

My family are all commercial fishermen and I was raised to live off the land smoking salmon and putting up all of God's bounty for people who live here in Prince William Sound.

I had had a confidence in our way of life that no urban

person living off the
supermarkets of the
city could understand. We have to
hunt and fish and
store up what we get
from the land. We
don't have the luxury
of just running down
to the store to replenish
our supply. Sometimes
we can't even get to
town for supplies in
the winter because of
storms etc.

Our lives are dependent
on what God provides to
the hunters and their
charity for the extended
families here in Tatitlek
and also those who
no longer live here but
have moved to the cities.
It is a privilege to live
this way of life.

I can't put into words how much the Valdez Oil Spill grieved my heart. All I can compare it to what the Jewish people must have felt to see their families die before their eyes.

Economically we are still being affected since most of our families are fishing every year all this life. Since the Oil Spill the price for pink salmon has bottomed out and some people here locally stand to loose their fishing boats. Thats why this Oyster Farm Project is so important to our local economy. The Chugach Region Management Project(93019)

and the Bivalve Shellfish Hatchery and Research Center (93020) are very important to us as we employ so many local people from the Alutia Pride Oyster Farm and the people have year around jobs. The Bivalve Shellfish Hatchery is needed so we don't have to send for oyster spat from Washington and California and is good for the whole state of Alaska, besides benefiting us here in Chugach Region.

The Chugach Region Mariculture Project (93019) and The Bivalve Shellfish Hatchery and Research Center (93020) are very important to us. There are very few jobs and these projects present job opportunities for our village. Further, the oysters are nutritious and give us a taste of some of our subsistence foods which were lost due to the oil spill.

We are working for our project to be self-sustaining and are counting on this money to reach this point. We urge you to help support our projects.

We also support these projects: Subsistence Restoration Project (93017), Habitat Use, Behavior, & Monitoring of Harbor Seals in the Prince William Sound (93046), & Chenega Chinook and Coho Salmon Release Program (93016).
