



Introduction



The Research and Analysis Section of the Alaska Department of labor is the prime source for much of the available information about Alaska's population, employment, unemployment and wages, and occupational and career information. The section also prepares and analyzes data for occupational injury, unemployment insurance and special projects. A list of other types of information gathered by Research and Analysis follows this introduction.

The information gathered and analyzed by Research and Analysis is often presented in the form of publications. Many publications are periodic, for which we maintain a distribution list; others are one-time reports which are available upon request. Timely summaries of most of these publications are regularly issued in press releases, also available upon request.

This directory contains a description of two microcomputer based occupational information systems: one for career planning and counseling and one for research and employment training program planning. This year information on available and upcoming 1990 census products has been included.

The publications containing occupational and career information are prepared in cooperation with the Alaska Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (AOICC). AOICC is part of the national Occupational Information Coordinating Committee network established by an act of the U.S. Congress in 1976 to promote the development and use of occupational information. The mission of AOICC is to develop and implement an occupational information system (OIS) and a career information delivery system (CIDS) that address the need for labor market information by the users of the data.




Alaska Career Guide

Alaska Career Information System (AKCIS)




AKCIS is an interactive computer software tool designed to help people of all ages explore careers, gathering the latest information to aid in career choices or transitions. The QUEST questionnaire allows the user to sort over 280 Alaskan and national occupations based on self-perceived interests and abilities. Each occupation includes a description of job duties, working conditions, aptitudes necessary, prospective employer groups, wages, and the projected outlook for that occupation.

The occupations are linked to appropriate postsecondary training programs and the schools that offer those programs. SCHOOL SORT allows the user to sort over 3,400 national 2 year, 4 year, and graduate schools. AID SORT, a new feature this year, provides sorting for 1,100 sources of financial aid. The user enters their special characteristics, talents, and needs and AID SORT provides a possible list of aid sources. These sources are then listed with specific information regarding the application process for each.

AKCIS contains the most current and comprehensive information available for career information seekers. The system is produced jointly between the Alaska Departments of Education and Labor. It is available through secondary schools, state employment services offices, universities, and private nonprofit agencies. AKCIS is primarily funded by user fees paid by the agency. The direct user is not charged. Many of the files on the computer are printed in books and accompany the software program. 


Alaska Housing Market Indicators (AHFC)




Alaska Housing Market Indicators provides detailed statistics relating to Alaska's housing market. Funded by the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation (AHFC), this quarterly publication provides information on housing loans and structure characteristics by census area. Using Alaska Department of Labor wage income data, an Affordability Index measures relative differences in housing affordability by census area over time. The publication also presents U.S. Census data and other information about the Alaska housing market as these data become available. Currently limited to loan data for loans purchased by AHFC, work is underway to incorporate loan information on lending activity of other lenders.

Alaska Industry-Occupation Outlook to 1995

Occupational profiles for 27 major industries and industry groups are presented in this annual publication. This award-winning publication includes occupational estimates for 1990, projections to 1995 and a narrative of the current industry status and outlook. Tables of detailed occupational employment estimates and projections for Alaska statewide, Anchorage/MatSu, Fairbanks and Southeast Alaska are featured.



Alaska Microcomputer Occupational Information System (Micro-OIS)




Micro-OIS is a microcomputer system for educators, administrators and counselors. The system matches occupational demand data (current and projected employment), supply data (trained people available to work in an occupation) and the number of job openings through the Alaska State Employment Service for specific and related occupations. An industry module provides for total employment by industry.

Micro-OIS has the capability of producing standard production reports or allows users to develop specific criteria for gathering data. The system currently delivers data on a statewide basis, for Anchorage/MatSu, Fairbanks and Southeast Alaska. A characteristics file allows the user to select occupational demand and supply data by various occupational traits that include general education development levels (reasoning, math, language), preparation time required, physical demands and environmental conditions.

Micro-OIS is available on computer diskettes to users who provide four formatted 5 1/4" or two 3 1/2" disks for use with an IBM-PC/XT or compatible machine.


Alaska Occupational Supply & Demand Information




This annual publication contains occupational supply, demand and analysis information organized by 100 occupational clusters. Demand information includes occupational employment estimates, five-year projections and annual job openings that result from industry growth and replacement needs. Supply data are provided for institutional program completers from the most recent school year for which data are available. Analysis information includes wage rates and Alaska State Employment Service job applications, job orders and job orders filled. Tables of detailed occupational employment estimates and five year projections are provided for Alaska statewide.

Alaska Occupational Injury and Illness Information

Alaska Occupational Injury and Illness Information is an annual statistical report on work-related injuries and illnesses in Alaska's work force. The major section of this publication contains information from the annual occupational safety and health survey, which provides injury incidence rates by industry. Sections cover work-related fatalities, and answers to questions frequently asked by employers.



Alaska Population Overview




Annual official population estimates for the state of Alaska and its boroughs and census areas by age and sex comprise this publication. Included in the state estimates are information on historical trends in births, deaths and migration. Estimates of population and households are also included for incorporated places, census designated places, and Alaska Native Village Statistical Areas. In addition, estimates are included for such specialized areas as the Alaska Native Regional Corporations, legislative districts, military populations, and school districts.


Alaska Population Projections

Periodic population projections for the state by age, sex, race and census area for selected years are presented. Included are descriptions of the methodology and assumptions about births, deaths and migration used to determine the projections.

Alaska Directory of Licensed Occupations




Alaska Employment and Earnings Report

Alaska Employment and Earnings Report is a quarterly publication of statistical tables containing, by industry, nonagricultural wage and salary employment and earnings for the state of Alaska, and Census Areas. It is available approximately seven months after the end of each respective quarter.

Unemployment Insurance Actuarial Study & Financial Handbook




Unemployment Insurance Actuarial Study & Financial Handbook is an annual report of Alaska's unemployment insurance (UI) system focusing on the benefit and tax structures. It includes an overview of the current UI system and an analysis of fund adequacy with respect to potential future benefit obligations. The report contains tables on employment, payroll, and earnings by industry and ownership; plus data on various aspects of UI benefit claims and payments. The full report is available in December of odd numbered years, and an update, of the data only, is available in even years.

Alaska Wage Rates

Alaska Wage Rates, an annual publication, presents the results of a wage survey of nearly 1,500 employers for 160 occupations. Data are provided for Alaska statewide and by economic region. Also presented are average wage offerings of job orders for about 200 occupations placed with Alaska State Employment Service offices throughout Alaska.

To provide local area wage information, average job order rates are listed for representative occupations from each of the 19 Employment Services offices.



Alaska State Data Center



The Alaska State Data Center (ASDC), located in the Research and Analysis Section of the Department of Labor, is the state's clearing house for census information. The ASDC provides census data to users, free of charge, in a variety of formats such as computer tape, diskette, and printed reports. Other formats such as CD-ROM, census reports, maps, and tape documentation must be purchased from the Census Bureau.

The ASDC provides free copying of census tapes. To order, send a blank 9 track tape and a written request identifying the census tape name and the geographic areas. The technical documentation is available from the Census Bureau for \$5.

CD-ROM data is available approximately 3-4 weeks after tapes are released. Technical documentation is included on the disc. To order, contact the Census Bureau. The fee varies but averages about \$150 per disc.

Printed census publications may be ordered directly from the Census Bureau. Prices may vary depending on the publication.

Maps of Alaska are available from the Census Bureau. There are 740 county/block map sheets and 172 tract/BNA map sheets for the state. The cost is \$5 per map sheet.
