STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

Takotna serves as a major commercial center for many years and was in existence at 1910 serving as a major river landing and supply point for the Innoko River Mining District. It still serves today as a supply/staging area for those gold fields.

Several roadhouses; Riek's Roadhouse (or Tokotna Roadhouse and Post Office), Gullickson's Roadhouse, and Cap McLane's Roadhouse, a post office, Pioneer's Lodge (1931-1933) and a telephone system (Takotna to McGrath), a newspaper and trading companies; operated at Takotna.
