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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The communities of Talkeetna, Trapper Creek, Cantwell, and Healy have been identified as potential impact areas of the Susitna Hydroelectric Project. An inventory of the socioeconomic characteristics of these communities has been undertaken to provide the baseline information necessary to forecast project-related impacts.

The public sector survey was conducted to obtain information about public facilities and services in Talkeetna, Trapper Creek, Cantwell, and Healy. Information obtained from the survey identified employment, service, and client characteristics for each public agency in the communities. The survey was conducted in 1983 for Talkeetna, Trapper Creek, and Cantwell. In 1985, information was updated for these three communities and Healy was surveyed for the first time.

2.0 APPROACH AND METHODOLOGY

The agencies surveyed were identified from several sources, including contacts made during the project feasibility study, the 1983 survey, other Susitna project surveys, and telephone listings. Thirty-one of 32 identified agencies responded, representing a 97 percent response rate.

The agencies surveyed are listed in Table 1. These agencies include federal and state departments as well as public schools and libraries. Between November 14 and 18, 1983, representatives of 19 agencies located in Talkeetna, Trapper Creek, and Cantwell were interviewed by telephone from Anchorage. Between April 23 and 26, 1985 representatives from these 19 agencies were again interviewed to update the information obtained in 1983. During this 1985 period interviews were conducted for the first time with eight agencies in Healy, two in Cantwell, one in Talkeetna, and one in Trapper Creek. When possible, the manager of each agency was interviewed. In cases where the manager was unavailable or did not have the requested information, the interviewer solicited the name of an agency contact who could provide the information.

The questionnaire used in 1983 consisted of 22 questions and required approximately 10 to 15 minutes to administer, depending upon the availability of information and the length of answers. The questionnaire used for Healy in 1985 was the same as that used in 1983 except that questions concerning operating budget were deleted. These questions were deleted because the 1983 survey found that local agency workers could not accurately answer the questions. The follow-up survey for Talkeetna, Trapper Creek, and Cantwell, conducted in 1985 consisted of 10 questions and required 5 to 10 minutes to administer. Samples of the 1983 and follow-up questionnaires are in Appendix A.

The surveys provided information on employment in the public sector on a community and area-wide basis. The results are summarized below.

3.0 PROJECT AREA RESULTS

3.1 Geographic Location and Duration.

Most of the agency offices in each of the four communities were near the center of the community they served. Their location made them accessible to the majority of the community residents. Most of the agencies interviewed had been established in their respective community for 10 years or more; the newest office opened in 1983.

3.2 Employment

The majority of the employees for all agencies combined had been residents of the community for more than one year. In most communities, full-time and part-time employment at agencies, excluding schools, was stable throughout the year. One exception was Cantwell, where the number of full-time employees increased by one-half during the winter. The other exception was Trapper Creek, where the number of part-time employees doubled during the summer months. As would be expected, schools maintained only a small staff, ranging from zero to five part-time employees during the summer months.

Of the 25 agencies other than schools, 15 used part-time summer employees and 16 used part-time winter employees. In most communities, the number of part-time employees was larger than the number of full-time employees for either season.

Eight of the 31 agencies responded that they had experienced problems in the last fiscal year. Problems mentioned included budget constraints, availability of workers, inadequacy of facilities, structural problems with the facilities, and increasing enrollment (schools) without additional staff.

3.3 Future Development

One agency planned to reduce service levels in 1986. Five of the 31 agencies planned to expand their existing service levels, but for three of these, the plans were either uncertain or depended on whether the future budget would be adequate.

4.0 RESULTS BY COMMUNITY

4.1 Talkeetna

Of the 10 Talkeetna agencies interviewed, 8 had been established in the community longer than 5 years. All of the agencies had been in Talkeetna more than five years.

The survey results indicated that the levels of employment in Talkeetna were stable year round in all of the agencies, with the exception of the two public schools. The higher average employment level in the schools during the winter could be attributed to the seasonality of school operation. The employment levels by season are presented in Tables 2 and 3.

Full-time employment by season since 1978 is presented for Talkeetna in Table 4. As shown, during the 1978-1983 period, employment levels fluctuated slightly in the summer and winter. In 1984, however, there was a substantial increase in the number of full-time winter employees, though the number of full-time summer employees remained relatively constant. This cannot be attributed to the one additional agency surveyed in 1985 because all of these employees were part-time. Rather, it is the product of an increase in school employment. Most of the employees for both summer and winter had resided in Talkeetna for more than one year.

Two of the agencies had experienced problems in the last fiscal year, including inadequate facilities and insufficient staffing. Three of the 10

remaining agencies anticipated maintaining their current level of service, at least in the short term.

4.2 Trapper Creek

The Trapper Creek survey included interviews with six agencies. Each agency had been established in Trapper Creek for a minimum of five years. Two of the agencies had been located in the community for more than 10 years.

Full-time employment remained constant from summer to winter in Trapper Creek at agencies other than the schools. Similar to Talkeetna, winter employment in Trapper Creek was higher than summer employment at agencies other than schools due to when schools were in session (Tables 2 and 3). Part-time employment at agencies other than schools, however, was almost double in the winter what it was in the summer (Tables 2 and 3). Full-time employment levels for the past seven years had been fairly stable with a total increase of five employees from 1978 to 1984.

One agency experienced problems during the past year, citing structural problems with the building. Only one of the agencies had plans to increase services.

4.3 Cantwell

Eight agencies participated in the Cantwell survey. All but 1 of the 8 agencies had been established in the community for more than 10 years; 4 agencies had been established for more than 20 years. The oldest agency was formed in 1923.

Part-time employment in Cantwell remained stable from winter to summer at agencies other than schools. Full-time employment, however, decreased from 20 in the winter to 14 in the summer. Similar to Trapper Creek and Talkeetna, school employment decreased substantially during the summer months. The agencies reported an increase in full-time winter employment

over the past 7 years from 16 to 26 persons. Full-time summer employment remained fairly stable over the past 7 years (Table 4). All of the employees were residents of Cantwell for one year or more.

One of the agencies reported that funding problems were causing inadequate staffing during the summer. None of the agencies had plans to change service levels.

4.4. Healy

The Healy survey included interviews with eight agencies. All 8 had been in the community for at least 10 years, and 4 of these had been established for over 20 years.

The survey results indicated that the level of part-time and full-time employment in Healy at agencies other than schools remained fairly constant from winter to summer. The seasonality of school employment caused summer employment in the schools to be substantially lower than in the winter months (Tables 2 and 3). Full-time employment by season is presented in Table 4. From 1979 to 1985, employment remained constant at the eight agencies interviewed.

Two of the eight agencies had experienced problems in the last fiscal year due to lack of funding for additional staffing. None of the eight agencies had plans for expansion; seven anticipated maintaining their current level of service.
