisitions in open session, and in response to overwhelming public support. They were reviewed and approved by the U.S. Department of Justice, the Department of the Interior, and the State Attorney General's office.

The Trustee Council will continue to use economic appraisals to help determine a fair price for habitat protection. But the Council must also consider the best interests of the biological resources injured by the spill and the humans who depend on them. This forms the basis of the Council's strong record of prudent actions, well supported by the public.

Natalie Phillips' article, "The price of pricelessness" (October 22), regarding the appraisal process of the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council, was a disservice to your readers; it contained factual errors and displayed a lack of understanding of the Trustee Council's mission.

The Council has the responsibility to restore and protect the resources and services injured by the 1989 oil spill. Scientists and the public have identified purchasing land and/or conservation easements as a key method for aiding these injured fish and wildlife populations and the users that depend upon them. This was affirmed through a rigorous Environmental Impact Statement and review process.

The Council uses fair market value appraisals that conform to government standards as part of its process to identify fair value. But appraisals provide merely an opinion of strict economic value (i.e., timber, minerals, recreational development) and do not consider restoration or biological value. To help determine those values, the Council conducted a multi-year evaluation in the spill area and identified those lands that would contribute to the recovery of injured resources and services if protected.

As allowed by state and federal laws and guidelines, the Council uses economic appraisals as a tool to decide what is a fair, reasonable price for protecting large remote parcels. Appraisers have frequent differences of professional opinion on market conditions, development costs, and speculative economic opportunities. Appraisals are estimates of value based on many assumptions and subject to professional judgements and opinions.

To date, the Council has completed five major habitat protection transactions, each with enormous public support. These include a contribution (together with the Alaska Legislature) to purchase inholdings in Kachemak Bay State Park; the Seal Bay acquisition on Afognak Island which is now Afognak Island State Park; purchase of commercial timber rights along Orca Narrows near Cordova (Eyak Sub-parcel); and two purchases of land and protection easements on Kodiak Island from Old Harbor and Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc.

To set the record straight, the Eyak Sub-parcel was in fact purchased for the government's appraised value. Your reporter also erred in stating that the Seal Bay acquisition was completed prior to a completed appraisal and that the appraisals were not available. That deal was negotiated by the Council subject to completion of the appraisal, and in fact the final price of \$38.7 million was at less than the government's appraised value of \$52 million. Those appraisals have been available for more than a year.

The government's appraisal of \$12 million referred to for Kachemak Bay State Park was a land value only and did not include commercial timber and subsurface rights. When these are added, the government appraisal was about \$20 million; the landowner's was \$34 million. After arbitration, a final deal was struck at \$22 million for all rights.

The Council has so far chosen to substantially exceed government appraised values only in the two Kodiak transactions. In both cases, after great deliberation, the Council decided that the restoration and habitat values justified a negotiated price in excess of the government appraisals' estimates of economic value.

These lands provide some of the highest value fisheries habitat in the world, worth hundreds of millions of dollars to commercial and subsistence fishermen. The statement that these lands were already protected - and therefore not worth purchasing - is not true. Until the Trustee Council protected these lands, they were potentially vulnerable to development that could have seriously harmed important fish and wildlife resources.

The Council acted on the Kodiak acquisitions in open session, in an extensively noticed public meeting, and in response to overwhelming public support. The transactions were reviewed and approved by more attorneys than anyone cares to count, including those of the U.S. Department of Justice, the Department of the Interior, and the State Attorney General's office.

The Trustee Council will continue to use economic appraisals as part of the process to determine a fair price for habitat protection. But the Council must also consider, as required by its restoration charter and as supported by overwhelming public opinion, the best interests of the biological resources injured by the spill and the humans who depend upon them. The Trustees have a strong record of prudent actions, well supported by the public.

#### Habitat Protection and Acquisition Status Report

Shuyak Island - A draft timber valuation report has been received from Cascade Appraisal, Inc. (CAI) and a review completed by State and Federal timber reviewers on October 9. Additional information was requested on October 10 from CAI concerning justifications for timber related costs and values. Further review of the report is pending receipt of this additional information which is expected in early November.

Chenega - Additional field timber related data collection was completed early the week of October 16 by CAI. An analysis of this information is proceeding. A request will be made of Koncor Forest Products, Inc. (KFPI) to allow CAI to complete an opinion of timber value by waving any possible conflict of interest determination on CAI's part due to an existing timber contract between CAI and KFPI. It is expected that this waiver will be obtained and thus, an opinion of value should be received in mid-Novmber from CAI.

Tatitlek - A preliminary timber valuation report (without numbers) was received on October 16 and is undergoing review by State and Federal timber reviewers. A complete draft timber valuation report is expected in early November. A first draft of a conservation easement was received from the landowner and discussions are progressing.

Byak - We have contacted Pacific Forest Consultants to obtain all timber cruise information collected under contract to the Forest Service. This information will be reviewed for data adequacy by State and Federal timber reviewers. This will lead to recommendations as how to proceed with a timber appraisal in the Sheep Bay and Port Gravina areas.

Jim Wolfe and Molly McCammon traveled to Cordova on October 6 to meet with Eyak Corporation representatives to discuss future possible negotiations. It was stated that a land management plan for Eyak land is expected to be completed in early 1996 which will provide the basis for future negotiations.

Eyak also stated that they were preparing to advertise for a viewshed timber sale in November in the Eyak Lake area. The sale proposes to remove about 20% of the merchantable timber volume primarily near Power Creek. Eyak representatives were curious as to the reaction of the Trustee Council about the future purchase of timber rights before or after the sale in the "Core Area."

Phil Janik, Craig Tillery and Molly McCammon plan to visit with representatives of Eyak's Board of Directors within the next two weeks to further discuss future negotiations.





Software Training Objectives

The purpose of this memorandum is to:

- 1) ask for your review and comment on the attached draft "Computer Software Training Objectives" chart; and
- 2) ask you to identify any immediate computer support tasks that are critical to address in the next two weeks.

As you know, Bill Johnson/ADFG visited the Restoration Office in mid-September to review the Restoration Office computer support capabilities. Bill visited with nearly all staff regarding their computing support needs. As a result of that assessment and further discussions

- needs for improvement to the existing Local Area Network (LAN) have been identified:
- certain software and hardware purchases have been recommended and approved; and
- the need for additional software training was identified in order to enhance and standardize the use of a consistent set of core software (in particular, word processing in advance of using Windows 95).

Traci Cramer, Bill Johnson, Bob Loeffler and I have been working to develop an RFP for computer support services. We hope to have a contractor on-site within a few weeks. The initial focus will be on increasing stability of the network and installation of recently acquired hardware and software.

Computer Software Training Objectives: With respect to software training, I have developed the attached draft chart in order to more clearly define our office software training needs. As an overall goal, within the next few months, everyone should have basic command of the core software systems

and ability to use the LAN and electronic mail systems. In some cases, a high degree of proficiency will be needed by certain individuals for certain applications (e.g., FileMaker Pro, Excel, My Advanced Mail).

Please review the chart. Comments are solicited, by the <u>end of the day Friday</u>. Just talk to me if that's easiest. Please note that the chart describes training *objectives* (i.e., where we want to be). The chart is not intended to reflect current level of training or skill staff may already have — this is not in any way a statement regarding current levels of software proficiency.

<u>Critical Computer Support Needs</u>: Ward will complete his work at the end of this week, possibly even today. Please let me know if there are specific *critical* computer support needs that you have. These should be only "must" services. Other support services can be identified as well (please use the categories: Critical, Short Term, and Long Term). A memo prepared by OSPIC is provided as an example. As needed, I will work to get computer assistance.

OSPIC DP Support Needs

The following is a list of the OSPIC data processing support needs in priority order. Please let me know if you have questions or comments.

### Critical needs:

WLN's CD-ROM, LaserCat, is our "card catalog" and its function is imperative. We occasionally have problems with LaserCat "locking up". We also require assistance in loading LaserCat when the quarterly updates include software updates.

Trouble shooting if LAN problems occur. Any modem problems should be addressed promptly, since problems with our dialout capabilities severely impair our ability to retrieve online information and catalog new materials. Catalog records must be entered online.

Backups: At this time I do not know if backups are being done on the OSPIC network on a regular basis. When the OSPIC staff performed backups using a tape drive, we did it every evening. At the minimum, backups should be done regularly on a weekly basis.

We are currently in the process of replacing the cable from our printer to the OSPIC LAN server. This requires new cable to be run above the ceiling tiles from the printer in the OSPIC back to the server located in the first floor storage room. Once the cable is in place, we must then install the new HP Jet Direct External Print Server, which will free up Beverly's machine from functioning as the print server.

#### Short-term needs:

Assistance is needed to resolve problems loading Netscape and Eudora software onto Beverly's computer.

Assistance is needed in converting the OSPIC statistics from WordPerfect to a spreadsheet.

### Long-term needs:

3

Set up and maintenance of World Wide Web Server: Orders have been placed for lines and equipment. Web server software and two 9 gig drives have already arrived. As soon as the Adaptec drive controllers arrive, the drives and CD-ROM can be installed in the server. The Web server software is then loaded from the CD-ROMs. Once the software is loaded, text files can be loaded and run through AnchorPage for indexing and html conversion. When the Cisco router arrives, the Department of Administration will schedule installation of the data line. They will also provide us with the IP address. This address is necessary to register the domain name with InterNIC. Once the line is installed and the domain name is registered, the Web server can go online.



Dear Mr. Selanoff, Mr. Totemoff, and Residents of Chenega Bay:

I am writing to thank you for hosting the Trustee Council's Public Advisory Group and staff in Chenega last month. I appreciate your hospitality and believe that the useful discussions at the open house and during meetings held the next day will help the Public Advisory Group understand the concerns of your community. I think what we all learned will be helpful in evaluating future restoration projects for the area.

At the open house, you asked us to check up on three questions. We did, and the answers are below.

**Could King's Bay be open to moose hunting?** Pete Kompkoff asked that we check out whether King's Bay could be open to moose hunting. We asked people at ADF&G that question and they told us that, in fact, part of the area is already open.

The land around King's Bay falls into Units 6 and 7. Since this is federal land, federal rules apply for subsistence hunting. Those rules currently do not allow for a subsistence hunt in those areas. Any appeal of the federal rule would have to be directed to the federal subsistence board.

For sport hunting, state rules apply. Unit 6 includes land at the headwaters of King's Bay. It is open to sport hunting as a registration hunt and requires a permit. The registration hunt typically allows an unlimited number of hunters (some are first-come first-served). The season is September 1 through the end of October and the limit is one moose. Unit 7 includes land around the rest of the bay. In this area, permits are by drawing, the limit is one moose, and the season is from August 20 — October 10.

Insurance requirements to use funds approved for the Cooperative Harvest Assistance Project. You asked us follow up with respect to insurance requirements that may impede Chenega residents' ability to use funds made available to the Chenega Village Council through the Subsistence Harvest Support Project funded from the state criminal funds. The project is administered by John Gliva from the Alaska Department of Community and Regional Affairs. We alerted him to the problem and asked that he talk to Larry Evanoff. He told Mr. Evanoff that insurance was, in fact, required in order to protect the State of Alaska and to protect the boat owners, but that funds were available in the grant to purchase insurance for the boat owner. We hope that resolves the problem, but if you have further questions, please let me know.

Can we get VFDA surplus fish? You asked if, as a replacement for depleted subsistence resources, it would be possible to get surplus fish from the Valdez hatchery (silvers). We called the hatchery, and they said that there was no problem. The hatchery gives away the silver salmon that they use for the egg takes in the fall. They told us that if Chenega would send a boat over when they do the egg take in the fall, they would give you the silvers for no charge. While the egg take is done for this year, you may call the Hatchery Manager at 835-1329 to make arrangements for next year.

Workshop on Residual Shoreline Oil. You are Invited to Attend. In discussions with Chenega residents, we heard of the problems and worries caused by oil remaining on shorelines near the village. We have had requests that we fund projects to remove the oil from nearby shorelines. The Trustees are concerned about the issues raised by Chenega residents. They are also concerned about the potential cost of a program to clean all of the offensive areas, especially if it will not significantly resolve the issues that concern subsistence and other users.

Because of these concerns, the Trustee Council is sponsoring a workshop on the subject in Anchorage on November 1 and 2. We hope that a number of Chenega residents can attend. If you are interested, please call Bob Loeffler of my staff at 278-8012 or 1-800-478-7745.

Thank you for your recent letter in regard to the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council's small parcel program and your comment in support of the parcel nominated by Mr. James Donald Hopkins. We have in fact been provided a copy of the report from Dr. George West that you referenced.

As you may know, more than 260 small parcels have been nominated by various land owners throughout the spill area. These parcels have all been evaluated for their potential contribution to restoration. A copy of the evaluation report is enclosed. The small parcel program is clearly quite popular and there are many more nominations of small parcels than the Trustee Council can purchase, at least at this time. The Trustees have identified 29 parcels of particular priority for the restoration of the resources and services injured by the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill. Efforts are currently underway respecting these particular parcels (i.e., title searches, hazardous materials surveys, appraisals, etc.). The Trustee Council will use this additional information to determine which parcels are appropriate for protection with settlement funds. Several of these high priority parcels are in the Homer area.

Although the parcel nominated by Mr. Hopkins (KEN 146) has a number of important attributes, this parcel has not been identified as a priority parcel at this time. However, it is possible that KEN 146 may be further considered in the future. I'll be letting the Council know of your interest, as well as others, in this parcel.

The enclosed report provides further detail on the small parcel program and process. If I can provide additional information, please let me know.





Thank you for your recent correspondence regarding the Trustee Council's actions on habitat protection. I can assure you that the Trustees are given copies of all comments received -- whether by mail or by telephone. Hearing from the public on major issues is an important part of our public process.

As you are probably aware, the Trustee Council has taken action to protect lands in Kachemak Bay near Homer, at Seal Bay on Afognak Island, and on Kodiak Island in the case of lands owned by Akhiok-Kaguyak and Old Harbor Corporations. An agreement with Koniag Corporation appears close to completion that would protect additional habitat on Kodiak. Negotiations are underway with the Kodiak Island Borough for lands on Shuyak Island; Afognak Joint Venture for lands on Afognak Island; Eyak, Tatitlek and Chenega Corporations for lands in Prince William Sound; and Port Graham and English Bay Corporations for lands within Kenai Fjords National Park. These efforts are all currently underway and at various stages of completion. In addition, the Trustee Council is considering 29 small parcels (under 1,000 acres each) for possible protection.

Habitat protection continues to be a major restoration effort on the part of the Trustee Council. Your continued interest in the Council's actions is appreciated.
