Dear Mr. Milby:

It was a pleasure speaking with you last week. I found our conversation very informative. I received the Court Registry Investment System Operating Procedures Manual and find it to be a most useful document. Thank you.

I relayed our conversation to the Executive Director and he is very interested in pursuing the establishment of a long term reserve account within the Court Registry. Annual payments from Exxon will end in September 2001 and the reserve account will provide a location to hold funds for restoration activities after that last payment. Approximately \$12 million per year (FY 1994 throught FY 2002), for a total of \$108 million plus interest, would be deposited into the reserve. Allocation of the reserve funds to specific activities will be made by the Trustee Council at a later date. The Trustee Council authorized payment of \$12 million into a reserve on January 31, 1994.

A Trustee Council meeting has been scheduled on or about August 29 and we would like you to attend, at our expense, if your schedule permits. The discussion of investment strategies, the reserve account and status of funds in the Court Registry account is of great interest to the Trustee Council.

RE:	Appraisal Authorization	

You are hereby authorized to undertake an appraisal for certain lands oned by the Afognak Joint Venture ("AJV"). The AJV consents to the appraisal of the parcels designated as AJV O1a, AJV O1(b), AJV O3a, and AJV O3b.

Please refer to the Memorandum of Understanding signed by the respective agencies and utilize the existing contract. An individual work order should be prepared for each ownership explicitly outlining the appraisal assignment. Before issuing the work order, a definition of rights to be appraised, a legal description, and a date for submission of the report should be prepared for the appraiser and Contracting Officer's Representative. This should be accomplished in cooperation with Negotiators. The landowner should be advised in writing that the appraisal is, with their permission, proceeding.

The appraisal should establish the base line (fee) value of each parcel, recognizing that the sellers are offering substantially less than fee interest for most parcels. Actual interests to be acquired, if any, have not yet been agreed upon. However, it is anticipated that parcel by parcel interests will be available for incorporation into the final appraisal.

Re: Afognak Joint Venture Negotiations

Dear Alex:

This will confirm our discussions regarding the request of the negotiating team to conduct an appraisal of certain lands owned by the Afognak Joint Venture ("AJV") in conjunction with their possible acquisition by the Trustee Council. The AJV consents to the appraisal of the parcels designated as AJV Ola, AJV Ol(b), AJV O3a, and AJV O3b.

As we have discussed in the past, the AJV is not interested in selling just the parcels which you have designated. Any sale of some or all of such parcels would be conditioned upon the Council also acquiring some of the less timbered lands held by the AJV. In order to facilitate those discussions, it would be appropriate for the Council to also appraise, at the same time, the other AJV lands in order that the appraisal information would be available during our further discussions. Thus, the AJV's consent to the appraisal of the aforementioned parcels is conditional upon the performance of an appraisal of parcels AJV 04, AJV 05 and AJV 06 (as previously designated by the Restoration Team) and the lands described in Exhibit A to this letter. By the Consenting to such appraisal, the AJV is not agreeing that the appraisal process which the Council has determined it will follow, will, in fact accurately determine the fair market value of its lands. As we have discussed, the AJV has conducted its own valuation based upon its expected return from the timber and obviously will not be interested in selling its lands for less.

RE: Investment of Funds Held in Court Registry

I spoke with Michael Milby, Clerk of the Court, United States District Court, regarding settlement funds held by the Court. The following information was provided:

The Federal court system has a Court Registry Investment System which is joined by individual courts throughout the country by court order. Funds are pooled and the initial fund established is known as a "liquidity fund". This type of fund is established when money comes in but it is unknown how long the funds will remain (no known disbursement horizon). The liquidity aspect allows them to buy big blocks of securities with essentially no risk.

The liquidity fund is set up to provide weekly liquidity similar to a money market fund. Funds are invested in government securities (at present only treasury securities) and purchased through secondary markets. The Court has a clearing account at the Federal Reserve and all transactions are cleared through this account. At no time are any of the funds ever held at a bank.

The investment strategy is very conservative - only Treasury securities. Presently, the Court buys out to about 100 days. Funds are receiving an 'A' market return but very liquid. Our funds are currently sitting in a pool of approximately \$650-\$700 million funds with several thousand other court cases.

The Court is currently in the process of creating a longer term fund with a staggered portfolio. This would be a 3-4 year fund with staggered maturity dates and quarterly liquidity. Cash flow would be managed to allow quarterly liquidations if needed. This would be a pooled fund. Our funds would be included in both the liquid and longer term fund and the two funds would be linked together. They are currently working on setting up the accounting system and expect to have this fund established in the next 90-100

days.

We discussed setting up a reserve. He said this was a definite possibility and has been done before. A reserve could be handled in one of two ways unique or pooled. Typically, for a large dollar amount a unique reserve is set up. A pool is established for smaller dollar amounts. If we are looking at setting aside approximately \$12 million a year it would probably be pooled, however, if there are circumstances related to our funds that would require a unique reserve then that would still be a possibility. Regardless of whether we move forward with a reserve it is intended that our funds would be part of the longer term fund.

He will mail us a manual for the Court Registry Investment System. The manual is technical but will provide us information on how the funds flow and what the investment strategies are.

He looks forward to establishing a relationship with us and is more than willing to speak with you at any time.

- 2. Draft Environmental Impact Statement: Restoration Plan

The DEIS for the <u>Draft Restoration Plan</u> will go out for public review and comment from June 18 to August 1. A series of public meetings will be held during this time, which includes June 27 - Anchorage, June 29 - Seward, July 1 - Homer, July 5 - Kodiak, July 7 - Cordova, and July 19 - Valdez.

Following the public comment period, the Trustees must choose a Final Alternative for the Final Environmental Impact Statement. This may be the Preferred Alternative in the Draft EIS, or it could be some modification based on Trustee Council response to the public comment received. In any event, this decision must be made by mid-August. Following that decision, the Final EIS gets written, printed and becomes available for public review on or before September 28. There follows a 30-day appeal period for the FEIS. The Record of Decision will be ready to be signed by October 28 by all three federal secretaries or as required. Although there was some question about the timing of the appeal period, this schedule has been approved. Trustee Council

3. Final Restoration Plan

Concurrent with the writing of the Final Environmental Impact Statement is the need to write the Final Restoration Plan. Since the time the original <u>Draft Restoration Plan</u> was written in November, 1993, much has occurred, including the hiring of an Executive Director, emphasis by the Council on an Ecosystem approach, and the need for a management-by-objective structure, including a science program. Additionally, the Trustee Council has consistently expressed the importance of public participation and the need for information and actions to be clearly communicated.

Therefore, as we have discussed during the past Council meetings, staff have reorganized the draft restoration plan by including goals, clear objectives and strategies. These have been refined and further articulated during a series of workshops held in January, March and April which included scientists, researchers, agency representatives, Public Advisory Group members, and other representatives of the general public. The product is what some have been referring to as the Implementation Management Structure including a science and monitoring program. Therefore, to achieve our goal of simplicity and clarity we will include this in the <u>Draft Restoration Plan</u>, in addition to responding to public comments during the review phase of the DEIS. It looks as though we will be able to develop a <u>Final Restoration Plan</u> during August as planned. A release of the FEIS in September is critical to meet the timeline for the October Record of Decision and adoption of the final restoration plan.

I hope this clarifies the various schedules that we are following and more closely accomodates your respective plans. Please, give me a call if you have questions or recommendations for further changes.

Environmental Problem Solvers Receive Pew Conservation Scholars Award

Ten conservation scientists have been selected as 1994 Scholars in Conservation and the Environment and will receive \$150,000 each over the next three years. The awards, given annually by the Pew Scholars Program in Conservation and the Environment, honor individuals whose careers reflect a commitment to both scholarship and environmental action.

"The 1994 Scholars have outstanding records in scholarship and conservation," said James E. Crowfoot, director of the Pew Scholars Program and president of Antioch College. "With the Pew awards these 10 individuals will be undertaking exciting new projects to advance the conservation of biological diversity. We look forward to the outcomes of their work, to their future collaborations with other Pew Scholars and their leadership in meeting the challenges of conservation."

The grant recipients include a plant ecologist devoted to the conservation and management of plant biodiversity in the species-rich Cape Floristic Region of South Africa, an internationally renowned conservation biologist whose work has revealed a much higher rate of tropical deforestation than generally accepted, and an interdisciplinary scientist who promotes the conservation of biodiversity in the developing world through the improved management of intensive agriculture.

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"It is a privilege to be able to support the fine work of these 10 scholars," said Rebecca W. Rimel, president of The Pew Charitable Trusts. "Not only are they making significant contributions to understanding the origins of many of our environmental problems, they are committed to finding ways to solve them. Through their example, they are creating a new model for the field--that of scientist as active problem solver."

The Pew Scholars Program requires that all candidates be nominated by the heads of their institutions or by one of the Program's independent nominators. From a pool of approximately 70 nominees, 10 scholars are selected each year by a national advisory committee comprised of prominent leaders in the conservation community.

The Pew Scholars Program in Conservation and the Environment was established in 1988 by the Pew Charitable Trusts, one of the nation's largest environmental grantmakers. The Program was designed to encourage and support early to mid-career conservation scientists who are applying themselves to the conservation of biological diversity and related environmental issues. This program identifies outstanding scientists in a variety of environmentally oriented disciplines whose work combines scholarship with conservation action. The Program began making appointments in 1990 and the 10 Scholars selected for the 1994 round of awards comprise the fifth group of Pew Conservation Scholars.

The Pew Charitable Trusts, a national and international philanthropy with a special commitment to Philadelphia, support nonprofit activities in the areas of culture, education, the environment, health and human services, public policy and religion. Through their grantmaking, the Trusts seek to encourage individual development and personal achievement, cross-disciplinary problem solving, and innovative, practical approaches to meet the changing needs of a global community. The Pew Scholars Program in Conservation and the Environment is one of several scholars programs established by the Trusts, reflecting their interest in supporting exemplary individuals in the fields of art, religion, Eastern and Central European public policy, biomedical science, and the environment.

Marcus Colchester received a Ph.D. in Social Anthropology from Oxford University in 1982. He is currently the Director of the Forest Peoples Programme at the World Rainforest Movement in England. Mark's primary work has been securing indigenous peoples' rights to their lands and livelihoods by pressing for policy change at the national and international levels. Mark plans to use his Pew award to research, document, and analyze the problem of balancing indigenous communities, which are undergoing rapid social and economic change, with their environment. He aims to develop a practical problem solving approach to help indigenous communities evaluate the environmental implications of their changing livelihoods and take appropriate institutional measures to establish control.

Richard Cowling received a Ph.D. in Plant Ecology from the University of Cape Town (South Africa) in 1983. He is currently a Professor in the Institute for Plant Conservation at the University of Cape Town. Richard has devoted a majority of his efforts over the last decade to the conservation and management of plant biodiversity in the species-rich Cape Floristic Region of South Africa. He views the Pew award as a unique opportunity to develop an extension program for communicating to all sectors of society the economic and cultural benefits of the preservation and sustainable use of the extraordinarily diverse flora of the Cape Floristic Region.

Gretchen Daily received a Ph.D. in Biological Sciences from Stanford University in 1992. She is currently a Postdoctoral Fellow in the Energy and Resources Group at the University of California at Berkeley, where she is striving to enhance her proficiency as an interdisciplinary scientist to more effectively aid in the transformation of global society into a sustainable system. The Pew award will provide Gretchen with the resources and visibility needed for launching a major, longterm research effort concentrated on the relationship between biodiversity and ecosystem function. She believes that establishing the value of biodiversity is critical to its preservation.

Thomas Goreau received a Ph.D. in Biogeochemistry from Harvard University in 1981. He is currently the President of the Global Coral Reef Alliance, where he promotes coral reef protection by documenting stresses to reef ecosystems, identifying the causes of these stresses, and proposing strategies to restore these species-rich and highly sensitive ecosystems. Thomas intends to use the Pew award for establishing grass-roots environmental management councils in the important reef areas of the Caribbean. He plans on developing a bottom-up community management approach that confronts the deterioration of coral reef systems and promotes their official designation as marine protected areas.

Norman Myers received a Ph.D. in Conservation and Development from the University of California at Berkeley in 1973. He is a self-employed independent scientist and consultant whose pioneering work in the early 1970s established the true rate of species extinction worldwide to be one hundred times greater than generally accepted. Norman has focused a major portion of his work during the last decade on the rate of tropical rainforest deforestation, demonstrating that it continues to be much higher than previously speculated. He plans to use his Pew award to investigate the issue of synergistic compounding of biodiversity problems and the role of the "shifted cultivator" or displaced peasant in tropical deforestation.

Rosamond Naylor received a Ph.D. in Applied Economics from Stanford University in 1989. She is currently a Fellow in the Institute for International Studies at Stanford University, where she initiated an interdisciplinary research program that investigates biodiversity conservation in the developing world through improved management of intensive agriculture. She plans to use her Pew award to develop a research, training, and field outreach program that focuses specifically on the interactions between agricultural production and the conservation of biological diversity in Mexico and Southeast Asia.

Daniel Nepstad received a Ph.D. in Forest Ecology from Yale University in 1989. He is currently an Assistant Scientist at Woods Hole Research Center, where he works to empower the civil society of Amazonia to understand, defend, and sustainably manage their natural resources. His longterm goal is to build a collaborative program with Amazonian institutions to help organizations of farmers and forest residents advance proposals of sustainable forest utilization and management. Daniel plans to use his Pew award to understand and reduce the incidence of fire in the Amazonian region and to develop a fire prevention course and curriculum for agricultural communities.

David Norton received a Ph.D. in Zoophysiology from the University of Alaska in 1973. He is currently an Associate Professor of Natural Sciences at Arctic Sivunmun Ilisagvik College, where he nurtures student interest in science and environment. David has recently focused his attention on developing Natural Science courses into curricular packages tailored to meet the diverse needs of rural Alaska college students. He plans to use his Pew sward to develop multidisciplinary museology courses and training programs for rural North American Native students. He hopes to promote their movement into professional careers that will serve the goals of conserving biological diversity and celebrating their cultural heritage.

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Charles Peterson received a Ph.D. in Biology from the University of California at Santa Barbara in 1972. He is currently a Professor of Marine Sciences at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Charles made a major contribution to environmental science as Chair of the Global Ocean Ecosystems Dynamics program that addressed how global change may be expected to affect marine ecosystems. He plans to use his Pew award to develop environmental regulations for coastal water quality and estuarine fisheries management designed to evaluate the consequences of alternative human activities on the health and production of two critical estuarine habitats, seagrass beds and oyster reefs.

Alexey Yablokov received a Ph.D. in Population Biology from the Soviet Union Academy of Sciences in 1965. He is currently a Senior Scientist at the Koltzoff Institute of Developmental Biology in Russia, and has worked as the top environmental policy advisor in both the Gorbachev and Yeltsin administrations. Alexey pioneered the application of "phenetic" marks (the smallest differences in anatomical structures, i.e., the difference in ear shape on the two sides of a person) to the detection of animal population structure and environmental stress. He plans to use his Pew award to develop a quick, cheap, non-invasive method which can be used for early detection of environmental contamination and the study of natural populations.

You are hereby authorized to undertake an appraisal for the Eyak Corporation lands as identified in the Eyak and Sherstone Comprehensive Habitat Protection proposal of May 24, 1994.

Please refer to the Memorandum of Understanding signed by the respective agencies and utilize the existing contract. An individual work order should be prepared for each ownership explicitly outlining the appraisal assignment. Before issuing the work order, a definition of rights to be appraised, a legal description, and a date for submission of the report should be prepared for the appraiser and Contracting Officer's Representative. This should be accomplished in cooperation with Negotiators. The landowner should be advised in writing that the appraisal is, with their permission, proceeding.

The appraisal should establish the base line (fee) value of each parcel, recognizing that the sellers are offering substantially less than fee interest for most parcels. Actual interests to be acquired, if any, have not yet been agreed upon. However, it is anticipated that parcel by parcel interests will be available for incorporation into the final appraisal.

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POLICY STATEMENT

Acquisition of less than fee simple title

Fee simple title acquisitions have the potential to provide the highest level of habitat protection. However, in some cases, restoration of injured resources and services can be achieved through acquisition of less than a fee simple title interest in the land. When adequate to meet restoration objectives, this strategy can have several advantages. First, it may reduce the cost of the Second, lands with high restoration potential for protection. which fee simple title is not for sale may be available for acquisition of less than fee simple. Third, it may allow the owner of the residual fee interest to pursue economic, cultural and other activities on the lands that are compatible with restoration objectives.

The density of commercial or other development has the potential to reduce the value for restoration purposes of the rights acquired in a less than fee simple transaction. The rights reserved to the seller, including the extent of development permitted, if any, must be delineated so as to preserve the value of the land for restoration purposes. The reserved rights may differ from parcel to parcel. In addition to density, related environmental issues such as shoreline setbacks, water and sewage and stream buffers should be addressed to ensure that the rights being acquired will, in fact, provide the level of protection needed to facilitate realization of the restoration objectives.

Acquisition of commercial timber rights

Acquisitions involving commercial timber rights, where the retained fee interests include the right of the fee owner to pursue development and other activities other than commercial timber harvest, should address the extent of timber removal permitted incidental to the fee owner's exercise of retained rights. The amount of incidental timber removal to be allowed must not significantly reduce the value of acquiring the timber rights for restoration purposes. Factors to be considered are the extent of buffers for sensitive areas such as streams and shorelines, limitations on the amount of canopy removal and limitations on the clearing or substantial clearing of areas. Any revenue in access of removal costs received from the sale of commercial timber removed incident to the exercise of retained rights should be paid to the managing agency.

Because of differing restoration needs for various parcels the limitations on incidental timber removal may differ for different parcels. Nevertheless, as a guideline, incidental timber removal should be limited to no more than five percent of the basal area1 of each parcel² to be acquired. Incidental timber removal of up to 25 percent of the basal area of any portion of the parcel to be developed may be allowed as long as the development does not exceed 100 acres in size and no more than five percent of the basal area of the entire parcel is removed. In addition to the basal area limitations, the size and juxtaposition of discrete blocks of timber harvested incidental to the fee owner's exercise of retained rights must be limited.³ The size of such discrete blocks should be limited to no more than one, five acre block per one sixteenth section. The blocks should not be contiguous. Incidental timber removal must be conducted so that there is not a disproportionate number of larger trees removed. In addition no timber removal should be permitted within 300 feet of anadromous streams, streams that support nesting of injured species, mean high water of salt water bodies, or fish bearing fresh water body shorelines except as may be specifically agreed upon after consideration of the restoration impact of the proposed removal.

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³ "Discrete blocks" are areas which are clearcut or more than 75 percent of the basal area is removed.

¹ Basal area is a per acre measure of the cross sectional area at chest height occupied by the standing timber.

² A "parcel" is a discrete piece of land as identified and evaluated through the Comprehensive Habitat Protection process and identified in that process, e.g., EYA1, KON4.

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PUBLIC ACCESS

All acquisitions shall be for the purpose of restoring to their pre-spill condition natural resources injured, lost, or destroyed as a result of the oil spill and the services provided by those resources. Covenants governing public access shall be sought when the interest to be acquired is less than fee simple but the price to be paid for the interest is a substantial portion of the value of fee simple and acquisition of public access rights will serve to restore services lost or diminished as a result of the oil spill.

The Nature of Public Access

<u>Scope:</u> Public access is access by the public to lands in which the interests are acquired for purposes of subsistence use and recreation, including among other activities, sport hunting and fishing, hiking and camping.

Limitations on public access: Public access should not be unreasonably restricted or denied for personal, non-commercial use of lands which are "unimproved" as that term is used in AS 09.45.795, so long as AS 09.45.795, or a substantially similar statute, continues in effect. Public access for personal, non-commercial use on unimproved lands may be reasonably restricted or denied as follows:

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(i) through reasonable restrictions by the seller on conditions of use such as requirements for permits, size of group activities allowed, length of stay and other conditions of occupancy;

(ii) where necessary for the seller to exercise its reasonable business interests, such as in connection with a lodge site;

(iii) where necessary to protect specific areas of cultural or historical significance;

(iv) where the government agency which has acquired the interest in land (the "buyer") determines that continued public use of the land will diminish the ability of the land to aid in the restoration of injured natural resources to the degree that restriction or denial of further public access is appropriate.

(v) where the seller determines that public use of the land has injured the land so as to diminish the use of the lands for purposes of restoration of resources or services injured by the oil spill and the buyer has failed, after reasonable notice and opportunity, to repair the damage;

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(vi) where the seller and the buyer, in consultation with applicable state or federal agencies, determine that continued public access will jeopardize the ability of the natural resources on the land to provide subsistence services to the residents of the area where the land is located.

Restriction or denial of public access must be as limited in scope as is feasible while still addressing the problem which led to the restriction or denial, instituted only after consultation with the buyer, and remain in place only so long as the condition which gave rise to the restriction or denial of public access exists. Where the restriction denial is based on injury to the land, public access must be restored after the injury has been repaired and the seller and buyer have reached agreement on actions needed, if any, to minimize the likelihood of a recurrence of such injury.

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PUBLIC ACCESS

Covenants governing public access shall be sought when the interest to be acquired <u>for purposes of restoring natural</u> <u>resources injured by the oil spill</u> is less than fee simple but the price to be paid for the interest is a substantial portion of the value of fee simple and acquisition of public access rights will <u>also</u> serve to restore <u>benefit</u> services lost or diminished as a result of the oil spill.

The Nature of Public Access

<u>Scope:</u> Public access is access by the public to lands in which the interests are acquired for purposes of <u>restoration of natural</u> <u>resources injured by the oil spill and also serves to benefit</u> subsistence use and recreation, including among other activities, sport hunting and fishing, hiking and camping.

The *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council met on May 31 in Juneau. One of the agenda items was a review of the status of the Comprehensive Habitat Protection program. Specifically, the Trustees, in executive session, received a briefing on the status of each habitat protection effort.

Upon reconvening in public session, the Trustees authorized me to proceed with the appraisal process for those parcels identified in the Comprehensive Habitat Protection Process. Included are the lands identified in your May 24, 1994 Comprehensive Proposal for Protection of Eyak Lands and Sherstone's Timber Interests. With your written concurrence, I am prepared to immediately authorize an appraisal of the lands and interests identified in your proposal. This would provide a clear basis for further negotiations.

This memo is intended to update you on a number of issues and a tentative meeting schedule for the next five months.

<u>FY95 Work Plan</u> - Everyone is working hard to accommodate your direction and the various policies that must be included in the FY95 Work Plan. Attached you will find a revised schedule based on the most recent council preferences (Attachment 1). It is not perfect. However, it has been designed with the following:

- A detailed solicitation for proposals with guidance
- Science plan framework
- Public Advisory Group participation
- Public review
- Legal review
- Trustee Council review of draft
- Trustee Council authorization
- Implementation subject to Science review
- Project monitoring
- Project reports
- Synthesizing
- Adaptive Management Process
- Ecosystem approach
- Final authorization (F.A.) in October (Next year we'll have F.A. prior to October 1)
- <u>FY95 Administration</u> We are in the process of developing the administration budget for FY95. I have requested that "liaisons" develop their budgets based on 1 F.T.E. and \$150,000. It would seem that this is sufficient in most cases. The total budget must be no more than \$3.5 million including our Chief Scientist and technical review capability in order to meet your 5% goal. This is achievable. In addition, we are continuing our effort to develop an Information Management System. This will likely be a separate project for your review.

<u>Science Review Board</u> - We have had several work sessions involving scientists, the Restoration Work Force, Public Advisory Group members, and other public members to develop an effective Science program. The results of these workshops are included in Chapter 3 and Appendix A of the <u>Invitation to Submit a Restoration Project for FY95</u>. These research priorities will be continually reviewed and revised using an adaptive management approach.

In order to develop and maintain a Science program as a cornerstone to our Ecosystem foundation and provide the integration and synthesis of research results, a Science Review Board is essential. Attached you will find a draft of the Science Review Board structure (Attachment 2). I assume that the Trustee Council will want to review and approve appointments to the Science Review Board. That is consistent with the Memorandum of Agreement between the United States and the State of Alaska. I would request that any comments on the draft be submitted to me by Friday, June 24. For the long term, I would hope that you would formalize the Science Review Board during either the July or August meeting.

Until you take formal action it is my intent to use an informal technical review committee for this current year's effort. This committee will be made up of:

- Bob Spies, Chief Scientist.
- Charles Peterson. Dr. Peterson is a Professor at the Institute of Marine Science of the University of North Carolina in Moorehead City, NC. Dr. Peterson is a marine ecologist with particular expertise in intertidal ecosystems who has been actively involved in the review of research and monitoring activities conducted by the Trustee Council during the past several years.
- Philip Mundy. Dr. Mundy is a well-respected fisheries biologist specializing in the study of salmon, who is currently a private consultant. He has studied salmon of the northern hemisphere for the past 20 years, and has been a key reviewer of fisheries monitoring and research for the Trustee Council.
- Christopher Haney. Dr. Haney is an Assistant Professor of Wildlife Technology in the School of Forest Resources at Pennsylvania State University in Dubois, PA. He has studied Alaska seabirds for many years, and has a very strong background in statistical applications in the biological sciences.
- Stanley Senner. Mr. Senner is the Director of the Audubon Migratory Bird Office in Boulder, CO. He specializes in the study of migratory shorebirds, and possesses an in-depth knowledge of the oil spill from his previous work on the Restoration Team for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game from 1990-1992.

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SCIENCE REVIEW BOARD

Responsibilities of the Board

- 1. Assist in the development of an adaptive management process:
 - A. Develop a synthesis that provides an annual overview of what has been accomplished, what has been learned, and what gaps need to be addressed.
 - B. Assist that Executive Director to organize the agenda for the annual workshop which reviews the restoration program.
 - C. Participate in the development of the Annual Status Report to the public, including an overview of the general health of the spill area ecosystem, and the status of injured resources and service.
 - D. Recommend appropriate changes to ongoing and proposed work and annually identify appropriate new projects.
- 2. Recommend scientific priorities based on technical merit:
 - A. Identify meritorious ideas and projects.
 - B. Recommend a prioritized list of ideas and projects within a specified funding level.
 - C. Recommend resolution of conflicts between competing proposals.
 - D. Recommend the best proposal or combination of proposals for a given objective and/or project.
 - E. Provide guidance to the interdisciplinary work groups for the development of strategies, research approaches, and testable hypotheses for monitoring, research, and general restoration activities.
 - F. Participate in the formation of the annual work plan; ensure that it is a comprehensive package for restoration that is both integrated and synthesized.
- 3. Assist in the peer review process for proposed, ongoing, and completed work:
 - A. Review proposals.
 - B. Review project design.
 - C. Review project conclusions and reports.

Composition

- 1. Members must be recognized as leading experts with proven track records, must have a multidisciplinary approach to solving scientific problems, and must have demonstrated professional integrity.
- 2. Since continuity is important, prior knowledge of the Exxon Valdez oil spill is desirable.
- 3. The Board will consist of three to five members including the Chief Scientist to cover as many as is appropriate of the following disciplines:
 - A. Archaeology
 - B. Birds
 - C. Ecotoxicology/chemistry
 - D. Fish
 - E. Intertidal/Subtidal
 - F. Marine Mammals
 - G. Oceanography

Where expertise is not available on the board, additional expertise on specific topics will be secured as necessary from appropriate sources.


- 4. The Chief Scientist will chair the Board (including calling meetings, setting agendas, and conveying results).
- 5. Appointment of persons to fill the Science Review Board positions shall be made by the Executive Director subject to approval by the Trustee Council.
- 6. Members will serve at the discretion of the Executive Director.
- 7. Members may not be contractually involved in the implementation of projects. Even the appearance of a conflict of interest must be avoided.
- 8. Annually, members must be able to travel to Alaska for at least two meetings. The first is the annual workshop that is conducted to disseminate the results of the previous season's field work, and recommend projects and/or modification of projects for the coming year. The second meeting will be to review project proposals as part of the annual work plan. The Board or individual members may hold additional meetings as needed.

Assumptions

- 1. The Science Review Board primarily focuses on the science program and scientific issues.
- 2. The Trustee Council establishes policies and executes authorizations per the Consent Decree. The Science Review Board makes recommendations and presentations to the Executive Director and the Trustee Council as appropriate.
- 3. Social objectives and policy continue to be set by the Trustee Council. The Science Review Board will be requested to make recommendations on how to most efficiently and effectively implement those objectives and policies.
- 4. The Science Review Board will operate on a consensus basis with majority and minority reports issued when necessary.
- 5. Science Review Board members only work part time and are compensated appropriately.
- 6. Both compensated and uncompensated peer reviewers will be available to the Science Review Board as necessary to review proposals, project descriptions, and reports.
- 7. Science Review Board meetings will be open to the public unless otherwise indicated by law (such as when reviewing proposals as part of a competitive procurement process in which proposals are confidential).
- 8. Staff support for the Science Review board will be provided by the Executive Director.

Science Planning and Management Organizational Diagram





I have recently been advised that you are in the process of preparing your FY95 proposal for restoration funds, to continue research efforts in Prince William Sound (PWS). I want to commend you for your commitment in FY94 and provide some framework for the FY95 work plan process. We are building the work plan for FY95 as you know through the "Invitation to Submit Project Descriptions for Fiscal Year 1995." I want to call your attention to this document.

Specifically, there are a couple of points I want to bring to your attention. First, due to time constraints, the Trustee Council will not take action on the final FY95 work plan until late October. Therefore, Fish and Game will be contacting you regarding first quarter funding needs. The first quarter funding is limited to funds for completing 94 field work and reports, as well as funds to continue those specific projects through the fall that absolutely cannot wait until the complete work plan process is finalized in late October. Ted, we expect this to be minimal.

Secondly, it is important that you note that there is clear guidance in many areas. In particular I look forward to your cooperation in meeting our financial effort to continue a <u>total</u> level of funding for research and monitoring similar to last year. This is imperative if we are to carry out a comprehensive balanced approach throughout the spill area. A rapid expansion of program and a dramatic increase in costs would be irresponsible. I am suggesting that I am willing to support an FY95 level of funding for the PWS Science Center that is <u>similar to the level in FY94</u> less the hatchery project amount. That support of course will depend on the accomplishments of FY94 work, the FY95 proposal itself, and how the project ranks in meeting the overall Trustee Council mission compared to other projects that are being proposed this year. By way of this letter I am asking the Department of Fish and Game to work with you on a review of FY94 expenditures and assist us in the development of FY95 proposals within these guidelines.

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Therefore, unless there is some unforeseen circumstance or discovery I do not intend to support dramatic increases (i.e., above \$4.25 million).

I hope this is consistent with your understanding and expectations. I look forward to our continuing restoration efforts together.

The Trustee Council has directed me to organize a process to establish a policy regarding "less than fee simple" acquisitions with specific attention to the issue of public access and the extent of protection required in commercial timber/conservation easement. I am hereby authorizing you to coordinate that effort. Please be sure to build a schedule that includes:

- a. public advisory group review and comment;
- b. the participation/comments of the Habitat Work Group;
- c. a preliminary review by the Restoration Work Force;
- d. participation/comments by affected landowners; and
- e. full presentation to the Trustee Council during its next meeting.

As you know our primary responsibility is the restoration of injured resources and services. Acquisitions are to be accomplished with that sole purpose in mind. There may be secondary benefits; however, the primary goal is <u>habitat protection</u>. To that end "less than fee simple" proposals are not the preference of the Trustee Council but may be considered within the framework of satisfying the protection that is necessary for restoration.

It is understood that some of the sellers are reluctant to sacrifice or impair their lands and subsistence rights granted to them under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) and the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA). Their efforts to maintain their rights while accommodating the need for long term habitat protection should be recognized and respected.

Please advise me no later than Tuesday, June 6, of your plan and schedule.

Thank you for your letter. I'm sorry that you were not able to attend the monitoring portion of the workshop last month. In general, I think there was broad appreciation for the workshop and a feeling that the sessions were very constructive. The workshop was the beginning of what I intend will be an on-going "adaptive management" process that will include an annual forum to share information as part of the effort to continually update, revise and refine the research and monitoring program, always trying to take advantage of the most current information available.

I understand that you have already received a copy of the *Invitation to Submit Project Descriptions for Fiscal Year 1995.* As you will note, this document draws heavily from the findings of the April workshop sessions. The project descriptions generated as a result of this invitation will be used to develop a Draft FY 95 Work Plan that will be published in mid-August which will then be subject to formal public review and comment. It is anticipated that the Trustee Council will meet at the end of October to take formal action on the FY 95 work plan.

The Trustee Council has included a policy in the *Draft Restoration Plan* (November 1993) stating that competitive proposals for restoration projects will be encouraged (Policy #6). We are working to implement this policy in several ways. As part of the FY 95 work plan *development* process, we are experimenting with two competitive procurement methods: a federal Broad Agency Announcement (or BBA), and a state, two-stage RFQ/RFP process (see *Invitation to Submit Project Descriptions for Fiscal Year 1995*, Chapter 1). Additionally, we will be trying to implement more project work through competitive RFPs. Again, referring to the *Invitation to Submit Project Descriptions for Fiscal Year 1995*, if a project is proposed for implementation by a specific state or

As you are aware, I asked the Chief Scientist to develop a recommendation regarding the proposed collection of marbled murrelets as part of the proposed study design for Project #94102/Marbled Murrelet Prey and Foraging Habitat in PWS. On the basis of our teleconference phone call on May 18 as well as subsequent discussions, the Chief Scientist has recommended that the proposed taking of murrelets be deferred until next year in order to better coordinate and integrate this element of the Project #94102 study with Project #94163, the forage fish research project being conducted by NOAA (see attached).

As you can appreciate, collections have been the source of substantial controversy and while I recognize that there would be value in data obtained as a result of taking murrelets this field season, I concur with the Chief Scientist's assessment that a more integrated and coordinated effort in concert with the forage fish investigations when there is an operable capability to detect forage fish in shallow waters would yield the most valuable results. Accordingly, based on the Chief Scientist's recommendation and observation, it seems most prudent to defer further discussions of this issue until we can address it comprehensively. At such time as there is an operable capability to detect forage fish in shallow waters, I would be willing to entertain further consideration of this issue. It should be noted that if this capability is demonstrated in late FY 94, one of the issues that will have to be addressed is the value of being able to collect data only from the final portion of the field season in 1994.

The commitment and hard work of Fish & Wildlife staff with regard to restoration effort is appreciated. We share the concern for marbled murrelets and believe this is the wisest course.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) requests authority to appraise lands on Kodiak Island within the Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge. The lands are owned by Koniag, Inc., Akhiok-Kaguyak, Inc., and Old Harbor Corporation. Discussions have been held with all the land owners who have indicated a willingness to sell most of their lands if an acceptable agreement can be reached.

The appraisal would be done by the United States Forest Service large parcel contract appraiser in accordance with the standardized appraisal instructions. The appraisal would be reviewed by federal and state review appraisers in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding executed March 21, 1994.

The Service will be using multiple funding sources for acquisition. Land and Water Conservation Fund money, restitution funds, and donations from non-profit organizations are expected to supplement restoration funds. Land Purchases with Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Settlement Funds

The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council, through the liaison Federal and State agencies, will begin purchasing land in the near future. Land will be purchased from private sellers, and title to the land will be held by the Federal or State agency to whom funds have been transferred.

We are currently negotiating appraisal specifications with willing sellers. In anticipation of these transactions occurring relatively soon, and in an effort to get the lowest purchase price possible, we would like to explore possible financing options.

We initially anticipated purchasing the land with a 20% down payment and six annual payments to pay off the balance. We would like to know if the following options are available to us with respect to purchases made through State of Alaska agencies:

- 1. State of Alaska issued tax exempt securities paying the seller cash. Will this require approval by the State Legislature?
- 2. Contract with sellers with payments over time. The interest rate negotiated would be set low enough to qualify as tax exempt to the seller.

Any information/guidance your agency can provide would be greatly appreciated. Thank you, in advance, for your assistance in this matter.

Dear Trustee:

After reviewing your 1994 Draft Work Plan, I noted the lack of effort or funds targeted towards working with private landowners on habitat restoration or enhancement. The budget is basically divided between paying for studies, administering projects and outright purchase of private lands. The Plan justifies spending enormous sums on the acquisition of private lands in the spill area. However, we could not identify any proposed projects where monies would be used to restore or enhance lands of those private landowners that have chosen not to sell their lands. Many of these landowners are currently managing their lands and are engaged in development activities, such as timber harvesting, shellfish farming, and community construction projects. These owners could easily participate in restoration projects that do not involve the purchase of their lands.

Koncor has approached trustee staff on several occasions with ideas of such restoration and enhancement projects. We currently have active timber harvest and forest management activities on Afognak and Montague Islands. Your staff's response has always been positive and supportive but unfortunately nothing has ever happened. This is clearly evidenced by the lack of any restoration projects for private landowners included in the 1994 Draft Work Plan.

The types of projects Koncor has discussed with your staff has included such things as salmon stream enhancement, modifying stream buffers, wildlife reserve areas, rescheduling of harvesting sequences, Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council January 24, 1994 Page 2

routing of roads to avoid critical habitat areas for spill damaged species, etc. These are all projects that could be done cooperatively with private landowners who choose not to sell their land to the Government but are still concerned about restoration and or enhancement.

It was made clear during these meetings with the trustee's staff that this is not a request for funds, which we reemphasize now. Koncor would just like to see some of the Excon Spill money spent on <u>actual</u> fish and wildlife enhancement projects on private land, not just studies, administration or the outright purchase of the private property. Excon Spill staff go to great lengths to explain their perceived impacts on spill damaged species from such activities as timber harvesting. There are many of us that believe timber harvesting can be done without seriously impacting oil spilled damaged species. In fact, we believe that through proper forest management not only can serious harm be prevented but habitat can even be enhanced.

Some examples of projects that could be proposed are:

(A) <u>Enhancement of Salmon Streams</u> - There are many streams on Montague Island and other islands that remain damaged from the 1964 earthquake. Restoring these streams to their pre-1964 condition would increase the population of salmon in Prince William Sound. Restoring these earthquake damaged streams would be a permanent benefit to the natural resources of the entire area and the people of Prince William Sound who depend on these resources.

(B) <u>Accelerated Reforestation</u> - The regeneration of harvested lands in coastal areas mainly depends on natural regenerations. Through the use of genetically superior trees, planting of nursery stock, thinning, and other forest management techniques, the trees can reach a mature state in a fraction of the normal time. Additionally, the manipulation of trees through forest management techniques can specifically target enhancing forest characteristics which favor animal species damaged by the oil spill.


These are just a few examples of cooperative projects that could be done with private landowners. I would encourage the Trustees to consider including several cooperative Private Land Enhancement Projects in your Final 1994 Work Plan. That would help assure that at least some of the spill money was spent on projects that will actually restore and enhance the natural ecosystems of Prince William Sound.

Thank you for your letter of April 11, 1994. We appreciate your sincere efforts to work with us. Your letter states that Sherstone, Inc. anticipates resumption of timber harvest operations this summer on some of the Eyak Corporation's lands. We recognize that Sherstone's harvesting activities will be conducted with the protection of fisheries, wildlife, and scenic values in mind. Because of the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill and the resultant stresses placed on resources and services injured by the spill, the Trustee Council continues to be interested in providing additional protection for those injured resources and services through acquisition and protection of habitat on the Eyak Corporation lands. The areas of prime interest are: 1) the "core lands" around Power Creek, Eyak Lake, and Eyak River, 2) "Areas of Special Biological Importance" which includes Sheep Bay, Windy Bay/Deep Bay, and Port Gravina, and 3) "Areas Contributing to Restoration" which includes Orca Narrows.

1) "Core lands"-The Council is interested in acquiring fee title to the core lands. The Trustee Council recognizes the Eyak Corporation's interest in development of hydroelectric potential in the Power Creek area and is willing to discuss proposals from Eyak Corporation to retain ownership and development rights to the Power Creek hydroelectric site. The Trustee Council also recognizes that the Eyak Corporation may wish to retain a portion of the core lands for the Eyak Shareholder Land Use Program.

2) "Areas of Special Biological Importance"-The Trustee Council also wants to discuss additional protection measures for Sheep Bay, Windy Bay/Deep Bay, and Port Gravina. These areas have been identified by Trustee Council staff as being of particular value for

restoration purposes. The Council would prefer to acquire fee title to these areas, but is willing to consider alternative proposals to protect injured resources and services while at the same time providing for the Eyak Corporation's needs for economic development and the Eyak Shareholder Land Use Program.

3) "Areas Contributing to Restoration"-Orca Narrows is an area of importance both for recreation and tourism. It is the desire of the Trustee Council and the community of Cordova to protect the scenic viewshed in that area. Accordingly, if Eyak Corporation agrees, the Council wants to discuss proposals to do so.

The Council requests that the Eyak Corporation grant public access to all lands on which less than fee title interests are acquired by the United States. To the extent permitted by law, such grant of public access would apply only to lands which are "unimproved" as that term is defined in AS 09.45.795, and would apply only so long as AS 09.45.795, or a substantially similar statute, continues in force. The Council acknowledges the Eyak Corporation's needs to reasonably regulate uses on those lands.

The price the Trustee Council is willing to pay for lands and interests is fair market value as determined by an appraisal. The fair market value will be determined, and the appraisal conducted, pursuant to standardized appraisal specifications being used by the state and federal trustee agencies.

The Trustee Council shares your belief that this or any other acquisition proposal must be subject to approval by the shareholders.

To facilitate discussions, any lands or interests in lands, including commercial timber interests, not owned by the Eyak Corporation or its wholly owned subsidiaries need to be identified at the outset of any negotiations.

We are requesting a detailed proposal from your Boards of Directors that accommodates your interests while meeting the terms of protection outlined in this letter. Upon reaching mutual agreement regarding the proposal, we will proceed with an appraisal.

As an interim measure, the Trustee Council is interested in acquiring protection for those Corporation lands on which timber harvesting is scheduled prior to April 1, 1995. It is the Trustee Council's understanding that these lands comprise a sub-parcel of the Orca Narrows parcel from which Sherstone, Inc. plans to harvest an estimated 8MMBF of timber between now and April 1, 1995.

Should the Boards of Directors of the Eyak and Sherstone Corporations wish to offer to the Trustee Council sale of the commercial timber rights to this sub-parcel, the offer should recognize that the sale would be at fair market value as determined by an appraisal. Further, the offer should include a properly executed action of the respective Boards of Directors of the Eyak and Sherstone Corporations which certifies that, as a condition of the sale of the commercial timber rights to the Orca Narrows sub-parcel, that no other commercial timber harvesting will occur on Corporation lands subject to this letter prior to April 1, 1995, notwithstanding subsequent actions, if any, prior to April 1 1995 by the

Trustee Council, the Boards of Directors of the Eyak and Sherstone Corporations or the shareholders thereof with respect to a more comprehensive protection package.

Upon receipt of an offer and properly executed Corporate action regarding Orca Narrows as outlined above, the Trustee Council is prepared to act expeditiously on such offer, and if such action is favorable, to immediately execute a purchase agreement and order the necessary appraisal for the Orca Narrows sub-parcel on a priority basis.

We stand ready to meet with you at your earliest convenience to discuss a detailed proposal. Thank you again for your patience and work with the Trustee Council.

You stated in your letter that acquisitions by the Council should not be treated like other governmental acquisitions because public funds are not involved. That assumption is incorrect. The funds received by the two governments were in settlement of federal and state legal claims against Exxon resulting from the oil spill. Congress has appropriated the federal portion of these funds, and expenditure of the state's portion is subject to review by the Alaska Legislature. The use of these funds is controlled by various statutory and trust obligations, including the Federal Clean Water Act, as well as the Memorandum of Agreement and Consent Decree entered by the United States District Court for the District of Alaska on August 28, 1991.

The Trustee Council has no inherent authority to directly procure or expend funds, or to acquire property in its name. Instead, it must utilize the existing authorities of one or more of the trustee agencies for any procurement. The Trustee Council intends to comply with the applicable governmental requirements for procurement of real property.

Your letter also expresses some confusion over the Council's policy for the interest in land it seeks to acquire. While acquisition of the full fee estate may be, in many cases, the preferred restoration approach, the Council has expressed its intention to attempt to accommodate the concerns of the sellers in this regard. I have enclosed excerpts describing the Habitat Protection and Acquisition portions of the Draft Restoration Plan produced by the Council in November 1993. This draft plan will not be finalized until completion of the environmental impact statement which is now in preparation and intended to be released to the public in June for comment. The Council also publicly discussed in some detail at several meetings last year its willingness to consider less than fee acquisition with respect to lands owned by Eyak Corporation which were subject to imminent threat of development. I trust that this adequately clarifies the Council's position in this regard.

I am very disturbed by the innuendo and outright misstatements contained in your April 6 letter. Such unfounded allegations serve no beneficial purpose. As Executive Director, I wish to assure you that the State and Federal governments do not intend to allow such allegations to negatively impact the habitat protection program. The wisdom underlying the Uniform Federal Appraisal Standards is that they are designed to eliminate subjective attitudes from the land acquisition process.

I have enclosed a copy of a letter I have received from Maria Lisowski from the Office of General Counsel for the United States Forest Service addressing allegations in your letter of April 6, 1994 specific to the Forest Service. I have investigated some of these allegations myself and can advise you that I concur absolutely with Ms. Lisowski's response to them.

You allege bias from the fact that the United States Forest Service considered using Cal Kerr and Charles Heran to appraise land at Chenega. It is my view that it would be inappropriate to retain anyone under contract as an expert witness in the Exxon litigation to appraise land for the Trustee Council.

Mr. William H. Timme

I understand that your clients have concerns that the appraiser may not value the so-called "public interest" component or "natural land" component of your clients' lands. This is a governmental acquisition issue that has appeared in a number of contexts nationwide. The Trustee Council, in authorizing the appraisal of fair market value, does not intend to, nor do we believe it can, deviate from the federal standard applied throughout the United States.

To establish and define responsibilities and procedures for the delegation of authority to the department's Approving Officers.

DISTRIBUTION:

To manual holders.

AUTHORITY:

A.S. 37.10.20, voucher to be approved by Administrative Officer; A.S. 37.10.30, responsibility of officer or employee approving or certifying a voucher; and A.S.37.10.40, enforcement of liability. Also Section 6903 - Receipt of Services, 6904 - Account to the charged, and 6905 - Approval, of the State Administrative Manual.

DEFINITION OF AN APPROVING OFFICER:

As defined under A.S. 37.10.30-40 (see Exhibit D):

"The officer or employee approving or certifying a voucher is responsible for the existence and correctness of the facts recited in the certificate or stated on the voucher or its supporting papers for the legality of the proposed payment under the appropriation or fund involved...."

In the Department of Fish and Game, Approving Officers are those officers or employees that are close to or have immediate access to persons that are close to the source of a transaction. In that capacity, they have (or have access to) first-hand knowledge pertinent to a transaction, enabling reasonable and responsible scrutiny of the transaction as required by Alaska law and administrative regulation.

The payment offices of the department depend heavily on the Approving Officers and the assurances provided by their approvals in both the quality and the reliability of the internal controls needed in the payment and expenditure process.

POLICY:

The Commissioner of the Department of Fish and Game, in executing the provisions, duties and responsibilities as provided by statute, may delegate to officers and employees of the department, approving authority over administrative actions and document approval as directed by A.S. 37.10.30-40 and the State Administrative Manual, Sections 6904 and 6905.

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Accordingly, each division director is delegated those responsibilities and authorities required of an administrative or approving officer as defined by these policies. Each director may, with the concurrence of the Director of the Division of Administration, make appointment of subordinate officers or employees as approving officers for that division's administrative actions and documents.

A duly appointed Approving Officer must, as a result of that appointment, complete the "Approving Officers Affidavit", page 016-10, "Signature Authorization Cards" (three), page 016-11, and the transmittal memorandum, page 016-12, within ten (10) working days of the appointment. In addition, within 30 days of appointment or upon notice from the Division of Administration, the Approving Officer will attend training as provided by the Division of Administration. The Approving Officer may begin exercising the duties and responsibilities upon appointment.

In addition, it is the policy of this department that:

- 1. An officer or employee may not be appointed as an Approving Officer if that officer or employee does not have final authority in the approval of a transaction or document (within that division). If an additional person (or persons) must approve or review transactions or documents, then that individual cannot (and should not) be approving the transaction.
- 2. An Approving Officer may <u>not</u> be hampered, coerced or subject to other compelling influences in the exercise of independent judgment. This should not be construed as preventing an individual from discussing the facts of a particular action or instance in order to clarify extraordinary circumstances or to present other facts.
- 3. An Approving Officer may not unreasonably withhold approval of an action. The Approving Officer may not be dilatory, capricious or malicious in the exercise of the duties and responsibility of an Approving Officer. The Approving Officer must make every effort to process documents in an efficient and expedient manner. The ignoring of or hampering the processing of any document for unfounded reasons will not be tolerated and may result in disciplinary action.
- 4. An Approving Officer will, in approving an action or document, sign that document with a full signature, the date of that signature and the RD Code of the Approving Officer. Initials or signature stamps are not acceptable.
- 5. An Approving Officer may be held accountable for and required to make good to the State the amount of an illegal, improper, or incorrect payment resulting from a false, inaccurate, or misleading certificate or

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for a payment prohibited by law or which does not represent a legal obligation under the appropriation or fund involved. These provisions provide for the "Enforcement of Liability" in circumstances where an Approving Officer knowingly and/or willfully, through explicit or implicit action or omission of action, allows a violation to occur. An action or omission of action, if unwittingly done as the result of a misrepresentation or falsification by another is not a misrepresentation or falsification by the Approving Officer.

DATE

PROCEDURES REQUIRED FOR APPOINIMENT OF APPROVING OFFICERS:

Appointing an Approving Officer will require the following actions:

- 1. The Division Director, or designee, will authorize an officer or employee, in writing, of an appointment. Once authorized by the Division Director, or designee, the Approving Officer may commence those duties and responsibilities required of an Approving Officer;
- 2. Within 10 working days the appointed officer or employee must file with the Division Director a completed Delegation of Authority Memorandum, Approving Officer Affidavit (signed by the appointing officer or employee) and three Signature Cards with original signature.
- 3. The division director approves the delegation of authority by signing the Delegation of Authority Memorandum, and forwarding the original of the Delegation of Authority Memorandum, Approving Officers Affidavit, and the three Signature Cards (with original signatures), to the Director of the Division of Administration.
- 4. The Director of the Division of Administration must take action on the appointment of the Approving Officer within 30 calendar days of the date of the appointment. If the Director of Administration concurs with the appointment, a copy of the approved Delegation of Authority Memorandum will be sent to the appointing Director and to the officer or employee.

In the event that the Director of Administration does not concur with the appointment, the Director of Administration will notify the appointing Director with an explanation of that dissent within the 30 day (calendar) period. This decision will be reversed if the Appointing Director can adequately address the concerns that caused the denial.

Thank you for your letter of April 11, 1994, which was jointly signed by Luke Borer, President of Sherstone, Inc. Your letter states that Sherstone anticipates resumption of timber harvest operations this summer on some of Eyak Corporation's lands. Timber harvesting can be conducted in a manner which protects fisheries, wildlife and scenic values, and we would anticipate that Sherstone's harvesting activities would be conducted with the protection of such values in mind. Even the timber harvesting which occurred in the Cordova area early this century, has regenerated and supports outstanding fisheries and wildlife values. Thus, the more modern forest practices including those covered in the Forest Practices Act should enable Sherstone, Inc. to provide significant protection for these values under normal circumstances.

Because of the *Excon Valdez* oil spill and the resultant stress placed on resources and services injured by the spill, the Trustees propose to purchase the so-called core lands of approximately 13,700 acres, including a subset of three parcels; the Power Creek parcel consisting of approximately 4,800 acres; the Eyak Lake parcel consisting of approximately 5,100 acres and the Eyak River parcel consisting of approximately 3,800 acres. The Trustees propose to purchase these lands in fee at fair market value, and would propose these lands be identified with a specific designation chosen by the Eyak Corporation and shareholders so that the area may be so signed and identified as such in perpetuity.

The Trustees also propose to purchase approximately 19,600 acres of land which have been identified as areas of special biological importance. These three areas consist of Sheep Bay (9,100 acres), Windy Bay/Deep Bay (7,100 acres), and Port Gravina (3,400 acres). The Trustees also propose to purchase these lands at fair market value. We are interested in discussing with you any additional measures that may be necessary for lands which have historical or cultural significance.

We believe your Board is aware of the public negotiations which surrounded the purchase of the Seal Bay lands on Afognak Island by the Trustee Council, and the Trustees are hopeful Sherstone and Eyak Corporations will follow a similar process in preparing various counteroffers which the Trustees can consider.

The Trustees urge Sherstone, Inc. and Eyak Corporation to give serious consideration to this proposal, and are willing to consider whatever counter or additional proposals your organizations may want to propose.

The Trustees believe these or any other proposals must be subject to approval by the shareholders and understand that the lands and timber under consideration are wholly owned by Eyak Corporation and its shareholders. Any lands or interests in lands, including commercial timber interests, not owned by Eyak Corporation need to be identified at the outset of any negotiations.

Project 94041 ("Introduced Predator Removal from Islands") and Project 94258 ("Sockeye Salmon Overescapement") were delivered to my office with a request to expedite the peer-review process. The DPD for Project 94041 arrived in our office on March 24, and the DPD for Project 94258 arrived on March 10. The reviewd for both of these projects has been received.

As we have agreed, I plan to provide a formal recommendation for each project that summarizes the purpose of each study and its relationship to restoration management objectives. Given the extensive work currently underway with regards to Project 94320, I have not yet completed the formal recommendations. I do plan to recommend that both projects go forward, however, and given their time sensitive nature I thought this informal recommendation might allow the projects to proceed.

Project 94041 ("Introduced Predator Removal from Islands"): The key issue raised by the reviewer was to verify that neither cattle or rats are present on the two islands slated for fox trapping. Cattle destroy bird nesting habitat and crush burrows, and rats are predators on seabirds, so if they are present removing the foxes will not provide a "predator" free habitat for seabirds. The principal investigator has assured Andy Gunther that Simeonof and Chernabura Islands (in the Shumagin Islands) do not contain either cattle or rats. Consequently, I recommend the project go forward as described.

Project 94258 ("Sockeye Salmon Overescapement"): This project is a continuation of a project started during the NRDA process. The project was favorably reviewed by an international panel convened in Vancouver on March 15, 1993. The panel made some recommendations for improvements, which have been incorporated by the principal investigators. Consequently, I recommend the project go forward as described.

As you are aware, the analysis that the peer reviewers and I have provided these Detailed Project Descriptions is focused upon their technical merit. I recommend that each project be given a budgetary review in addition to the technical review provided by my office.

The purpose of this memorandum is to formally approve work to proceed on Project #94102/Marbled Murrelet Prey and Foraging Habitat in PWS, as described in the DPD, with the understanding that the work effort will be modified as recommended by the Chief Scientist in his memorandum dated April 7 (attached). In particular, these study modifications include that:

- 1. the proposed lipid analysis will be eliminated; and
- 2. the Principle Investigator will examine substituting non-lethal dietary analysis techniques (live capture and regurgitation).

With respect to the second issue, it is my understanding that the project DPD, as presented for peer review, called for the collection (i.e., killing) of 30 murrelets. As a general matter, the Trustee Council has not looked favorably upon methods that involve the sacrifice of already damaged resources. While I recognize that there may well be valid and important justifications for "taking" 30 murrelets, this element of the project should not proceed prior to my being personally briefed on this aspect of the study and persuaded that the alternative technique of capture and regurgitation will not reasonably accomplish the research objectives.

The study will also be carefully integrated with the forage fish project (94163), which should provide the ability to correlate forage fish availability with murrelet foraging locations, foraging behavior, and possibly reproductive success indices. This project proposes to take 30 marbled murrelets (out of a summer population of 100,000). The USF&WS is considering alternate techniques for diet analysis (capture and regurgitation). The proposed lipid analysis is very experimental, and I believe such experimentation is better suited to birds with more varied diets such as pigeon guillemots.

Consequently, I recommend the project go forward as described except that the lipid analysis be eliminated, and the principal investigator consider substituting non-lethal dietary

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analysis techniques. I also recommend that the principal investigator share GIS data with the SEA investigators, and obtain relevant data from that study for use in his own GIS analyses.

Project 94173 ("Pigeon Guillemot Recovery Monitoring"): Pigeon guillemots were injured by the spill, and are also among the group of seabirds with declining populations since the 1970s. This project will examine the important factors limiting guillemot recovery, including food availability and predation. The reviewer's key concern here was that guillemots cat a variety of prey, making it difficult to determine if a change in one prey resource (e.g., forage fish) is related to observed changes in reproductive success. I agree that it is unlikely that we will obtain unambiguous information regarding the linkages between pigeon guillemot populations and forage fish distributions, and I plan to consider this issue carefully in review of the forage fish study. The reviewer also pointed out that previous data suggest that predation may be a very important factor affecting guillemot recovery, and that experiments to study predation may yield less ambiguous information.

As with the marbled murrelets, however, pigeon guillemots are an injured resource about which we have very little information for purposes of restoration. If through this study we develop an understanding of factors limiting pigeon guillemot recovery, we could design restoration strategies to bolster recovery of this injured resource. Consequently, I recommend that this project go forward as described with the condition that the principal investigator consider all ways that might strengthen the data obtained from the study regarding predation as a factor limiting guillemot recovery.

As you are aware, the analysis that the peer reviewers and I have provided these Detailed Project Descriptions is focused upon their technical merit. I recommend that each project be given a budgetary review in addition to the technical review provided by my office.

As indicated by Karen Oakley/USFWS, expenditure authority for this project is needed immediately in order to meet the R/V <u>Tiglax</u> sailing date of May 13 from Homer. The Chief Scientist has reviewed the DPD and recommends that the project go forward as indicated in the attached memorandum dated April 5. (A more formal recommendation from the Chief Scientist will follow.)

Project 94041 ("Introduced Predator Removal from Islands") and Project 94258 ("Sockeye Salmon Overescapement") were delivered to my office with a request to expedite the peer-review process. The DPD for Project 94041 arrived in our office on March 24, and the DPD for Project 94258 arrived on March 10. The reviewd for both of these projects has been received.

As we have agreed, I plan to provide a formal recommendation for each project that summarizes the purpose of each study and its relationship to restoration management objectives. Given the extensive work currently underway with regards to Project 94320, I have not yet completed the formal recommendations. I do plan to recommend that both projects go forward, however, and given their time sensitive nature I thought this informal recommendation might allow the projects to proceed.

Project 94041 ("Introduced Predator Removal from Islands"): The key issue raised by the reviewer was to verify that neither cattle or rats are present on the two islands slated for fox trapping. Cattle destroy bird nesting habitat and crush burrows, and rats are predators on seabirds, so if they are present removing the foxes will not provide a "predator" free habitat for seabirds. The principal investigator has assured Andy Gunther that Simeonof and Chernabura Islands (in the Shumagin Islands) do not contain either cattle or rats. Consequently, I recommend the project go forward as described.

Project 94258 ("Sockeye Salmon Overescapement"): This project is a continuation of a project started during the NRDA process. The project was favorably reviewed by an international panel convened in Vancouver on March 15, 1993. The panel made some recommendations for improvements, which have been incorporated by the principal investigators. Consequently, I recommend the project go forward as described.

As you are aware, the analysis that the peer reviewers and I have provided these Detailed Project Descriptions is focused upon their technical merit. I recommend that each project be given a budgetary review in addition to the technical review provided by my office.



The purpose of this memo is to provide you with a list of those Detailed Project Descriptions that we do not believe will require scientific peer review. This list includes DPDs that we have received during the last two weeks, and some that we anticipate receiving the future. In the latter case, we may change our recommendation upon review of the DPD, although we expect that instance to be rare. We would like your concurrence with our recommendations.

There are two major criteria that we have used to screen the DPDs, and if a project satisfies either criterion we have placed in on the list. The first criterion is to determine if a project does not have a scientific component, such as the Habitat Protection and Acquisition Fund (94126). The second criterion is a judgment as to whether the technical or scientific portion of the project is routine in nature. It is our opinion that projects without sophisticated or complex scientific components do not need to be reviewed by outside scientific experts. An example of such a project is the Chenega Chinook Release Program (94272).

Please review the list and let us know if you agree with our assessment. Some of the projects below may benefit from an independent review by experts who are not scientists (e.g., Institute of Marine Science-Seward Improvements [94199]).





The purpose of this memo is to:

- 1. Provide status update of Exxon Valdez Oil Spill projects revised program 18-4-9992.
- 2. Recording the revised program.
- 3. Provide information on how funding approved in revised programs can be transferred

between state agencies.

Status of RPL 18-4-9992

The Legislative Budget and Audit Committee (LB&A) approved all of the projects conceptually and the FY 94 funding. It will be necessary to go back to LB&A for approval of the FY 95 funding just prior to the beginning of FY 95. The RPL will either be carried forward or a new one will need to be submitted. The Office of Management and Budget is working on submitting language for the appropriation bill which would put an extended lapse date on the RPL.

Recording the Revised Program

The entire amount (\$12,389.7) of the revised program will be recorded in the state accounting system, however, if the lapse date is not extended a restriction will be necessary for the FY 95 funding portion.

Transfers between state agencies

The revised program amount is considered an appropriation with three allocations (Environmental

- Conservation, Natural Resources, and Fish and Game). The amounts in the revised programs must be recorded as approved initially and cannot be changed. If it becomes necessary to make adjustments/transfers between these three allocations it will be necessary to submit an additional revised program to make the change for Office of Management and Budget approval.


