DEIS MEETING — TALKING POINTS

A. <u>Background</u>

The Problem... in 1989, Joe Hazelwood drove the *Exxon Valdez* onto Bligh Reef, dumping 11 million gallons of crude oil resulting in widespread damages as described in the *5th Year Status Report* (refer to copy)

The Opportunity ... following extensive litigation:

- in 1991, the US District Court approved a civil settlement that resolved the claims that the US and the State of Alaska had brought against *Exxon* for the recovery of civil damages from the spill
- *Exxon* agreed to pay US/State of Alaska \$900 million over ten years (through 2001) and provided the opportunity to restore the damages from the spill

[NOTE: settlement governed by two documents (1) consent decree between *Exxon* and US/SOA, and (2) MOA between the US and the SOS... both approved by US Court]

B. Use of Settlement Funds

- MOA provides restoration funds may be used only ...
 - "... for the purposes of restoring, replacing, enhancing, or acquiring the equivalent of natural *resources* as a result of the Oil Spill and the reduced or lost *services* provided by such resources..."
 - inside Alaska, unless agreed that Outside necessary for effective restoration
 - all decision unanimous
- the settlement contemplated significant reimbursements "off the top" to (1) the federal/state agencies for the costs associated with damage assessment, cleanup, response and litigation, as well as (2) *Exxon* for clean up costs

(see DRP, p. 5 for basic accounting of past expenditures)

— approximately \$654 million remains uncommitted at this time

- ... provides direction to guide the Annual Work Plan
- (very brief) highlights of Draft Restoration Plan:

Chapter 2 Policies (... nine policies with explanations)
 Chapter 4 Objectives (describes what the injuries have been and what proposed recovery objectives are)
 Appendix B more detailed information about injury to specific resources

- E. A Brief Review of the Public Process to Date
 - public participation in the TC process has been extensive
 - January 1992, public meetings were held/written comments requested regarding recommendation for establishment of PAG, later formed in October 1992
 - additional public meetings were held in May 1992 on the restoration Framework Volume I document which provided an initial, general framework for restoration planning
 - a third set of meetings was held in April-May 1993 to discuss Alternatives for the Draft Restoration Plan (the "tabloid")
 - approximately 2,000 comments were received on the tabloid
 - complied in the *Summary of Public Comment on Alternatives* in September 1993
 - these public comments were used and reflected in preparation of the *Draft Restoration Plan* (see example, Policy 4, p. 12 of the DFRP)
- F. Final Note...
 - important to understand what Draft Restoration Plan is/isn't...
 - the *Draft Restoration Plan* provides basic guidance on the types of restoration activities that can occur, it *does not* specify specific expenditures (or projects)... rather those decisions are made through the approval of the annual Work Plan
 - in making decisions regarding the the annual work plan, the TC has been using the *Draft Restoration Plan* for guidance (on an interim basis) and will use the final restoration plan adopted by the TC after this public review process is complete

- C. The Trustee Council
 - the settlement, under the Clean Water Act, provides that the President and the Gov appoint Trustees to supervise use of funds...
 - Attorney General (Botehlo/Tillery)
 - Commissioner of ADFG (Rosier)
 - Commissioner of DEC (Sandor)
 - Secretary of the Interior (Babbitt/Frampton)
 - Administrator of NOAA/US Dept of Commerce (Pennoyer)

 - at the direction of Trustees, the TC administers Restoration Fund

 - ... contains proposed policies for making decisions about restoration actions
 - ... provides a common language for describing restoration
 - ... describes the basic components of what the Trustee Council has developed as the proposed alternative: a comprehensive, balanced approach to restoration, including
 - Monitoring
 - Research
 - General Restoration
 - Habitat Protection

Trustee Council Pursues Restoration

Anchorage—The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council moved forward with a comprehensive approach to restoration and recovery of the resources injured by the 1989 spill at their meeting Tuesday.

"The Trustees' actions will provide a balanced approach to full restoration of the Alaskan ecosystem injured by the oil spill," said newly-appointed Executive Director Jim Ayers.

At the November 30 meeting the Trustee Council approved projects ranging from Kodiak to Prince William Sound. The Trustees approved a Draft Restoration Plan which will guide all future restoration actions, adopted a mission statement to help focus future Trustee actions, released the list of proposed 1994 projects for public review, approved funding for an Alutiiq Archaeological Artifact Repository in Kodiak, and reviewed the agenda for the Prince William Sound ecosystem workshop scheduled this weekend in-Cordova.

The Draft Restoration Plan outlines an ecosystem approach which includes general restoration, monitoring and research, and habitat protection.

The draft plan, which still must comply with the National Environmental Protection Act process, will be used to guide annual decisions on how to spend the bulk of the civil settlement monies.

The myriad of general restoration projects proposed for the coming year include a project to restore sockeye salmon in Prince William Sound to replace

salmon lost as a result of the oil spill, work to remove oil from mussel beds, and treatment of oiled beaches near the village of Chenega.

Monitoring and research projects under consideration include the development of a world-renowned marine research institute to be located in Seward. Some other related research projects include fisheries projects to determine the causes of recent drops in pink salmon and herring populations in Prince William Sound and sockeye on the Kenai Peninsula, and projects to assess the condition of various indicator species such as marine mammals and seabirds.

Action planned on habitat protection includes evaluation and ranking of additional parcels of land for their importance to species injured by the spill. The Trustees also directed Ayers to initiate tentative discussions with the owners of seventeen parcels which were already highly ranked.

Also at their November 30 meeting the Trustees received an update on the Ecosystem Workshop scheduled in Cordova December 4 through 6 to develop an ecosystem study for Prince William Sound. Workshop participants will define problems occurring in Prince William Sound, hypothesize causes and work to identify possible solutions.

In addition, the Trustees for the first time approved a mission statement which emphasizes restoring the injured ecosystem, "while taking into account the importance of quality of life and the need for viable opportunities to establish and sustain a reasonable standard of living."

"It's been two years of long hard work to get the restoration to this point," said Ayers. "I'm confident that the process will result in wise use of the settlement funds to benefit the entire nation as well as Alaskan residents and the injured eocsystem in the spill area."

Fact Sheet: November 30, 1993 Trustee Council Council

Anchorage—The draft plan to guide use of funds to restore resources and services injured by the *Exxon Valdez* oil spill was approved by state and federal officials at their November 30 meeting.

The *Draft Restoration Plan* outlines the policies developed by the *Exxon Valdez* Trustee Council after extensive public comment on two preliminary documents released in 1992 and 1993. The plan is available for public review now and will be sent out for formal public comment concurrently with the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the plan. Copies are available at the Oil Spill Public Information Center.

This Trustee Council meeting was the first to take place since appointment of new Executive Director Jim Ayers.

"The Trustees made a lot of critical decisions at this meeting," Ayers said. "It was an ideal point for me to come on board." The Trustees hired Ayers to move restoration activities into a second phase of work with adoption of the "Restoration Plan and approval of development of an ecosystem planning approach.

The Restoration Plan incorporates nine general policies, each addressing an issue that was raised during public discussions. The policies specify that:

- the restoration program will take an ecosystem approach;
- restoration activities may be considered for any injured resource or the service it provides;

 - most restoration activities will occur within the spill area; a few restoration activities may occur elsewhere in Alaska;
 - restoration activities will emphasize resources and services that have not recovered from injuries sustained as a result of the 1989 spill;
 - activities must have a relationship to an injured resource, benefit the same user group that was injured and should be compatible with the character and public uses of the area;
 - competitive proposals will be encouraged;
 - restoration projects will be subject to independent scientific review;
 - meaningful public participation will continue to be actively solicited; and
 - government agencies involved will be funded only for restoration work that they do not normally conduct.

Other actions and issues discussed during the Trustee Council meeting included:

- The Trustees reviewed the *Comprehensive Habitat Protection Process: Large Parcel Evaluation & Ranking* document, which evaluated and ranked eightyone land parcels of one thousand acres or more for their importance to species injured by the spill. The Trustees then directed Ayers to initiate discussions with the owners of seventeen parcels of privately owned land in Prince William Sound, on the Kenai Peninsula and in the Kodiak region which received high rankings.
- The Trustees directed Ayers to send the Draft 1994 Work Plan out for public review and comment. The document should be distributed around December 13, staff members said. The draft plan will include a proposed Alaska Marine Research Institute to be located in Seward and dedicated to research and monitoring of marine mammals and seabirds to aid in their long-term recovery.
- Funding was approved for the Alutiiq Archaeological Repository in Kodiak.
- The 1993 Shoreline Survey Assessment project report was delivered by Project Leader Ernie Piper and geomorphologist Dr. Jim Gibeaut. They reported that oil residue—either surface or subsurface—was present at every one of the 59 study sites the team visited in Prince William Sound and the Kenai region. They also noted that overall oiling is markedly reduced, and that the effects of cleanup work are becoming more apparent over time as indicated by reductions in oil remaining at sites which were cleaned more aggressively. Gibeaut said there was also a substantial decrease in subsurface

oil found from 1991 to 1993. He noted that the rate of decrease is slowing, however, and speculated that it may take another four years to see the amount of improvement noted between 1991 and 1993.

• The Trustees reviewed the agenda for an Ecosystem Workshop sponsored by the Council to take place in Cordova December 4 through 6. This workshop is the result of the Trustees commitment to develop an ecosystem study for Prince William Sound. Workshop participants will define problems occurring in Prince William Sound, hypothesize causes and work to identify possible solutions.

Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustees Appoint Executive Director

Anchorage — The Exxon Valdez Oil Spill Trustee Council today unanimously approved a motion to offer Jim Ayers of Juneau the position of Executive Director of Trustee Council operations.

In this position Ayers would direct restoration planning and management under the October 1991 civil settlement between the state and federal governments and Exxon. Ayers is currently Director of the Alaska Marine Highway System, and has served the State of Alaska previously in a variety of resource management posts, including Deputy Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

"We're excited about putting Mr. Ayers in this post," said Trustee Charles Cole, Alaska Attorney General. "We think this selection will give an indication to the people of the state and the country that we are serious about moving things forward with restoration, enhancement and acquisition in the spill affected region that will help to bring balance to an environment injured by the 1989 spill."

"The job with the Trustee Council is the opportunity of a lifetime to do good things for people, the environment and the resources," said Ayers. "I intend to work closely with the state and federal trustees and the people in the spill affected region. I'm very proud to serve and I'm confident we can reach agreement quickly on terms and conditions of the job." Ayers has nearly 20 years of experience in private enterprise and public administration, much of it resource-related. In addition to his work at the state ferry system and the fish and game department, he has worked extensively with rural, coastal Alaska communities. He holds a bachelor of science degree in economics and industrial management from Purdue University, and an M.S. in administration from the University of Oregon.

"The Department of the Interior appreciates the commitment on the part of the state trustees in choosing an extremely qualified person to serve as Executive Director," said George Frampton, Assistant Secretary for Fish, Wildlife and Parks. "This is an excellent example of the spirit of cooperation between the state and federal governments."

The Trustee Council in a separate motion approved a recommendation to Ayers of Molly McCammon as Assistant Director, noting that selection of key staff members will be one of Ayers' immediate priorities. Ayers said that he intends to meet with McCammon soon to discuss the position.

McCammon has specialized in fisheries management issues for both the state fish and game department, as a special assistant to the commissioner, and as staff to several state legislators representing Western Alaska coastal communities.

The Trustees commended Interim Administrative Director Dave Gibbons, who was appointed to that post at the Trustees' first meeting in December of 1991.

"Dave and the staff have done a tremendous job to bring us through this extremely fluid period in the formative stages of the trustees operations. Dr. Gibbons has done an exceptional job in helping the Trustee Council to steer through this difficult period and deserves a great deal of credit and thanks," said Steve Pennoyer, NOAA Trustee.
