## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

Established in 1910, Dikeman served as a commercial boat landing on the Iditarod River until 1915. Located at the site were cabins, a store, and a post office that existed from March 24, 1911, until Sept. 30, 1915. Dikeman was founded by William A. Dikeman, co-discoverer, with John Beaton of Gold on Otter Creek. The remains of a false front structure were reported in July 1980. The foundations of several other structures were located to the south of the store and are in ruins. Also located was a grave.
