The Memorandum of Agreement and The Consent Decree between the United States and the State of Alaska recognize the importance of public participation in the Trustee process. To ensure that those affected by the oil spill and those concerned with the settlement monies' expenditure will have a voice, the MOA and the CD require that "procedures providing for meaningful public participation in the injury assessment and restoration process" be established. To best empower the public, the MOA and CD further require that an advisory council and an "organizational structure for decision making" be established.

We understand that the Trustees have held meetings--with significantly less than full public input--to discuss the organizational structure and role of the public advisory group. It is a startling slap in the face that the public should be excluded from the process of establishing a meaningful public process! Already, with such neglect for public participation, it is easy to imagine that the Trustees do not value public input.

In the future, we urge that you provide plentiful advance notice of meetings and state clearly that full, meaningful public participation or public testimony opportunities will be available. In this vein, we also urge that you provide adequate opportunities for public participation at today's meeting (December 5, 1991) and defer any decisions until the public has had an adequate and fair opportunity to participate.

We request that you release in draft form for public review and comment the proposed organizational structure.

Finally, we wish to incorporate by reference the excellent and timely suggestions of the Alaska Center for the Environment.

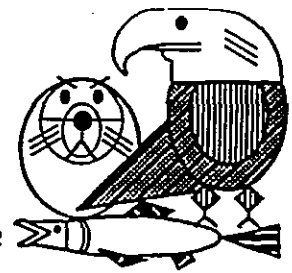

As I am sure you are aware, at all subsequent Trustee Council meetings there has been a public comment period which was teleconferenced to the communities in the spill affected area, as well as to Juneau and Fairbanks.
