On March 23-26, 1999, ten years after the Exxon Valdez oil spill - the most destructive oil spill in the history of the United States, there will be a four-day symposium at the Egan Convention and Civic Center in Anchorage, Alaska (March 23-26, 1999). This conference is jointly being sponsored by the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council and the University of Alaska Sea Grant College program.

The purpose of this letter is to invite you to attend this conference to join with scientists, government agency representatives, community members and others as we examine the lessons learned from the Exxon Valdez oil spill. Legacy of an Oil Spill: Ten Years After Exxon Valdez will review the impact of the Exxon Valdez oil spill ten years. The presentations will address such questions as:

- Have the biological resources injured by the oil spill recovered?
- How have the civil settlement trust funds been used?
- What is the current state of oil spill prevention and response?

What are the human dimensions of the oil spill?

This first-day of the symposium will also include a keynote address by Dr. Jane Lubchenco, an internationally recognized marine biologist and past president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Ecological Society of America. Dr. Lubchenco will address "The State of the World's Oceans." The following three days of the symposium will be devoted to 150 oral and poster presentations covering a wide range of restoration and response topics. I am writing on behalf of the Secretary of Interior's Special Assistant to Alaska, the Alaska Director of the National Marine Fisheries Service, the Alaska Regional Director of the U.S. Forest Service, the State of Alaska's Attorney General, the Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, and the Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation, all trustees with the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council.

The purpose of this letter is to request that the registry fee associated with deposits in connection with the settlement reached in <u>United States v. Exxon Corp.</u>, No. A91-082 Civil (D. Alaska) be modified to accommodate the long-term nature of the settlement and the total monetary size of the settlement. It is further requested that the modified fee be retroactively applied.

Under terms of the settlement, Exxon agreed to pay \$900 million in eleven annual payments beginning in December 1991 and ending in September 2001. The settlement requires that the funds be used first to reimburse the federal and state governments for the costs of cleanup, damage assessment and litigation. The settlement also has a provision allowing the governments to claim up to an additional \$100 million to restore resources that suffered a substantial loss, the scope of which could not have been anticipated from data available at the time of the settlement.

Pursuant to the Second Amended Order for Deposit and Transfer of Settlement Proceeds, all funds paid to the Anchorage District Court are placed in the Court Registry Investment System (CRIS) administered through the United States District Court for the Southern District of Texas. Consistent with the Order, CRIS maintains

both the EXXON VALDEZ Oil Spill Settlement Account (Liquidity Account) and the Exxon Valdez Reserve Fund (Reserve). The Reserve Fund was specifically established because the Trustee Council believes its restoration activities will last well beyond the last payment from Exxon in 2001.

The first payment from Exxon was invested by CRIS on December 13, 1991. To date, a total of \$485,796,212 has been deposited in CRIS. Consistent with the settlement, Exxon will pay the remaining \$210,000,000 over the next three years. A summary of earnings and fees associated with the two accounts follows:

In recognition of the long-term nature of the settlement and the total monetary size of the settlement funds, it is requested that you exercise your authority provided by 56 Fed. Reg. 56356 dated November 4, 1991. Specifically, it is requested that when assessing registry fees, authority be given to consider the settlement as a whole, rather than a series of individual deposits.

Under this interpretation, the registry fee would decrease from 10% of the income on investments to 2%. The modified fee of 2% would ensure that the maximum amount of funds possible are available to the United States government and the State of Alaska for restoration of the natural resources injured by the oil spill. In addition, the modified fee of 2% is consistent with the Federal Register regarding the total minimum fee to be charged. I would also note the opinion of the United States General Accounting Office (GAO) concerning a reduction of the registry fee. The GAO recently completed a report entitled <u>Natural Resources Restoration</u>: Status of Payments and Use of *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Settlement Funds (August 1998). In the report, the GAO recommended that the Trustee Council minimize management fees. The GAO concurred with the Trustee Council's independent auditor in their conclusion that the fees charged by CRIS greatly exceed the costs incurred in administering the funds.

We are also requesting that the fee be modified retroactively. Thus, a total of \$1,715,681.85 would be returned to the Liquidity Account and \$21,156.56 would be returned to the Reserve (see Attachment A).

I look forward to discussing this with you further. I would hope that the request to modify the fee could be acted on quickly, especially given that the previous adjustment did not include lost earnings associated with an over-collection. If you have any

Dear Mr. Milby:

I am responding to your letter of December 1, 1998, regarding the return of *Exxon Valdez* settlement funds. I am pleased to learn that \$166,388.71 has been returned to the Liquidity Account. I have reviewed your worksheet and concur that the adjustment represents the net of excess registry fees collected from the Reserve Account investments minus the shortage of fees collected from the Liquidity Account investments. However, we are at a loss as to why we are not being credited with the income that would have been earned had the overcharge not occurred and would appreciate an explanation of the basis for that decision.

You stated in your letter that only the Director of the Administrative Office can reduce or modify the registry fee. At this time, I am working with the U.S. Department of Justice and the Alaska Department of Law to apply to the Director for a reduction in the fee. I would ask that the registry fee associated with the securities that matured November 15, 1998 continue to be invested in the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Settlement Account – *Exxon Valdez* Liquidity Account pending resolution of the fees issue.

Regarding the disposition of the prematurely collected fees, the Second Amended Order for Deposit and Transfer requires that all funds shall be held with the CRIS until further order of the Anchorage District Court. To that end, I would ask that the proceeds remain invested in the Liquidity Account.

On behalf of the Trustee Council, I am submitting responses to the general comments, the Court Registry Investment System - Joint Trust Account comment and the United States Department of the Interior, Natural Resources Damage Assessment and Restoration Fund comment contained in the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, Internal Control and Operating Comments dated February 1, 1999. Specific agency comments are addressed separately by the affected agency.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Comment: Improve Contract Management

Response: We concur and will continue to emphasize the importance of obtaining detail listings of expenditures along with progress narratives to support amounts claimed by vendors. However, it is important to acknowledge that the agencies have made substantial progress. The exceptions identified by the audit actually relate to contracts about to expire. In these cases, the contractors refused to amend the contracts to incorporate the additional reporting requirements.

Comment: Improve Review of Restoration Project Expenditure Activity

Response: We concur and will remind the Restoration Work Force that review of Project Expenditure Activity is an important function of the Project Managers.

Comment: Return of Lapsed Funds

Response: We concur and will work with the Department of the Interior, Office of the Secretary Budget Office to ensure more timely return of unexpended and unobligated project funding.

Comment: Indirect Cost Allocation Guidance in the Operating Procedures

Response: We concur that the Operating Procedures are silent regarding whether the allowable general administration is limited to the total general administration budgeted for a project or based on actual direct project costs and encumbrances/obligations. We will review the procedures with the Restoration Work Force and develop language to provide more explicit guidance regarding the recovery of general administration costs. Once developed, the language will be submitted to the Trustee Council for their consideration.

COURT REGISTRY INVESTMENT SYSTEM - JOINT TRUST ACCOUNT

Comment: Reduce Registry Fee

Response: We concur. It is the Trustee Council's belief that the fees charged by the United States Court System are disproportionate to the costs incurred by the Court for this service. As such, we continue to explore other options.

UNITED STATES, NATURAL RESOURCES DAMAGE ASSESSMENT AND RESTORATION FUND

Comment: Improve Controls over Cash Flow Plan

Response: The Carry Forward wording on the Fiscal Year 1999 Cash Flow Plan has already been changed from *Not Required* to *No Approved Authorization in FY 1999*. This will clarify that those Carry Forward funds are not approved for use in Fiscal Year 1999. It is noted that although the clarification may help technically, none of the funds were included as part of the current year's Cash Flow Plan. The funds were deducted from the total amount authorized prior to completion of the annual Cash Flow Plan and invested in the NRDAR Fund. Regarding the recommendation that the Cash Flow Plan be reviewed by a second party, the Department of the Interior, Office of the Secretary Budget Office will work with the Restoration Office to identify a second party to review subsequent Cash Flow Plans.

### **RE:** Special Cash Flow Explanation

This explanation has been developed for the special cash flow statement and supporting schedules dated February 23, 1999. The statement contains the following assumptions.

- The December 30, 1998 ending balance reconciles with the CRIS Liquidity Account balance for the same period.
- Fees are calculated at 10% of earnings for a total of \$378.7.
- The gross earnings are based on a 5% rate of return for a total of \$3,896.5.
- A total of \$1,775,434 of unreported interest associated with the state and federal trust funds has been included.
- The lapse associated with Fiscal Years 1999-2000 is based on the assumption that 3% will lapse annually. The total included is \$1,378.8.
- A total of \$4,830,174 of unreported lapse associated with prior years' work plans and other associated projects has been included.

On behalf of the Trustee Council, I am submitting responses to the general comments. the Court Registry Investment System - Joint Trust Account comment and the United States Department of the Interior, Natural Resources Damage Assessment and Restoration Fund comment contained in the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, Internal Control and Operating Comments dated February 1, 1999. Specific agency comments are addressed separately by the affected agency.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Comment: Improve Contract Management

Response: We concur and will continue to emphasize the importance of obtaining detail listings of expenditures along with progress narratives to support amounts claimed by vendors. However, it is important to acknowledge that the agencies have made substantial progress. The exceptions identified by the audit actually relate to contracts about to expire and thus new procedures were not implemented for these contracts.

Comment: Improve Review of Restoration Project Expenditure Activity

Response: We concur and will remind the Restoration Work Force that review of Project Expenditure Activity is an important function of the Project Managers.

Comment: Return of Lapsed Funds.

Response: We concur and will work with the Department of the Interior, Office of the Secretary Budget Office to ensure more timely return of unexpended and unobligated project funding.

Comment: Indirect Cost Allocation Guidance in the Operating Procedures

Response: We concur that the Operating Procedures are silent regarding whether the allowable general administration is limited to the total general administration budgeted

for a project or based on actual direct project costs and encumbrances/obligations. We will review the procedures with the Restoration Work Force and develop language to provide more explicit guidance regarding the recovery of general administration costs. Once developed, the language will be submitted to the Trustee Council for their consideration.

COURT REGISTRY INVESTMENT SYSTEM - JOINT TRUST ACCOUNT

Comment: Reduce Registry Fee

Response: We concur. It is the Trustee Council's belief that the fees charged by the United States Court System are disproportionate to the costs incurred by the Court for this service. As such, we continue to explore other options.

UNITED STATES, NATURAL RESOURCES DAMAGE ASSESSMENT AND RESTORATION FUND

Comment: Improve Controls over Cash Flow Plan

Response: The Carry Forward wording on the Fiscal Year 1999 Cash Flow Plan has already been changed from *Not Required* to *No Approved Authorization in FY 1999*. This will clarify that those Carry Forward funds are not approved for use in Fiscal Year 1999. It is noted that although the clarification may help technically, none of the funds were included as part of the current year's Cash Flow Plan. The funds were deducted from the total amount authorized prior to completion of the annual Cash Flow Plan and invested in the NRDAR Fund. Regarding the recommendation that the Cash Flow Plan be reviewed by a second party, the Department of the Interior, Office of the Secretary Budget Office will work with the Restoration Office to identify a second party to review subsequent Cash Flow Plans.

I have enclosed several items for you to look at as background for your visit to Alaska and presentation at the "Legacy of an Oil Spill: 10 Years After the Exxon Valdez" symposium on March 23rd. We can address the details of your travel schedule through e-mail exchanges, but we are excited about your visit and look forward to seeing you here. Things are shaping up nicely for the symposium, but the next few weeks will be very hectic for us in the Restoration Office.

The items enclosed are:

(1) Two fliers with information about the symposium and registration. These are for your information only; we will take care of your registration.

(2) The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Restoration Plan, which was adopted in November 1994 by the Trustee Council.

(3) The Trustee Council's 1998 Status Report. A 1999 version will be out in time for the symposium.

(4) February 1999 draft updates on the status of injured resources and services. These will give you our most current assessment on the status of injury and recovery 10 years after the oil spill. The injured resources update was adopted by the Trustee Council on February 9; the Trustees are scheduled to act on the services update on March 1.

(5) The Invitation to Submit Restoration Proposals for Federal Fiscal Year 2000. This will give you an overview of the current (FY 99) science program and what is envisioned in FY 2000.

(6) A one-page summary of what we call GEM, the Gulf Ecosystem Monitoring program. In capsule form, this presents a vision for a long-term ecological research and monitoring program in the northern Gulf of Alaska. The Trustee Council is actively considering something along these lines and is tentatively scheduled on March 1 to make a decision about how much money to allocate for long-term science. The amount may be on the order of \$100 million.

(7) The latest version of the peer-reviewed publications (**not** including agency gray literature) presenting results of research sponsored by the Trustee Council. This list will soon include more than 300 citations, and it should give you a sense of the nature and scope of the research that is being carried out.

(8) A description of the scientific peer review process used by the Trustee Council.

We have advertised your talk as "The State of the World's Oceans," so you don't need to address the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill per se. It would be good, however, if you can call attention to the Trustee Council's commitment for long-term research and monitoring and how the information from such efforts can be used to foster the sustained use and conservation of marine ecological resources. In this regard, we will let you know what comes out of the Trustee Council meeting on March 1.

We are trying not to overwhelm you with materials about the oil spill, but can supply additional materials if there is something else you need. The Exxon Valdez restoration program is large and at times controversial, and there are many interesting and sometimes conflicting views about this program. If you have questions or want to discuss any aspect further, please give me a call. We also are trying to arrange dinner on Monday evening, March 22, with some of our outside peer reviewers, such as Pete Peterson and Robert Spies.

Thank you, and I look forward to seeing you in late March.



- Please call Hugh Short or me if you have any questions about the proposal process or want help in putting together a proposal. Our phone number is 907-278-8012, or 1-800-478-7745 toll free.
- The court settlement with Exxon Corporation says that the Trustee Council may spend funds only to restore, replace, enhance, or acquire the equivalent of natural resources injured as a result of the oil spill or the reduced or lost services provided by such resources. Page 46 of the enclosed booklet lists the injured resources. Funds spent to restore subsistence, which is considered a "lost service", must aim to restore the resources used for subsistence.
  - Pages 39-68 of the booklet list everything that should be included in a proposal. However, if you prefer, you may instead write a letter to the Trustee Council describing your proposal. In this letter, talk about (1) which injured resource the proposal would benefit, (2) what work or activity the proposal would involve, (3) who you would like to have perform that work, and (4) how much you think the proposal would cost. If necessary, Trustee Council staff will further develop the proposal so that its technical merit and cost can be fully evaluated.
    - All proposals and letters must be received at the Trustees' Anchorage office by <u>April 15, 1999</u>.

Thank you for your faxed letter dated February 4, 1999. The Trustee Council took final action on proposed updates to its List of Injured Resources and Services on February 9, and your letter was distributed to and discussed with the Trustees at that meeting. You did a good job of describing how little is known about the effects of the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill on loons and the uncertainties associated with interpreting loon data obtained via Fish and Wildlife Service marine bird boat surveys (Project \159). The Trustee Council, nonetheless, chose to place the common loon in the "not recovering" category, rather than leave this species in the "recovery unknown" category.

The Fish and Wildlife Service boat surveys are the primary source of information on the injury and recovery status of a whole suite of coastal and marine birds. Since the surveys are designed to obtain data on multiple species, the results are of varying quality with respect to any one species. For example, the data on loons are not as useful as are the data on pigeon guillemots, which are easily identified and which nest along Prince William Sound shorelines.

The Trustee Council ideally would have information on the relationships between the loons actually killed by the spill and the birds monitored during March and July boat surveys, as well as information on the breeding grounds and productivity of these populations. Absent this information, however, we still think that the boat survey data provide **some** insight into injury to and recovery from the oil spill.

Here are several points for your consideration:

(1) The Trustee Council added the common loon to the injured resources list in 1996. The nearly 400 oiled loon carcasses found after the spill were deemed to represent a significant injury relative to what are assumed to be small spill-area populations for four loon species. Since more

than 50% of the carcasses were identified as common loons, this species was singled out, but we view the common loon as representative of injury to all loons.

(2) Because of the environmental "regime" shift that apparently occurred in the late 1970s, we do not find that the 1972-73 data are a very meaningful point of reference for postspill surveys. For July surveys, the more appropriate prespill data are from 1984. Comparing July 1984 data separately with July 1989, 1990, and 1991 surveys, Klosiewski and Laing (1994) found fewer loons (*Gavia* spp.) than expected in the oiled zone given trends in the unoiled zone of the same survey area for 1991.

(3) We have never made or stated any assumption about the relationship of the wintering, migrant, and nonbreeding populations sampled in March and July surveys to any particular breeding populations.

(4) Although we cannot confirm the assumption that the populations sampled on the boat surveys in March and July are the same each year, nor that these populations are the same as those injured by the spill itself, as more surveys are conducted, we have more confidence that the data <sup>3</sup> provide at least some information about oil-spill injury and recovery.

(5) Based on trends in oiled versus unoiled areas from 1989-1996 surveys, Agler and Kendall (1997) concluded that there was no significant evidence of recovery for loons in either March or July surveys through 1996.

(6) With reference to your point no. 3, we don't find the comparison to 1972-73 data meaningful, and the post-spill estimates are mixed (Agler and Kendall 1997). Sound-wide estimates for common loons are higher in March 1996 than in March 1990, but lower in July 1996 than in July 1989. For total loons, the March 1996 estimate is higher than the March 1990 estimate, but remains about the same for July 1989 and July 1996. In all cases, the confidence intervals on these estimates are very high, making interpretation of trends difficult. It also is important to note that these estimates are for the entire Prince William Sound, and do not distinguish between populations in oiled and unoiled areas. As you will see in item number 8 below, trends in the oiled and unoiled areas are not the same.

(7) Surveys were conducted again in March and July 1998. A draft report is due in mid-April, but a preliminary analysis by Brian Lance and David Irons (pers. com.) continues to indicate that there is no statistically significant evidence of recovery, either for common loons or total loons.

(8) Finally, in a new analysis of July 1984 data versus July 1990-98 boat survey data, Irons et al. (ms. submitted and in review, Condor) found that loons (all spp.) show a pattern of increasing

densities in unoiled parts of the sound and essentially stable densities in oiled parts of the sound. This disparity is consistent with possible lack of recovery from an oil-spill effect.

In sum, it would be great to know more than we do about injury to and recovery of loons following the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill. Unfortunately, we have to work with what limited data are available. On the basis of the information above, the Trustee Council has concluded that common loons (or loons, in general) have shown "little or no clear improvement" since the oil-spill injuries occurred. I hope that this letter at least clarifies the basis for the Trustee Council's judgment.

This letter concerns a proposal from Craig Matkin of the North Gulf Oceanic Society to Wildlife Forever for matching funds for studying and monitoring killer whales in Prince William Sound and the adjacent Kenai Fjords. I am writing in support of Mr. Matkin's request for \$16,170 in matching funds in 1999.

The state-federal *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council administers funds obtained from an out-of-court settlement with Exxon for the purpose of restoring natural resources injured by the oil spill. The killer whale was one of 28 fish and wildlife species and other natural resources deemed by the Trustee Council to have been significantly injured by the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill in 1989. Up to 22 individuals from what is known as the AB pod, one of several "resident" pods based in Prince William Sound, may have been lost due to the spill. For several years following the spill, it appeared that there was little or no prospect of recovery for the AB pod. Recent information suggests that the pod is finally growing, but until this trend is clearly sustained over several years, the Trustee Council continues to classify the killer whale as "not recovering" from the effects of the spill. In addition, there are concerns about the long-term conservation status of "transient" whales also using the area, since they carry high contaminant levels and mostly prey on marine mammals (e.g., harbor seals and Steller sea lions), which are themselves declining.

Since the settlement in 1991, the Trustee Council has invested more than \$800,000 on killer whale research. Nearly all of this work has been carried out by the North Gulf Oceanic Society. Mr. Matkin and his associates are highly capable, cost-effective researchers, who consistently work hard and provide a high return on the funds invested by the Trustee Council. Their photobased monitoring program has been the only means to track recovery of killer whales injured by

the spill, and the information obtained in regard to genetic relationships, diet, movements, and contaminants will prove invaluable for the long-term conservation of Gulf of Alaska killer whales. Mr. Matkin has done a good job of getting his findings into the peer-reviewed scientific literature, and, in fact, the Trustee Council subjects his project proposals and reports to rigorous independent peer review before making decisions to provide funds or accept reports.

Although the Trustee Council has made a major investment in killer whale research and monitoring and will likely continue to do so in at least the near-term future, the funds available for the oil-spill restoration program are dwindling. We are strongly encouraging our principal investigators, such as Mr. Matkin, to obtain funds from sources other than the Trustee Council to supplement their work. In the long run, we believe that projects that obtain funds from several sources will have a greater impact and have a greater prospect of continued, strategic support by the Trustee Council.

I encourage your favorable consideration of the request for \$16,170 from Mr. Matkin and the North Gulf Oceanic Society. Their work is productive and cost effective and will benefit the conservation of killer whales in the Gulf of Alaska. 


