**Events Marking the 20th Anniversary of the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill**  
**Saturday, March 21, Public Exhibit and Events:**

- Continuously run three different EVOSTC films of different length dealing with the oil spill, native subsistence and other related oil spill issues;
- Scheduled lectures and Q & A talks with EVOSTC scientists about their work, accompanied by photos or slides and possibly research tools or other hands-on items to facilitate discussion;
- scheduled talk by a EVOSTC Trustee about the Council;
- The updated Darkened Waters exhibit: the nationally-acclaimed exhibit shown in the Smithsonian and nationally about the spill consists of large free-standing floor panels on different subjects related to the spill including the spill, clean up, impact on the area and it human and animal inhabitants, technological changes since the spill and the lingering oil that remains.
- Otter table with web feed to EVOS otter at Vancouver or Monterey Bay aquarium "sea otter cam," otter skull and pelts for hands-on exploration, copies of Alaska Sea Life Center otter treatment records from the spill for perusing, otter hand stamps and continuous showing of "Nyac the Sea Otter," an EVOSTC otter video less than 2 minutes in length;
- A table with samples of EVOS oil in vials and a piece of Bligh Reef as hands-on spill artifacts;
- A table with hands-on oil spill experiments for kids regarding soaking up oil and oil and water dynamics; and
- A table with a sample of some of the many photo-laden publications about the spill over the last 20 years for handouts and for perusing.
- Poster boards with photos and information about the spill and restoration, including an exhibit of a map of Alaska showing habitat purchases made by the EVOSTC in the spill area for conservation purposes.

The Imaginarium and the Alaska Sea Life Center would like to be involved and are currently considering their abilities to partner with staff and exhibits. Other potential partners include the Bird Treatment Center and the dances and other activities by the Alaska Native Heritage Center. We also expect the Dept. Fish and Wildlife may also have hands-on exhibits for a table top. We are continuing to develop the exhibit and activities and will keep you updated on its development.

Anchorage School District Visits, March 23 and March 24:

The ASD is interested in busing in students, for example, to visit the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Exhibit for an hour and then Zoo for an hour.

ASD is aware that there is a charge for the Zoo and that the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council is pleased to have the Exhibit staffed and open to Anchorage School District students Monday, March 23 and Tuesday, March 24 without additional cost. The Exhibit for ASD would be as described above, but without the scheduled talks by scientists, unless we made additional arrangements.

For additional education opportunities, the Zoo houses three of the species affected by the spill: river otters, harbor seals and bald eagles. It might enhance the educational aspects of the visit if Zoo staff could give a brief talk to the visiting students about these three species that the Zoo houses and the Oil Spill in conjunction with a visit to the Exhibit. (We can provide additional Oil Spill information with regard to those species.)



- **\*\*I would like to keep the oil spill experiment running on track downstairs on Monday and Tuesday. However, if the oil spill room gets too full or is running late or a bus arrives at an off-time, the class can go upstairs, because they have only an hour. When there is room available again, we can announce upstairs that there will be room for a class that has not performed the experiment can come down five minutes or so before the class switches out (give time for teachers to gather students).**





## The 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill at the new Education Center at the Alaska Zoo, Anchorage

### EVENT DATES:

- Saturday, March 21, 2009, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the new Gateway Education Center for the Alaska Zoo. Free and open to the public.
- Monday and Tuesday, March 23-24 open to the Anchorage School District.

### EVENT DESCRIPTION:

This is intended for the general public with restoration related programs for all ages in an interactive and free setting. It completes the suite of 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary events beginning with the scientific focus of the Alaska Marine Science Symposium, January 19-23; the state-wide outreach of the Alaska Forum on the Environment, February 2-6; and local events in spill affected communities. The zoo setting offers a powerful supplement to *Exxon Valdez* Oil Spill Trustee Council (EVOSTC) restoration programming, with the opportunity for people to see live animals injured by the spill such as river otters, seals and bald eagles.

### PARTNERS:

In addition to the Alaska Zoo, partners include: the Bird Treatment and Learning Center; Alaska SeaLife Center; Cordova Historical Society; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; U.S. Geological Survey; and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Other interested partners include: the Alaska Native Heritage Center; Prince William Sound Regional Citizens Advisory Council; Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation; and Alaska Department of Fish and Game. Partners are providing significant staffing, programming and materials.

### ACTIVITIES INCLUDE:

- Three different EVOSTC films running continuously spotlighting spill effects and restoration, impacts to native subsistence and other related oil spill issues.
- Scheduled lectures and discussion with EVOSTC scientists accompanied by audio-visual aids, research tools or other hands-on items to facilitate discussion.
- Display of the updated Darkened Waters exhibit.
- Samples of *Exxon Valdez* oil and a piece of Bligh Reef as hands-on spill artifacts.
- Hands-on oil spill experiments.
