As your letter of February 18, 1998, indicates, the Seldovia Historical Museum has requested funding from the Exxon Valdez trust fund. In fact, organizations in all eight spill-affected communities in Prince William Sound and lower Kenai Peninsula have requested trust funds to improve or repair existing museums or construct new ones. In some communities, more than one organization has requested funds for this purpose. In Seldovia, both the Museum and the Seldovia Village Tribe have requested funds to improve their museums.

The challenge for the Trustee Council has been to develop an approach to museum improvements that primarily restores injury from the 1989 oil spill, but also serves the interests of the communities and resolves competing requests for use of trust funds. Exxon Valdez oil spill trust funds may be used to restore resources injured as a result of the oil spill, including archaeological resources. The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Restoration Plan acknowledges the restoration value of providing appropriate facilities to store and display spill-related archaeological artifacts.

The Trustee Council recently adopted a resolution regarding funding for archaeological artifact repositories and display facilities in Prince William Sound and the lower Kenai Peninsula. Seldovia is one of the eight spill-affected communities in these regions. The resolution directs me to invite comprehensive proposals for a single regional repository in one of the eight communities, local display facilities in the remaining seven communities and traveling exhibits. I expect to issue a Request for Proposals soon. The Trustee Council is tentatively scheduled to make funding decisions on archaeological restoration on August 6, 1998. Funds would be available on October 1, 1998, at the earliest.

I have encouraged Mr. Kroll to work with the other organizations in Seldovia to ensure that a proposal for a facility in Seldovia reflects the community's interests and support. Please let me know if you need additional information.

This letter is in response to your request for information on small parcel habitat protection efforts in the Homer area.

On October 3, 1997, the Trustee Council agreed to provide \$996,100,00 to purchase 68,7 acres at Mud Bay and 38 acres at Beluga Slough. In addition, the City of Homer agreed to convey a conservation easement to the State of Alaska and the United States on additional parcels containing a total of approximately 59.5 acres adjacent to the Mud Bay small parcel. The City will also provide \$41,000 toward the purchase of the Beluga Slough small parcel.

Purchase of these parcels was initially proposed by the City of Homer and widely supported by the public in Alaska as well as on a national basis. Many letters were received to let the Trustee Council know how important these lands are to the residents of Homer as well as the tourism industry. The Homer Chamber of Commerce and Homer's State Legislators also endorsed this effort. After the purchase of the land is complete, the City of Homer will be responsible for its management. The City is already planning ways to enhance the public use of the area through boardwalks and viewing platforms for bird watching and other recreational activities.

Parcel Description: The subject properties collectively comprise a contiguous 68.7 acre tract largely comprised of low-lying intertidal flats and salt marsh on the eastern side of the spit along Kachemak Bay extending across the spit to include the outer beach berm. The Trust for Public Lands (TPL) has an option to purchase the nominated lands.

Restoration Benefits: Acquisition of the subject properties will provide protection for important intertidal resources. These estuarine wetland habitats extend from mid-intertidal to supratidal elevations and include muddy intertidal, mixed sand/gravel substrate, giving way to alkalai grass salt marsh and a gravel/cobble/driftwood beach along the western beach berm. On the bay side of the spit, the intertidal habitats are characterized by brackish waters, providing feeding habitat for juvenile salmon outmigrating from other parts of Kachemak Bay. At high tide, harbor seals will swim in the area to feed, especially when the salmon are running in the mid to late summer. The intertidal habitat in this area supports intertidal vegetation and invertebrates that are of special significance to migratory birds on a seasonal basis. During spring migration, the tidal flats of this area are used by tens of thousands of migrating shorebirds which also use the uplands for roosting at high tide (especially Western sandpipers and Black Turnstones). In spring, the wetter portions of these lands are also of significant value to a variety of waterfowl species. Because of the biological productivity as well as aesthetic value of these lands, the properties are also of great public interest, helping to support tourism and recreation services. The area is especially popular during the annual Homer Shorebird Festival which draws thousands of visitors from throughout the state.



The purpose of this memorandum is to bring to your attention two items that require Trustee Council action. Because these matters are time sensitive and there is no scheduled Trustee Council meeting in the near future, I suggest that these action items be addressed through use of the emergency action provision provided for in the Trustee Council *Procedures* adopted on August 29, 1996.

While using the emergency action provision in the *Procedures* is clearly not the preferred approach, after consultation with federal and state legal counsel and in light of the specific actions being considered, it appears that both matters could reasonably be addressed through a polling of Council members.

Alaska SeaLife Center insurance claim: On November 8, 1997 a wind storm caused damage to the bird aviary canopy while it was under construction. Damages have been determined to be a covered loss under the builder's risk policy held by the Seward Association for the Advancement of Marine Science (SAAMS). Repair costs are estimated at \$350,000 - \$550,000. An insurance claim has been made and repairs are in progress to stay on the tight construction schedule necessary to allow for timely completion of the project. In order for SAAMS to access the insurance funds, SAAMS needs to have all named loss payees on the insurance policy release their respective interests in the payments. Under the terms of the Cooperative Agreement between ADF&G and the City of Seward, the Trustee Council along with a number of other parties including ADF&G and the U.S. Government are specifically required to be named as loss payees.

On February 17, a teleconference was held which included participation by Alex Swiderski/Department of Law, Claudia Slater/ADF&G, Lou Edwards/Alaska State Division of Risk Management, Darryl Schaefermeyer/SAAMS, Kim Sundberg/SAAMS, Barry Roth/DOI, and Gina Belt/Department of Justice as well as staff from the Restoration Office. The meeting produced two conclusions: 1. release of possible interest in the insurance claim by the various loss payees in order to allow SAAMS to proceed with the repairs expeditiously was appropriate; and 2. reconsideration and

possible amendment to the Cooperative Agreement provisions requiring that the Trustee Council and the U.S. Government be named as loss payees was in order.

While amending the Cooperative Agreement may take some time, the immediate concern involves allowing SAAMS access to the insurance funds in order to avoid possible delays in the construction schedule. Darryl Schaefermeyer has advised that, in order to avoid delays, SAAMS has already made an initial payment from non-insurance funds and that this is creating a cash flow problem for the project. In order to provide the required release, however, Trustee Council action is required in the view of Craig Tillery because the claim could be considered an asset and therefore require a unanimous vote of the Trustee Council to relinquish. Further, Mr. Tillery has indicated that use of the emergency polling method provided for in the Procedures would be reasonable in this instance. Accordingly, subject to a unanimous delegation of authority, releasing the Trustee Council interest in the aviary canopy claim can take the form of a letter to the insurance providers. A question concerning the grant of that authority is presented below.

Archaeological Facility RFP date change: The Trustee Council adopted a resolution on December 18, 1997 directing the Executive Director to invite comprehensive proposals for archaeological restoration, including a single regional repository and display facilities and traveling exhibits for the eight communities in the Chugach and lower Cook Inlet regions. As contemplated at the time, the resolution specifically directed that proposals were to be submitted by April 15, 1998 (coincident with other FY 99 work plan proposals).

Since that time, staff at the Restoration Office has been working on the preparation of a Request for Proposals (RFP) to be issued by the Alaska Department of Natural Resources. Preparation of the RFP has been more complex and taken longer than initially anticipated. Further, in the course of developing the RFP, it now appears that

giving potential respondents more time than originally envisioned to craft proposals is warranted in light of the extensive information that will be required of proposers.

However, the resolution adopted by the Trustee Council was drafted in a manner that does not allow any discretion in terms of when proposals are to be submitted. At this time, I would envision that proposals be submitted in mid-June which would still allow for evaluation and action by the Trustee Council in a time frame consistent with the FY 99 work plan. Accordingly, the following motion is presented for your consideration.

MOTION: By unanimous agreement of the Trustee Council, the Executive Director is hereby authorized to establish the appropriate due date for response to the RFP for comprehensive proposals concerning the establishment of a single regional archaeological repository and associated community display facilities and traveling exhibits within the Chugach and lower Cook Inlet regions.



The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Restoration Plan acknowledges the restoration value of providing appropriate facilities to store and display spill-related archaeological artifacts.

The Trustee Council recently adopted a resolution regarding funding for archaeological artifact repositories and display facilities in Prince William Sound and the lower Kenai Peninsula. Seldovia is one of the eight spill-affected communities in these regions. The resolution directs me to invite comprehensive proposals for a single regional repository in one of the eight communities, local display facilities in the remaining seven communities and traveling exhibits. I expect to issue a Request for Proposals soon. The Trustee Council is tentatively scheduled to make funding decisions on archaeological restoration on August 6, 1998. Funds would be available on October 1, 1998, at the earliest.

With regard to the \$300,000 endowment proposed by Mr. Kroll, I understand its primary purpose would be to provide long-term financial support for the museum. 

Dear Mrs. McCammon:

The endowment mentioned in my previous letter was the money mentioned in your April 2, letter to Fred Elvsaas of the Seldovia Village Tribe. I quote:

"Cost of construction: If your proposal entails a facility, what is the estimate cost of construction and how do you plan to secure the necessary funds? Consider two levels of funding from the Trustee Council for local repositories, \$225,000 and \$500,000. The Trustee Council has not decided to specify a maximum amount of funding, but I am including these figures in this request to help you formulate your response." I responded to this request and you have my letter on file.

I don't see why the decision as to how this money should be dispursed should fall on me. If I go down to the Seldovia Village Tribe and ask them to split the money fifty-fifty they are going to laugh at me and send me away. You are putting me in a catch-22 situation.

- 1. Seldovia Village Tribe is a legal, non-profit corporation but there are shared officers and directors as well as offices with the Seldovia Native Association.
- 2. The Seldovia Historical Museum is a legal 501-C public corporation under the laws of the State of Alaska and the IRS. The Seldovia Historical Museum's three city lots are not taxed by the Kenai Peninsula Borough. We are legal in all respects.
- 3. Veronica Christman informed us that the Exxon Valdez Trustee Council used the Seldovia Historical Museum's grant application as a model for it's other submissions.
- 4. The Seldovia Historical Museum's grant application was submitted before anyone else.
- 5. The Seldovia Historical Museum already has two archeological collections on display.
- 6. The Seldovia Historical Museum already has clear, community support from the City of Seldovia and the Seldovia Native Association. (See enclosed letters of support.)
- It is perceived by some that past decisions made by the Trustee Councils may have been politically influenced.

We hope that a decision can be made to repair the roof

of the museum and start construction of a bigger and better facility.







Soldotna Summary

The 1997 commercial salmon season in all of Upper Cook Inlet ended by emergency order on August 7th, due to poor coho salmon run strength. All harvest numbers in this summary are preliminary harvest figures based on inseason catch reports.

The harvest of 4.4 million salmon is slightly above the 1954-1997 average of 4.05 million (Table 1). Roughly 93 percent of the total salmon harvest was comprised of higher value sockeye salmon which resulted in an exvessel value of \$ 30.5 million, the eleventh highest exvessel value since 1960.

Sockeye Salmon The Upper Cook Inlet harvest of 4.1 million sockeye salmon represents the eighth highest catch on record and is approximately 1.7 million fish higher than the long-term average. The harvest was 1.2 million fish below the forecast of 5.3 million due primarily to Kenai River stocks that were weaker than forecast. Sockeye prices at the beginning of the season were \$ 0.65 to \$ 0.75 per pound but by the end of the season most processors were paying \$ 1.10 to \$ 1.15 per pound, paid retroactively to the beginning of the season. This resulted in an exvessel value for sockeye of \$ 29.6 million which was 97 % of the total exvessel value.



In recent years the management strategy employed has been to restrict the drift gillnet fleet to the three mile corridor for one and sometimes two regular periods to lower the exploitation rate of northern bound sockeye. In addition extra fishing time is restricted to the three mile corridor used in conjunction with the eastside set gillnets to harvest surplus Kenai or Kasilof stocks. Prior to the start of the 1997 season the drift fleet was advised that there would likely be two restricted regular periods to permit passage of northern bound stocks that were returning from a weak parent year escapement that occurred in 1992. The first restriction occurred on the regular period scheduled for July 11th. Escapements in the Yentna River responded favorably after several days with counts approaching ten thousand sockeye per day. The duration of acceptable daily counts lasted for a scant three days. A second drift restriction occurred on July 18th. With escapements still lagging a third restriction was necessary for the period scheduled on July 21". In addition the Board of Fisheries also restricted by regulation the drift period on July 28th for coho conservation allowing significant numbers of sockeye into the Northern District as well. In addition to the drift gillnet restrictions the Northern District set gillnet fishery was closed for the regular periods scheduled on July 18th and July 21th. As a result of these restrictions and a protracted run timing escapements into the Yentna crept over the upper end of the escapement goal with a total count of nearly 158,000, the largest escapement since the Department began using this site in 1986 (Table 2).

The fishery along the Central District east side targeting Kasilof River stocks (Kasilof Section) opened early on June 27th for regular Monday and Friday fishing periods. With a strong run to the Kasilof River considerable additional fishing time in the Kasilof Section was required to control escapements into the Kasilof River. The Kenai and East Forelands sections opened as scheduled on July 11th. The Kenai return was below forecast but still required considerable additional fishing time in the entire Upper Subdistrict to control escapement levels. Even with a relatively intense fishery in the Upper Subdistrict, escapements into both the Kenai and Kasilof rivers exceeded the upper end of the escapement range in 1997 (Table 2). The late Russian River component of the Kenai River return appeared quite weak, requiring a closure of the popular sport fishery at that location in early August in order to assure the 30,000 fish escapement goal. As a result of this closure, the complete commercial closure and a much protracted run timing this goal was exceeded and currently the escapement is nearly 60,000 sockeye.

Since 1990 the Crescent River on the west side of Cook Inlet, has been producing at a lower level than is required to allow the harvest of this stock during regular fishing periods in the Western Subdistrict with set gillnets and by drift gillnets west of 152 degrees 25 minutes West Longitude. Starting in 1990 numerous restrictions of the Western Subdistrict for both drift and set gillnets were required usually beginning about the 10th of July and continuing until early August when the sockeye return is essentially over. In roughly half of those years even with these restrictions escapements fell below the minimum goal by significant numbers. In 1997 we intended to bolster these results with a closure of set gillnets in the Western Subdistrict south of Redoubt Point, and drift gillnets west of 152 degrees 25 minutes W. Long. if the initial rate of



escapement into the Crescent River was not adequate. This closure was effective on June 30 and was rescinded beginning July 14<sup>th</sup>. The final escapement into the Crescent River was very near the midpoint of the desired range.

The commercial fishery targeting Fish Creek stocks in Knik Arm was closed after two periods when escapements were less than what was needed to meet the escapement goal of 50,000. In addition the personal use dip net fishery was also curtailed. The final escapement into Fish Creek was 54,000, and the commercial harvest was only 14,000 sockeye. The escapement of sockeye into Packers Creek on Kalgin Island is still progressing but is currently at 20,000, the midpoint of the desired escapement range (15,000 to 25,000). The 1997 return to Packers Creek was weak but has allowed a modest harvest in the Kalgin Island Subdistrict and a modest amount for cost recovery by Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association.

Chum Salmon The 1997 harvest of 89,480 chum salmon was the lowest harvest on record. Management actions restricting the drift fleet and Northern District fisheries for Yentna sockeye are a contributing factor to this poor harvest, however since the flood of 1986 chum production in much of south central Alaska has been poor. In addition the chum salmon return to Chinitna Bay judged subjectively to be fairly strong was essentially unexploited as the local set gillnet fishery was inactive due to poor prices and no tendering service from any processor. Fishermen were paid \$.15 to \$.25 per pound for chum salmon, producing an exvessel value of \$ 120,000 or just 0.4% of the overall fishery value.

Pink Salmon The 1997 harvest of 70,500 pink salmon is about half the long term average for an odd year in Upper Cook Inlet. As with chum salmon management actions restricting the drift fleet and Northern District fisheries for Yentna sockeye are a contributing factor to this poor pink harvest. Pink salmon escapements are not monitored in Upper Cook Inlet however it appears that escapements to most river systems were normal for odd year run strengths. Prices paid for pink salmon were \$.06 to \$.09 per pound resulting in an exvessel value for this species of \$12,500.

Coho Salmon The 1997 coho harvest of 144,043 was about half of the average long term harvest in Upper Cook Inlet and the lowest harvest in 23 years. With few exceptions the coho harvest throughout Upper Cook Inlet was poor, period after period, with little improvement as the season progressed. Escapements into monitored systems were also lagging far behind desired levels. Coho run strength remained so weak that after the commercial period on August 4th the entire commercial fishery in all of Upper Cook Inlet was closed for the remainder of the 1997 season for coho conservation. In conjunction with this commercial closure bag limits in the recreational fishery were reduced from three fish to one fish with a prohibition on the use of bait.



Chinook Salmon The 1997 harvest of 13,013 chinook salmon was 3,000 fish below the long-term average and was valued at \$325,000. Consistent with the management strategy outlined for the Board, the directed chinook fishery in the Northern District was initially limited to a single period to aid in rebuilding a number of stocks where escapement levels had been below desired levels in recent years. As a result of escapement goals being achieved or exceeded in most of the monitored systems the last period in this fishery was reinstated along with reopening of sport fisheries in the affected areas. The resulting catch of 1,000 fish from the first period was by far the lowest in the twelve-year history of the fishery. Effort for the second period was much reduced and the harvest was just 50 fish.

The Central District east side set gillnet fishery harvest of 10,940 chinook salmon was slightly above the long-term average harvest. The sonar count into the Kenai River was 54,000 with an estimated 10,000 fish harvested in the recreational fishery leaving an escapement of 44,000, well in excess of the optimum goal of 22,300.

#### NEW MANAGEMENT APPROACH FOR THE 1998 KENAI RIVER KING SALMON FISHERY ANNOUNCED BY FISH AND GAME

The Division of Sport Fish of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game announced today that there would be a new approach to managing the 1998 Kenai River king salmon fishery. During 1998, the department will rely less heavily on sonar data and will utilize all measures of run strength including sport and commercial fishery performance. Changes in managing the fishery and estimating the number of early and late run king salmon to enter the river are required as there is uncertainty regarding the accuracy of the sonar. This uncertainty is greater during the late run than during the early run. The problem is the sonar can not perfectly distinguish between king salmon and sockeye salmon when large numbers of sockeye salmon are present.

Additionally, a test netting program will be established to enhance the ability to determine run strength. To establish the test gill net program will require the test netting crew be able to deploy their nets in a consistent manner in the same area from day to day. To accomplish this a one half to three quarter mile area in the lower river will be closed to all fishing from boats. Although the exact location of this area has not been selected, it will probably be in the vicinity of the king salmon sonar counter at Rivermile 3. Since the netting crew will be restricted to the closed area, consistency in sampling will be assured and competition for space between sampling crews and recreational anglers will not occur. This will benefit both the department's program and recreational anglers.

The Kenai River early and late run king salmon fisheries will continue to be managed to achieve the established spawning escapement goals. The king salmon fisheries will also be conservatively managed and anglers should expect the normal closures on Mondays in July.

The status of the fishery will continue to be available to anglers on a recorded message phone (262-9097). The recorded message will provide the sonar estimate, an evaluation of the other indicators used to manage the fishery and the department's best determination as to whether or not management actions in the fishery will occur in the immediate future.

### Habitat Protection Program: Large Parcels Status Report

February 5, 1998

The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council funds the acquisition of land to protect the habitat of resources and services injured by the spill. Since 1993, the Council has spent \$211.2 million to protect 454,000 acres of habitat. Most of the habitat that has been acquired is in large tracts (over 1,000 acres) that help protect ecosystems, but some is in smaller tracts with unique habitat or strategic value. This report describes the status of the Large Parcel Habitat Protection Program.

In 1992, the Restoration Office evaluated 16 large parcels that were imminently threatened by development. In March 1993, the Restoration Office contacted 90 owners of large parcels in the spill area and subsequently evaluated 850,000 acres nominated by their owners. Table 1 summarizes the status of activities related to the acquisition of these lands.

Acquisitions Completed. The Council has spent \$198.4 million to protect 450,276 acres of land in large parcels, including inholdings in Kachemak Bay State Park, land adjacent to Seal Bay/Tonki Cape on Afognak Island, commercial timber rights on land along Orca Narrows, a parcel on Shuyak Island, and lands formerly owned by Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc., Old Harbor Native Corporation, Koniag, Inc., Chenega Corporation and English Bay Corporation.

Acquisitions Pending. The English Bay Corporation has agreed to sell 32,537 acres of land within the Kenai Fjords National Park and the Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge. The first closing occurred on November 3, 1997, with the purchase of 29,636 acres. Additional closings will occur in the future for the remaining acreage.

Offers Accepted. The Tatitlek Corporation has agreed to sell interests in 69,814 acres of land and The Eyak Corporation has agreed to protect 75,425 acres of land. Both acquisitions are subject to a shareholder vote. Shareholder votes are expected in May for the Tatitlek Corporation and in July for the Eyak Corporation.

Negotiations. The Council has authorized an offer of up to \$70 million for the purchase of certain lands owned by Afognak Joint Venture; negotiations continue to further delineate the land to be acquired and the terms of the agreement. Negotiations are being held with Koniag, Inc., concerning acquisition of fee title to the 57,082 acres that are now under a limited conservation easement slated to expire in 2001. Port Graham Corporation has officially withdrawn from any further negotiations at this time.

# Habitat Protection Program: Small Parcels Status Report

February 5, 1998

The Exxon Valdez Trustee Council funds the acquisition of land to protect the habitat of resources and services injured by the spill. Since 1993, the Council has spent \$211.2 million to protect 454,000 acres of habitat. Most of the habitat that has been acquired is in large tracts (over 1,000 acres) that help protect ecosystems, but some is in smaller tracts with unique habitat or strategic value. This report describes the status of the Small Parcel Habitat Protection Program.

In response to public solicitations, 331 small parcels have been nominated. Council staff evaluate, score, and rank the parcels, taking into account the resource value of the parcel, adverse impacts from human activity, and potential benefits to management of public lands. The nomination period is open-ended. The Restoration Office continues to receive and evaluate nominations.

Acquisitions and Offers (Table 1). The Council has authorized offers to purchase 46 parcels. It has also offered to contribute \$4 million toward the purchase of lands owned by the Kenai Natives Association and up to \$1 million toward the purchase of key waterfront parcels forfeited to Kodiak Island Borough for tax delinquency. Thirty-two small parcels (3,560 acres) have thus far been acquired for \$12.9 million. Purchase agreements have been signed for three additional small parcels and the Kenai Natives Association package (\$4.5 million for 3,435 acres). Landowners are considering offers on ten additional small parcels. Appraisals of the Kodiak Island Borough Tax Parcels are being reviewed.

Parcels Under Consideration (Table 2) lists 8 parcels in which the Council has expressed interest, but has not yet authorized offers to purchase. In addition, as part of the offer to acquire a large parcel of land from the Tatitlek Corporation, the Council designated homesite lots in the Two Moon Bay and Snug Corner Cove subdivisions as parcels meriting special consideration under the small parcel process.

**Nominations (Table 3)** lists 33 recently nominated parcels on which the Council has taken no action. Three parcels were removed from this table because they were purchased with criminal settlement funds: the 27-acre Grubba Parcel (KEN 1059), the 160-acre Christiansen Parcel (KAP 1054) and the 63-acre Arneson Parcel (KAP 1065).

It is my understanding that the Finance Committee requested a five to six year history of project costs and additional information regarding the habitat protection program.

To answer the first request regarding a five to six year history of project costs, please find enclosed a copy of the Invitation to Submit Restoration Proposals for Federal Fiscal Year 1999. The cost of restoration projects undertaken since the civil settlement is located in Appendix B. This appendix presents actual and projected costs for projects that have been funded in the past. This table does not list new projects that may be proposed for Fiscal Year 1999. The appendix also includes an estimate of future costs of ongoing projects.

Regarding the habitat protection program, I have enclosed the most recent Large and Small Parcel Status Reports. These reports are routinely updated to summarize the status of activities related to the protection of habitat within the spill affected region.

### Habitat Protection Program: Large Parcels Status Report

February 5, 1998

The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council funds the acquisition of land to protect the habitat of resources and services injured by the spill. Since 1993, the Council has spent \$211.2 million to protect 454,000 acres of habitat. Most of the habitat that has been acquired is in large tracts (over 1,000 acres) that help protect ecosystems, but some is in smaller tracts with unique habitat or strategic value. This report describes the status of the Large Parcel Habitat Protection Program.

In 1992, the Restoration Office evaluated 16 large parcels that were imminently threatened by development. In March 1993, the Restoration Office contacted 90 owners of large parcels in the spill area and subsequently evaluated 850,000 acres nominated by their owners. Table 1 summarizes the status of activities related to the acquisition of these lands.

Acquisitions Completed. The Council has spent \$198.4 million to protect 450,276 acres of land in large parcels, including inholdings in Kachemak Bay State Park, land adjacent to Seal Bay/Tonki Cape on Afognak Island, commercial timber rights on land along Orca Narrows, a parcel on Shuyak Island, and lands formerly owned by Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc., Old Harbor Native Corporation, Koniag, Inc., Chenega Corporation and English Bay Corporation.

Acquisitions Pending. The English Bay Corporation has agreed to sell 32,537 acres of land within the Kenai Fjords National Park and the Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge. The first closing occurred on November 3, 1997, with the purchase of 29,636 acres. Additional closings will occur in the future for the remaining acreage.

Offers Accepted. The Tatitlek Corporation has agreed to sell interests in 69,814 acres of land and The Eyak Corporation has agreed to protect 75,425 acres of land. Both acquisitions are subject to a shareholder vote. Shareholder votes are expected in May for the Tatitlek Corporation and in July for the Eyak Corporation.

Negotiations. The Council has authorized an offer of up to \$70 million for the purchase of certain lands owned by Afognak Joint Venture; negotiations continue to further delineate the land to be acquired and the terms of the agreement. Negotiations are being held with Koniag, Inc., concerning acquisition of fee title to the 57,082 acres that are now under a limited conservation easement slated to expire in 2001. Port Graham Corporation has officially withdrawn from any further negotiations at this time.

#### Habitat Protection Program: Small Parcels Status Report

February 5, 1998

The Exxon Valdez Trustee Council funds the acquisition of land to protect the habitat of resources and services injured by the spill. Since 1993, the Council has spent \$211.2 million to protect 454,000 acres of habitat. Most of the habitat that has been acquired is in large tracts (over 1,000 acres) that help protect ecosystems, but some is in smaller tracts with unique habitat or strategic value. This report describes the status of the Small Parcel Habitat Protection Program.

In response to public solicitations, 331 small parcels have been nominated. Council staff evaluate, score, and rank the parcels, taking into account the resource value of the parcel, adverse impacts from human activity, and potential benefits to management of public lands. The nomination period is open-ended. The Restoration Office continues to receive and evaluate nominations.

Acquisitions and Offers (Table 1). The Council has authorized offers to purchase 46 parcels. It has also offered to contribute \$4 million toward the purchase of lands owned by the Kenai Natives Association and up to \$1 million toward the purchase of key waterfront parcels forfeited to Kodiak Island Borough for tax delinquency. Thirty-two small parcels (3,560 acres) have thus far been acquired for \$12.9 million. Purchase agreements have been signed for three additional small parcels and the Kenai Natives Association package (\$4.5 million for 3,435 acres). Landowners are considering offers on ten additional small parcels. Appraisals of the Kodiak Island Borough Tax Parcels are being reviewed.

Parcels Under Consideration (Table 2) lists 8 parcels in which the Council has expressed interest, but has not yet authorized offers to purchase. In addition, as part of the offer to acquire a large parcel of land from the Tatitlek Corporation, the Council designated homesite lots in the Two Moon Bay and Snug Corner Cove subdivisions as parcels meriting special consideration under the small parcel process.

Nominations (Table 3) lists 33 recently nominated parcels on which the Council has taken no action. Three parcels were removed from this table because they were purchased with criminal settlement funds: the 27-acre Grubba Parcel (KEN 1059), the 160-acre Christiansen Parcel (KAP 1054) and the 63-acre Arneson Parcel (KAP 1065).

On behalf of the Trustee Council, I am submitting responses to the general comments and the Court Registry Investment System - Joint Trust Account comments contained in the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, Internal Control and Operating Comments dated January 29, 1998. Specific agency comments are addressed separately by the affected agency.

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

Comment: Improve Contract Management

Response: We concur and will facilitate a special class for all agency liaisons and project managers. The class will include development of contracts and agreements to ensure that sufficient documentation is provided with each invoice, as well as invoice approval procedures.

Comment: Indirect Cost Allocation Guidance in the Operating Procedures

Response: We concur that the Operating Procedures are silent regarding whether the allowable general administration is limited to the total general administration budgeted for a project or is based on actual direct project costs and encumbrances/obligations. We will review the procedures with the Restoration Work Force and develop language to provide more explicit guidance regarding the recovery of general administration costs. Once developed, the language will be submitted to the Trustee Council for their consideration.

COURT REGISTRY INVESTMENT SYSTEM - JOINT TRUST ACCOUNT

Comment: Reserve Fund Registry Fees

Response: On behalf of the Trustee Council, the Alaska Department of Law and the United States Department of Justice submitted a letter to the Clerk of the Court on this issue February 5, 1998. A response from the Clerk of the Court has yet to be received. Comment: Reduce Registry Fee

Response: We concur. It is the Trustee Council's belief that the fees charged by the United States Court System are disproportionate to the costs incurred by the Court for this service. As such, we continue to explore other options.

Comment: Registry Fee Overcharge

Response: We concur and will contact the Clerk of the Court regarding the Registry fee overcharge.

**Comment: Improve Disbursement Process** 

Response: We concur. The time lag between when funds are liquidated in the Court Registry Investment System and again reinvested in the interest-bearing trust funds maintained by the State and Federal Governments is unacceptable. Clearly the current practice of issuing a warrant results in lost earnings on recoveries. In addition, since the registry funds are maintained within the Treasury General Account, it could be argued that the Federal Government has the use of the funds until the warrant is presented for payment. Wiring the registry funds directly to the interest-bearing trust accounts would ensure that interest accrued on recoveries is used for the joint purposes as outlined in the Memorandum of Agreement and Consent Decree.

- The court settlement with Exxon Corporation says that the Trustee Council may spend funds only to restore, replace, enhance, or acquire the equivalent of natural resources injured as a result of the oil spill or the reduced or lost services provided by such resources. Page 42 of the enclosed booklet lists the injured resources. Funds spent to restore subsistence, which is considered a "lost service", must aim to restore the resources used for subsistence.
- Pages 35-63 of the booklet list everything that should be included in a proposal. However, if you prefer, you may instead write a letter to the Trustee Council describing your proposal. In this letter, talk about (1) which injured resource the proposal would benefit, (2) what work or activity the proposal would involve, (3) who you would like to have perform that work, and (4) how much you think the proposal would cost. If necessary, Trustee Council staff will further develop the proposal so that its technical merit and cost can be fully evaluated.
- All proposals and letters must be received at the Trustees' Anchorage office by April 15, 1998.

The December 1991 payment includes interest accrued on the escrow account. The actual disbursements without interest was \$24.5 million to the United States, \$29 million to the State of Alaska and \$36.5 million to the Joint Trust Fund. The total interest earned on the escrow account was \$831,233 which was disbursed proportionately. This included \$226,280 to the United States, \$267,842 to the State of Alaska and \$337,111 to the Joint Trust Fund.

The September 1994 reimbursement to the United States included an over-payment of \$80,700 to NOAA. This over-payment is a direct result of final costs for damage assessment activities being lower than what was previously estimated. The funds were returned to the Joint Account by reducing the amount transferred to the United States in Court Request number 15.





In accordance with the Resolution of the Trustee Council passed November 8, 1996, this letter is to advise you that the terms and conditions set forth in that Resolution have been satisfied as outlined below for the purchase of the Virginia C. Abston Native allotment, KAP 1055:

- 1. The NEPA requirements were satisfied by the signing of a categorical exclusion for small parcel acquisition on March 30, 1994.
- 2. The contaminants survey for the parcel was completed on October 7, 1997.
- 3. The owner of the property, Virginia C. Abston, accepted our offer to purchase the property and signed the purchase agreement on November 12, 1997. The United States completed the execution for the Purchase Agreement on February 5, 1998, for the acquisition of Lots 1 and 2 of U.S. Survey 9402 for the appraised fair market value amount of \$281,300.00. The purchase agreement requires that no development or encumbrance take place prior to transfer of the property.
- 4. The preliminary title opinion was received from the Office of the Regional Solicitor on February 3, 1998.

# RESOLUTION OF THE EXXON VALDEZ OIL SPILL TRUSTEE COUNCIL REGARDING SMALL PARCEL KAP 1055

We, the undersigned, duly authorized members of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council ("Trustee Council"), after extensive review and after consideration of the views of the public, find as follows:

- 1.a. The Council at its meeting of October 15, 1996, authorized the appraisal by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) of parcel KAP 1055 as a parcel having special merit for land acquisition and habitat protection;
  - b. The owner of small parcel KAP 1055 has indicated an interest in selling said parcel;
- c. An appraisal of the parcel has been approved by the State and federal review appraisers;
- d. As set forth in Attachment A, if acquired, this small parcel has attributes which will restore, replace, enhance and rehabilitate injured natural resources and the services provided by those natural resources, including providing habitat for bird species for which significant injury resulting from the spill has been documented, providing key marine access for subsistence and recreational uses on the surrounding public lands, and making available to recreational users a public use cabin originally built by FWS on the property being acquired;
- 2. Existing laws and regulations, including but not limited to the Alaska Forest Practices Act, the Anadromous Fish Protection Act, the Clean Water Act, the Alaska Coastal Management Act, the Bald Eagle Protection Act and the Marine Mammals Protection Act, are intended, under normal circumstances, to protect resources from serious adverse affects from logging and other development activities. However, restoration, replacement and enhancement of resources

injured by the Exxon Valdez oil spill present a unique situation. Without passing on the adequacy or inadequacy of existing law and regulation to protect natural resources and services, biologists, scientists and other resource specialists agree that, in their best professional judgment, protection of habitat in the spill affected area to levels above and beyond that provided by existing law and regulation will have a beneficial effect on the recovery of injured resources and lost or diminished services provided by these resources;

- 3. There has been widespread public support for the protection of small parcels; and
- 4. The purchase of small parcels is an appropriate means to restore a portion of the injured resources and services in the oil spill area.

THEREFORE, we resolve to provide funds for FWS to offer to purchase and, if the offer is accepted, to purchase all the seller's rights and interests in small parcel KAP 1055; and to provide funds necessary for closing costs recommended by the Executive Director of the Trustee Council ("Executive Director") and approved by the Trustee Council and pursuant to the following conditions:

- (a) the amount of funds (hereinafter referred to as the "Purchase Price") to be provided by the Trustee Council to the United States shall be the final approved appraised value of the respective parcel which is \$281,300;
- (b) authorization for funding for the foregoing acquisition shall terminate if a purchase agreement is not executed by December 15, 1997;
- (c) disbursement of these funds by the District Court;
- (d) a satisfactory title search is completed by the acquiring government and the Seller is willing and able to convey fee simple title by warranty deed;

- (e) no timber harvesting, road development or any alteration of the land will be initiated on the land without the express agreement of the acquiring government prior to purchase;
  - (f) a satisfactory hazardous materials survey is completed;
  - (g) compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act; and
- (h) a conservation easement satisfactory to the U.S. Departments of Justice and the Interior and the Alaska Department of Law shall be conveyed by the seller to the non-acquiring government.

It is the intent of the Trustee Council that any facilities or other development on the foregoing small parcels after acquisition shall be of limited impact and in keeping with the goals of restoration and that there shall be no commercial timber harvest nor any other commercial use of the small parcels excepting such limited commercial use as may be consistent with applicable state or federal law and the goals of restoration to prespill conditions of any natural resource injured, lost, or destroyed as a result of the EVOS and the services provided by that resource or replacement or substitution for the injured, lost or destroyed resources and affected services as described in the Memorandum of Agreement and Consent Decree between the United States and the State of Alaska entered August 28, 1991 ("MOA") and the Restoration Plan as approved by the Trustee Council ("Restoration Plan").

By unanimous consent and upon execution of the purchase agreement and written notice from FWS and the Executive Director that the terms and conditions set forth herein and in the purchase agreements have been satisfied, we request the Alaska Department of Law and the Assistant Attorney General of the Environment and Natural Resources Division of the U.S. Department of Justice to petition the District Court for withdrawal of the Purchase Price and any such additional

costs related to closing as are recommended by the Executive Director and approved by the Trustee Council for KAP 1055 from the District Court Registry account established as a result of the Governments' settlement to be paid at the time of closing. These amounts represent the only amounts due under this resolution to the Sellers by the United States from the joint funds in the District Court Registry and no additional amounts or interest are herein authorized to be paid to the Sellers from such joint funds.


Chief Cove is well-known to Kodiak mariners as a sheltered anchorage just inside the entrance to Uyak and Spiridon Bays. The cove also offers protection from the open Shelikof Strait for marine birds and mammals. Chief Point and Chief Cove were among the few documented beaches on Kodiak Island hit with oil from the 1989 spill. A number of seabird carcasses were picked up on this site.

The Abston parcel has many features that complement the goals of the EVOS habitat restoration effort. The accessible shoreline and the nearshore waters in this area are used for subsistence purposes, primarily by residents of Larsen Bay. Residents harvest salmon, waterfowl, shellfish, Sitka black-tailed deer and pick berries on or adjacent to the parcel. The Abston property provides key marine access for subsistence and recreational uses on the surrounding public lands.

A documented cultural resource site is located near the parcel and evidence of historic and prehistoric use most likely exists on the parcel. However, the area has not been intensively explored for cultural sites. The Spiridon Peninsula has notable wilderness qualities and the Abston parcel is one of only a few private patents in the area. The Kodiak Refuge maintains a public use cabin on the parcel (the allotment was recently conveyed to Mrs. Abston). The cabin is especially popular during the fall deer season.

Two bald eagle nests are adjacent to the parcel and the birds forage along the entire shoreline. Pigeon guillemots, common murres, marbled murrelets and black oystercatchers are found in seasonal concentrations in Chief Cove, especially during rough weather. The intertidal beach supports extensive Pacific herring spawning that contributes to the commercial Spiridon Bay District harvest. River ofter use of the area is high with probable denning on the site.

The acquisition of KAP 1055 would greatly enhance the restoration investment already placed on Kodiak Island.





We, the undersigned, duly authorized members of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council ("Council"), after extensive review and after consideration of the views of the public, find as follows:

- 1. The owners of the Mud Bay small parcels, KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D, and the Beluga Slough small parcel, KEN 1061, have indicated an interest in selling said parcels and executed options to sell the parcels that are held by the Trust for Public Land (TPL);
- 2. An appraisal of the parcels commissioned by TPL has been approved by the State and federal review appraisers;
- 3. As set forth in Attachment A (Benefits Reports for KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D and KEN 1061), if acquired, these small parcels have attributes which will restore, replace, enhance and rehabilitate injured natural resources and the services provided by those natural resources, including important habitat for several species of fish and wildlife for which significant injury resulting from the spill has been documented. Acquisition of these small parcels will assure protection of 68.7 acres at Mud Bay and 38 acres at Beluga Slough. In addition City of Homer officials have indicated that the City appears receptive to a requirement of the acquisition that the City convey a conservation easement to the State of Alaska and the United States on additional parcels containing a total of approximately 59.52 acres adjacent to the Mud Bay small parcel as well as providing \$41,000 of the funds towards the purchase of the Beluga Slough small parcel.
- 4. Existing laws and regulations, including but not limited to the Alaska Forest Practices
  Act, the Alaska Anadromous Fish Protection Act, the Clean Water Act, the Alaska Coastal Management
  Act, the Bald Eagle Protection Act and the Marine Mammal Protection Act, are intended, under normal

circumstances, to protect resources from serious adverse effects from activities on the lands. However, restoration, replacement and enhancement of resources injured by *Exxon Valdez* oil spill ("EVOS") present a unique situation. Without passing judgment on the adequacy or inadequacy of existing law and regulations to protect resources, scientists and other resource specialists agree that, in their best professional judgment, protection of habitat in the spill area to levels above and beyond that provided by existing laws and regulations will have a beneficial effect on recovery of injured resources and lost or diminished services provided by these resources;

- 5. There has been widespread public support for the acquisition of lands within Alaska as well as on a national basis;
- 6. The purchase of the lands is an appropriate means to restore a portion of the injured resources and services in the oil spill area. Acquisition of these lands is consistent with the Final Restoration Plan;
- 7. The purchase of small parcels is an appropriate means to restore a portion of the injured resources and services in the oil spill area.

THEREFORE, we resolve to provide funds for the State of Alaska, to offer to purchase and, if the offer is accepted, to purchase on behalf of the City of Homer all the sellers' rights and interests in the small parcels KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D, and KEN 1061 and to provide funds necessary for closing costs recommended by the Executive Director of the Trustee Council ("Executive Director"), and approved by the Trustee Council and pursuant to the following conditions:

(a) the amount of funds (hereinafter referred to as the "Purchase Price") to be provided by the Trustee Council to the State of Alaska shall be \$422,100 for small parcels KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D and \$574,000 for small parcel KEN 1061 with additional funds necessary to complete the acquisition of KEN 1061 to be provided by the City of Homer;

- (b) authorization for funding for any acquisition described in the foregoing paragraph shall terminate if a purchase agreement is not executed by September 15, 1998;
  - (c) disbursement of these funds by the District Court;
- (d) a title search satisfactory to the State of Alaska and the United States is completed by the City of Homer or TPL, and the seller is willing and able to convey fee simple title by warranty deed;
- (e) no timber harvesting, road development or any alteration of the land will be initiated on the land without the express agreement of the State of Alaska and the United States prior to purchase;
- (f) a hazardous materials survey satisfactory to the State of Alaska and United States is completed;
  - (g) compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act;
- (h) the acquisition of small parcels KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D is authorized on the condition that all four subparcels A, B, C, and D be acquired;
- (i) a conservation easement on parcels KEN 1060 A, B, C, and D and KEN 1061 shall be conveyed to the United States and the State of Alaska and a warranty deed to the City of Homer, each of which must be satisfactory in form and substance to the United States and the State of Alaska Department of Law; and
- (j) a conservation easement, which must be satisfactory in form and substance to the United States and the State of Alaska, shall be conveyed to the United States and the State of Alaska on the following five parcels totalling approximately 59.52 acres and owned by the City of Homer:

It is the intent of the Trustee Council that the above referenced conservation easements will provide that any facilities or other development on the foregoing small parcels and adjacent lands owned by the City of Homer after acquisition shall be of limited impact and in keeping with the goals of restoration, that there shall be no commercial use except as may be consistent with applicable state or federal law and the goals of restoration to prespill conditions of any natural resource injured, lost, or destroyed as a result of the EVOS, and the services provided by that resource or replacement or substitution for the injured, lost or destroyed resources and affected services, as described in the Memorandum of Agreement and Consent Decree between the United States and the State of Alaska entered August 28, 1991 and the Restoration Plan as approved by the Trustee Council. The conservation easements may provide for a utility corridor adjacent to the roadway and the conservation easement for Lot 6-A may provide for parking.

Parcel Description: The subject properties collectively comprise a contiguous 68.7 acre tract largely comprised of low-lying intertidal flats and salt marsh on the eastern side of the spit along Kachemak Bay extending across the spit to include the outer beach berm. The Trust for Public Lands (TPL) has are option to purchase the nominated lands.

Restoration Benefits: Acquisition of the subject properties will provide protection for important intertidal resources. These estuarine wetland habitats extend from mid-intertidal to supratidal elevations and include muddy intertidal, mixed sand/gravel substrate, giving way to alkalai grass salt marsh and a gravel/cobble/driftwood beach along the western beach berm. On the bay side of the spit, the intertidal habitats are characterized by brackish waters, providing feeding habitat for juvenile salmon outmigrating from other parts of Kachemak Bay. The area is especially popular during the annual Homer Shorebird Festival which draws thousands of visitors from throughout the state.





Appraised Value: The appraised fair market value of the subject properties is \$615,000 as reflected in the approved fair market appraisal.

Proposed Management: It is intended that the property will be managed by the City of Homer in a manner consistent with the terms of a conservation easement to ensure protection of restoration values.

Public Comment: The Restoration Office has received an extraordinary amount of public comment in support of acquiring the Homer Spit/Beluga Slough nominations. Scores of letters from individuals as well as organizations both from within and outside the state have endorsed purchase of the nominated parcels. A large number of individuals have also indicated support through a petition.


